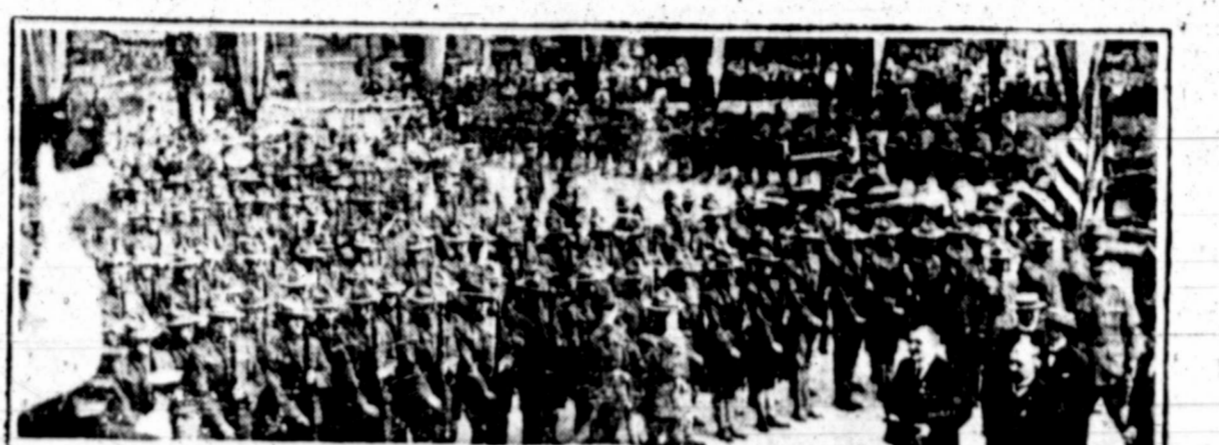

U.S. GOVERNMENT HURRYING WORK ON AVIATION CAMPS

The following dispatch is reprinted from the New York Times and is of special interest here on account of Wichita Falls having been named as a site for one of the aviation training camps.

Washington, July 4.—The practical work of instructing America's big army of aviators will begin this week at the first of the new government aviation training fields at Rantoul, Ill., and by July 15 the fields at Dayton, Ohio, and Mount Clemens, Mich., will be completed.

This announcement was made today by Howard E. Coffin, chairman of the Aircraft Production Board. He said that all records had been broken in the construction of the field at Rantoul, and that union and non-union men had worked side by side without friction in order to best serve the nation's interests.

Mr. Coffin said that contracts had been let for enough training plants to start the task of instructing the aviators, and that while it would be impossible to obtain the full quota of planes by July 15 for the training fields, the work would not be seriously hindered. Twenty aviators will open the training field at Rantoul this week and within another week or ten days the entire undertaking will be going at top speed.

It has been the general impression that practical training could not be started for some time, and the announcement today came as a surprise to almost every one except the officials who have been preparing the fields. The experts here assert that America will develop its host of fliers with a speed that will amaze Germany and the rest of the world.

Mr. Coffin returned today from a tour of the training fields. "The construction work on Chanute Field at Rantoul has broken all records," Mr. Coffin said. "A half million dollars worth of buildings have been put up practically within a month. They form a village a mile long, and the speed with which they have been virtually sprung out of the ground has been deeply impressive. A few weeks ago the big mile-square space was simply a collection of corn fields."

"The explanation for the speed with which the work has been done is the spirit which has filled the men engaged in it. Union men and non-union men are working side by side in the effort to advance the national interest. The only outward distinction is that the union men are wearing behind a big American flag, which is advanced as the job progresses. The sole idea which has occupied the minds of the workmen has been the desire to break all records on this war work. There are 2,000 men on the job, and there has not been a disagreement or row of any kind since it started. I was impressed with the fact that these men were doing their part in the nation's service in the ranks with guns on their shoulders."

"Wars are now fought with nations in arms. Few of us can hope to serve in any heroic role or even carry a gun. Every science, industry, and trade now has its part to play. Our fliers will fight on the front in France, but the thousands of men and women whose labor will go to aid in equipping training and maintaining these fliers are also doing their share."

"There are 3,000 men working on the War Wright field at Chanute, 2,000 on the Selfridge field at Mount Clemens. The Dayton field is the most impressive, as it is more than twice the size of the others. It is intended to accommodate four squadrons instead of two, and is about one and three-quarters miles wide and two and one-half miles long. Over 100,000 men are actively superintending the work at Dayton."

"The preliminary training schools now training cadets will be prepared to send quotas of students to the training fields as soon as the fields are ready, and the work will be in full swing by the last of July. Arrangements have already been made for the training planes, and although the full quota of machines will not be available by the 15th, the shortage will not be serious."

