Heavy masses of Austro-German troops are being thrown against the Italian lines between the Piave and the Brenta in an effort to drive a wedge between the Italian armies defending the Piave line and those to

Comparatively rapid progress has been made in this operation with n the last day or two and it is becoming clear that the main Austro-German tort is concentrated at present upon what is probably the most vulnerable point in the Italian detensive line. Quero is Taken,

Quero, on the upper Plave, about 50 miles from the coast, was taken by the invaders, who subsequently pushed the left flank of their line west of the river, a considerable distance south along that bank.




