How does it affect America? Will the senate ratify it? Will Germany accept it? Official Washington, with the president and secretary of state in Paris, congress in adjournment and many leaders on both sides absent, was rather devoid of authoritative expression on the first two questions. For the third the generally accepted opinion seemed to be that the Germans would accept the convention, but that it might require economic but that it might require economic pressure to bring about the fulfillment of some of its terms.

Statements Expected.

The few congressional leaders who were in the capital were carefully studying the published summary preparing to issue their comments in the form of statements. Some of these form of statements. One point seemingly generally accepted at first giance was that President Wilson has successfully carried out his determination. ation that the league of nations con-cenant should be an inseparable part of the peace treaty and that the whole document must stand intact as it comes up for ratification or re-jection. Of course, the senate might casily in the resolution expressing its action make reservations on any portions which it does not approve. Another point, which seemed evident to those who studied the summary, was that the rejection of the treaty by any single nation would only have the effect of delaying the restoration of relations between that nation and Germany, while nations which do accept the treaty will enjoy the advantage of opening up trade and commerce with the remnant of the great Central European powers. Some obseriers were inclined to regard this feature as a formidable agent in the hands of the president when he urges the acceptance of the treaty by the United States,

Prepare to Line up Forces.
The probabilities are that the forces in congress, for and against the treaty, will begin to line up and show themselves within the pext few days and take on a more definite position as the full text of the record-breaking lenthy document decomes available.


Quite beside the questions involved in the league of nations plan, will come the provisions suggesting a special arrangement by which the United States and Great Britain would go to States and breat Britain would go to the aid of France; the clauses which China protests give her rightful ter-ritory to Japan, the involved and tech-nical provisions of the economic sec-tions on which the advice of experts doubtless will be sought, and a score of other points, all of which promise to furnish the material for a history making session of the session if not, ineed, both houses of congress. President Wilson's call for the extraordinary session of congress to assemble May 19, already is bringing the national legislators toward Washington. 

VERSAILLES, May 8-The German delegates to the peace congress complained bitterly this morning to one of the French liason officers of the unexpected harshness of the conditions of peace. The delegates said they had expected from the news-papers that demands in many re-spects would be far-reaching, but were not prepared for the terms as actually laid down in the printed copy of the document.
