

YOUTH IN GERMAN PRISON WRITES SISTER HERE A PATHETIC APPEAL

Wounded and in a German prison camp hospital, Corporal George Hughey, with the American Expeditionary Forces in France for almost a year, first wrote his sister, Mrs. Dora Yates, living about nine miles out from Wichita Falls, in June of this year, stating that he had been wounded and captured and was receiving good medical attention and good treatment from the German people. But two months later, his letters tell a different story. First a card and then this week a letter was received by Mrs. Yates. The card said: "This leaves me still at the hospital but am getting along well. I hope this finds you and family well. Drop me a letter every week and let me know how the home folk are getting along. I am awfully hungry and would like very much to receive some biscuits and cheese from home. Don't worry about me. I will get along better when I am able to work to pay for my food. It is very hard living under war conditions as a prisoner. Tell all the folk to write me a few lines each week. That will cheer me up very much."

Wants Something to Eat. The latest word from the young man is contained in the following letter received this week: "Will write you a few lines to let you know I am getting along well, but am awfully (censored) today. This makes two months since I have been captured and have not received any letters or food from the American Red Cross. I have seen more American prisoners and each of them had gotten parcels. Please send me something to eat and some socks and shoes. I have no clean shoes and my feet are blistered and awfully sore. My shoes were taken from me when I was captured. If this happens to be delayed you won't know my suffering but if you receive it please send me food and clothing, a pair of overalls will do. I hope you are well and enjoying a free life. It would be better if I were killed. I was so shell shocked, don't think I will ever get over it. Please write as soon as you receive this. Will close. As ever."

The board clerk announces that the Class 1 men of the new draft will be included in the next call, as the board expects to have to supply about 250 men as soon as the training camps are receiving men, when the influenza epidemic is over. No information has been received by the board as to when this next call will come.

Department store and the Art Jewelry store. Another school Thrift society has been organized by Mrs. Lee and Mrs. W. P. Building. This is at the Washington school, and is the only society among the negro school children. Altogether \$198 worth of stamps had been sold before the visit of the committee. Zenobia B. Trouble is to manage the club and sell stamps at the school each Friday. The meeting Thursday at the Washington school was highly enthusiastic, the students singing "America" and "Star Spangled Banner" with a vim that the visitors declared they had never heard equaled. DEMAND FOR WORKMEN EXCEEDING THE SUPPLY

Calls for more workmen than the office is able to supply continue to come to the Wichita Falls free employment bureau, G. W. Nulton, the examiner in charge states. This is for local labor strictly on a walk in nearby towns and communities, and all men who do not wish to go far away from this city are urged to register with the board, if they are in need of work. A complete list of openings with all desired information is kept on file at the local employment bureau at all times and the service is free to all interested.

KEMP IS NAMED ONE OF ADVISORS TO DRAFT BOARD

J. A. Kemp has been nominated by the Department of Labor to serve as an industrial advisor to the district draft board, according to announcement from the department. This advisory board has been created to deal with a need arising from the increased scope of the draft law, the Department of Labor states, and the men acting on the board will have it as their duty to see that the new draft upon American man-power for military service may be made with the least possible disturbance to war industries. Kemp will not be taken from positions where they could be serving their country more capably than in the army, and the advisory board will assist the draft boards in determining just what the value of the individual is. There will be three members of each district advisory board, the two others for the northern district in addition to Mr. Kemp to be named by the department of agriculture and the draft board. Other appointments made by the department of labor are: H. A. Vree of Austin, western district; Gus Taylor of Tyler, east district; and Charles N. Murphy of Houston, southern district.

Duty of Advisors. The chief function of these advisors will be to place before the District Board information as to the nature and whether any registrants under the selective service act are engaged in occupations necessary to the prosecution of the war. They will also show before each Board all facts and information as to the preferences lists issued by the War Industries Board, which show what industrial plants and other concerns have been found to be engaged in priority of raw materials, fuel and transportation. They will also furnish information supplied to them by the United States Employment Service as to the needs for an supply of skilled labor in each community, in order to assist the Board in deciding whether or not individuals in certain industries, occupations or employment are engaged in work necessary to the maintenance of the military establishment, or the maintenance of national interests during the present emergency.
