



63 School Taxpayers File Law Suit Against 1970 Tax Roll

Wednesday morning a law suit against Clovis King as tax assessor-collector of the Gatesville Independent School District by a group of 63 taxpayers of the school district was filed in Judge Truman Roberts 52nd District Court in Gatesville. The suit threatened for six weeks by the group, seeks to enjoin the 1970 tax roll here.

Plaintiffs in the suit were hoping action by the school board to hire a tax appraisal firm would make it unnecessary to file the suit.

The tax suit resulted from the Gatesville School Board's

delay of decision on the equalizing of the 1971 tax roll.

The petition points out to the court that "they (the plaintiffs) have no adequate remedy at law and will suffer irreparable injury unless granted a temporary restraining order, temporary injunction and in due time, perpetual injunction, restraining the Defendant from carrying into effect the proposed and illegal assessments of taxes and from placing such illegal valuations on the tax records and creating a lien upon the properties of the Plaintiffs and other persons owning taxable property with-

in the Gatesville Independent School District similarly situated."

The petition also asks the court that the tax assessor and his successors "be at once temporarily restrained and upon a hearing temporarily enjoined from assessing or attempting to assess any values for tax purposes upon any of the Plaintiffs properties of any other persons similarly situated within the confines of said school district based upon such prospective valuations, and from levying or collecting any tax upon any of the properties of the Plaintiffs and upon any properties within said Independent School District based upon said valuation procedure as was used, and from making and certifying and approving any of the present tax rolls prepared on such basis or until the same are fair and equitable, from putting into effect or attempting to put into effect any plan or scheme of assessment bases upon the findings of the Board of Trustees of the Gatesville Independent School District."

Further, the petition calls for the Court to "appoint a Master in Chancery to supervise the placing of all property on the tax rolls at a fair, just and equal value according to the tax laws regulating same and that upon final hearing said injunction be made permanent and Plaintiffs be awarded full gen-

erals and costs of this suit." The petition is filed in the name of the Gatesville Independent School District.

Pearl Honored At Statewide Banquet

The Pearl Community Improvements Program received another high honor last week at the Community Recognition Banquet in College Station.

Pearl was one of 35 communities over the state to be presented a silver tray for 10 years of continuous enrollment in the Community Improvements Program.

Attending the Banquet from Pearl were Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Freeman, Leta Graham, Mr. and Mrs. A. V. Freeman, Don Callahan and Mrs. Wanda Brown.

Governor Preston Smith addressed the more than 400 community leaders, representatives of the public utilities companies operating in Texas which sponsor the Agricultural Extension Service conducted Texas Community Improvement Program, high administrative officials of Texas and A&M and their friends.

The Governor told the overflow audience that we need strong rural communities and thriving small towns. "They have," he said, "been and are a great source of strength for America and we need to preserve them. I am impressed with the mottoes of this program. First—'Brighten the Corner Where You Are' is based on the theory that before you can have effective group improvement, you must have individual motivation. The second, 'Working to Make Texas Even Better' is a most worthy goal.

"When you involve 'corner brightening' individuals in groups, there is opportunity to achieve this end. You have proven in your communities that this is an ideal to which we can all aspire."

Governor Smith had high praise for the leaders who have given their time and talents, both in and out of the communities, for developing and giving leadership to a program which has over the years been responsible for more than 1,000 community centers, 750 community water systems, expanded rural telephone systems, expanded health services, better housing, youth programs that work, improved agriculture and a long list of other achievements which have truly made Texas a better place to live.

"Our greatest natural resource," said Governor Smith, "is our boys and girls, and the demonstrated abilities of those appearing on the program tonight tell us our future is in good hands. They deserve the best possible facilities to study and learn. They must have every opportunity to live happy and productive lives.

"Through the statewide Texas Communities Tomorrow Program, we are striving

to increase industrial growth in rural areas. In 1969 when Texas ranked first in the nation in industrial growth, almost 35 percent of the new

Hornets Seek Victory Against Marlin Bulldogs In Home Stand

It will be Bulldogs again this week for the Hornets as the Marlin Bulldogs come to town for the opening battle at McKamie Stadium.

The Hornets' loss to McGregor makes it four straight losses for the locals and the trend will have to be stopped soon.

Coach Jack Moss reports his team in top physical condition after the hard-hitting battle with McGregor. The Hornets did lose several players to cramps during the McGregor game. Reportedly, the salt tablet consumption in the local fieldhouse has increased this week.

