WASHINGTON, Oct. 30—Another note from the German government reached Washington today. It supplants the last brief communication saying armistice terms were awaited by reciting in details governmental changes which have taken place in Germany as evidence that the kaiser has been deprived of all power of making war and negotiating peace.



REFUGEES CROSS

FROM BMALL BEGINNING NUM-BER HAS INCREASED TO THOUSANDS.

SCENE IS AFFECTING

Privation and Suffering Reflected in Faces of Man, Women and Children.

By Associated Press.

AMSTERDAM, Thesday, Oct. 29.—
When the German retirement in Belgium Flanders began it was reported that. 250,000 refugees would seek safety in Holland. Up to Saturday: however, only a small fraction of this number had arrived. At that time only about 7,000 had passed through the wire gates marking the Dutch-Belgian frontier. On Friday alone 4,996 arrived. All but thirteen were French people from the districts of Vatinciennes, Doust, Cambrai and Quesnoy.

There is no congestion as in 1914 when the mass of refugees from Belgium threaten to overwheim the hurriesty arganized bands of willing helpers.

This time the attention began to trick-in slowly, but the number now as increased to thousands. However, there has been time to organize at frontier centers food depots in charge of committees co-operating with the Dutch Red Cross. So far there has been two main

Bo far there has been two main atreams, some thirty miles apart. One point of entry is where the Dutes provinces of Brabant that the Dutes meet and the other across the Meuse River into Maastricht. At these points the fugitives are registered and must underse a personal examination.

The bundles of possessions carried by the refugees included birds in cages, chickens and rabbits and odd kitchen utensils.

The fatigues of the fourney were too much for some of the travelers. The weaker ones died on the way aid a few others succumbed soon alter reaching the hospitable soil of Holland. Many of the refugees are suffering from grippe and bronchial affections.

To distribute the fugitives in Holiand, the government last week ordered the burgomasters of Deventer, Zutphen, Assen and Arnhem and other provincial towns further north to arrange to accommodate refugees to the extent of two per cent of the populations of the towns. To these centers the fugitives now are being taken.

The French minister at The Hague has been studying the possibility of repatriating the refugees to France through the liberated portions of Belgium but the plan is not yet feasible. Meanwhile a plan of repatriation by sea is being studied.




