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LEAGUE NATIONS DEFINITE IDEAL ASQUITH DECLARES

"HOSPITALITY" DINNER IN LONDON TURNED INTO OVATION FOR WILSON.

By Associated Press. LONDON, July 11.—Sincere praise of President Wilson's leadership in the war and his advocacy of a league of nations after the war was given by Herbert H. Asquith, the former premier, in an address last night at the National Liberal Club. The occasion was a "hospitality dinner to American officers" at which 500 prominent Englishmen were hosts. The dinner resolved itself into a meeting of ovation for the president.

Vice Admiral Sims, commander of the American naval forces in the war zone, paid tribute to the co-operation of the British and American navies and declared: "The submarine menace is now at an end for we are destroying them faster than the Germans can build them."

Major General Eddie, commander of the American forces in England, evoked long cheers when he announced that American troops were stationed at from seventy to eighty different points in England and Scotland.

Former Premier Asquith in the course of a speech urging the importance of President Wilson's idea of a league of nations as "the most urgent of all peace problems" said: "The United States as a nation has had the very good fortune that in the supreme crisis of her national history the man whom she most needed for inspiration and guidance has always appeared."

President Wilson has taken the greatest decision of our age and he has carried his people with him in it. Moreover, he has laid before the world the grounds for his decision, the reasons which justified and compelled it and the spirit in which it was adopted. He has done this in state papers which are worthy to live side by side with the most inspiring utterances of his most famous predecessors.

"Probably the world owes its greatest debt to President Wilson for helping men whose vision has been blurred and blinded by the smoke of the battlefields to look up beyond it. It is very difficult in time of war to keep a steady hand and a clean tongue. President Wilson does both."

"We cannot ask ourselves too often what we are fighting for. President Wilson has done more than any other statesman to concentrate the minds of his own people of the Allies and even of enemy peoples upon a league of nations as our dominating world aim."

"There can be no clean peace which does not clear away the causes of war. It seems to me all important that both here and in America we should realize and act as though we realized it, that a league of nations is neither a mere political action nor a summary rhetorical formula but a definite goal."

ANOTHER REPORT OF DEATH OF SON OF FORMER CZAR

LONDON, July 11.—Swedish newspapers publish a statement by a Swede just returned from Moscow that Alexis Romanoff, son of Nicholas Romanoff, the former Russian emperor, has been killed by a Bolshevik soldier by means of a bomb, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen today.

SOLDIER HANGED AT WACO FOR CRIME AGAINST GIRL

WACO, TEX., July 11.—Nat Hoffman, formerly a member of the supply company nineteenth field artillery, fifth brigade, was hanged in the stockade at Camp MacArthur this morning at 5:38 o'clock. Hoffman was tried by court martial on a charge of criminal assault upon an eleven-year old school girl near the camp last April. Convicted followed and the case was sent to Washington for review. Sentence was affirmed and its execution followed quietly this morning at the hour named. None but officers and the guard was allowed to communicate with the condemned man. It was announced that his only utterance during preparation for the execution was that he deserved his fate.

Hoffman was 25 years old and of a possessing appearance. He was from Pennsylvania but the exact place of his home is in doubt, his father and mother being separated, neither of them communicated with him.

One evening last April Hoffman met the girl in company with a boy about her age in a lonely wooded spot near Camp MacArthur. The boy was first attacked and ran away after which the girl was assaulted. The boy reported the affair and military police were soon on Hoffman's trail. He was captured early in the evening and the trial followed soon thereafter.

Throughout Night Crowds Pass Bier Of Major Mitchell

NEW YORK, July 11.—Throughout the night men and women, representatives of every class, filed past the flag-draped coffin containing the body of Major John Purroy Mitchell, former mayor of New York City, to pay silent tribute to his valor, unmeasured loyalty and supreme sacrifice.

Several hours before the funeral procession started for the service at St. Patrick's cathedral it was estimated that forty thousand persons had visited the City Hall and hundreds were still in line.

The solemnity and ceremony of military rites marked the funeral today. The gun carriage which conveyed the coffin to the cathedral was escorted by detachments of soldiers, sailors and marines, three regiments of state guards, a regiment of police and a platoon of firemen. A squadron of eighteen airplanes, circling over the cortege dropped flowers upon it as a last tribute from the men of the service to a fallen comrade.

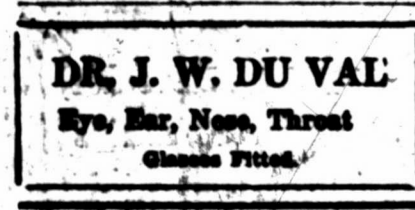
Mechanics Can Be Accepted Up To July 16

EXAMINATION OF 1918 REGISTRANTS STARTS SATURDAY

Examination of the men reclassified from Class 3 to Class 1, who have never been examined and who are called to leave on July 21, when Wichita county will send 200 or more men to Fort Sam Houston, will begin Saturday July 13, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and will continue through next week, the men being called to report at 3 o'clock each afternoon at the office of the draft board. The new registrants who have already been notified that they have been placed in Class 1 are also notified to appear for examination at the same time. In calling the 1918 registrants the board states that the first day all those registrants whose registration numbers are between 1 and 50, inclusive, will report for examination, the following day those whose registration numbers are between 51 and 100, the third day numbers 101 to 150, and so on, until all are examined. The board has reclassified practically every man in Class 3, which is composed of registrants who have relatives other than a wife and children dependent on them, but the list of those to be examined in Class 1 permanently and made subject to the July calls of the draft has not been completed, for every man that is reclassified is given a hearing if he is not satisfied with his classification, and opportunity of appeal to the district board is also given.

FIVE SOLDIERS INJURED IN WRECKING OF TROOP TRAIN

SHREVEPORT, La., July 11.—Two of the five soldiers injured last night when a troop train moving west was derailed on the Vicksburg, Shreveport and Pacific Railway, near Wadley, seventeen miles from Shreveport, were reported this morning at the sanitarium to which they were taken to be in a serious condition. They are Corporal T. P. Houston of Caldwell, Texas, and Private Joseph Alford of Texas. Two Sergeants are thought to be badly hurt internally. Although six sleepers and a box car went into the ditch, there were only three other soldiers injured, and their injuries are slight. They are Sergeant Thomas Guernsey, Laredo, Texas; Private Charles M. Berry and Arthur M. Carter, addresses unknown. Officials of the Vicksburg, Shreveport and Pacific were today conducting an official investigation of the wreck. Superintendent J. C. Stambaugh of the company expressed the theory that a brake beam broke on a box car which was being used as a baggage car and ran just behind the engine and the car went into the ditch carrying the six sleepers with it. Soldiers were transferred to another train.

If you do that, the ice won't melt so fast. And the foods will keep better.

Don't put hot dishes in the refrigerator. The heat raises the temperature and, as a result, the ice melts quickly.

Don't leave the refrigerator doors open one minute more than necessary. The in-rushing warm air counteracts the chill from the ice.
