

OIL INDUSTRY WILL LIKELY ESCAPE ALL HOSTILE LEGISLATION

Special to The Times.
AUSTIN, March 1.—Drastic legislation antagonistic to the full development of the industries in Texas will not be enacted by the Thirty-Sixth Legislature, in the opinion of leading members of the lower house. In fact, the sentiment is greatly in favor of passing adequate laws which will foster and encourage the industry which promises to be the leading one in Texas within the next year or two.

Each of these measures are by Senator R. P. Dorough, of Bowie. The one which was promptly defeated in the house proposed to extend the provisions of the blue sky law so as to apply to unincorporated associations and to require all joint stock companies, limited partnerships, and associations to file certified copies of their plan of organization, common law and trust agreements and other data with the secretary of state before offering any stock for sale. By killing this bill the house won, or is expected to win, a victory in the development of oil industry. The other bill, generally known as Senate Bill No. 19, is the one which is particularly objected to by the smaller oil companies.

INVESTIGATION OF EXCESS LAND DEAL URGED BY HOUSE

RESOLUTION IS ADOPTED URGING TRAVIS COUNTY ATTORNEY TO ACT.
WOULD EXTEND INQUIRY

Representative Crumpton Made Attempt to Include Charges Made by Robison.
AUSTIN, March 1.—A resolution providing that the Travis county attorney be requested to investigate the activities of individuals in alleged attempts to secure control of excess state land was adopted by the house today. Representative Sid Crumpton later introduced a resolution proposing legislative investigation of charges made before the Travis county district court that Land Commissioner J. R. Robison has been fraudulently and unlawfully discharging duties of land commissioner. The resolution also proposed investigation of charges made by Mr. Robison that individuals had attempted to unlawfully influence his actions as public official, in an attempt to gain possession of excess lands.

SPIRIT OF UNREST INSPIRES PETITION AT BARRON FIELD

ENLISTED MEN PROTEST THEIR RETENTION IN SERVICE FOLLOWING PEACE.

ALFONTE ON THE JOB

Major Assures Men That He Will Approve All Applications for a Discharge.
FORT WORTH, March 1.—Addressing enlisted men at Barron Field this morning, following their written protest to the commander against remaining longer in the army, Major Alfonse, the new commander, said that he himself would address some kind of a recommendation to Washington. He also said he would approve all applications for discharge. The major took charge at this field only yesterday and the protest from the enlisted men was his first luncheon.

COMPLAINT IS MADE ON FRIDAY AFTERNOON

FORT WORTH, March 1.—The enlisted men of Barron Field, about 200 in number, gathered from all parts of the United States, have filed with Captain Finney, commanding officer, a protest against being longer kept in the service. The communication, about 1,000 words long, is couched in respectful language. It is stated in the protest that the men enlisted "for the period of the war" and the war now is over; that they are losing valuable time; that the families of some of them are starving; others are obtaining employments they could also obtain if free from army duty, and that since officers have been given the right to decide whether or not they wish to remain in the service, the same privilege should be given to enlisted men. The men, it is set forth in the protest, decline to engage in any of the sports, amusements or recreations provided at the flying field and which they are urged to support. They say they are competent to provide their own amusements and relaxations and in a letter to Swager Sherley, chairman of the House appropriates committee.

NAME COMMITTEE TO EXPEDITE WORK OF CONFERENCE

PARIS, Mar. 1.—To expedite the work of the Peace Conference in defining the approximate territorial frontiers of the enemy countries, the Supreme Council has decided to appoint a committee comprising one member each of the United States, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan. The committee will outline the frontiers on the basis of recommendation of the territorial commissions already appointed or yet to be created and submit the delimitations for consideration by the Conference. The committee also will make recommendations regarding parts of frontiers, enemy states which are not included in the scope of any commission with the exception of such frontier questions as any of the powers concerned may desire to discuss in the first instance in the Supreme Council.

TOTAL OF 352,922 TROOPS EMBARKED TO FEBRUARY 28

OBSTRUCTION IN SENATE KILLS OIL LEASING BILL

CANCEL CONTRACTS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF 550 VESSELS

Mitchell Palmer, the Alien Property Custodian, who will become Attorney General March 4, in a report transmitted today by President Wilson to the Senate on the administration of enemy owned property worth \$740,000,000, stated that continued liquidation of large German interests was necessary to prevent renewed attempts of commercial dominance by Germany.

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RUSSIA ENLISTS SUPPORT OF MANY WOMEN

ARE TEMPTED WITH INVITING POSITIONS IN MINISTRIES AND COLLEGES.

IS LENINE-TROTZKY PLAN

Admit That Success of Bolshevism Depends Upon Interest Manifested by Women.

By Associated Press. WARSAW, Thursday, Feb. 27.—The Russian soviet government is carrying on a popular campaign to secure the support of women throughout Russia according to refugees from Moscow. Mrs. Radek, wife of Karl Radek, chief bolshevik agent in Germany is active and with other women is trying to attract the attention of the large mass of women by having women take positions in the ministries and colleges. Premier Lenin made this remark to Mrs. Radek: "If bolshevism fails it will be because we could not get the mass of women interested. Many intelligent women are reported to be cooperating with Lenin and Trotsky but so far they have pointed out vainly that they are not interested in women as long as religion is flaunted and divorce is made so easy. The soviet propaganda bureau is putting out notices that with spring will come food and clothes. They also harp on the prospects for peace, as it is peace above all that the women and peasants want."

No General Application. There has apparently been no general application of the much advertised easy divorce and easy marriage regulations. The province of Tula tried to nationalize women but nothing came of it. The same result followed a similar decree in Moscow.

However, women have frequently been subjected to mistreatment as in Briansk. Troops of the red guard army when they arrived there requisitioned sixty unmarried women and sixty married women and women of the nobility. In Saratov, Volga and Vladimir, the soviets declared that men and women had equal rights and also that if a person of either sex was not married they were obliged to accept the first offer made public through the selections made by soviet headquarters. The children of such marriages, it was declared, were to become the property of the state.

It was on this theory, it is declared, that the children of a prominent (a prominent bolshevik) married Debenko, at one time the bolshevik minister of marine. She believed children of the bourgeoisie created by the state, would grow up with bolshevik ideas. She also devised a plan to eliminate maternal affection by forcing mothers at children's institutions to nurse indiscriminately any children there who were not their own.

PRESIDENT SIGNS TWENTY-THREE BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—Another day of strenuous work by President Wilson brought to a close what White House attaches said was the busiest week ever experienced at the executive offices. Twenty-three bills and joint resolutions were signed by the President today at odd moments between the reception of callers, consideration of domestic questions, and the making of nominations. These included two general appropriation measures, the post office bill and legislative, executive and judicial bill. The bill authorizing voluntary enlistments in the army up to 175,000 men and that giving service men their uniforms and five cents railroad fare instead of 3-12 cents, also were signed.

Austin To Have A Twelve-Story Hotel Building

BRITISH ARMY NOW NUMBERS 2,500,000 MEN

The house insisted on making it 2 percent. Even should this measure pass in its present shape in the house, it is understood an amendment will be offered in the senate to make the tax 1 1/4 and the whole matter may have to be finally determined by a conference committee. While the oil companies, especially the smaller ones, believe this tax excessive, still they believe business could be done under the measure.

There is a bill pending in the house by Representative Burton, which seeks to impose a tax of 2 percent on refiners, the tax being imposed on the gross sales. This bill was killed once by the house committee on revenue and taxation and later received and recommitted and a favorable report made thereon, with an adverse minority report. In the opinion of Representative Curtis, this measure will be killed when it comes up for a vote in the house.

Another bill which is insisted upon by the development of oil and other minerals is one also by Representative Burton which proposes to tax oil leases and require the owner of the lease to pay the tax. Under the present law the land under which there may be oil and other minerals, the owner of the land is taxed the same as on other lands. Should this measure become a law there would be few oil leases according to Representative John Davis of Dallas.

This bill was also killed once in committee and subsequently re-submitted and is pending on a favorable majority and adverse minority report. It was introduced in the house which seeks to conserve the oil and gas resources of the state, and to define "waste" and giving the railroad commission authority to make necessary rules and regulations. This bill is designed to prevent the wasting of oil when a well is brought in.

SPECIAL SESSION OF LEGISLATURE TO BE HELD IN JUNE

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, March 1.—Governor W. P. Hobby has announced that he will not call a special session of the Texas legislature until about the middle of June. His statement is in part: "The attorney general has informed me that immediate legislation will be needed to bring about the enforcement of the prohibition amendment to the constitution. If an extra session is called by me prior to the middle of June it would be necessary to have two extra sessions before mid-June. I shall, therefore, not call a special session until about the middle of June in order that one session may serve."

President Will Meet Delegation Of Irish Citizens

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—Congress was urged today to express itself on the Irish question before adjournment by a delegation appointed at the recent Irish race convention in Philadelphia. After hearing the delegation the house rules committee agreed to report a special rule giving right of way for consideration. If a resolution instructing American peace delegates to urge Ireland's cause before the Paris conference. The delegation headed by Justice John W. Goff and Daniel F. Cohan of New York, included more than forty prominent American citizens of Irish descent. President Wilson today promised to meet a delegation from the recent Irish race convention at Philadelphia, after his speech in New York Tuesday night. The Irish spokesmen desire to present resolutions demanding self-determination for Ireland, and sought to see the president today but found all his time taken by engagements.

LAUNCH CAMPAIGN FOR A SENATORIAL REAPPORTIONMENT

MOVEMENT TO OBTAIN JUSTICE FOR WEST TEXAS IN MATTER OF REPRESENTATION.