Against McGregor, the Hornet offense made very few "execution errors" but fumbles did hurt the scoreboard for the Hornets. Coach Moss reviewed the films of the game and graded his offense as "good." He said, "They all looked good" speaking of his offense. Allen Bell played very good at guard on offense, noted the coach.

On defense, only three players received mention this week after the staff had graded the films. Terry King, defensive tackle; Jim Smith, stinger; and Billy Hord, cornerback, each received praise from Moss for their defensive play. Moss said, "We lost on our defense and McGregor did a good job of

blocking." Summing up football, Moss said, "The offense sells the tickets and the defense wins the games." He admitted that the singling is completely different for a defense and "it gave us problems." Offensively, the Hornets had good blocking from the line all night, noted Moss. From Mike Mathews at tight end to Ricky Thompson at split end, blocking assignments were effective.

Moss seemed pleased that his offensive total yardage came from six running backs. With 287 yards total offense, four runners, Larry Moore, Jim Saunders, Ronald Brown and Steve Palmer, averaged over six yards per carry. The breakdown of the offensive performance is listed below:

Moss noted that despite the distribution of the offense, his big performer from last year, Ronald Brown, was still effective, gaining 79 yards in 10 carries. Last season Brown carried over 30 times per game and gained between 100 and 130 yards each game. The 20 extra carries last year for Brown were "hard-nosed, one and two yards at a time" carries.

The offense lacked a passing punch as the Hornets had no completed passes during the game.

This week, with Marlin, passing will have a big part of the action as this set of Bulldogs rely on their passing game for an offensive punch.

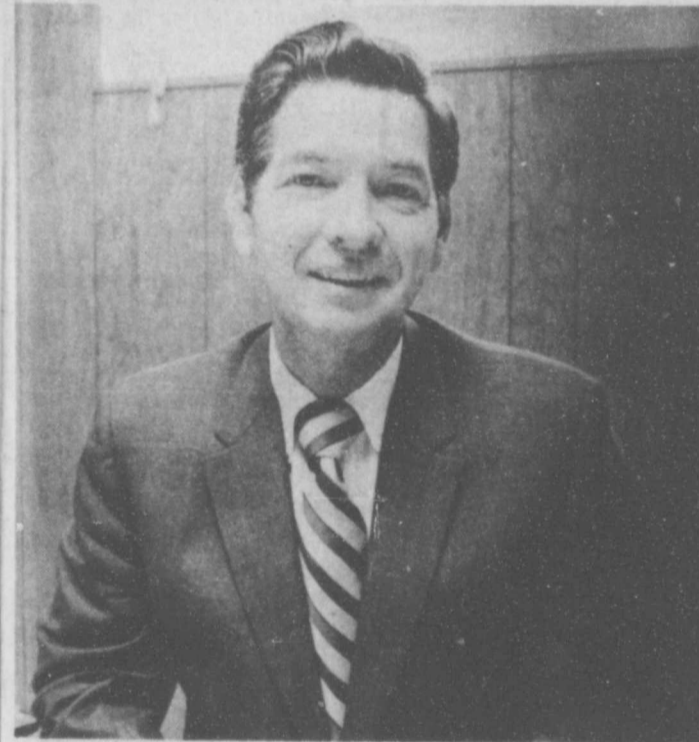
Hospital Cost Set At \$80,756 Construction To Start Soon

A \$80,756 negotiated bid figure was approved Monday by Commissioners' Court for the proposed improvements to the Coryell Memorial Hospital.

K. A. Sparks Contractors Inc. of Hamilton was awarded the contract with 200 calendar days set for completion. Sparks had been low bidder at a bid opening in July and the only bidder at a later bid opening in August.

The hospital project calls for many changes in the facility. Surgical and X-ray facilities will be approximately doubled with the addition of much needed recovery rooms. Hospital Administrator, Joe Gilmore estimates, "The overall project calls for approximately 2800 square feet of additional floor space."

Gilmore indicated that the dietary department would approximately double its present size and space for storage of wheelchairs and other

School Board Decides More Time Is Needed

In a special meeting of the Gatesville School Board Tuesday night the school board issued a statement answering demands for tax equalization.

Board member Hal Anderson made a motion "That the Gatesville Independent School Board of Trustees forego employment of an outside appraisal firm at this time."

