GENEVA, Jan. 2.—The Polish army, which is marching toward Berlin, has as its objective "a tearing raid into Germany," according to the Polish agency at Lausanne. The infantry is well armed and is supported by artillery and cavairy. The infantry already has occupied important railway centers, including Kreuse-Driesen and Posenau, and has captured a large amount of railway stock with little resistance. The Germans are re-arming demobilized soldiers and fighting is expected, although some of the demobilized troops are refusing to serve.

FOR ALLIED INTERVENTION

LONDON, Jan. 2.—Poland is in despair, owing to invasion of bolshevist troops and the apparent indifference of the western powers to the plight of the country, according to a Warsaw dispatch to the Mail.

"Telegrams are sent begging intervention by the Ailies," the dispatch states, "but no reply comes. The Poles admit the immensity of the numerous problems absorbing the Allies, but complain that they do not receive the least sign of attention or a word

After asserting that "there is noth ing so essential to the financial peace ond the commercial and industrial welfare of the United States, as a definite governmental railroad policy, Mr. Lovett declared that the necessit for exclusive national control, as gainst state regulation; was now too bvious for discussion and that only debatable question is whether such control shall be through govern-ment ownership or by exclusive fed-eral regulation of private ownership.

Favors Regulation.

"I believe in thorough regulation by
the national government of all competition in service and facilities, with ower to check it where it amount an evil," he said. "I should permi consolidations, subject to government approval, where the public benefit would plainly be promoted, particular ly in the absorption of financially weak lines of minor importance whereby so doing the communities de pendent thereon could be better served. But I would steadily preserve competition between the large sycomposition between the large sys-tems and pursue a policy of widening the competitive areas between such large system wherever practicable." In giving his reasons for opposing government ownership, Mr. Loveti asserted that "if we carefully analyze the relative merits of efficiency from unification and the advantages.

Consideration of any solution the problem involves the fundamental question of whether there shall or shall not be competition," said Mr. Lovett.
"All will agree, I believe, that com-

petition in railroad rates is unwise and practically impossible. Competi tion in rates cannot exist without re bates, secret rates and other kindred evils that make it intolerable. But competition in service and facilities always existed until the beginning of federal control, and has really been responsible for the great advance in the quality of railroad service in this country, particularly in recent years Its elimination would mean compara tive stagnation

Much is said of the waste of rail road competition. Nearly everything thus characterized is for the benefit of the public. Undoubtedly there is some actual waste, but the amount of expense saved by unification is rela-tively a great item. Moreover, I have no doubt that the rigid economies en forced by keen supervision of details forced by keen supervision of details under private management as against the lax habits inherent in public management and the greater freedom and extravagance in methods of spending government money would much more than offset every year any possible saving from the elimination of a penses incident to competition."