JUDGE HUFF IS ACTIVE

Letters Have Been Sent to West Texas Chamber of Commerce and Leading Citizens.

A campaign to obtain a senatorial reapportionment of Texas before the census of 1920, to see that West Texas has justice in the way of political representation, has been launched by the Wichita Falls chamber of commerce through President R. E. Huff.

By the constitution of Texas the state can have only 31 senators, and the present senatorial apportionment is based on the census of 1900.

Population Increase. The four districts referred to showed an increase in population of 108.5 percent over four times the increase of the rest of the state.

In a letter Saturday to H. P. Brelsford, former state senator from Eastland, Judge Huff stated: "Now unless we get a reapportionment on a basis of the census of 1910, we will get none until after the census of 1920."

Should Raise Big Row. "I feel sure if we raise a big row about it, we can get relief, but we cannot accomplish anything if we assume it is impossible."

Letters also have been sent to all chambers of commerce and other commercial bodies in this section asking strong support of the campaign and stating that "while there is probably no chance of getting anything done at this regular session, if you will help us we will organize all of West Texas for a persistent campaign and feel sure we can get results at the special session by demand."

OIL DEVELOPMENT

VANCLEAVE FARM IS SCENE OF MUCH RECENT ACTIVITY

A number of new derricks are reported up on the Vancleave farm, both on the northern, central and southern portions and it should be only a few weeks until the outlines of the pool on this side should be defined, from the developments under way.

The Clover Leaf Oil Co., composed of Henrietta people, is reported ready to begin operations on their tract, a short distance west of the Johnson well, now reported as preparing to drill.

The Mammoth Oil Co.'s No. 1 Vancleave is reported standardizing, while to the north of the road the Fowler Farm Oil Co. is reported setting casing on their most northern well on the Vancleave tract.

The Edna Vancleave well, north of the road, after several delays, has finally connected up the boiler and will commence drilling Monday.

Progress in the Comanche and the Eastland Fields. Special to The Times. FORT WORTH, March 1.—Following is the latest report from the Comanche county field, including a number of wells in northern Comanche, southern Eastland and the southeastern part of Erath counties.

Josephine Herrington's No. 1 of the Ohio Gas and Fuel Co. in Eastland county is drilling at 3,185 feet in black slate. It has a small showing of oil but no gas.

The Maypole No. 1 of the Sun Co. about a mile southeast of the Duke wells, is showing around 7,000,000 cubic feet of gas at 2,575 feet. It is probably being drilled deeper.

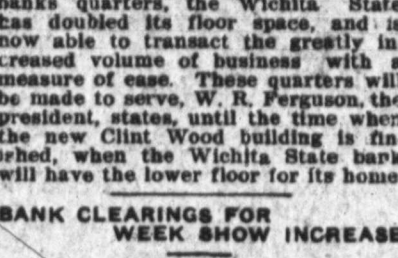

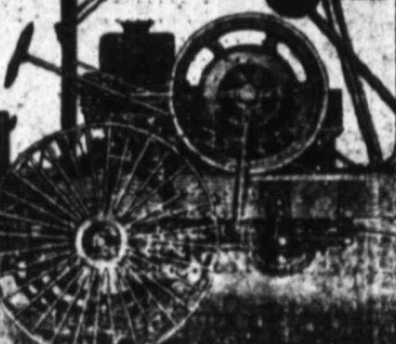

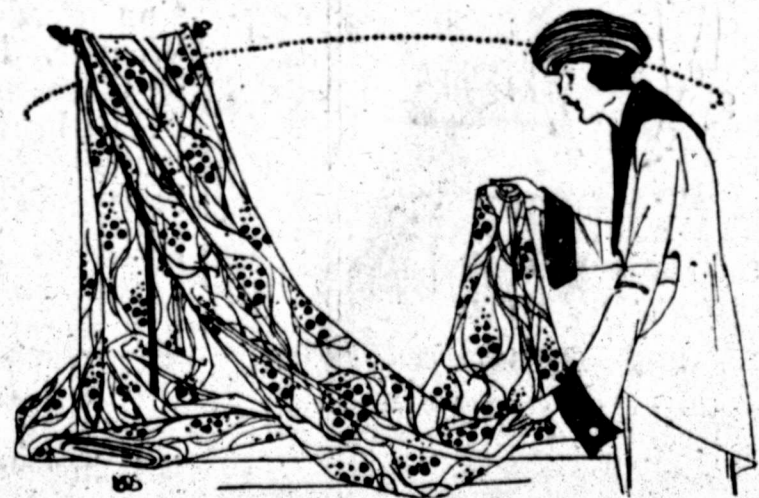

**ISSUE CHECKS FOR FIRST PAYMENT ON THE MARINE DEAL**

**FIVE HUNDRED PER CENT OF ORIGINAL INVESTMENT PAID BY PURCHASERS.**

**TO DRILL EIGHT WELLS**

Extensive Developments Are Planned by the New Company for the Near Future.

Checks for the first installment of the Marine interests purchase price were received by stockholders in Saturday's mail, the amount being 500 per cent of the original investment. The remaining 1250 per cent of the investment is to come from a note and from the oil runs, according to the terms of sale, and payment from the oil is expected to begin within a short time.

Gilliland and Richards, the purchasers of the Marine holdings, are preparing to develop the property immediately. It is understood that a contract has been let for eight wells to be drilled immediately on the Hardhu lease, Dubose Survey, west of the townsite, where the first Marine well was brought in. C. F. Sheldon, the contractor, is to begin drilling on the first well Monday, and will soon have other rigs going, just as fast as they can be secured.

**FONVILLE COMPANY IS PREPARING TO BEGIN TWO WELLS**

The Fonville Petroleum Company has secured the northwest and southeast quarters of block 29, Burkburnett townsite, and is preparing to put down two wells. Drilling is to begin immediately. A. S. Fonville, J. I. Harvey and C. P. Burton are officers of this company.

**STEPHENS COUNTY LEASES THE ROADS.**  
PORT WORTH, March 1.—The commissioners court of Stephens county in which is located the Caddo pool and other pushers, yesterday leased the public roads for drilling. It is provided that the first well must be sunk in six months and one every ninety days thereafter until ten in all are drilled. The money for the lease will be used in building roads. This is the second west Texas county to lease its highways for oil wells, Wichita being the other.

**QUADRUPLE OIL CO. DRILLS INTO SAND NEAR THE WATKINS**

The Quadruple Oil Co. on block 48 of the Kemp subdivision, Wichita valley lands, drilled into the sand at 678 feet Saturday. The drill was put four and a half feet into a fine looking sand. The hole was reported full of oil Saturday afternoon and it was believed the well would make a good producer. The new well is between the Watkins well on the Hodge and the Lone Wolf well which is about a mile further south. The Geronimo Oil Co. and Hill Stone, Turner and Sheegog are drilling to the east of the Quadruple. The L. and S. Co. is also rigging up in this section.

