Control Under Leyer Act. Under the authority of the Lever food control act, by which the food administration including restrictions upout margins of profit, control was exercised over unfake practices, extortionate charges and hoarding. In general terms, the margin of profits allowed amounted to nine percent on total annual business and 2½ per cent on the turnover on meats. 




