London, Jan. 24.—The impressions conveyed in today's news dispatches from Switzerland regarding the internal situation in Germany on the eve of Chancellor von Hertling's expected address before the reichstag is one of discontent among the masses suppressed by the triumphant hand of the military party. Efforts of the German censorship to prevent public knowledge of the Austrian strikes and peace demands succeeded for a time but the news leaked through gradually and Austrian events seem now to be widely known by German workers. The Austian hope that the latter would follow their lead has not however, materialized, while German news papers which ventured to hold out a hand to the Austrians projetriat

papers which ventured to hold out a hand to the Austrians proletriat have been sternly repressed.

German Workmen Stronger.

Neverthless according to the Amsterdam dispatch German workmen, especially Independent Socialists are becoming stronger. This is partly attributable to the attitude of the German delegates at the Brest-Litovsk conference which caused widespread discontent as was manifested by the Lumuitous scenes at numerous meetings of the Fatherland party.



COAST ARTILLERY **WANTS MORE MEN** SAYS COMMANDER

TRAINING CAMP IS ESTABLISH-TURN OUT OFFICERS.

By Associated Press

Austin, Tex. Jan, 23.—Persident R. E. Vinson of the University has received a letter from Major Thos. M. Spaulding of the Coast Artillery Corps, in the office of the Chief of Coast Artillery at Washington, suggesting that there may be many of the alumni and undergraduates who may be interested in that branch of the military service, and pointing out how they may enter it. The letter follows:

"There has been established at Fort Monroe, Va. and will be maintained throughout the war, a training camp from whose graduates will be appointed all officers of coast artillery. The course is of three months duration, commencing early in January April, July and October. The number of students will vary according to the prospective needs of the Service. Only enlisted men of the coast artillery are admitted, selection being made by boards of officers convened in all commands about a month before the beginning of each course.

Duty of Artillery.