**Start Drilling On the Lone Wolf Well Number Two**

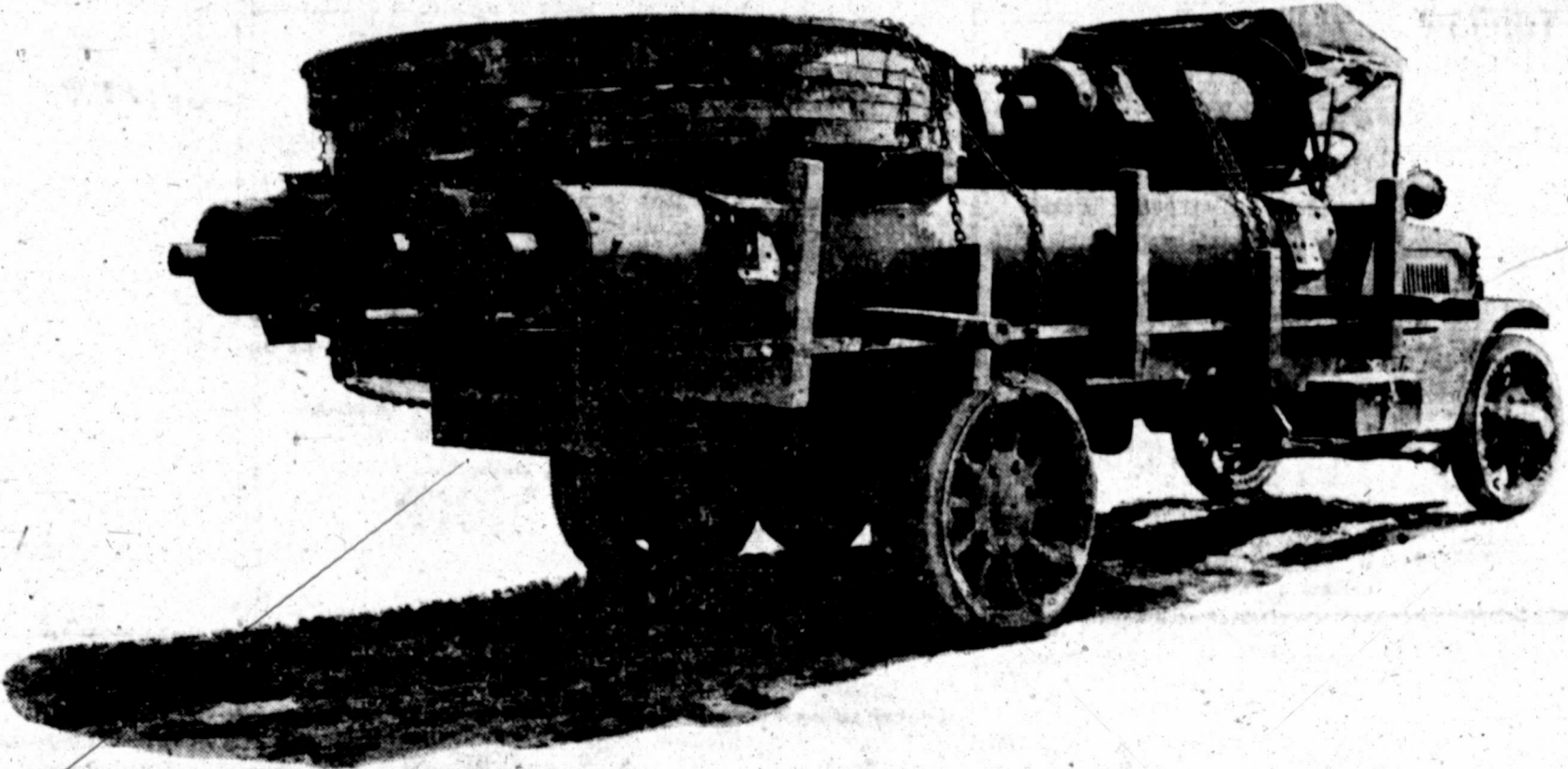

### MARCH PROMISES TO BE SPLENDID DIVIDEND MONTH

March is to be a big dividend month for Burkburnett oil companies, to judge from the beginning, four companies putting dividend checks in the morning's mail, as stated elsewhere in this issue, while many other companies are expecting to declare dividends within a short time. 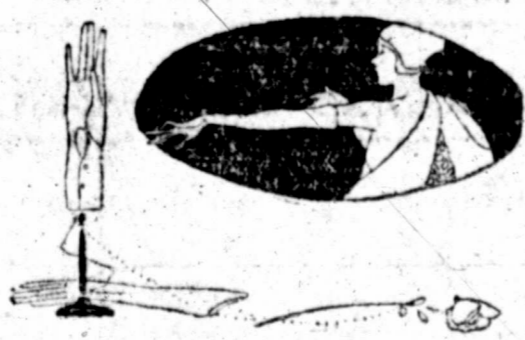

# KNOX DECLARES PLAN OF LEAGUE SANCTIONS WAR

WANTS TO KNOW WHY FEVERISH ANXIETY FOR ADOPTION OF THIS PLAN.

## PROPOSES A NEW PLAN

Would Form International Organization Comprising All Nations of the World.

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—Senator Knox of Pennsylvania, former secretary of state, speaking today in the senate, assailed the league of nations as striking down American constitutional principles and proposed a new world organization which he said would preserve the Monroe Doctrine and save America from the results of European intrigue and aggression.

Senator Knox, who attended the White House dinner conference last Wednesday with other members of the senate foreign relations committee, said the constitution of the league as presented to the peace conference, sanctions, breeds and commands war, and after criticizing various clauses of the document, asked: "Why this feverish anxiety for the adoption of this plan? Why this racing up and down the land by propagandists urging its adoption? What benefit is to come from such a sale of the country as is urged upon us? Who are the beneficiaries of this betrayal of our people?"

Would Include All Nations. The Pennsylvania senator said that if the people of the United States desire what he termed a real league of nations to prevent war and "not merely build a coalition to further trade or preserve and expand territorial possessions," it might be secured through the formation of an international organization comprising all the nations of the world.

Senator Knox said the constitution of such an international coalition should primarily declare war an international crime and stipulate that an action engaging in it except in self-defense be punished by the world as an international criminal. He also suggested that the constitution provide that international disputes be decided by an international court according to an international code defining war; that no nation could summon another before the court unless the subject under discussion was of common concern to the contending nations, and that jurisdiction of the court not extend to matters of governmental policy.

Would Avoid Arbitration. Under such a code, Senator Knox declared, America would not, as in event the present plan for a league of nations were ratified, be called upon to arbitrate the policy involved in the Monroe doctrine, our conservation policy, our immigration policy; our right to expel aliens, our right to regulate

vasion and to maintain military and naval establishments; our right to make necessary fortifications of the Panama canal or on our frontiers, and our right to discriminate between natives and foreigners in respect to rights of property and citizenship.

Among other suggestions for the constitution, Senator Knox said it should provide that the countries of the two hemispheres be called upon to enforce decrees of the international court only in their respective hemispheres.

"A league framed on these broad lines," he continued, "would carry with it a minimum loss of our sovereignty, would relieve us from participation in the broils of Europe; would preserve the Monroe Doctrine and would save America from the results of European intrigue and aggression."

Declares Against War. In opening his address Senator Knox said he wished it understood he had not secured negative conclusions in regard to the constitution of the proposed league through unwillingness to express his opinion. He said he acquiesced to the extent of seeing the United States make the utmost sacrifices possible, but that he wanted to feel sure that when the offering of the United States had been placed upon the altar and burned this country should have measurably and proportionately advanced the cause of human liberty and aggression.

Referring to the proposed constitution of the league of nations Senator Knox first criticized it for "looseness of expression" which he said "has acterized it throughout and then because it appeared to set up two operating entities for its enforcement, the high contracting parties and the league itself. In this connection Senator Knox said the importance of this became apparent when it was observed that "the high contracting parties" did not comprise every member vote in the league and that therefore the "burden assumed by the high contracting parties, whoever they may be, possibly the 'Big Five' is crushing in its weight."

Should Admit Central Powers. The senator warned especially against leaving the central powers out of the league, saying the inevitable result would be "to drive them more closely together for mutual self-protection, thus making the formation of a second league of nations bidding for adherence from neutral states almost a certainty."

"Thus at no distant date," he con-

tinued, "we should have two great leagues of nations and two great camps each preparing for a new and greater life and death struggle."

Even the term league of nations is a deceptive misnomer," Senator Knox declared, "for under this proposed plan the nations of the world are divided into three classes:

"First, signatories of the covenant; these are not named, but it is assumed they will include and possibly be confined to the five great Entente powers, that is to say, the British empire, France, Italy, Japan and the United States;

"Second, States not signatory, but named in the protocol. No information is given as to who these states are, though surely they will include such Entente powers, if any, as are not signatories as well as certain other

states neutral in the conflict now closing; and

"Third: Those states which are neither signatories nor protocol states and which must, to be admitted to the league be prepared to give certain effective guarantees as to their intention to be bound by such international obligations. These latter are outcast states and presumably include the central powers and their allies in the war. Thus a league of nations in the sense of all nations, is not created by this document nor are the states members of the league treated as equals.

"The term, league, is a misnomer in another and really vital manner. For a league connotes a confederation and a confederation implies a right in the several parties to withdraw at their will. But there is no right of secession within the four corners of this covenant. On the other hand, the association here provided for is a union

**COTTON COUNTY FANS WILL NOW WAIT TEN DAYS**

Dallas News, Feb. 27, 1919: Casing was set yesterday in the Burk-Bridge well in Cotton county, Oklahoma, opposite Burkburnett. It will require ten days for the cement to set, and then it is expected the well will be drilled in and the story known as to what is offered opposite the wonder field of Burkburnett on the Oklahoma side of Red River.

A log identical with the wells on the Texas side of Red River is reported for the Burk-Bridge well. Mr. Reusch, Government agent, states, with the notable feature that the shallow showings are more pronounced in the Burk-Bridge well. Shallow sands that were only oil traces in Texas are said to be shown to be of paying depth in the Oklahoma well, according to the log. The casing is being run to protect the shallow sands, so that they may be developed later if desired.

Practically all developments on the Oklahoma side of Red River are awaiting the outcome of this well and much tension has resulted, that will not be fully relieved until the well is thoroughly tested. In the full sense of that term as applied to our own political institutions. Once in this union and we remain there no matter how enormous its gigantic burdens may become.

Must Remain a Member. "No matter how great the distaste and revulsion our people may have for it, we must remain members until either we persuade all the states represented in the executive council and three fourths of those represented in the body of delegates to bid us depart in peace, or until the league crumbles of its own weight or is destroyed by its enemies, or until we fight our way out against the British empire, France, Italy, Japan and all the lesser states they are able to persuade to join the league."

Senator Knox took up the six operative bodies of the league and criticized them one by one. As to the body of delegates, Senator Knox's chief criticism was that the constitution contained no provisions for their appointment, removal, compensation or tenure. Senator Knox objected to the formation of the executive council because it would be composed of only nine of half a hundred states and practically would be given the power to declare war, make its own laws, sit as a court and pass judgment and then determine the means of enforcing its judgments.

Terms It Abhorrent. A body clothed with powers such as given to this council is an anachronism," said Senator Knox. "It belongs to the days of the Medes and the Persians. A union more abhorrent to our traditions, free institutions and trend of all civilized government could not be devised."

Provisions for the mandatory commission Senator Knox thought were indefinite as to organization and operation. Of the bureau of labor, he asked whether it was the intent to put labor of all countries upon an equality.

"If this be the intent, labor of this country may consider, inasmuch as France already has given notice it will be impossible to put French labor on an equality with American, whether it is proposed to bring American labor to the level of French labor, in order that there may be equitable treatment of the commerce of the two countries."

MAJOR OSTRUP DIES OF PNEUMONIA ATTACK

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, Mar. 1.—Major John C. Ostrup, who served on the staff of General Pershing in France during the war and an authority on railway engineering, died of pneumonia at a hotel here yesterday.