DALLAS SECOND CITY IN NAVAL ENLISTMENTS
Dallas shows second on the list of the navy recruits for the whole of the United States, only New York City going ahead of it last week. Dallas enlisted 178 men, New York 201, Chicago 129, Boston 104, and Omaha 100. Wichita Falls for the week ending July 5th shows 57th on the list, but there are several extenuating circumstances to be taken into account. BAKER'S CENSORSHIP ORDER IS CALLED UNCONSTITUTIONAL

They had it if the organization would send for it.

THE NATIONAL CRISIS AND THE PUBLIC SCHOOL By Associated Press. Portland, Ore., July 10.—The world crisis, as it affects the United States, and the part this country is playing in it, is a test of the public school, according to Mrs. Mary C. C. Bradford, superintendent of public instruction of Colorado, as expressed in an address before the elementary section of the National Education association here today. Taking as her subject, "The Public School and the Nation in 1917," Mrs. Bradford declared that if the United States, carried into effect its avowed policy of "righteousness to all humanity" and "sacrifice for all nations" it will be "because the American public school has, in some degree at least, fulfilled the august task confided to it by the commands of democratic government." "If, after this great war to end wars shall be over," she continued, "America functions as the supreme idealistic force in the reorganization of the world, it will be because the public schools have given to the nation a higher vision than the world before has seen. This is the great task of the public school in 1917: to give the nation a vision that must be made by the school people of today." Pointing out that non-Americans had declared the public school system of this country the "supremely distinctive feature" of the American development, Mrs. Bradford declared: "A new vision must come to the school world of America; a vision that reveals to it itself as the moulder of the soul-stuff of the nation in the likeness of the ideal humanity." Comparing the public school to the Casket of the Holy Grail, she added, "Let us offer ourselves to the nation as one unit in the great army of those who stand ready to give all at the nation's summons; let us fit ourselves for the high enterprise of keeping safe the immortal draught with which the national ideals most perish."

INFORMATION CONCERNING THE ARMY DRAFT

A circular has been issued by Provost Marshal General Crowder giving information concerning the drafting of the men for the new army. It is believed that the draft will be started Saturday.

How or when the government will select the men to be examined is not detailed in the circular, but it is revealed that registration cards in each county or jurisdiction are to be numbered with red ink, and that as soon as the drawing is complete lists showing the order in which these red ink numbers are drawn will be published in the press and will be posted at the office of each local board. It already has been announced that the selection will take place in Washington, and the general presumption has been that some device similar to a jury wheel will be employed.

Exemptions by Local Boards. Exemptions are to be determined by the local boards, the circular shows only for the previously announced specified causes, such as are probably for the support of relatives, and not for agricultural and industrial reasons. Seven days after designations are posted will be allowed for filing claims. Then there will be an additional allowance of ten days for proofs, and the board must decide within three days after the proof is filed.

Does Not Cover Summoning to Service. The circular does not cover the summoning of the men for actual service, pointing out that selection and acceptance does not mean an immediate summons.

The steps a registered person should take are set forth in great detail in the circular. First, the registrant is advised to find out the location of the office of his county or city local board and then ascertain, if he intends to claim exemption for agricultural or industrial reasons, to what district board he must apply. "Every board has numbered the cards in its jurisdiction with red ink in a series running from one to the number representing the total number of cards in its jurisdiction," continues the circular. The red ink numbers are to be drawn by lot to determine the order in which registered persons are to be called by the various local boards.

Must Take Physical Examination. As soon as quotas are assigned in each state and each board, each board will call upon persons whose cards are in its jurisdiction, instructing them to present themselves for examination. You must report for physical

examination on the day named in your call.

"If you are found physically disqualified the board will give you a certificate which will explain to you your further duties.

"If you are found physically qualified and file no claim for exemption, or within seven days after your call you will be given ten days after filing your claim of exemption to file proof in support of your claim for exemption.

Names to Be Published.

"If you are found to be physically qualified and file no claim for exemption, or if you appear for physical examination, your name will be posted to the district board as one who was called for military service and was not examined or discharged. On the eighth day after call, or within two days thereafter, copies of the list of persons so posted to the district boards will be given to the press with a request for publication, will be posted at the office of the local board accessible to the public view, and notice will be mailed to you at the address on your registration card."

"Only the district board," concludes the circular, "can receive claims for discharge on the ground that you are engaged in industry including agriculture. Only decisions of district boards or industrial claims for discharge can be appealed. If you desire to appeal the decision of the district board to the President, you may do so within seven days of the date of mailing to you of the decision of the district board. As soon as you appear for physical examination, the adjutant general of your state will notify you by mail that you have been finally selected for military service."

"Notice that you have been selected for military service will not necessarily order you into service. Notice to report for military service will come when the government is ready to receive you."

A horizontal raise of 25 percent in the assessed valuations in the Wichita Falls Independent School District for school taxation purposes was ordered by the school board at a meeting Monday night. The city tax assessments are to be taken as a basis for the increase within the city limits and county tax rolls are to be taken as a basis for that part of the district outside the city. It is estimated that this twenty-five per cent raise will mean an increase in the school revenues of between \$14,000 and \$15,000.

