BRITISH ARE PROVIDING FOR THE ARMENIANS IN BAGDAD DISTRICT WHO ESCAPED MASSACRE BY THE TURKS

Associated Press Mail Correspondence.

Bagdad, July 14.—"One of the best things that is being done in Bagdad just now is the relief of Armonian women and children who have survived the massacres and are now living in Mussulman families," writes the British official Eye-Witness with army in Mesopotamia, "They are being gathered into hostels financed by the British government and their own people are looking after them.

REDUCE FOOD COSTS

practical means of reducing table exother than wheat.

Cereals contain most of the impo ant food elements which the body needs and yet are comparatively mex-pensive. They are primarily a source of starch, needed by the body to yield energy. Doubtful Whether Some Lenses Now In Use Comply With Regulations Concerning Lights

The Wichita County Motor Club has offered to make applications for any Wichita county motorists who may have failed to send in their cards for a state license in compliance with the new state highway commission law. Those who have not filed application at midnight tonight are liable to prose-

Those who have not filed application at midnight tonight are liable to prosecution, and as banks and the postorfice are closed on Sungay, there is of course no way in which payment for the license can be made, as personal checks can not be accepted.

For those failing to register after the law goes into effect and running their machines without the proper numbers displayed, the act declares they shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and are subject to a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$25 for each violation and each separate day which the machine is thus operated shall constitute a separate offence. The club will do what it is able in having the penalties suspended provided the cause is a good one.

Owing to the delay in issuing the numbers by the state highway department it is not thought that a strict enforcement of this penalty will be pursued until a sufficient time for the dispatch of all the numbers has ensued. But it is imperative that the applications that have not already been sent in be forwarded Monday, and the Motor Club will undertake this task. John W. Thomas the secretary will

handle these matters at the Chamber of Commerce, and is also prepared to give what information may be desired. Both the state highway commission act and the act "regulating the opera-tion of motor vehicles" are now in force and there are many new clauses which motorists may relate unknown

There is some discussion as to whether the painting of the lens, as is being generally done in this city, will effectually remedy the glare. Some of the colored lens emit quite as blinding a glare as the plain lens, so it is doubtful if this accomplishes the purpose. The act regulating the lights of an autorobile or any other meter driv. pose. The act regulating the lights of an automobile or any other motor driv-en vehicle, states distinctly that the lights must not be "capable of projec-ing direct rays at a greater height than a parallel of four feet from the road provided, however, that any au-tomobile, motorcycle or bicycle may be equipped with a lamp capable of pro-lecting direct rays at a greater height. equipped with a lamp capable of projecting direct rays at a greater height than a parallel of four feet from the road, if such lamp, when lighted, is not capable of producing a dazzling light or glare." There is another section preceding this section, which provides that each motor vehicle other than a motorcycle must have front lights visible at least 500 feet in "the direction toward which such motor vehicle is facing," under normal atmospheric conditions. The vehicle must also have in the rear a lighted lamp exhibiting one red light platnly visible for a distance of 500 feet to the rear.

rear.

Provision is made for the showing of the state numbers on both the back and front of motor vehicles and one number to be displayed at the rear of motorcycles. These numbers and identification marks must be kept clear and distinct and free from grease or other blurring matter so that they can be plainly read at all times during daylight. Motor vehicles must also have adequate horn, bell or gong to give warning of their approach. The act provides that this said "bell, going, whistle, horn or other device be sounded when necessary as a warning of danger, but not at any other times or for other purposes."

In addition to the two numbers the Department is also required to furnish a seal which must be displayed at the front end of each vehicle.

There are various stringent regulations pertraining to those who operate the motor vehicles. Chauffeurs in private employ or drivers of service cars have a license and must be over 18 years of age.

The law also states that no intoxicated person shall be permitted to drive a motor car or motorcycle. In case

The law also states that no intoxicated person shall be permitted to drive a motor car or motorcycle. In case a person has been twice convicted of driving a motor while intoxicated within 60 days the state revokes his ficense to operate a motor vehicle on the public highways.

The speeding regulations, provide a motor rehicle may not be driven faster than 25 miles an hour on any highway nor may the speed on "any public highway where the territory contiguous thereto is closely built up" be greater than 18 miles an hour, or in any business district of a town of less than 40,000 population greater than 15 miles an hour, nor greater than 15 miles an hour, nor greater than 15 miles an hour, nor greater than 16 miles an hour, nor greater than 16 miles an hour of the business districts of any city over 40,000 in population.

For violation of the speed regulations the law provides for revocation of the license to drive a motor vehicle from now on will immediately apply for state licenses.

QUARTERMASTERS, THEIR

What's in a title? The title of quartermaster in itself means many different things, according to whether the quartermaster in question belongs to the army or navy. The duties of the quartermasters in the two branches have nothing whatever in common, and the navy quartermaster will tell you that the real difference between the two jobs is, that the navy quartermaster needs brains. The army man will ten needs brains. The army man will sax precisely the same thing; and

.The army quartermaster of the regiment is in charge of the feeding and ment is in charge of the feeding and supplies. There are various company quartermasters under him, traking up what is known as the quartermaster corps, whose work is the "office" work of the regiment. Clerks, stenographers, bookkeepers, and so forth all come under the quartermasters department, and draw extra pay for their work. This work was formerly done under the head of "extra duty," and the staff of workers was drawn from the ranks. Any man qualified for the work could apply for it, and could draw extra pay for doing it. Now, however, there is a regular department for the work, and the staff are ranked considerably higher than the privates, drawing extra pay. These men have practically no other duties outside of the work in the quartermaster department. the quartermaster department. Al ception of ordnance supplies, go through the hands of this department, and this entails so much work, that those performing it have very little time for anything else.

time for anything else.

The navy quartermaster, however, is an entirely different animal His first duty is to steer the ship; which in itself includes a knowledge of many things. He must also write up the ship's log, or diary, every hour, stating the exact bearing of the ship, the condition of the weather and anything of an unusual nature that may be going on. He must read the barometer every hour, and take observations by the chronometer and the sun. He must understand the appearance of clouds, and be able to tell pretty exactly what sort of weather they forecast. He must be able to map out the ship's course, and to do everything directly or indirectly connected with the science of payigation. He must be able to receive and send signals. While in port, he must act as the officers' deck assistant, checking out liberty parties, receiving visitors and so forth.

Unlike the army even in the method

Unlike the army even in the method of his appointment, he can only be drafted from the ranks, because all his knowledge is such as can only be acquired aboard ship. No landsman could obtain the knowledge necessary for a payal quartermasters' work near could obtain the knowledge necessary for a naval quartermasters' work nearly as easily on land as he could on board; and therefore it almost invariably happens that the navy quartermasters are drafted from the ranks.

The only branch of the navy quartermasters for which landsmen may apply is the aviation department. In this work, the duties of the quartermaster are those of a pilot, and as no amount of naval experience would helphim much in an airplane, he may easily be drafted from new fectults as from seasoned sailors. There is at present a large number of vacancies in the aviation quartermasters' department.






