IT'S A FITTING TRIBUTE to Baird's Bob Norrell that this year's Callahan County Pioneer Reunion is dedicated to him. The highly respected and beloved Baird Banker has been one of the "mainstays" in the organization since its founding 25 years ago. This is the Silver Anniversary of the organization, and the officers and committee members voted at their meeting Friday to "give credit where credit is due." Bob Norrell probably knows more of the history of Callahan County than most people. He has had a part in its development for many years. Guess most everyone will be pleased that the Silver Anniversary edition of the reunion is dedicated to one who has dedicated a lot of his life to the affair.

DID YOU EVER hear of a buzzard, the flying kind, starting a fire? We hadn't either until recently, but one actually started the grass fire at the Buster Hatchett place last week. Baird firemen answered a call to help the Hatchett family put out the blaze which had gotten a pretty good start. The efforts of the rural unit manned by local firemen, and the Hatchett's and their neighbors succeeded in containing the blaze after it had destroyed some 80 to 100 acres of prime grass. Buster and others who were fighting the blaze, came across a dead buzzard at a point it was determined the fire started — under a highline owned by one of the major power companies. The big bird had flown into the power lines and was electrocuted. His feathers were set afire, and as he fell to the ground, the blaze was started. The Hatchett family is very grateful to all who helped them in fighting the fire.

Baird Trucker Unhurt In Wreck

Baird truck driver and an employee of the Texas Highway Department escaped with minor hurts Tuesday in a truck-station wagon collision some three miles south of Albany on Highway 380.

Norman Smith of 541 West 7th in Baird received bruises and scratches when the 1959 International truck and tandem trailer turned over on its side after hitting the highway vehicle. Smith's truck, owned by Halley Transport Company of Abilene, was loaded with 6,410 gallons of crude oil.

According to Highway Patrolman Don Roberts the accident occurred when Smith attempted to pass the highway department vehicle. The state car attempted a left turn in front of Smith's truck and the right fender of the truck struck the left side of the station wagon. Smith's truck jack knifed and turned on its side in the ditch. The highway car turned over two times, but the driver was unhurt.

Smith reported that gasoline poured from the tank of the truck and soaked him before he could climb out the windshield opening. The windshield shattered and popped out of its place. Smith washed the gasoline from his body and clothing at a nearby creek. The load of crude poured out in the ditch and was lost.

Fund Is Started for Baird Child Who Must Have Heart Operation

A six year old Baird girl faces death from a serious heart ailment unless corrective surgery is performed within 30 days, it was learned by her parents and friends following an examination last week by Dallas specialists.

Little Debbie Alexander who lives in West Baird with her father and step-mother must undergo open heart surgery to correct a damaged heart valve and a mal-formed artery. Specialists report that one of the

valves of her heart is closing rapidly, and that corrective measures must be taken immediately. He give her small chance of recovery if the surgery is not performed in 30 days. The surgery will result in the replacement of the valve and the repair of the damaged artery.

The people of Baird have started a fund to aid in payment of the expensive operation and for hospital care. Mrs. China Allphin and Mrs. Fay Smith are spearheading the drive. Already almost \$100.00 has been contributed to the fund. It was pointed out that the fund would be handled by a committee and that the money collected would be paid directly to the doctors and the hospital by the committee.

The First National Bank has agreed to serve as a clearing house for the funds, and any of the tellers will accept checks or money which will be placed in the account. Checks should be made to the Debbie Alexander Fund.

Those wishing to contribute, and the urgency of the project was stressed, were asked to mail it to the bank, take it by in person or to give it to Mrs. Allphin or Mrs. Smith.

Two Local Men On Committee For Rehab. Drive

Hugh Ross and James Snyder of Baird have been appointed to the round-up committee for the annual "Round-up Drive" of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene, C. A. (Charlie) Morris, chairman of the Cattlemen' Round-Up for Crippled Children, has announced.

The Round-Up, founded in 1961 by Coke County rancher Conda Wylie, is one of the main financial sponsors of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene.

Each year since its founding, Texas ranchers have donated livestock to the Round-Up which is sold with all profits going to the Center. It provides over one-third of funds needed by the Center.

The Center serves 724 patients with some 110 patients receiving daily treatment. It is a private non-profit organization dedicated to the rehabilitation of the handicapped. Most of the patients are victims of polio, strokes, cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis and other neurological or orthopedic disorders.

The Round-Up sale, one of the most unique auctions to be found, will be held September 28, 1963, at the Abilene Livestock Auction, announced Morris. It is in conjunction with the "Best in the West" stocker feeder sale.

P.H.A. Changes Finance Method

FORT WORTH — A new plan for cooperative financing by Local Housing Authorities in Texas is expected to result in substantial savings annually, Public Housing Regional Director Marshall W. Amis announced today. The change will possibly result in a savings for the Baird authority.

