

CZECHO-SLOVAKS TAKE 31,000 PRISONERS; VIRTUALLY DESTROY BOLSHEVIK ARMY

ARMY OF POLAND IS MARCHING ON BERLIN

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 2.—A Polish army of thirty thousand men is marching on Berlin, according to a dispatch received here quoting rumors at the German capital.

Gustav Noske, member of the Ebert cabinet in charge of military affairs, is said to have ordered the fifth German division to meet the Poles.

POLAND IS BEGGING FOR ALLIED INTERVENTION

LONDON, Jan. 2.—Poland is in despair, owing to invasion of bolshevist troops, and the apparent indifference of the western powers to the plight of the country, according to a Warsaw dispatch to the Mail.

After dealing with the bolshevist menace to Lemberg, Vilna and other places, the correspondent says the situation is made worse by internal dissension in Poland.

Polish troops have entered Frankfurt, according to a dispatch to the express which adds that the Poles have occupied Beuthen, in Prussian Silesia, and Bromberg, in the province of Posen, 63 miles northeast of the Posen city.

BAPTISTS PLAN A \$150,000 MODERN CHURCH BUILDING

RECOMMENDATION HAS BEEN MADE AND COMMITTEE WILL BEGIN AT ONCE.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR

All Obligations Paid and More Money Raised Than in Any Previous Year.

The deacons and finance committee of the First Baptist church met last night to give an account of their stewardship for the past year and to plan greater things for the new year. This committee is composed of forty of the leading business men of the church, headed by J. C. Mytinger as chairman. They were able to report all obligations paid for the past year and more money actually raised than ever before by the church. This money, it was announced, was raised without a single public collection being taken in the church during the year.

The committee decided to recommend to the congregation, the beginning of the erection of a modern church house to cost not less than \$150,000. Plans for the building will be the last thing in 1919. The building will be a modern one, with a large auditorium, a gymnasium, a swimming pool, bath, and kitchen. There will also be a parsonage, a home for the aged, and a home for the blind. The church is now in a financial straits, and the committee is asking for a special collection on Sunday, Mr. J. C. Mytinger was again unanimously elected chairman of the Finance Committee for another year.

It is the ambition of the committee to erect a building that will be not only the pride of the congregation but of the citizenship of the whole town. The city has grown in its commercial and material interests and it is planned that the religious interest shall keep pace with it. The congregation of the Baptists has outgrown the building capacity, and inside the members there are according to the last religious census more than a thousand non-affiliated Baptists who have recently come into the city to make their home. It is the desire and ambition of the congregation of the First Baptist church that they shall have the best of homes for their souls and the souls of their children.

FEDERAL COURT TO OPEN FRIDAY WITH A HEAVY DOCKET

Federal court for this district will open tomorrow at the Wichita county court house with United States District Judge Rufus Foster of New Orleans on the bench. The docket to come up for disposition during this session will be heavier than the average, according to Commissioner Lantz, clerk of the court.

The grand jury has been named and will meet tomorrow to take up their regular investigations of law and order violations that come under the jurisdiction of federal officials. The first work of the term will be given over to the hearing of the civil cases on the docket and then the criminal cases will be disposed of.

Local Bureau Is Unable to Furnish Sufficient Labor. It is impossible to meet the demand for certain classes of labor needed in oil fields near Wichita Falls, according to an announcement made by G. W. Minton, U. S. Employment Examiner for this district. Drillers, tool dressers and riggers, are in great demand in local oil fields and good wages are being offered for this kind of work during the past week more than twenty discharged soldiers have been placed by the local federal employment office with oil companies working near at Wichita Falls and yet there is a strong demand for mechanically trained men.

Mr. Minton states that his office can easily place all drillers, tool dressers and riggers who desire work, and in fact, all men with mechanical experience or training are in strong demand at Wichita Falls and yet there is a strong demand for mechanically trained men.

The government has been trying to run the railroads without advertising and while this is not responsible, for the big deficit in operations, it has been a contributing factor and under peace conditions would be a much greater factor.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—An opening advance of 19 to 42 points met considerable realizing in the cotton market this morning but the offerings were absorbed on reactions of 25 or 30 points and the undertone was steady on talk of an increasing domestic trade demand, bullish spot prices and covering. After settling at 20.00 on the call, promoted by the circulation of a few notices but soon stiffened up to 29.85 or about 27 points net higher. March meanwhile fluctuated between 28.88 and 28.45 compared with 28.25 at the close of Tuesday. Liverpool was closed again today but will re-open for business tomorrow and there seemed to be nothing in the over holiday to create fresh sentiment.

Realizing became more active toward the middle of the morning. Recent buyers seemed to be disappointed that the turn of the year had not brought in an immediate increase in trade demand and for a time the market was weak under more or less general selling. January broke to 29.20 and March to 27.80 with active months generally showing net losses of 35 to 45 points. The pressure then subsided and the market steadied toward midday on covering and a little fresh buying promoted by large clearances reported from Galveston and New York.

After the break to 29.05 for January and 27.60 for March, or about 53 to 65 points net lower, prices steadied on covering and showed rallies of 25 or 30 points from the lowest during the middle of the morning. There was no change in the general character of the news and business was comparatively quiet. Exports reported up to 2 o'clock amounted to 58,051 bales. Cotton closed steady.

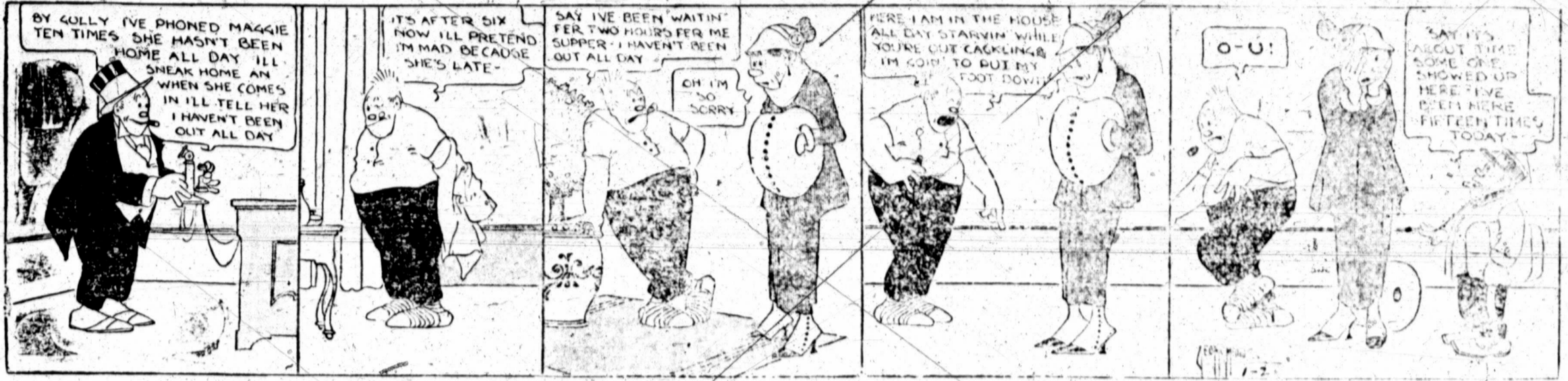