The board has not had enough time to make a basic study

of the tax-valuations, and to act under duress without further study would not be fair to the taxpayers of this district. Be it further ordered that the board continue study of tax valuations and to work out a plan to better equalize valuations for the 1971 tax roll. This can be done by using a local appraisal board or an independent appraisal firm. And, be it

further moved that the board make every effort to care or have adjusted as far as possible tax valuation inequities."

The motion was seconded by Ray Byrom and passed unanimously by the school board.

The special meeting was short, lasting only 35 minutes and the private executive committee met for 20 minutes of the time.

Several local citizens attended the meeting in hopes of avoiding the threatened law suit. With the school board's statement of policy there was no need in further discussion.

Mayor Bob Miller attended the meeting with intention of assuring the school board that the city council would consider the appraisal project and possibly participate in the cost of the program.

The school board began the meeting with several pieces of business being considered prior to the tax appraisal question. The board voted to borrow money on anticipated income from the state for operation of the school. Insurance on the newly completed fieldhouse extension was increased.

Also the 1970 tax roll was amended to total \$16,108,780.

"Proper Pressure?"

Pressure must be applied in the "proper" place. The school board has been under pressure in recent weeks to have the 1971 tax roll appraised by an outside firm. Let's review the tremendous pressure that has been applied. A group of citizens, between 20 and 30, attended the August meeting of the school board and threatened a law suit unless the tax roll for 1971 was not equalized.

Editorials then began to fly. Admittedly strong, these editorials have attempted to show the need for change in our tax rolls.

The September meeting of the school board heard the citizen group's lawyer request that the school board accept the proposal and cost estimate of Southwest Appraisals Inc. Pressure was executed in a tactful manner.

Pressure continued to build with communications between the citizen group and the school board and administration. The threat of a law suit lost its tactful pleading and became a promised action.

Great pressure continued to build with last Tuesday night's special school board meeting figuring to be the climax.

Under the definite promise of legal action if the board did not hire an outside tax appraisal firm, the final decision came to a climax.

Quickly reviewing the above paragraphs, the school board was under "duress."

Despite all these pressures publically stated and openly applied by myself and other citizens, the board ruled not to meet our request. (We had applied all our pressures in the proper channels.)

There was one other bit of pressure applied this year on the tax roll. A small group of citizens complained when they received their "notice to appear before the board of equalization" because their taxes had been raised.

The school board listened to this "private, behind-the-back" pressure and reset the school tax policy all in one easy, almost unnoticed step.

"It is not what you know, it is who you know." Somebody said that sometime.

It is hard to believe that subtle pressure by a few individuals can carry more weight than the legal pressures applied over a six-week period.

Just think--in the short time that the notices were issued in July, a small minority of taxpayers quietly pressured the school board into interfering with the entire school tax policies.

We tried to reverse that action for six weeks with no results. Which is the "proper pressure"?

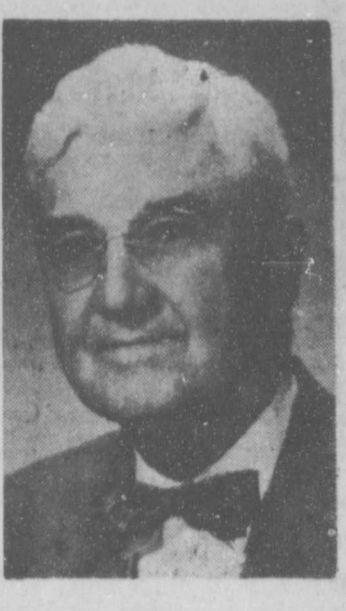

C.C. Curry, Former Resident And Temple J.P., Dies

Coleman C. Curry, 78, of Temple, a justice of the peace in Temple for seven years, died early Monday morning on his way to a Temple hospital after a heart attack.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday at Memorial Baptist Church with Rev. R. B. Baker officiating. Burial was in Bellwood Memorial Park.

Mr. Curry was born April 3, 1892, in Brookhaven community in Bell County, the son of Joseph Oran Curry and Virginia Lee Curry, early settlers in the county. He attended Brookhaven High School and Wedemeyer Academy in Temple. He lived in Gatesville and McGregor, and was a member of the McGregor School Board for eight years and chairman of the board for six years. He was employed in the Bell County tax office in Belton for many years and washing inspector for the City of Killeen.

He served as justice of the peace in Precinct 3, Place 2, from 1959 until his retirement Jan. 1, 1966. After his retirement he was Bell County Grand Jury bailiff. He was a licensed electrician and licensed building inspector under the Southern Building Code.

