As citizens of a democracy engaged in a world war we must realize fully that the fact of a political democracy does not ordain an economic democracy.

At the peace table we will ask for no lands, no special ports, but we will demand freedom for all. Freedom for what? Freedom to cut each other's throats in trade affairs?

There are two unseemly, mighty forces at work in the world today: the will to power and the will to serve. Consciously or unconsciously all of us are working with and by one of these two forces.

The one-aching need of civilization today is the will to serve. Any student of international affairs must admit that this war will find the United States the most powerful nation in all history.

ENEMY FALLING BACK SOUTHWEST OF USKUB

LONDON, Sept. 25.—The British Vardar river in Macedonia the Germans and Bulgarians are falling back on Vesles, 25 miles southeast of Uskub, according to a Serbian official statement received here.

BRITISH CAPTURE MORE THAN 25,000 TURKS, SERBIANS ADVANCE TOTAL DEPTH OF 40 MILES; ITALIANS GAIN

LONDON, Sept. 23.—Twenty-five thousand Turkish prisoners and 260 guns had been counted up yesterday evening by General Allenby's forces pushing northward through Palestine, according to an official statement issued today by the war office.

LONDON, Sept. 23.—Reports from the Palestine front this afternoon indicate that none of the Turkish forces of at least 40,000 men trapped by the British through the seizure of the last of the passages of the Jordan, can possibly get away.

ROME, Sept. 25.—The Italian troops in Macedonia have advanced an average of more than seven miles in pursuit of the Germans and Bulgarians and have taken sixteen villages, says the report from the war office today.

By Associated Press. LONDON, Sept. 23.—Serbian troops have cut the main railway line between Uskub and Saloniki and are on the western bank of the Vardar River, according to the Serbian official statement of Sunday.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Sept. 23.—Entente cavalry yesterday was three miles from the Bulgarian army in the region of Strumitza, according to news dispatches received here from the Macedonia front.

By Associated Press. (By Associated Press.) In Palestine, Macedonia and France the Entente Allied offensive progress successfully.

General Allenby's forces in Palestine have followed up their rout of the Turkish forces with additional gains. In central Macedonia the Allies are pressing vigorously the advantages won and the difficulties of the Germans and Bulgarians are increasing.

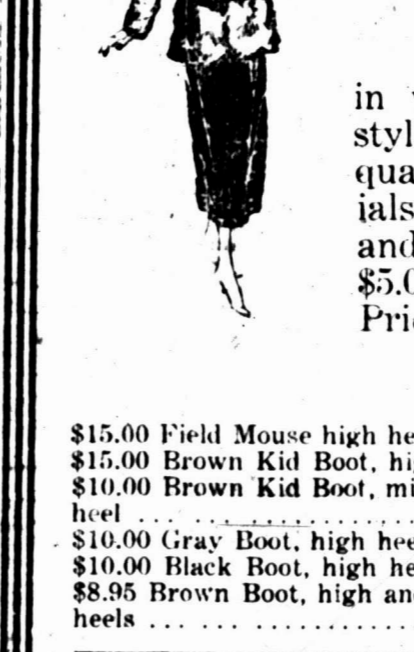

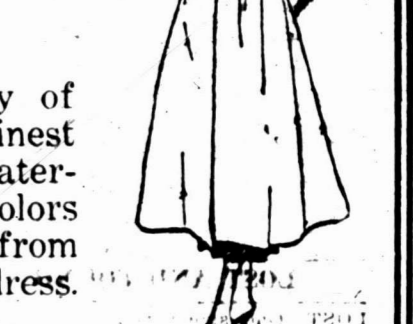