On August 14, 1963, New Housing Authority Bonds (Second Issue) in the amount of \$8,975,000 will be sold by the Housing Authority of the City of Fort Worth, Texas, as Agent Authority, for their Authority and the following Housing Authorities: Baird, Childress, Crystal City, Floresville, Floydada, Frisco, Gladewater, Gorman, Hamlin, Maud, Nocona, Pinedale, Rotan, Stanton and Tulla.

On July 9, 1963, Cooperative Temporary Notes (First Series) in the amount of \$5,098,000 were sold by the Housing Authority of the City of Fort Worth, Texas, as Agent Authority, for their Authority and the Housing Authorities at Anson, Breckenridge, Brownsville, Calvert, Kenedy, Orange, Orange County and Texarkana to the Morgan Guaranty Trust Company and The Continental Illinois National Bank & Trust Company of Chicago at an average interest rate of 1.79546 per cent.

On August 13, 1963, Cooperative Temporary Notes (Second Series) in the amount of \$1,565,000 will be sold by the Housing Authority of the City of Fort Worth, Texas, as Agent Authority, for their Authority and the Trenton Authority.

On August 13, 1963, Cooperative Temporary Notes (First Series) in the amount of \$7,033,000 will be sold by the Housing Authority of the City of Wichita Falls, Texas, as Agent Authority, for the following Housing Authorities: Ballinger, Bay City, Bryan, Burk Burnett, Clarendon, Cooper, Dayton, DeKalb, Edinburg, Edna, Henrietta, Kingsville, Lored, Lubbock, New Boston, Runge, Spearman and Victoria.

Use of the plan and the issuance of Cooperative Bonds and Notes will make available substantial benefits to LHA's, benefits otherwise not available with small individual programs.

"The key to the computation of savings is in the interest rate differential, bond counsel fees, advertising and printing costs," Amis said.

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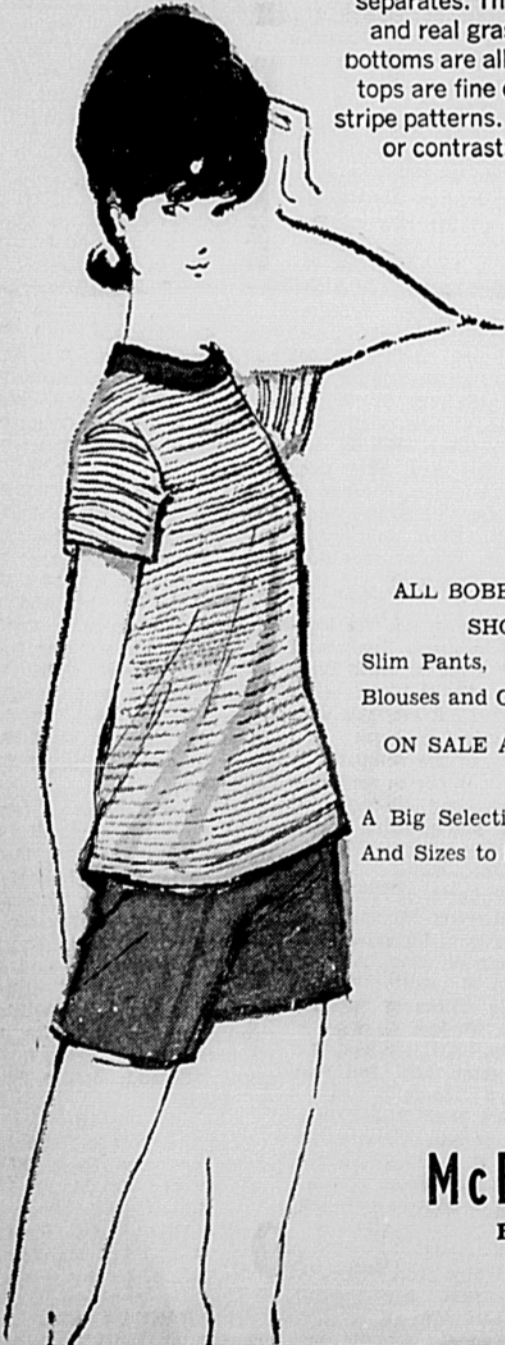

Low Flying Planes
Are From Dyess AFB

(Dyess AFB, Texas) — You may be closer to the Air Force than you think. That was the word from Dyess Air Force Base, near Abilene, to residents of the surrounding area today. Giant C-130 Hercules assault airlift aircraft from the 516th Troop Carrier Wing at Dyess are now making frequent low-altitude practice runs that carry them over the plains of Central Texas at regular intervals.

Col. Burl W. McLaughlin, commander of the 516th, told a reporter the following facts about the new airlift operations at Dyess: The C-130, backbone of the assault airlift force for the Tactical Air Command, USAF, is frequently used to carry and drop U. S. Army Paratroopers in practice exercises, and, if need be, during the limited or brush-fire wars that may crop up anywhere in the world. In dropping paratroopers in or near enemy territory, the problem of detection by the enemy's radar network makes the job especially dangerous.

