NC-4 STARTS BUT IS UNABLE TO CONTINUE

Forced to Land in the Mondego River on Account of Motor Trouble

PLANE NOT DAMAGED

Requests that Destroyers Be Kept at Their Respective Stations

By Associated Press. LATEST reports received here by wireless say that the NC-4 developed trouble in both starboard motors which unbalanced the plane and compelled Lieutenant Commander Read to land. The plane was not damaged. Commander Read is attempting to repair the motors and may try to reach Vigo or Corruna before dark next sea in.

By Associated Press. The American naval seaplane NC-4 made an ineffectual attempt today to make the jump from Lisbon, Portugal, to Plymouth, England, scheduled last leg of her trip, and thus round out the transatlantic air voyage. Less fortunate than on the previous flights of her journey, she was compelled to land in the Mondego river, about 100 miles up the coast from Lisbon. The NC-4 sent word by radio that she would be unable to make Plymouth tonight but the message of her commander seemed to indicate that she intended flying somewhat further on her journey during the day, as he asked the American naval authorities what was the best port for him to land the seaplane within 300 miles to keep stations. It was picked up at 12:30 p. m. by the United States auxiliary, Bridgeport in Brest harbor. The message was addressed to the command of Division 1, U. S. destroyer force.

There was no information here as to why Commander Read made a landing, but officers assumed that the plane's engines were not running. The plane evidently ran into shallow waters in landing or was left so by a receding tide while repairs were being made.

NAVY DEPARTMENT IS OFFICIALLY NOTIFIED

WASHINGTON, May 30.—The navy department was officially notified of the departure of the seaplane NC-4 from Lisbon for Plymouth at 5 o'clock this morning in a brief message from Admiral Cummings at Lisbon. The starting time was given as 5:24 Greenwich time (1:20 a. m. Washington time). Slow cable communication keeps the department in news of progress of the flight. At 7:30 o'clock Washington time the navy department received a message from the U. S. destroyer force stating that "NC-4 passed stationary ship but not being sighted by destroyer Rathbun. The time was garbled and it was not made clear whether the Rathbun was station ship B, the second of the line of destroyers extending from Lisbon to Plymouth, or one further on. The seaplane NC-4, sole survivor of three giant machines which left Rockaway Point, N. Y., May 8, on the epochal air voyage across the Atlantic reached Lisbon at 8:02 o'clock Tuesday night on the evening of May 27, after a wonderful flight from Ponta Delgada, Azores. When the NC-4 reached Lisbon she had traveled since leaving Rockaway Point a distance of 3,150 sea miles, having been in the air 54 hours and 33 minutes. Her average speed had been 72 sea miles per hour for the whole journey although her speed from Ponta Delgada to Lisbon averaged far above that figure. From Lisbon to Plymouth is approximately 775 sea miles.

FRANCE BARS THE GERMANS FROM LEAGUE

Is Unalterably Opposed to Admission of that Government

OTHERS ARE WILLING

Council of Four Engaged Today in Studying Counter Proposals

By Associated Press. PARIS, May 29.—With the exception of France all the major powers would undoubtedly agree to the immediate admission of Germany to the League of Nations but France is unalterably opposed to it in consequence there is no possibility of this being done. Strangely enough, the sum of \$25,000,000,000 fixed by the Germans for reparations corresponds exactly with the amount upon which several American and British conference financial advisers had agreed that the Germans could reasonably be expected to pay and it is not impossible that some changes will be granted in the financial terms of the treaty. The transition of German counter-proposals is going on so slowly that it seems improbable that the council of four will be able to have the complete English and French texts for consideration until Saturday.

NO MEETING TODAY OF COUNCIL OF FOUR

PARIS, May 30.—The council of four did not meet today. Peace negotiations between the Germans and the British and French proposals and the study of the Austrian peace terms by the delegates representing the smaller states.

TWO NEW NOTES ARE DELIVERED BY GERMANS

VERSAILLES, May 30.—Two new notes-wars, delivered to the secretary of the Peace Conference by the German delegates today. At the same time the Germans handed over French and English translations of the first section of the counter-proposals which were delivered yesterday in German only. The first of the two new notes concerned German property in Allied countries. The second has to do with the Turkish public debt.

SUMMARY OF TODAY'S INTERNATIONAL SITUATION

Austria's peace delegation will not receive the terms of the peace from the Allied representatives until Monday. After the plenary session of the Peace Conference held yesterday afternoon, it was announced that several of the smaller powers declined to accept the terms of the peace to be presented to Austria had asked for 48 hours in which to study the pact. This makes it necessary for the conference to hold another plenary session Saturday. The Austrian delegation has been informed that the presentation of the treaty will not occur until Monday and has acquiesced in the decision of the conference. There is no suggestion of a disagreement in the conference over the terms, but it was pointed out by M. Crainza of Rumania that small nations desired a short time for consideration.