Major Ostrup was born in Denmark and was graduated from the Royal Danish Academy. After coming to this country he was engaged in railroad enterprises until 1907 when he became a member of the faculty of Stevens Institute of Technology. He resigned four years later to resume work in his profession.

DR. MIKE WALKER TELLS OF HORRORS PRACTICED BY HUN

"Don't be swayed by any silly sentimentality towards the Hun," is the plea of Captain Mike Walker to the folk at home, after he had seen the suffering and devastation that the Hun has caused in occupied territory. Captain Walker has been attached to the French, evacuating refugees for the past two months. In a letter to G. C. Wood he gives what is seemingly the general feeling of all American soldiers overseas towards the Germans. A portion of the letter follows:

Capt. Walker's Letter.

"I have seen some very interesting work since the war ended, as I was attached for two and a half months to the French, evacuating refugees. Wish you could have seen just a few of the things that I saw while on this job. Any sympathy for the Germans would entirely disappear. They did so many useless things to impose suffering on the innocent that were of absolutely no military use to them, and from what I have seen the women were just as guilty and deserving as little consideration and as much punishment as the men. I would kick the whole bloody nation into hell if I had an opportunity, and don't delude yourself that his people at home were starving or suffering one half that these poor people here were. He even stripped them of their blankets and bedding down to the scantiest amount and sent it to Germany. He is a filthy old swine, and can never be anything else, absolutely contemptible in every way. The Hun was the only soldier on the western front that would squeal like a pig when he was about to die or being severely punished. He would never die game, but would make a miserable spectacle of it.

I trust that you people will not be swayed by any silly sentimentality, and will not deny yourselves a thing, or buy a bond or give a thing toward helping feed the Hun. He fed himself well enough while the war lasted, very much better than the machine guns then with food. If you could see the devastation he has caused, you would feel the same way, but that is not half the atrocity he practiced on the female population were something terrible. One-tenth of the things have never been published, and never will until our army gets home and tells you first hand. Until then you people will have no conception of what has really happened over here.

"Visit to Brussels. "I have just returned from Brussels. The day I was there he sent back on

one train nearly a billion dollars in gold that he had stolen from that city alone. This country was full of fine churches, rich in old paintings. Many of these he sent to Germany. I have seen others slashed with knives and utterly ruined, and the churches were his favorite place to stable his horses. I hated to see the war end when it did. Another ten days and he would have been slaughtered by the hundreds of thousands, but he was wise enough to know it and throw up his hands and holler 'Kamerad.' I believe the soldiers were all far from satisfied to see it end when it did.

"Mr. Wilson is creating quite a sensation in Europe, and making a great impression, I think. I think he is a wonderful man, but we can't tell yet what will be the outcome of the peace conference. I believe Mr. Wilson is an idealist and has some wonderful theories, but whether they will work out in a practical way awaits to be seen. If they do, he will go down in history as the greatest man of his age. However, the soldiers are frankly skeptical and uneasy, but of course a man can't be a soldier and diplomat both.

"We are having some very cold weather now. I snows most every day. It don't seem to hurt me like it did at home. I haven't had a fire in my room this winter, and only a couple of blankets and my overcoats for bedding.

"I don't know just what is to become of me. I am still with the English and have learned the game from this standpoint quite well. Have done practically everything that is done in my line, from base hospital to front line."

Producing Well Is Purchased By Stonewall Brown

Stonewall Brown, of the Big Burk companies, this week purchased a producing well and a quarter of a block at Burkburnett from Harry Weeks and Mann-McPhail for a consideration in excess of \$50,000. This well has been producing for around two months, being on block 21. Mr. Brown bought the well individually and not for any of the companies with which he is connected.

GEN. AGUILAR ORDERS AMERICAN DEPORTED

By Associated Press. MEXICO CITY, March 1.—Advices from Cordova state that General Candido Aguilar, chief of military operations in the Gulf coast district, has ordered that an American, H. D. Wilkins, be deported on the charge of aiding rebels. Wilkins is variously reported as having been employed by a foreign oil company and a foreign electric power company in the Tuxuan region.

"RUNNING THE RACE."

"Therefore seeing we are compassed about by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight and the sin that doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith." Heb. 12:1-2.

The glorious past, the throbbing present and the expectant future are all in this text. Let us look into it as a mirror and discern the vision that we may profit thereby to the glory of God.

Seeing we are compassed about! This means environment, and how few fully realize the force of environment. You carry with you your environment. You are a maker of an environment. Strive to create a good environment within and without.

There is an environment of witnesses, not spectators, or idle lookers-on, nor cold critics, in this verse of life. This environment of witnesses who really are testifiers, or even better martyrs, are forever related to the race of time. Look back and see those of the lasting faith who have gone one before. That word, "therefore" compels us to look down the glorious aisle of the 11th chapter that we can be the better make our race today. We are one with these ancient runners as with all in this time running the race.

The past is a witness for us and against us. The present is a witness of the race that shall largely ordain the goal of our running. Lay aside every weight! No runner can do this best when weighted with needless impediments. The original word means, "tumour," "encumbering," "weight," "a swelling." We add weights to our lives in bad habits. We add weights to the progress of civilization by our public sins and private follies. The curse in the church and in society is the indifferent runner; the careless runner; the crooked runner; the disgruntled runner; the runner who is not in training. So breaking the rules of training such runners violate the laws of life. Daring themselves by the defeat of lust they sow

British government regarding the Venezuelan boundary. Secretary of State, Olney used language which, taken by itself, would give the impression that the United States claimed some authority over the other countries of the Western Hemisphere, and recognized obligations to protect them from their enemies. Mr. Roosevelt undoubtedly accepted that as the meaning of the Doctrine, but that is a great extension of a principle of action that had stood for more than 70 years when the Venezuela boundary became an exciting subject, and the United States is not committed to it.

In the first place, the Monroe Doctrine was beyond dispute a defiance of the Holy Alliance. Beginning as a means of preventing war, this Alliance quickly developed into a machine for the suppression of liberalism, first in Greece and afterward in South America, where Spain's colonies had virtually established their independence, but had never had their independence acknowledged by Spain, and the Holy Alliance showed a disposition to aid Spain in re-establishing its authority on this hemisphere, after it had, as a matter of fact, ceased.

In the second place, the Monroe Doctrine was a notification to the Holy Alliance that if it should begin the suppression of popular government we should not wait to be invaded, but would take the initiative. Europe could operate against the United States from Mexico much better than it could from the other side of the ocean. What we announced in the Monroe Doctrine was that any part of America which had emancipated itself from monarchy should not be subjected to monarchy by external forces, because any combination of nations that did that would be in a position to attack us. If anybody started a fire on our neighbor's premises we should put it out without waiting for our own house to catch.

disaster and disgrace along the course of life. And sin which does so easily beset us! What is the betting sin of your life? Easy sin! Some sins are hard and we shun them as a plague. "Let us be patient then, these severe afflictions not from the ground arise, but oftentimes celestial benedictions assume this dark disguise." You are to be God's runner, run then for the good of man; run for the welfare of woman; run for the happiness of childhood; run for God's righteousness son man's earth.

Look unto Jesus! No runner can run without a sure goal. Set your eyes on Him and your course will be right. "Gird up the loins of your mind," and "get into the game!" Run right for no athlete in the game is crowned except he contend lawfully. Will you get out of the running because another runner has quit? Or because some runner is not running honorably? 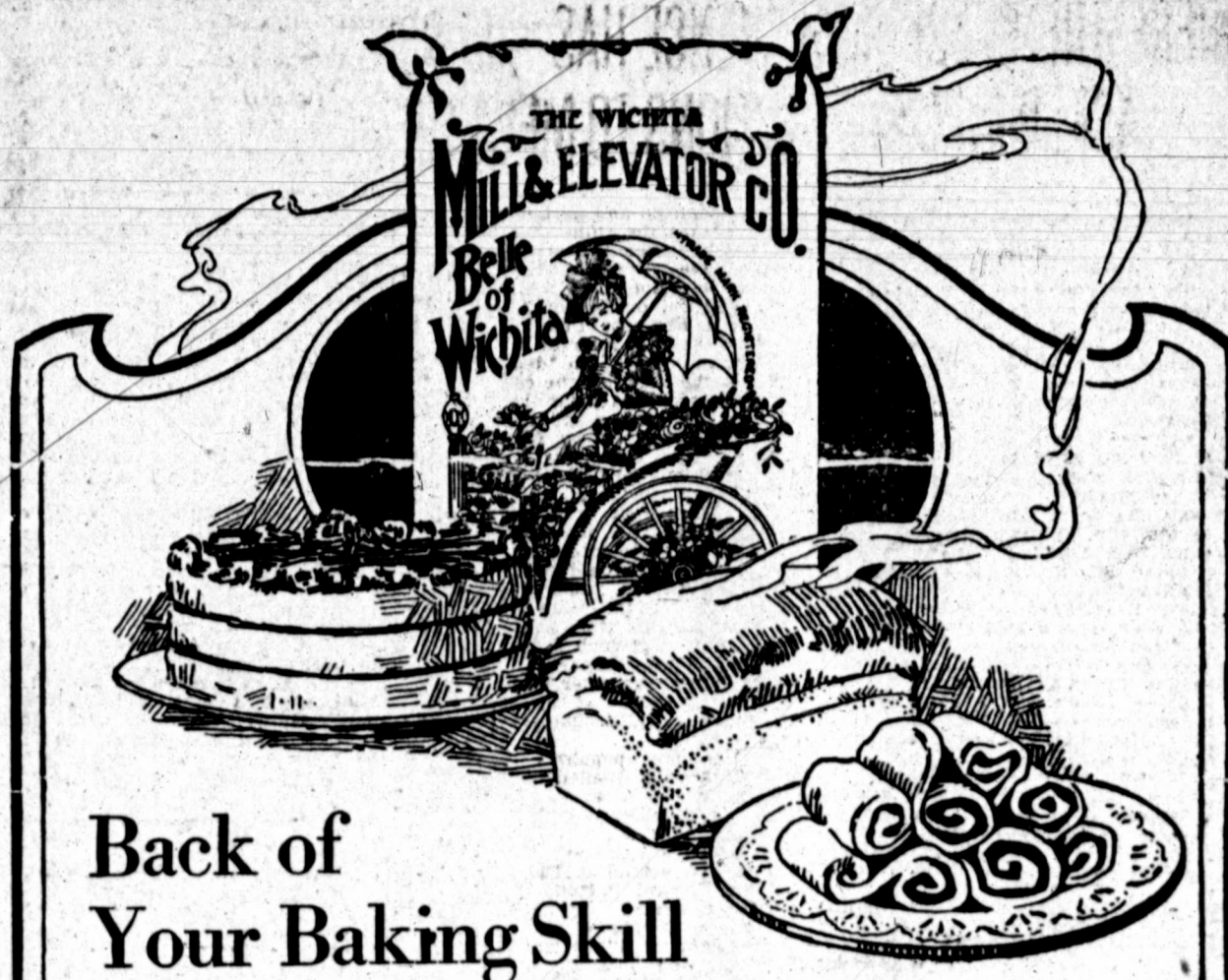