The increase in the assessment is made necessary from the fact that the 50-cent limit provided in the State constitution has already been imposed in this district and the tax rate cannot therefore be raised.

It is absolutely necessary that the revenues be increased, members of the school board declare, if the schools are to be maintained at their present standard of efficiency.

At the meeting last night repairs were ordered on the Sam Houston school and necessary repairs were ordered on all other buildings. The old building at the Travis school were ordered torn down and material used in constructing a building on the north side of the river. If sufficient money remains from the bond issue after the completion of the Travis school, it is planned to erect a building east of the Valley tracks. The board already has an option on a site in that district.

COMMISSIONERS VOTE AP. PROPRIATION FOR CAMPBELL

The County Commissioners yesterday voted to renew its arrangements with J. W. Campbell as county demoralization agent. An appropriation of \$1,000 was voted for this purpose. The county joins with the federal government and the Chamber of Commerce in keeping Mr. Campbell in the field.

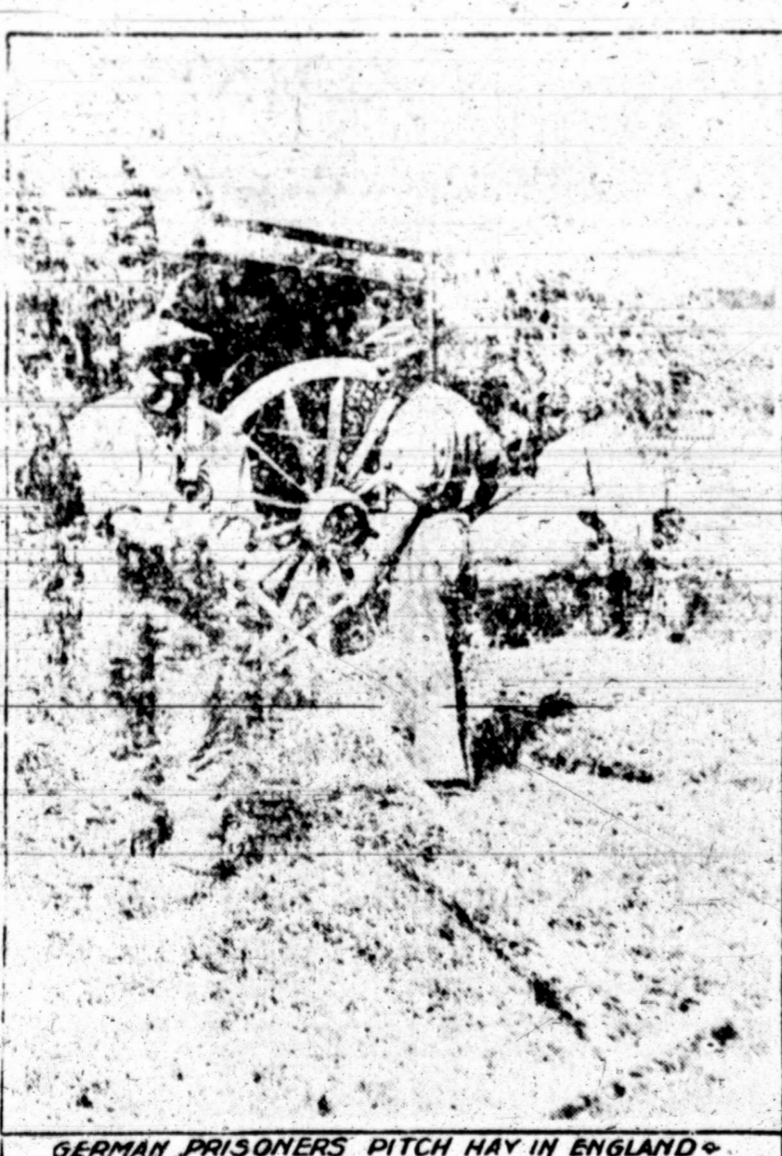

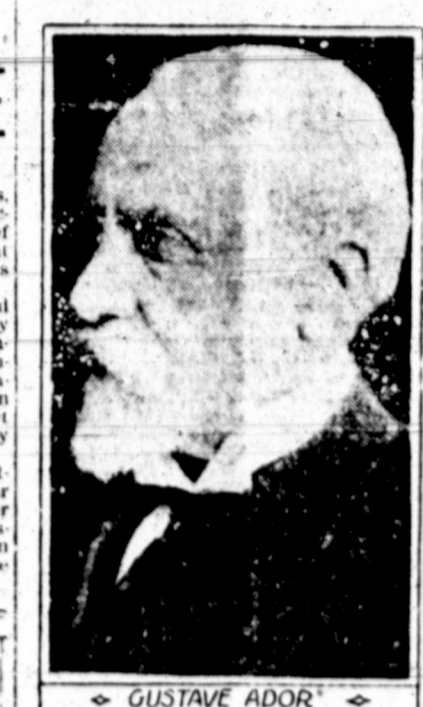
