Rules That Citizenship Cannot Be Granted Enemy Aliens During War

Dallas, Texas, July 16.—Judge Geo.
Jack of Ehreveport, i.a., holding United
States District Court here today denied
citizenship to 16 Germans who had
filed applications before the outbreak
of the war between the United States of the war between the United States

and Germany.

Judge Jack, in his opinion, sounded a warning against the issuance of citi-zenship papers to aliens of enemy coun-tries. Pointing to the German statute which permits the German citizens to become naturalized citizens of other countries without forfeiting their Ger-

"Allegiance to this country must be absolutely undivided," Judge Jack said.
"To become citizens of the United States foreigners must absolutely cast off all allegiance and loyalty to countries other than their own."

Judge Jack quoted the federal sta-

tutes which says that no citizens of ; country with which the United States are at war at the time of their application can become naturalized.

He rules that "the time of application" did not refer to the first and formal request for citizenship but the period between the request and the final granting of citizenship papers by

GERMANY IS RUSHING MEN TO EASTERN FRONT

Men Taken From France In Effort to Divert Korniloff's Great Drive

Washington, July 16 .- The whole Russian front, from the Gulf of Riga to Roumania, is reported, in official dispatches today from Petrograd to the Russian embassy here, to be alive with battle. The Germans are said to be rushing up troops from Italian and French ports and to be entirely re-arranging their positions.

On the northern front, near Riga, German reinforcements are rushing up by sea transports. On the Lemberg front the troops are being shifted back and forth by means of heavy automobiles in an attempt to prevent further advances by General Korniloff. On the southern front, in the Carpathians, the Austrians are said