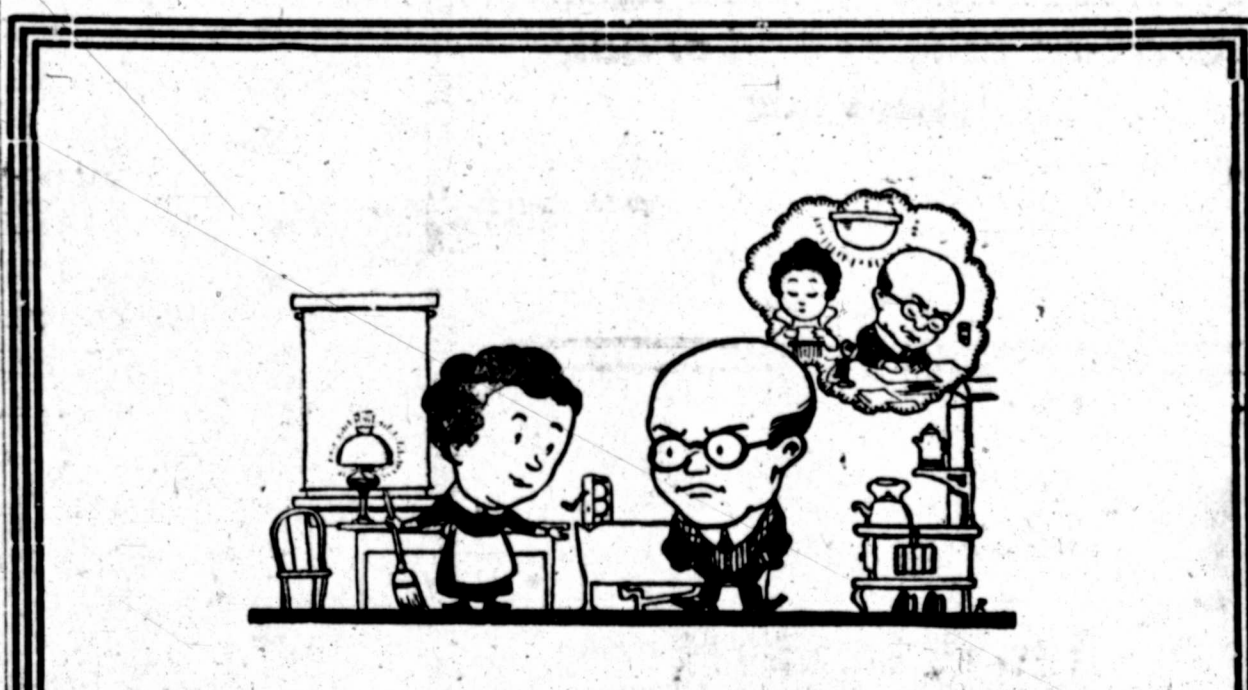

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## WHERE THE PEACE CONFERENCE HAS ASKED RUSSIA'S FACTIONS TO MEET

Special to The Times  
**WASHINGTON, D. C., March 1.**—The National Geographic Society, from its Washington headquarters, has issued the following bulletin concerning the Princes' islands, in the Sea of Marmora, where the warring factions of Russia have been asked to send delegates for a conference at which it is hoped the internal dissensions in the vast Slav dominions can be composed.

It would seem that the peace conference in Paris have had the number of Princes' islands in mind as well as their geographical location when they were named as the place of meeting on February 15 for the warring factions in Russia. There are nine islands—enough for each group of delegates to have an island to themselves should such a course of segregation prove expedient.

**Near Constantinople.**  
 "The islands lie from 10 to 15 miles southeast of Constantinople, near the Asiatic shore. Four of them are inhabited, and the largest of the group, Prinkipo (also called Pityusa, meaning 'rich in pines'), has a population of more than 10,000. Turks and Greeks being about equal in number.

"The islands in modern times have been popular as summer resorts, owing to the salubrity of their climate and their proximity to the Turkish capital.

"Few islands have a history more poignant with tragedy, with high hopes and shattered dreams, with diabolical machinations of empire wreckers and makers than these few square miles of earth washed by the waters of the Marmora. Their very name is significant of their past, for in the days of the Byzantine Empire they were the retreats, either forced or voluntary, of princes and princesses who had fallen into disfavor at the nearby court.

**Home of Famous Exiles.**  
 "Each island of the group could tell its own story of famous exiles. None is more pathetic, however, than that of Prout as the prison of the deposed emperor, Romanus IV, called Diogenes. The life of this ruler reads like one of the fictitious romances of Cleopatra's days. He was a distinguished young soldier descended from a Cappadocian family. Having been implicated in a conspiracy to depose his sovereign, Constantine IX, he was condemned to be executed for treason. While being led to his death, according to one account, he caught the eye of the empress regent, Eudocia Macrembolitissa, who instantly fell in love with him, granted him a pardon and shortly thereafter married him. After his coronation as emperor he led three successful expeditions against the Seljuk Turks, but his fourth campaign, against Alp Arslan was a disastrous failure.

"Compelled to pay a large ransom for his release, Romanus returned home to be defeated at the hands of a pretender to the throne. Blinded, he spent his few remaining days of abject misery imprisoned in a monastery on the highest point of Prout.

**Imprisoned With Brigands.**  
 "On the island of Antigone, the great patriarch Methodius spent seven years of his life imprisoned with two brigands.

"On Prinkipo, which is now dotted

with fine residences and gardens, the traveler is shown the ruins of a convent in which eleven centuries ago the remarkable woman Empress Irene I, was imprisoned for a time. A poor but beautiful orphan of Athens, Irene married Emperor Leo IV and soon became the true ruler of the Byzantine empire. Upon the death of her husband, she assumed the reins of government for her 10-year-old son, Constantine VI. For a decade her reign was distinguished by firmness and wisdom. Then began the conflict with her ambitious son which terminated in the greatest blot upon her career, the capture of the fleeing youth, his return to Constantinople, where by his mother's orders his eyes were gouged out. It would seem that the ancients had good cause to interpret an eclipse of the sun which took place about this time as a sign of heaven's horror at such a deed.

**Wife of Three Emperors.**  
 "Another famous prisoner of Prinkipo was Zoe, the wife of three emperors—Romanus III, Michael IV and Constantine IX.

"One of the most populous of the islands is Halki (also spelled Chalcidic and Khalki) where there is a naval college and a theological college. A Greek commercial school occupies the site of an ancient monastery. At the entrance to the school is the tombstone of Sir Edward Barton, English ambassador to Turkey during the reign of Queen Elizabeth.

"On the island of Plata the peace delegates will find a castle, built after the model of Windsor Castle. It is now falling into decay. Once it was the summer residence of Sir Henry Bulwer (the famous author of the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty of American history) when he was British ambassador at Constantinople. Upon his retirement, the one-time British ambassador at Washington, sold the island to the Khedive of Egypt, whose family still owned it at the outbreak of the world war.

### PUBLIC IS VICTIMIZED BY CLEVER IMPOSTER

**DALLAS, March 1.**—A soldier who said he had been wounded in the Battle of Chateau Thierry was arrested here as he was entering a pawn shop to secure money on stolen valuables. He told the police he "had to steal or starve." He said he was unable to secure employment and that his wound made it impossible for him to do manual labor. Touched by his story, police said they would not press charges against him.

The story was published in a local paper which circulates in nearby towns. Peace officers in Texas, Kansas, Willis Point and other places read the story and immediately telephoned local authorities that a man who had burglarized homes in those cities had given the same account of himself. Confronted with these facts the soldier confessed he had never been to France and that his "wound" was received when he jumped from a moving freight train.

## London Papers Are Alarmed Over the German Situation

**LONDON, Mar. 1.**—Several of this morning's newspapers feature on the internal demoralization of Germany and the dangerous growth of bolshevism as a result of lack of food and the increase of unemployment, and express editorially deep concern as to the problem thus created for the Allies.