Treaty Not Complete. Experts Are Busy.

Experts are busy engaged in the task of translating the German counter proposals submitted yesterday by the enemy delegation. Nothing specific regarding the contents of the German reply other than received on Wednesday from Berlin, through London, have been made public. It is probable, according to dispatches that were held in many cities and towns in England, while in France the cemeteries were held in many cities and towns in England, while in France the cemeteries where lie the soldiers of the Marne, the Vesle, the Aisne, the Hindenburg Line, were the scenes of memorial exercises. LONDON, May 30.—The bolshievi have driven the Poles from Rovno, after fierce fighting and occupied the town, according to a wireless message from Moscow today. The Russians claim to have captured a large quantity of military stores at Rovno.

OBSEVANCE OF MEMORIAL DAY AT WASHINGTON

SERVICES HELD IN FRANCE AT THE GRAVES OF THE AMERICAN DEAD

WASHINGTON, May 30.—With solemnity the first Memorial Day after the close of the great world conflict was observed in the national capital today, the nation's heroes of earlier wars sharing its tribute with those who fell in the struggle to maintain the liberty and ideals for which their forefathers fought. Memorial exercises were held at Arlington National Cemetery, the United States soldiers' home and at other points under the auspices of the U. S. Army and Spanish War Veterans and allied organizations, which participated in the annual parade earlier in the day. A special committee decorated the tomb of the unknown soldier at Arlington, as a tribute to American soldiers who fell in France. Special exercises also were held at the home of the U. S. S. Maine at Arlington. Vice-President in Speaker. Vice-President Marshall was the speaker at exercises at Battle Ground National Cemetery, conducted under the auspices of the G. A. R. and Representative Campbell of Kansas, spoke at the Soldiers' Home exercises. While business and many of its members had gone to nearby cities to deliver Memorial Day orations, the House continued its work, except on the floor, and the Senate devoted solely to the resolution tendering the thanks of congress to the new patriots. The measure, introduced by Republican Raymond, was framed after conferences with democratic and republican.

MEMORIAL SERVICE AT GRAVES OF AMERICANS

By Associated Press. PARIS, May 30.—Not a grave of an American who fell in the great war was overlooked today in observance of Memorial Day in France. Some of the services were held in the vicinity of the battle line along which the troops fought and sacrificed their lives—in the cemeteries where they were laid to rest. Other services were held in the cemeteries further back where those whose wounds finally caused death were buried. The two most notable events of the day were the memorial services at Romagne, near the Argonne. President Wilson left the laborers of the Peace Conference to go to the former place for an address. While General Pershing went to Romagne, near the spot where the Americans suffered their heaviest losses in the fighting, the 2500 soldier dead at Romagne were honored by the attendance of a battalion of infantry, a battery of artillery and a regimental band while smiling detachments took part in the exercises at other large cemeteries. After paying tribute to the memory of their fallen comrades, the members of the American expeditionary forces from the Rhine to the sea spent the remainder of the day in taking part in and witnessing athletic events of various kinds.

POLICE ARE ACTIVE FOLLOWING ARREST OF FORMER SOLDIER

By Associated Press. KANSAS CITY, MO., May 30.—With Sylvester Keel, a discharged soldier, under arrest here on a murder charge in connection with the killing on May 4th last of Sheriff Joseph C. Talbot of LaFayette county, Missouri, and Deputies John McDonald and James C. Stapleton, the police today turned their attention toward locating two other men suspected of complicity in the crime and for whom "John Doe" warrants have been issued. Sheriff Talbot and his deputies were struck on a lonely road near Higginsville while taking three suspected motor car thieves from Marshall to Lexington. The sheriff and Deputy McDonald were killed outright and Deputy Stapleton died in a hospital without regaining consciousness. Searched for the slayers several days without success.

'NEVER AGAIN' SAYS SECRETARY DANIELS IN ADDRESS TODAY

By Associated Press. PHILADELPHIA, May 30.—Never again will the United States be guilty of the folly of trusting its foreign commerce to the ships of other nations or of quitting the shipbuilding industry, declared Secretary of the Navy Daniels in an address delivered today at the launching of the keels of five steel frigates—the greatest single day's launching in the history of any yard in the world. The five vessels added 28,000 tons to the American merchant marine. "We could not, if we would, as a nation," said Secretary Daniels, "longer live between the two ocean dependent upon foreign bottoms for our overseas commerce. We will not quit the shipbuilding industry or ever again be guilty of the folly of trusting our foreign commerce to foreign bottoms. We will put the industry on a firm and sound basis."

