Special Efforts To Bring Forth **Hoarded Money**

DALLAS, Tex., Mar. 6.—Special efforts are being made by Frank M. Smith, Federal District Director of War Loans, to see that a large portion of the money hoarded since the European war began is invested in War Savings Stamps this year. Lajos Steiner, Chicago member of the War Trade Board, estimates that more than a billion and a half dollars has been hidden away since 1914 by unnaturalized immigrants from Austria, Hungary, Russia and other European nations. C., Mr. Herbert went to Alabama with his parents when 13 years old and made his home there until he moved to Washington to practice law in 1897. He was elected to the forty-fifth congress and sered continuously until the fifty-second congress when he was appointed to the cabinet of President Cleveland's second inauguration in 1893.

not believe that the promoters nagers, of the many companies together to blame for the pres-cline in the stock markets, and are altogether to blame for the present decline in the stock markets, and I do not believe that it makes much difference any way what the board prices are. Practically every man or woman who bought initial stocks bought them because they thought the company would get oil and that they would get their profits from the sale of the oil, and not from the increase in the board price of the stock. If they figured any other way they are exactly in the same class as the promoter who promoted solely for promotion profits and not for production profits, and in my opinion have no kick coming if the public fails to provide the profits by paying a higher price for the stock.

Of course a share in a producing well is safer and better, and worth more money than a share in a prospect, no matter how flattering, but a well will not pay any more dividends because its stock is quoted at \$5 than it would if priced at par. So I am maintaining that it is the speculation that is responsible for the present decline rather than a decline in real value. I believe the stocks are worth more right, now than they ever were. In fact, I believe they are just now comfing into their real value. The

more right, now than they ever were. In fact, I believe they are just now coming into their real value. The value that will pay profits from earnings, and not from speculation. And I believe they will go higher from now on than, they ever have been before. It is possible to force "bine sky" value in a stock by speculation but it is not possible to hold it there unless there is some real merit behind it, and the real merit of the Burkburnett oil stocks is just now becoming apparent through the checks from the pipe lines.

And blaming the promoters and managers of the companies for not producing results quicker! There has been lots of such criticism. 



BURKBURNETT TO HAVE CASING HEAD GASOLINE PLANTS

ARE SIMILAR TO THOSE USED IN ELECTRA FIELD FOR NUM-BER OF YEARS.

PROTECTION AND SAVING

Announcement Responsible For Report That Vacuum Pumps Were To Be Installed.

Casing head gasoline plants, such as have been in use in the old Burkburnett field, and in intera for a number of years, are to be established in Burkburnett, and already many of the wells have been covered by casing head gas contracts, according to operators in the fields. These casing head gasoline plants are considered to effect a great saving, and will be particularly valuable in the new Burkburnett pool, operators declare, because the oil is rich in gas, some of the wells actually testing from 2 to 3 gallons of gasoline per thousand feet of gas. This gas is now going to waste in most of the wells, except in some instances where the gas is used as fuel for the boilers. There is at least one well in the Burkburnett townsite that is actually producing enough gas daily to fire two boilers, and there are doubtless others that have a similar omount of gas.

Eliminates Fire Risk.

At present this loose gas constitutes a very grave fire rick, which will be eliminated when the gas savers are put on and it will make the felld safer, as well as making the wells pay better, according to several men, who have had much experience with the extraction of casing head gasoline from the gas in oil wells. The dry gas that remains at the plant when the gasoline is extracted can be returned to the wells for use as fuel, thus effecting a double saving.

L. R. Crowell and W. G. Skelly are remong those who will operate large casing head gasoline plants, and it is reported that practically all of Burkburnett townsite pool is covered with contracts. Up to a short time ago the value of the casing head gas was not fully realized, and not all the lease contracts bore the casing head. Now all contracts contain this clause are being substituted for the old leases, Practically all of the larger companies have casing head plants in the field to extract the gas from their wells and convert it into gasoline at the present time, at least in this section, where the oil is particularly rich in gas.





OT EXPECTED THAT LEGISLA TION INIMICAL TO INDUSTRY WILL BE ENACTED.

REVIEWS FIGHT MADE

Bend, Inspection and Promotion Fee Features Are Eliminated by Amendments.

"There is no further danger that a blue-sky bill inimical to the interests of the independent oil operator will become a law in Texas."

The statement is credited to Porte A. Whaley, secretary of the chamber of commerce, who returned to Wichita Falls Wednesday after campaigning a week in Austin against the radical gravisions of the Dorough bill. In view