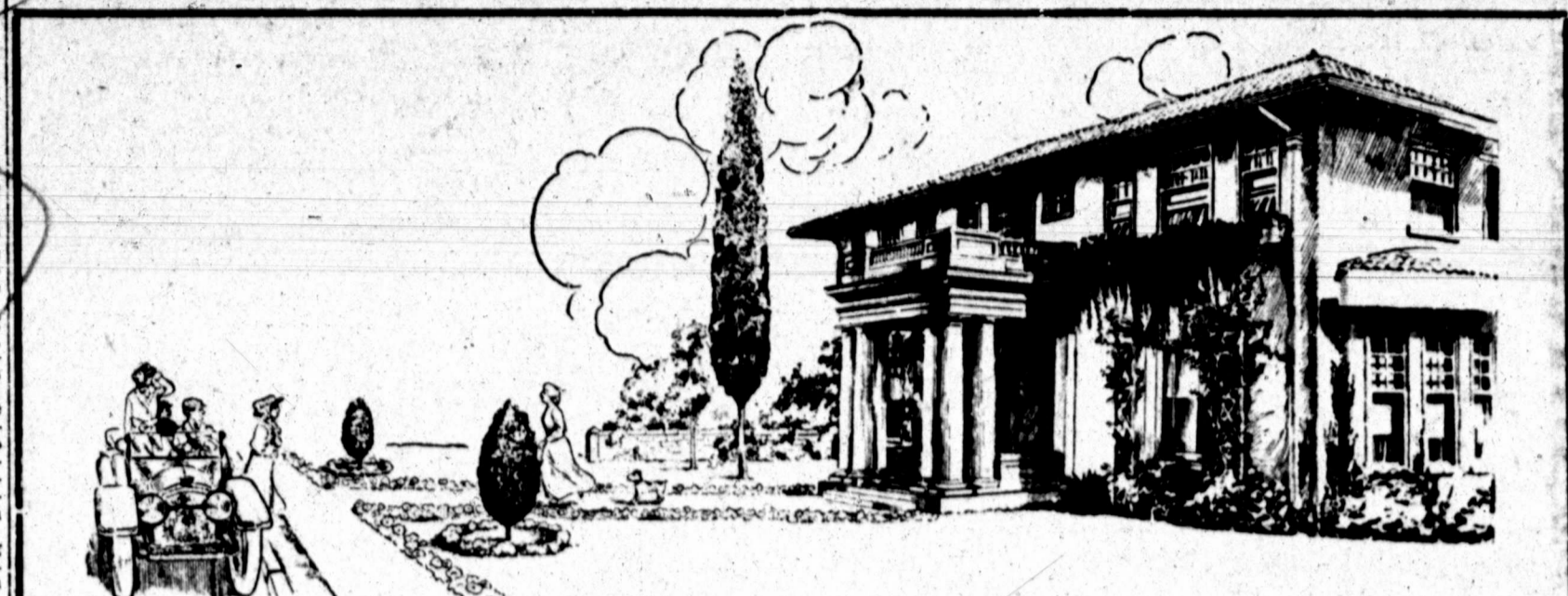
Various reports concur in declaring that the situation is extremely urgent. A Reuters report describes the position of Germany as more precarious than it was last November.

"Discontent is growing, the people are hungry, neurasthenic and dispirited and the government is unable to improve material condition," this report says. "Far sighted and well informed men are pessimistic and apprehensive at ominous signs which show a tendency toward anarchy."

The telegram which prints two long reports this week from a correspondent who is viewing the situation in Germany, prints another today corroborating the worst features of reports of hardship among the German people. The correspondent contends that if the Allies "do not act immediately there will be no Germany to negotiate with because anarchy will take the place of the government."

### URUGUAY GOVERNMENT IS COMMISSION FORM

**MONTEVIDEO, URUGUAY, Mar. 1.**—With the inauguration of Dr. Baltasar Bruz as president today, Uruguay today begins a commission form of government for the republic, the commission being formed of the president, elected by the direct vote of the people and nine commissioners appointed by the two houses of congress. In addition the president will have the usual cabinet of eight members of whom he will name three and the commission six.

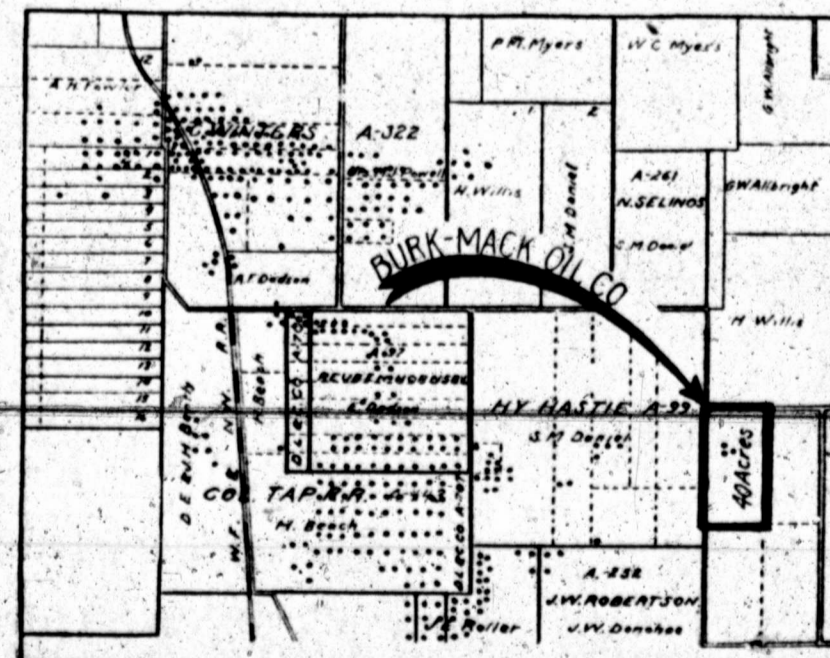
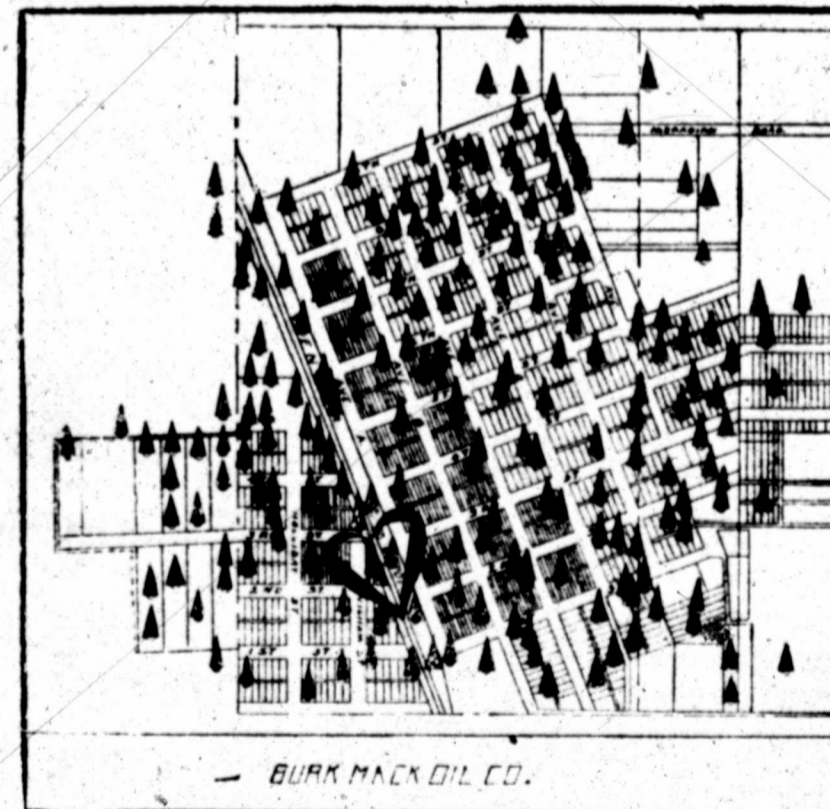

CAMPAIGN STARTS MONDAY TO RAISE BUDGET FOR SALVATION ARMY.

### ORGANIZED ON FRIDAY

Ensign Robb is in the City in Connection with Plans for the Proposed Drive.

Frank Kell heads the new Home Service Council of Wichita Falls, which is to supervise the social service work of the Salvation Army and which will on Monday, March 3, begin to raise the budget for this phase of the Army's work. Organization of this council was perfected Friday at a meeting held in Mr. Kell's office. Ensign H. G. Robb, formerly in charge of the Wichita Falls work, now secretary of the Home Service Council for the Southwestern Division with headquarters at Dallas, was here for the organization and will remain in Wichita Falls about two weeks longer.

### Budget Placed at \$5,000.

Five thousand dollars has been set as the budget for the year's work by the Council, and this amount will be raised by subscription in a very short time. This new organization and the collection of money by subscription and in a lump sum will mark the passing of the tambourine collection in Wichita Falls, in connection with other cities through the world, as the Salvation Army commander, Evangelist Booth, ordered this week. Ensign Robb, since the conclusion of his work with the Salvation Army Unit in Camp Logan, has been assigned as secretary of this new section of the Army work, and those who are familiar with his work in Wichita Falls, feel that the division commander has made a wise choice, and that he will be as successful in this work as he has been in his work in this city. Since he can not be stationed here permanently, they are glad that he has been assigned to outlie that will bring him frequently to Wichita Falls so that he will remain in touch with the local work in which the business men have become thoroughly interested in the past, through his efforts.