CONDITIONS AT WINNIPEG ARE MORE NORMAL

WINNIPEG, MAN., May 30.—Offers of metal trade companies here to discuss labor problems with their striking employees with representatives of the Canadian Railway Brotherhood, as mediator came close on the heels of a long step forward in resumption of the city's normal activities today. Large numbers of the city employees who walked out have applied for reinstatement or have returned to work. The police force is now normal, all the striking railway matters have returned and Mayor Charles F. Gray has announced an attempt will be made to resume street car service today or tomorrow. Edmonton street car service has been resumed after a brief interregnum when the walkout occurred there Tuesday, and reports from Calgary say business activities continue there almost normally. The Alberta Federation of Labor has sent out a call for a strike vote of all unions in the province today or tomorrow. "More than 75 regular members of the Winnipeg fire department have returned to duty after signing the pledge not to participate in sympathetic strikes," said Fire Chief J. E. Buchanan this forenoon. "It was announced at the city hall at the same time that a majority of the Winnipeg policemen refused to sign the new pledge and that they will leave the force at 1 p. m."

SYMPATHETIC STRIKE TO AID METAL WORKERS

By Associated Press. TORONTO, ONT., May 30.—The sympathy strike to aid striking metal workers went into effect today. The metal workers went out because their demand for a 44-hour week and a collective bargaining agreement was refused. Conference here and at Ottawa, in which Premier Borden and members of his cabinet participated, apparently have failed to bring about a settlement.

RAILWAY BROTHERHOODS PROHIBIT VOTE ON STRIKE

WINNIPEG, Man., May 30.—Executive of the railway brotherhoods, in a formal letter to Winnipeg members of the railroad trades, have notified them that they are prohibited from taking a vote on the question of striking with the Winnipeg union, unless such action is formally approved by the international brotherhoods. Sharp action will be taken if the Winnipeg trainmen attempt to violate this order, the letter stated. The letter was signed by Ash Kennedy, assistant grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and George K. Wark, vice president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers. The letter includes this statement: "We make a earnest appeal to our members to be constantly on guard against those who would have them violate their obligations and dishonor contracts made with their employers."

GERMANS WARNED AGAINST A DISPLAY FOR NEW REPUBLIC

By Associated Press. BERLIN, Thursday, May 29.—The government has published a statement in black type under a huge "warning" saying that those planning to separate the Rhineland from Germany and to create an independent republic are guilty of high treason, punishable with life-long imprisonment and that the government's duty would be to take measures to the utmost severity of the law against those persons. The Prussian Diet discussed the situation yesterday and there was a violent criticism of Herr Kaestner, Herr Kuehoff and Herr Froberg, who are alleged to have negotiated with General Mangin, commander of French forces in the Mayence district.

UNITS OF THE 36TH DIVISION ARRIVE AT NEW YORK TODAY

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, May 30.—Seventy-one officers and 2,120 men of the 36th Division (former national guard of Texas and Oklahoma) arrived here today from Brest on the steamship Great Northern, which brought altogether 2,980 troops. The 36th's units were the 11th Engineers (less detachment of officers), 5 officers and 1,541 men; 11th Sanitary Train's Headquarters, Ambulance Section Headquarters and Ambulance Companies B, C, D, E and F, these totaling 14 officers and 187 men; and detachment of 114th Infantry's Company I, two officers and 92 men. The 36th's troops go to Camp Dix, Sherman, Bowie, Upton, Pike and Travis. The others on the Great Northern were 700 men recovering from illness or wounds, nine nurses, and casuals, the last including Brigadier General Arthur Johnson. Among 127 troops on the Saxonia from Brest were three officers and 190 men comprising Company G of the 142nd Infantry, also of the 36th Division. Most of these go to Camp Bowie. The Saxonia brought two officers and 361 men, 11 or wounded, and casuals.