He was married to Mrs. Frances Jordan, Dec. 2, 1914. He was a member of Memorial Baptist Church, Knob Creek Lodge A.F.&M., and Temple Chapter 153, Order of the Eastern Star.

He was active in Sunday school work at Memorial Baptist Church.

Surviving are his wife; one son, Rayburn Curry of Temple; two daughters, Mrs. M. S. Hagler of Marlin and Mrs. Robert W. Copeland of Temple; three brothers, Dr. J. L. Curry of Belton, Edgar Curry of Florence and John Curry of San Angel; three sisters, Mrs. Turk Brown of Gatesville, Mrs. Izora Well of Killeen and Miss Eva Curry of Abilene; seven grandchildren and a great-grandchild.

up. And his power shall be mighty, but not by his own power: And he shall destroy wonderfully, and shall prosper, and practice, and shall destroy the mighty, and the holy people. And through his policy, also, he shall cause craft to prosper in his hand; and he shall magnify himself in his heart, and by peace, shall destroy many; he shall also stand up against the Prince of princes; but he shall be broken without hand." (Dan. 8:23-25)

Jesus Christ is presented in the Holy Scriptures, as the Son of God, and the true Messiah; He, himself, spoke of "false prophets." "Anti-Christ" or the opposite of Christ, is a Biblical term. The Apostle John wrote: "And every spirit that confesseth not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh, is not of God: And this is that spirit of Anti-Christ, whereof ye have heard that it should come; and even now, already, it is in the world." (I John 4:3)

The Apostle Paul called this one, Anti-Christ, "the man of sin, the son of perdition" and this wicked one, he explained, will be destroyed by the brightness of Christ's coming. (II Thess. 2:8)

The prophet Daniel described the Anti-Christ of the end times, as the one who would "cause craft to prosper in his hand" and who "by peace would destroy many." He also will stand up against the Prince of princes.

Jesus Christ is the Prince of princes or the Prince of peace; the Anti-Christ is a false prince of peace. The name of Peace will be his weapon to bring all under his yoke of Peace.

Rev. 13 calls this Anti-Christ the Beast; He has a number--the number of a man--666. And God says, "Here is wisdom. Let him

that hath understanding count the number of the beast." (Rev. 13:8) The beast "deceiveth them that dwell on the earth--and cause, that as many as would not worship the image of the beast, should be killed.--And that no man might buy or sell, save he had the mark." (Verses 14, 15, 17.)

I'm saying all of this to bring this thought, hoping we may consider it, seriously. The so-called peace symbol which the hippies and the communists are using everywhere is nothing but a cross, turned upside down, and broken with a circle drawn around it.

The Anti-Christ, as described in the Bible, rejects Christ, and all that He represented in His cross, but he will destroy many, by Peace. (Dan. 8:25.)

The present, general acceptance, by so many of this "peace" symbol, and its increasing use in so many places, may be preparing the way for the Anti-Christ to condition the people to accept his mark, which all must have, and willingly accept, in order to live, buy and sell.

The rejection, and dishonoring of the cross as the "peace" sign, is indeed the spirit of Anti-Christ. Daniel says the Anti-Christ will put emphasis on "Peace" to destroy many.

Jesus said himself, "that as a snare, it shall come on all them that dwell on the face of the whole earth," and "take heed to yourselves, lest, at any time, your hearts be overcharged with surfeiting, and drunkenness, and cares of this life, and so that day come upon you, unawares" (Luke 21:34-35)

The Book of Revelation also explains that this world dictator will be destroyed by the true Christ, when He comes in the clouds of glory.

Jesus Christ will appear, and in righteousness, he doth

judge and make war. The hosts of heaven will follow Him. The Beast shall be taken. (Rev. 19th chapter.)

The dramatic future events described in the Bible concerning the Anti-Christ, and his destruction, seem to be foreshadowed, and in preparation for fulfillment.

The true Christ represents everything that is contrary to Anti-Christ. He was sent by God, not inspired by Satan, as is the Anti-Christ.

He, Christ, is our "Peace." He "made peace, by the blood of His cross."

The Cross is the true emblem of Peace, not the broken inverted cross as the symbol we see in so many places now.

In the midst of these days of perplexities, confusion, revolution, when men's hearts are failing them for fear, Christ still calls men to Himself, and invites them to believe in Him.