Plans for the raising of the budget have been perfected and members of the council will call on the citizens of Wichita Falls for funds to support the local work early this week. The work is to be kept before the public as often as possible, and as soon as the entire membership of the council is selected, the various necessary departments will be organized for action.

### D. S. Crosses Are Awarded To 3,918 Soldiers of U. S.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—Of the total of 3,918 distinguished service crosses awarded for gallantry in action to American soldiers General March announced today, 664, or more than double the number given to any other division, went to the second regulars. The first division of regulars came next with 300 crosses awarded to its members. The third regulars with 233 was third. The twenty-sixth, New England national guard, the fourth in the list with 229 awards, led all national guard and national army divisions. The 42nd (Rainbow) came next with 205 and then the 30th with 177. The 27th division, New York National guards, home returning home, received 139. The 77th, also a New York division, received 146.

### ROUTING OF THE MERIDIAN HIGHWAY HAS BEEN CHANGED

WICHITA FALLS IS NO LONGER INCLUDED ON THE MAIN LINE OF ROAD.

### MEETING AT EL RENO

Announced That Highway Will Cross Red River Between Ringgold and Terrell, Okla.

Wichita Falls is no longer on the main line of the Meridian Highway, according to an announcement received Saturday from G. A. McNaughton, at San Marcos, Texas, publicity agent for the Highway in Texas. The highway has been routed through Oklahoma, south from El Reno through Chickasha and thence to the Terrell crossing near Ringgold. The change is announced in the following dispatch:

Meeting at El Reno. "According to a decision arrived at in the meeting at El Reno last Friday the following routing was adopted for the Meridian road through Oklahoma, from El Reno south via Chickasha, Marlin, Duncan and Waurika on to Terrell, crossing the Red River on the Terrell bridge into Texas, thence to Bowie, following the Meridian road from there as originally planned. F. L. Patten of Kingfisher was elected president and Ed. F. John of Chickasha was elected secretary and treasurer. F. J. Gentry was endorsed for state highway commissioner. New chairmen were named in seven counties and a legislative committee was elected to work for the new bridge over the South Canadian river at Miner-Union City, south of El Reno. New Membership Plan. "The new membership plan of the Meridian Highway, pledging a dollar per mile, was endorsed. The new Meridian Highway sign was also adopted. The sign is as follows—a plank eighteen inches long by eight inches wide, nailed to a pole or post at right angles to the road, with the following inscription, "M. H. Straight ahead (arrow) Winnepeg — miles." Signs will be erected before and after each intersecting road and before all forks in the road. Blue prints for each county, with instructions for same, will be issued on application to the president, John C. Nicholson, Newton, Kansas or G. A. MacNaughton, San Marcos, Texas.

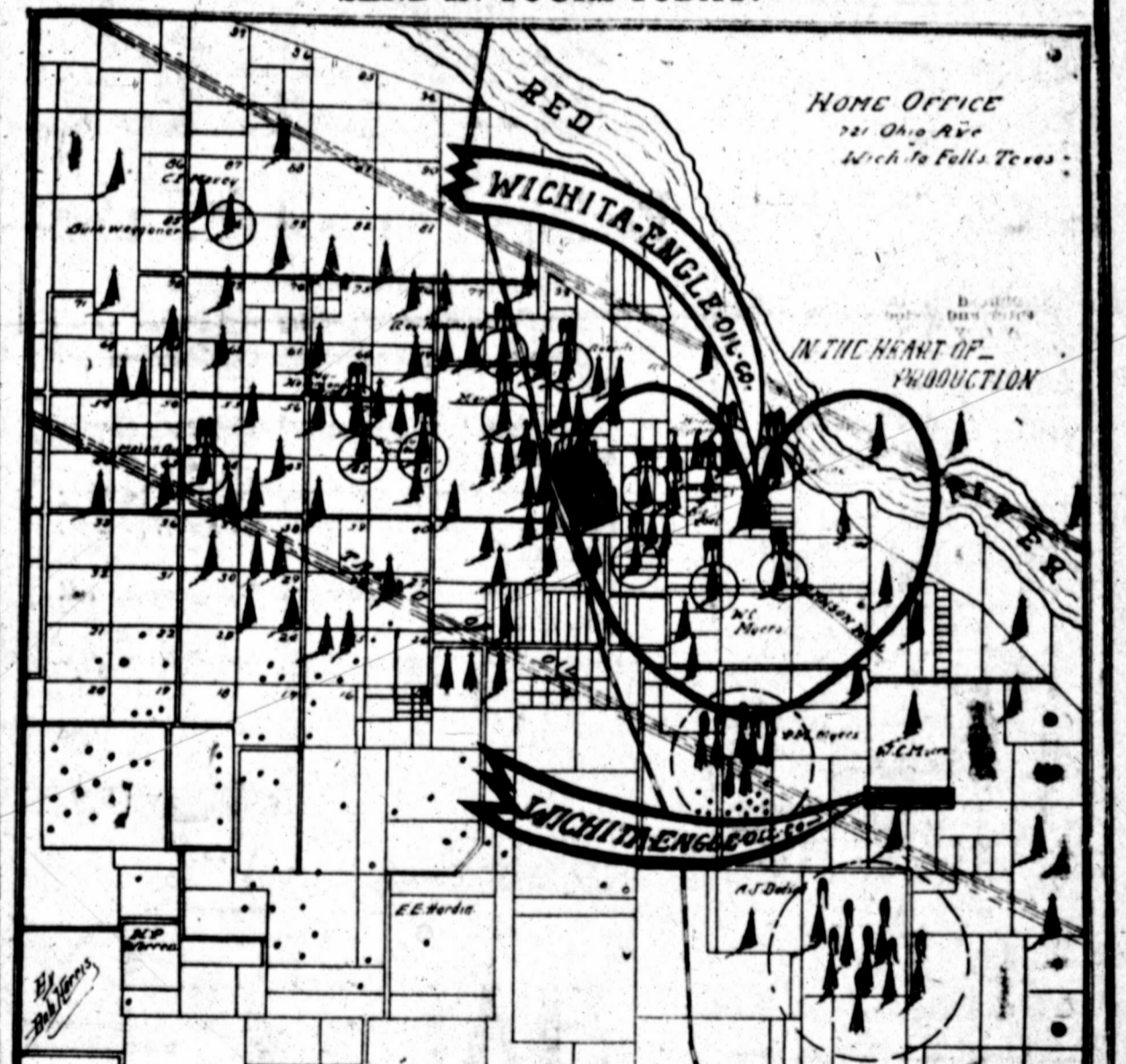

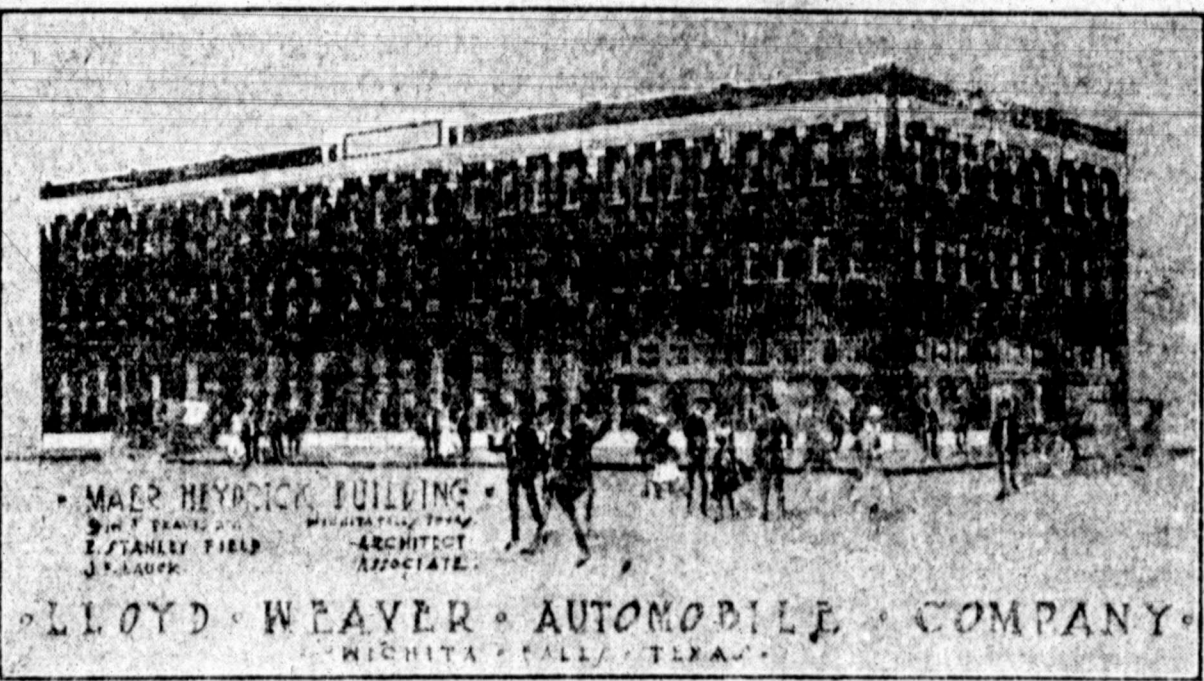

### PARNELL DEFENDS VOTE AGAINST THE "BLUE SKY" LAW

AUSTIN, TEX., March 1.—Tuesday afternoon's session of Monday's recessed session of the Texas house was marked by what will likely be the final attempt to cancel all Appropriations and annul the act of the Thirty-fifth legislature, establishing certain normal colleges, which was voted down after a debate into which entered every known species of argument, embracing the digging up of legislative skeletons dating back to the enactment of the Robertson insurance law, the question of "soft barrel" grabbers, and imputations of control by interests alien to the cause of the people, culminating in the closing speech of Mr. Richards of Lockhart, who, in the course of his remarks, declared in speaking of the opposition to the bill that he was for the interests of the people always and not as "on posters," when the people of this state vote on one side in the oil tax bill and the oil companies on the other, the gentleman from W. argued voted against the people, calling forth underlines of personal privileges from Mr. Parnell, a statement to the effect that the declaration made by Mr. Richards was a "lie" if it meant that he was representing other interests than those of the people.

