

SELECTING JURY FOR TRIAL OF REV. L. G. J. KELLY

By Associated Press. — Selection of a jury was expected to begin today at the resumption of the trial of Rev. L. G. J. Kelly on an indictment charging him with slaying one of the eight victims of the Villa, Iowa, axe murders of June 9, 1912.

There were unconfirmed reports that additional indictments had been voted by the Montgomery county grand jury which late yesterday indicted the attorney general, Havener, in connection with his action at the grand jury investigation of the axe murders.

THIRD SUCCESSIVE NIGHT GERMANS RAID ENGLAND

By Associated Press. — The first moonlight air raid over the London district occurred about midnight last night and resulting in the dropping of bombs but the full extent of the damage is yet unknown and no casualties have been reported.

One bomb fell just outside a hospital another smashed through a theatre and still another hit a retail store in which a number of girls were sleeping. Notwithstanding the moonlight raid, the moon was insufficient to obscure the moon. The raiders were constantly shelled by anti-aircraft guns and several British machines took the air to attack the invaders.

Has Germany got her great air offensive ready before ours? is a question asked by a morning paper apropos of the invasion of England on three successive nights and Field Marshal Haig's overnight report of aggressive enemy aircraft from the paper which assumes and frequently warns of Germany's intention to invade England with air craft in very large fleets.

The enemy seems to be getting on rather fast with invasion plans. The German aircraft came, bombed and departed. Our guns fired and our aircraft went up but without result, according to the latest official reports.

300 BUFFALO ARE MENACED BY FIRE ANTELOPE ISLAND

By Associated Press. — The largest herd of buffalo in the United States, consisting of more than 300 animals, is menaced by a fire which has raged on Antelope Island in the Great Salt Lake from early yesterday morning.

In addition to the buffalo 400 head of government horses and 1200 head of cattle and other stock are in danger.

LIVE STOCK CONFERENCE OPENS AT WASHINGTON

Washington, Sept. 5.—Secretary Houston today opened the conference of the United States live stock industry committee called primarily to discuss the advisability of removing breeding stock from the west to the east and southeast where more rough food is procurable. The committee comprises 100 cattlemen and stock experts.

CIRCULARS TELL HOW TO KNIT FOR THE SOLDIERS

Washington, D. C., Sept. 5.—Half a million illustrated knitting circulars were sent out today from National Headquarters to Red Cross Chapters throughout the country. The circulars contain full information on how to knit the eight standardized articles, sleeveless sweaters, mufflers, helmets, socks, wristlets, wash cloths and bottle covers, authorized by the Woman's Bureau of the Red Cross.

Recent cables from Major Grayson, M. P. Murray, Red Cross commissioner in France, again emphasize the necessity for warm knitted articles for the men who face the hardships of a winter in the trenches. Army officials request that the knitted articles be forwarded as soon as possible. The

STORY OF THE RAID IN CHATHAM DISTRICT

By Associated Press. — London Sept. 5.—The Chatham district for the first time experienced an air attack on Monday night when one or more bombs fell on a section of the royal naval barracks, killing 107 blue jackets outright and wounded 87 others. Four bombs in all fell about the barracks, but two were harmless and in fact apart from those which took such a heavy toll of lives. Damage in the whole area was insignificant. The barracks was filled with sleeping hammocks and a majority of the men were asleep at the time of the attack. The first indication of the presence of air raiders was the sound of engines overhead. The presence of high powered machines overhead did not cause much alarm because notices had been published earlier in the evening that anti-aircraft practice would be carried out that night and when the guns began firing it was assumed that the practice was in full swing. Then came the unexpected. Loud explosions were heard in one part of the district and then in another. In all about 17 bombs were dropped and the raiders are thought to have been over the district nearly an hour. Searchlights sought out the raiders, but they failed to locate them, the visibility being low owing to a slight haze notwithstanding the moonlight.

severely of winter with a coal shortage to face and a rising tuberculosis rate to combat demand that several million garments reach France before Thanksgiving.

The handbooks issued by the Red Cross are primarily for hand knitters. Knitting machines may be used provided the articles can be as well made and made of the same yarn.

The circular is the first of a series to be issued by the Woman's Bureau, of which Miss Florence Marshall is director. Others are to be issued immediately on the making of comfort kits, the manufacture of hospital garments, surgical dressings and relief kits for the refugee children of France and Belgium.

All of them will be available at the nearest Red Cross Chapter. Sock knitters are warned that all knots, ridges or lumps should be carefully avoided, as they are apt to blister feet.

Directions for the making of sleeveless sweaters, of which Major Murphy has ordered a million are as follows:

Two and one half hanks of yarn; 1 pair Red Cross needles No. 3. Cast on 80 stitches. Knit 2, purl 2 stitches four inches. Knit plain until sweater measures 25 inches. Knit 28 stitches, bind off 24 stitches for neck, loose. Knit 28 stitches. Knit 7 ridges on each shoulder, cast on 24 stitches. Knit plain for 21 inches. Purl 2, knit 2 stitches for 4 inches. Sew up sides, leaving 9 inches for armholes. Two rows single crochet around neck and 1 row single crochet around the armholes.

RENTFROW AN OLD TIMER IN THE SHOW BUSINESS

J. N. Rentfrow, owner of the show now showing at Indiana and Thirteenth is one of the interesting characters among the old time show men of the United States, having spent more than a half century catering to the amusement desires of successive generations, and furnishing each with a class of entertainment that appealed to the better instincts.

Mr. Rentfrow first started in life to be a printer and newspaper man, going into the office of the Register at Des Moines, Iowa, to learn the trade under Clarkson, afterwards a member of President Harrison's cabinet and one of the most prominent editors of the middle west.

Deserting the ink barrel for the sawdust ring, he joined the Orton Bros. Circus, and in 1887 came to Texas, when a band of bad men undertook to hold up the ticket wagon for the day's receipts. In the fight a number of the outlaws were killed, but the

circus people kept their money. Since 1878 Rentfrow has been in the show business for himself, with the company called Rentfrow's Jolly Pathfinders. In the early advents Rentfrow introduced what is now called the musical comedy, playing most of the cities of the north in one night stands and week stands with a repertoire of musical plays. Later he took up dramatic work, playing through the north what were termed 10, 20, and 30 cent stands with melodrama and comedy drama, and has continued this line ever since. He now makes his home in Houston and plays only the Southwest, under canvas, carrying a company capable of producing all the standard dramas. His annual visits to the different cities are advents among a host of old time friends and acquaintances.
