The provisions bowever, most streamounly objected to, are those which limit the compensation for promoting to 15 per cent and requires the giving of a bond to the secretary of state equal to 10 percent of the capital stock, not to exceed \$50,000. The features of the bill will destroy the development of the oil industry, as none of the amaller companies can do business under these drastic provisions. It is claimed that to make such requirements would prevent the sale of oil stock.

CHARGES SENSATIONAL

Alleged That Nine Hundred Men Were on the Force on Jan-uary 14, 1919.

AUSTIN, March 1.—The report of a joint legislative committee appointed to investigate the Texas ranger force was adopted by the house today by a vote of 87 to 10. The investigation extended nearly two weeks and charges ranging from drunkenness to murder which were made against rangers were probed. The report exonerated the adjutant general who commands the rangers of blame and commended him highly. Several charges against individual rangers

charges against individual rangers were sustained.

Objection was raised to the part of the report which commended the adjutant general and the house spent almost the entire day discussing it.

Representative J. T. Canaies called up the report. He said that in the investigation the committee had stricken out the charge made by him which charged the adjutant general with misconduct in office and cut. which charged the adjutant general with misconduct in office and cut off the offering of evidence along that line. And then in their report the committee commended the adjutant general for efficiency. He then took up the record, as he said, to show that the adjutant general was aware of pulconduct by reserve and did not of misconduct by rangers and did not discharge them from the force. 'to further charged that the adjutant gen-eral had violated the constitution in two instances. Using a report of the central investigating committee of central investigating committee of the thirty-fifth legislature, Representative Canales said that the adjutant general had drawn money from the federal government while he was acting as an official. The second charge was that the adjutant general was member of the legislature which in creased the salary of the adjutant gen aral and the adjutant general author of the senate bill which treased the salary of the office now hoods. NEW YORK, March 1:—A renewal of yesterday's selling movement caused a further decline in the cotton market during today's early trading but rallies followed with the close steady net five points higher to 25 points lower. May contracts sold as low as 20.55 on the early break or 34 points below last night's close and more than two cents per pound below the recent high level. The rally extended to 21.32 for that position, which closed at 21.15 compared with 21.19 at the close yesterday.

The market opened steady at a decilne of eight points to an advance of one point. There was buying by Wall street and local trade houses but the demand was quickly supplied by the continued southern selling. As prices eased off there was liquidation by buyers on the decline of yesterday and the market was very unsettled on the break of about 30 or 35 points on old crop positions. At 21.70 for March and 20.23 for July the southern selling became less active and the market rallied. March sold up to 22.20 and July to 20.65, but later fluctuations were irregular with the close showing reactions of some 10 to 15 points from the best.

The week end reviews of the goods trade were regarded as indicating no change in the situation. According to some reports fully 30 per cent of manufacturing facilities is now idle but the curtailment of production is said to be giving the goods market rather a steadier tone. The irregularity late in the morning was considered chiefly due to the evening up for over the week end although some foreign buying was reported.

LONDON, Feb. 20 .- American dis-LONDON, Feb. 20.—American dis-cussion of the league of nations is closely followed here. The press is giving much attention to criticisms of the pian in the senate. These are not considered as indicating that Amer-ica is unwilling to take part in whattver arrangements seem necessary to make sure the fruits of victory and guarantee the peace of the world. On the contrary, best English opinion considers that without the fulless criticism and discussion of the plan in criticism and discussion of the plan in the United States no arrangements to which the American people were committed would be likely to be upheld by them. There is comparatively little faith here in the writing of constitutions; all the political experience of this country tends to make the British people believe in the slow growth of institutions backed by public sentiment rather than in architectural plans.

lic sentiment rather than in architectural plans.

Complete Agreement Not Expected.

It is considered impossible here to expect the complete agreement of the civilized world in every detail of a scheme, but the production of the document now before the conference within so short a time is felt to be sympotomatic of a growing sense of the need of international co-operation. British opinion will only go so far with the scheme as seems practical and necessary to meet the immediate problems of civilization; at the same time there is a general desire to leave room for whatever future development the opinion of the world may make possible. For example, the omission of a representative world senate or assembly does not forever preclude its organization by the associated governments. Such a veleopment might be promoted by parliamentary groups, for example under the auspices of the Inter-Parliamentary Union. A similar elasticity in the proposals leaves room for the later establishment of a court of international justice which may lead to a council of conciliation and similar arbitral machinery replacing or being made supplementary to the arrange-

to a council of conciliation and similar arbitral machinery replacing or being made supplementary to the arrangements of Article 15.

Praise British Proposal.

What is considered one of the most vaulable proposals contained in the scheme in its present shame is the British plan for the establishment of permanent secretarial or office a permanent secretariat, or office force of experts, which is considered a natural and inevitable outgrowth of the secretariat established for the peace conference. 



PROPERTY CLASSIFICATION FOR TAXATION PROPOSED

AUSTIN, March 1.—Classification of property for taxation in Texas is proposeds in a joint resolution introduced in the senate by Senator J. H. Woods of Navarro county. The resolution has already received a favorable committee report. It is proposed that taxes may be imposed on the income of natural persons and corporations other than municipal from whatever source derived, and also that taxes may be imposed on inheritance. Such income and inheritance taxes may be either propertional or graduated and progressive.