Just as the night session was closing at 9:30 Tuesday evening, Mr. Richards said that he didn't realize in the heat of the debate during the afternoon what he may have said, but that whatever he did say, he didn't intend to make any reflection on the gentleman from Wilbarger or others, as it was said jokingly.

Mr. Parnell then said that he, too, desired to withdraw any statement he might have made and wanted to apologize to the house for his actions.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 1.—President Carranza is considering a plan, submitted by the National Board of Health for the enactment of legislation that will gradually result in the complete abolition of the alcoholic liquor traffic in Mexico. He recently signed a decree increasing from 25 to 50 per cent the tax on pulque and

other alcoholic beverages in Mexico City.

The constitution, according to the officials of the Board of Health, gives that body powers to dictate health regulations that will result in the abolition of the liquor traffic. The board's program, as submitted to the president, provides for an elaborate campaign to suppress the liquor traffic gradually. High duties, early closing hours for saloons, temperance lectures, organization of temperance societies and various other means would be resorted to before the prohibitory regulations became fully effective.

### LUIS TERRAZAS THIRD IS REPORTED KILLED

MEXICO CITY, March 1.—Luis Terrazas, 3rd, rebel "general" and adventurous grandson of the former multi-millionaire Chihuahua ranchman of the same name, has been killed in the state of Tlaxcala, while serving with the bandits of Marcelo Caraveo, according to reports received here from Puebla.

Terrazas, who was about 25 years old, is credited with being the leader in numerous sanguinary chapters of the history of modern Mexican liquor traffic in Mexico. He recently signed a decree increasing from 25 to 50 per cent the tax on pulque and, when his

# AMERICAN DISCUSSION OF LEAGUE IS CLOSELY FOLLOWED IN LONDON

By MARGARET WALTER  
(Special Correspondent, Reciprocal News Service.)

LONDON, Feb. 20.—American discussion of the league of nations is closely followed here. The press is giving much attention to criticisms of the plan in the senate. These are not considered as indicating that America is unwilling to take part in whatever arrangements seem necessary to make sure the fruits of victory and guarantee the peace of the world. On the contrary, best English opinion considers that without the fullest criticism and discussion of the plan in the United States no arrangements to which the American people were committed would be likely to be upheld by them. There is comparatively little faith here in the writing of constitutions; all the political experience of this country tends to make the British people believe in the slow growth of institutions backed by public sentiment rather than in architectural plans.

Complete Agreement Not Expected. It is considered impossible here to expect the complete agreement of the civilized world in every detail of a scheme, but the production of the document now before the conference within so short a time is felt to be symptomatic of a growing sense of the need of international co-operation. British opinion will only go so far with the scheme, as seems practical and necessary to meet the immediate problems of civilization; at the same time there is a general desire to leave room for whatever future development the opinion of the world may make possible. For example, the omission of a representative world senate or assembly does not forever preclude its organization by the associated governments. Such a development might be promoted by parliamentary groups, for example under the auspices of the Inter-Parliamentary Union. A similar elasticity in the proposals leaves room for the later establishment of a court of international justice which may lead to a council of conciliation and similar arbitral machinery replacing or being made supplementary to the arrangements of Article 15.

Praise British Proposal. What is considered one of the most valuable proposals contained in the scheme in its present shape is the British plan for the establishment of a permanent secretariat, or office force of experts, which is considered a natural and inevitable outgrowth of the secretariat established for the peace conference. The functions of the present secretariat can be carried on with few changes if the conference develops into a permanent international council.

Other features of the scheme on which British opinion is united are the principle of trusteeship for the backward peoples and the registration of all international treaties with the Secretary-General of the Conference of League. It is also assumed here that in spite of Article 10 the acceptance of the fourteen points by the Allies as a basis of the armistice involves the pledge of admission of Germany to the membership and benefits of the league after peace is signed, although it is not contemplated that Germany should have any place in the proposed executive council.

The only American opinion that arouses criticism here is that which advocates the severance of relations between the United States and the Allies by a refusal to consider a joint responsibility for a victory jointly won. This is regarded as little short of playing the German game. Anything which puts difficulties in the way of establishing a just and permanent peace is presumed to be the result of German influence.

Harry Holman Neuberger, first lieutenant, to whom has been awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for heroism overseas, was the first soldier of the Allies to set foot in Rembach, Germany. According to the citation made public by the War Department, Lieutenant Neuberger, of the Tenth field-artillery, Third division, was the cross because at Coetstou, France, on July 14 and 15, 1918, he volunteered to assist another officer in driving an ambulance, making three trips to Greves Farm under intense shell fire. He continued to assist in the evacuation of the wounded even after being gassed. He was ill for three weeks in Paris, after which he returned to his regiment and spent forty-nine days in the Argonne Forest.

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### URGES MINIMUM SALARY OF \$1500 FOR THE TEACHERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 1.—Doubling the salaries of teachers within the next five years, and then adding 50 per cent before another 10 years have passed, so that the minimum average salary for teachers will be \$1,500—this is the program urged by Dr. P. F. Claxton, U. S. Commissioner of Education. Dr. Claxton says: "It is only by very large increases in pay of teachers that we may hope to improve our schools appreciably. Small increases of 5, 10 or 20 per cent will not avail, for they will not be sufficient to hold in the schools men and women of superior ability.

"Teachers are now paid less for their work than any other class of workers, and the increase in their pay in the last few years has in no wise been in keeping with the increase in pay of other workers, or with the increase in the cost of living. While the cost of living has increased approximately 80 per cent—food, 85 per cent; clothing, 106 per cent; drugs, 103 per cent; fuel, 53 per cent; and house-furnishing goods, 75 per cent—the salaries of teachers have increased only about 12 per cent. The purchasing power of the salary of the teacher in our public schools is, therefore, only about 43 per cent of what it was four years ago.

"Many of the better teachers are leaving the schools, and their places are taken by men and women of less native ability, less education and culture, and less training and experience. Many of the places are not filled at all. As an inevitable result of this character of the schools, the standards of the schools must continue to fall. In some normal schools the enrollment is far less than in former years.

"The only remedy is larger pay for teachers. If school boards, legislators and county and city councils would immediately announce the policy of doubling the average salary of teachers within the next few years and of adding not less than 50 per cent more within the 10 years following the expiration of this period, so that at the end of 15 years the average salary of public school teachers would be not less than \$1,500—about one and a half times larger than they receive at present—and then take steps for carrying out this policy, much good would be accomplished thereby at once.

"Such a policy and such a prospect

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would attract to the schools more men and women of superior ability and would hold them, working contentedly and, therefore, profitably for the children and the public welfare. Such increase in salary should carry with it an increase of not less than 25 per cent in the average length of the school term, which is now less than 160 days.

"To those who are not acquainted with past conditions and who have given the matter no intelligent thought, the increase recommended may seem large, but in fact it is not. It would in most states mean a range of salaries from \$1,000 to \$3,000. No person who is fit to take the time and money and opportunity of the children of this great democratic republic for the purpose of fitting them for life, for making a living, and for virtuous citizenship should be asked to work for less than \$1,000 a year in any community or in any state. No one who is unworthy of this minimum salary is not fitted to do this work and no such person should be permitted to waste the time and money of the children and to fritter away their opportunity for education.

"It is not for the sake of the teachers that this policy is advocated. Schools are not maintained for the benefit of the teachers. If men and women of ability are not willing to teach for the pay offered them they can quit and do something else for a living, as hundreds of thousands of the best do. It is for the sake of the schools, the children and the prosperity of the people and the strength and safety of the nation that the policy is advocated.

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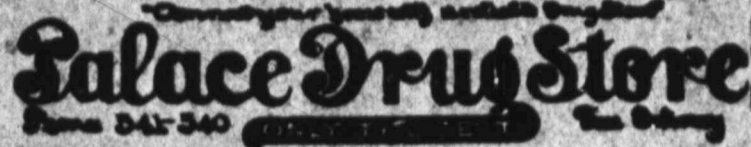

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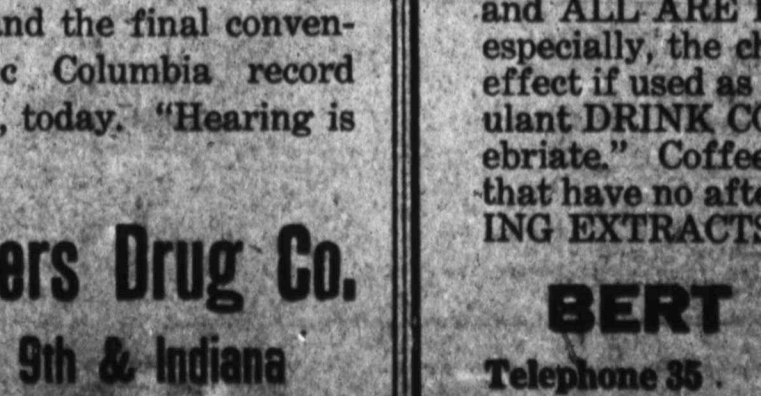
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