"He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life; and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him." (John 3:36)

The Bible presents the true man of Peace, the Lord Jesus Christ, and describes the day when He comes in Judgement, at the beginning of his great millennial reign of Peace, when the knowledge of the Lord shall cover the earth, as the waters cover the sea. (Isaiah, 11th chapter)

The false prince of Peace conspires to weaken, disarm and destroy the true forces of freedom, righteousness, and peace.

Jesus taught his believers to "watch and pray" which should be the watch word of God's people today; that we not be deceived by the false peace and the symbol of the Anti-Christ.

This is the message of the hour!

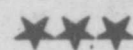

GLAZED DOUGHNUTS

- 1 c. scalded milk
- 1/4 c. sugar
- 1/2 c. Crisco
- 1 t. salt
- 1 c. flour
- 2 eggs
- 1 pkg. yeast
- 1/4 c. warm water
- 2 1/4 c. flour
- 1/2 t. vanilla

Combine in a mixing bowl milk, sugar, Crisco and salt. Add flour and beat well. Add eggs and beat again. Dissolve yeast in water and add to mixture. Then add flour and vanilla. Let stand in warm place for 1 hour. Work down and roll out. Pattern with doughnut cutter. Let stand 10 minutes. Drop in hot grease until brown.

GLAZE

- 1/2 box powdered sugar
- 1/4 c. milk

Mix well in a small mixing bowl. Roll browned doughnuts in glaze.

 "Marlin is not big with a line averaging 175 pounds, but they are quick," Moss said. "We will have to stop the Big play to beat them," he continued.

The Hornets defense will be in for another big test with Marlin. Instead of the power, the attack will be quick and explosive air action directed at the defensive backfield.

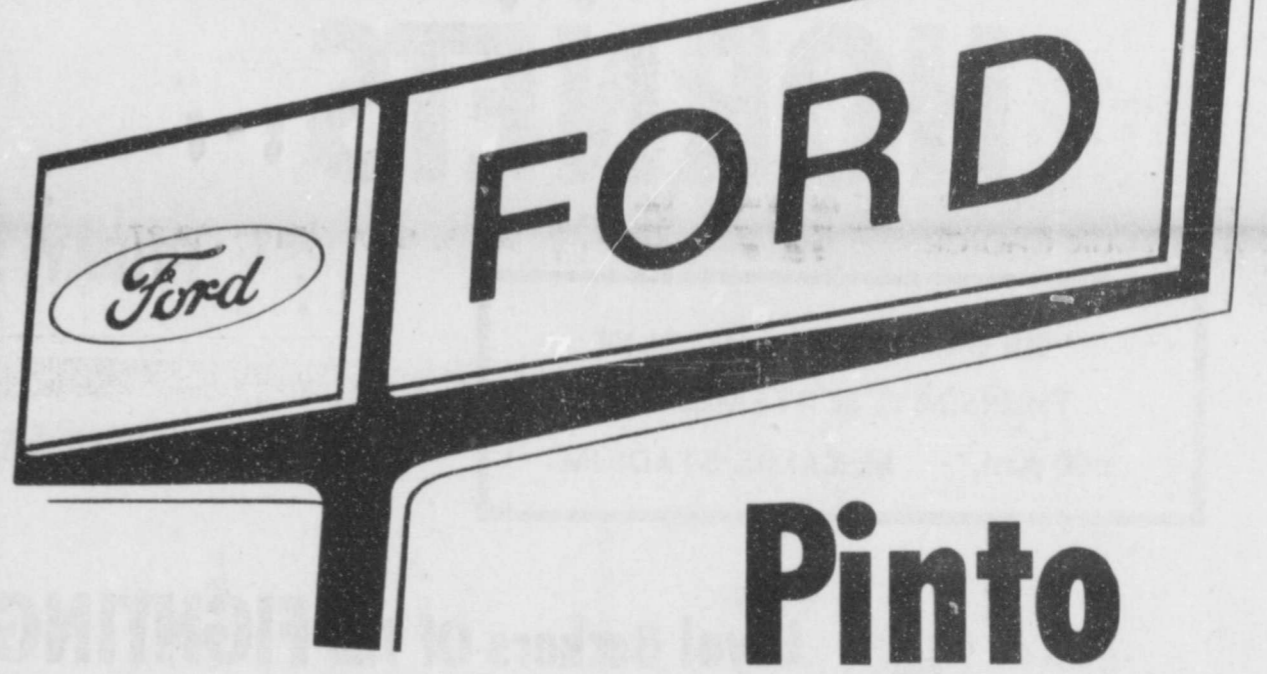