Now, Tactical Air Command has developed a new method for overcoming this risk. C-130 crews fly into the battle zone at very low altitude, about 500 feet, flying under the radar scanning range. Just before the drop zone, the aircraft makes a maximum-performance climb to 1,000 feet, releases up to 65 fully-equipped men, then rapidly drops back to its low-level route.

A practice drop zone has been in operation at Dyess AFB since last March, and it is now being used to qualify 516th crews in the new technique, dubbed "Close Look" by TAC. The flight

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pattern for Close Look takes in the area up to 100 miles north, east and South of Abilene. Flights over the area started early in July and are expected to continue until about August 1.

Colonel McLaughlin, and Col. Paul J. Mascot, deputy commander for the 516th's operational missions, stressed that the low-level flights are perfectly safe for both crews and the observers below. The main sign that Hercules aircraft are near will be the low drone of four turboprop engines. C-130s fly well below the speed of sound, and thus cause no sonic boom.

Central and West Texans can clearly identify the Hercules as it passes over the area. The plane is equipped with four engines, each with a propeller 13 feet in diameter. The props always rotate at the same speed, 3700 R.P.M., and speed and altitude of the plane are changed by rotating the prop blades so that they "bite" more or less air as they spin.

The 516th Troop Carrier Wing flies the newest version of the C-130, the E model, and this plane has a giant pylon tank under each wing. Each tank holds over 1500 gallons of JP4 fuel, and the total fuel capacity of the E is close to 10,000 gallons. Each plane also can be identified by the red, yellow and blue Tactical Air Command Emblem on the vertical tail stabilizer.

Soon, the 516th will make use of its new Close Look technique in Exercise Swift Strike III, a massive military exercise in North and South Carolina. Blue and Red armies and air forces will conduct mock battles to test the effectiveness of new techniques such as Close Look. The exercise is under the direction of Gen. Paul D. Adams, U. S. Army, and his joint Army-Air Force U. S. Strike Command.

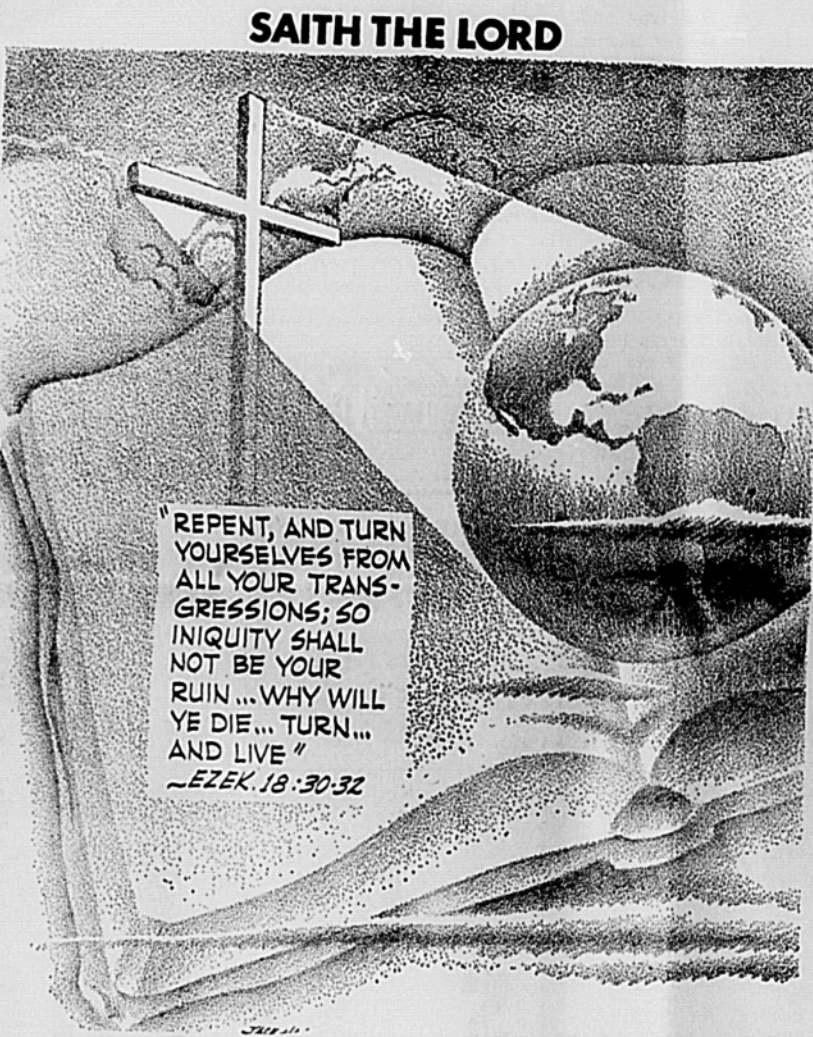