VEILED THREAT CONTAINED IN VILLA STATEMENT REGARDING PROPOSED PASSAGE OF TROOPS

HOBBY WANTS AN ASSURANCE OF PROTECTION

Must Be Satisfied That Americans Will Be Given Protection

EXCHANGE TELEGRAMS

Department Seems to Be Laboring Under Mistaken Idea

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, TEX., May 30.—Governor W. P. Hobby must be satisfied personally that ample protection will be afforded in America and their property in Mexico before he will give definite approval to the plan to send Mexican troops through Texas, the chief executive emphasized today. In an exchange of telegrams with the State Department at Washington today, the Governor pointed out that mere assurances from the department have no value and that the protection will not be sufficient, but that permission for the Mexicans to enter Texas will be withheld, "pending definite advice from the department as to the precautions taken."

RELATES DETAILS OF THE VILLISTA COUNCIL

By Associated Press. DALLAS, TEX., May 30.—Details of the Villista council at Parral, Chihuahua, May 27, were confidentially given to an active campaign against the president of Mexico with Villa as Secretary of War, were given out here today by Colonel Dario W. Silva, formerly attached to the staff of General Carranza. In the manifesto promulgated by the council, protection is promised "all foreigners who will devote their time and energies to the promotion of the cause and business, keeping out of factional support, direct or indirect; making it emphatic that all Americans will be given the protection to which they are entitled."

It is claimed that there are 3,000 federal troops at Santa Rosalia, south of Chihuahua City, which came from General Dieguez's force in Torreon. This statement is doubted by recent arrivals from Torreon who say the garrison at that point is much smaller. REPORT CAUSES LITTLE CONCERN AT CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Reports from the border that Mexican federal troops were marching at Empalme, Sonora, for shipment in bond through Arizona en route to Juarez gave officials here little concern. It was believed here that the march had been before the Mexican government began to get word to the commanding officer that the State Department had withheld for the present permission for the troops to pass through American territory. Officials said the American government, officials on the border would not permit the Mexicans to cross the line without instruction from Washington regardless of the fact that the acting Governor of Arizona had not withdrawn his permission for the Mexicans to pass through that state. One official said if the Mexicans did actually cross the international line, that under the circumstances it probably would be regarded as a mistake which easily could be rectified by turning the troop train back.

## BASS WELL IS FLOWING FOUR INCH STREAM

After being drilled 31 feet in the sand, while preparations were being made to swab, the Bass et al. No. 1 Waggoner, block 88, blew in yesterday afternoon and is now flowing a solid four inch stream. The well is rated as one of the best in the new field. It lies directly between the M. P. Burk on the Evans and the Burk-Waggoner discovery well, and is on what government geologists report as the highest structural point in the field. Sand was found at 1596 feet, W. J. Orishan, who is interested in the well, states, and this bears out the geological report. Bass and Dillard drilled the well, the lease being owned 50-50 by Bass and Dillard and W. J. Orishan and by Clint Wood and others.

## TARRANT CO. SUING FOR POSSESSION OF A TRACT OF LAND

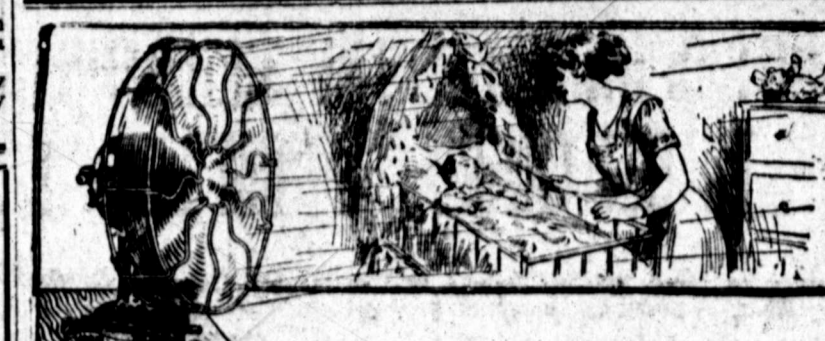

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### ARMY WORM HAS MADE APPEARANCE IN WICHITA COUNTY

The army worm, which has done considerable damage in sections of Dallas and Denton and other North Texas counties, has made its appearance in Wichita county wheat fields, according to reports received by County Agent J. W. Campbell. Mr. Campbell does not believe the worm will do much damage to the wheat but says there is danger of the worm going to other crops after the wheat is cut.

W. B. Lanham, State agent, has issued the following bulletin concerning the worm and means to combat it:

"In occasional seasons dull, striped worms, related to the common cut worm, become unusually abundant and march from field to field, devouring corn, wheat, oats and other related plants.

"Individual specimens of this insect are in the fields every year, but only occasionally do they appear in sufficient numbers to become a menace. When they become sufficiently abundant to travel openly as an army, from one field to another, the invasion may be stopped by plowing three or four furrows and maintaining as thick a dust mulch as possible. As the worms collect in the furrows they may be killed with a drag or sprinkled with pure kerosene.

"Another method to prevent them from entering the field is to plow or dig a rather deep ditch with a steep vertical side next to the field that is to be protected. In this ditch every few feet apart are dug holes with a post hole auger. The worms will fall into these holes and perish, and owing to the steepness of the ditch, few will be able to get up and enter the field.

"After they have once gotten into the field the best remedy is a poisoned mash, made as follows: Thoroughly mix 50 pounds of bran, two pounds of Paris green and three finely chopped lemons. Stir in a damp mash with four to seven gallons of water sweetened with one-half gal. of low-grade molasses. Sow sparingly around bases of plants and broadcast over the field where infestation is general."

**REFLECTS DISCREDIT ON THE SOUTH.**

A new principle has lately been recognized in legislation in Texas in reference to venereal diseases and no longer is the subject handled solely from the standpoint of immorality. While its immorality is recognized as plainly as ever, late legislation has approached the subject from the standpoint of public health, and serious and earnest attempts are now being made to handle these terrible infections from that standpoint.

It is to be hoped that the new viewpoint will result in some check to the spread of these diseases. The on-tracked legislation on this subject from the viewpoint of immorality alone that has prevailed has failed, as is shown in the records of the mobilization camps. Only five states had a worse record for percentage of men infected with venereal diseases than Texas and these were all Southern states. The belt of the largest percentage of infection is made up of the Southern states. In Texas it amounted to 11.02 per cent of the men mobilized, and this percentage included only those obviously infected. The record of Texas and of the South in this respect is a shameful one, but the facts must be faced if these diseases are to be intelligently combated. This is not a pleasant subject but in order that the people may know the following statistics from the mobilization camps giving the percentages of the men infected are herewith printed:

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# Brides of the Gods to Leave their Hindoo Temples

Stripping the veil from the face of the oriental woman and the bandage from the feet of the Chinese, is a plank in the new program of reconstruction.

Slave girls, held in the incense-blurred shadows of Hindu temples as victims of the rituals of ancient creeds, are to find the temple doors thrown open for their escape.

Young brides, wedded by strange rites to grotesque Asiatic gods, are to be delivered from their stone masters.

Women in many lands—millions of women who are beasts of burden, slaves of cruel custom, play things and property—are to be made free.

The program of their deliverance is an American program. The will of millions of American men and women has created it. The power of \$140,000,000 now being raised by the two branches of the Methodist Episcopal Church in America is being put behind it. And the name of it is the world reconstruction program of the Methodist Episcopal Centenary.

Inspiring this program is a profound conviction that only free women can bear generations capable of fulfilling the promise of universal democracy that is in the political reconstruction of today.

In narrow, winding streets and sun-drenched market places from Algiers to Teheran and from Bombay to Peking, white-draped women may be seen gliding by. And their eyes look out like the eyes of a prisoner, above the "pardah"—the white veil of Islam.

### Where They Bandage Feet and Sell Babies

All the light of occidental civilization, streaming in upon China, has not completely flooded out the shadow of the binding of women's feet. Still among the Chinese, despite the efforts of their now more intelligent classes to end a tradition of suffering, are women whose goings and comings amid life are limited to mincing steps upon courted extremities.

In Shanghai, upon the Yangtse Kiang, not long ago, a country woman shuffled along unsteadily under the bamboo yoke from which hung two

swaying baskets. Over the side of each peeped the immobile face of a Chinese child. They were the woman's children. She had brought them to the city to offer them for sale.

Up the steep incline of a road in Northern India, under a merciless sun, twenty women strained at the traces of a heavy roller. Their bare feet, cut and blistered, scrambled painfully in the gravel of the new roadbed. At their head an overseer—a man—urged them on.

As a trans-Pacific liner slipped into the harbor of Nagasaki, innumerable flat-bottomed boats laden with soft coal made fast alongside. Scores of little Japanese women, heads bound for protection from coal dust, and some with babies bound to their backs, scrambled up the hastily erected scaffolding. Hour after hour they stood, catching the baskets of coal tossed to them by men in the boats. Night had fallen when the coaling was done. The little women took their day's wage, fifteen or twenty cents, and went home.

Are these the mothers of universal democracy? They are types, living illustrations of the subjection of women in oriental countries, whether under the yoke of custom, of ignorance or of poverty. Strange Wrongs to Be Righted in Every Country

Lifting the yoke is the objective of the centenary program. The small army already being recruited to apply that program will undertake not only to help make them free, but to help make them better mothers, better home makers, greater influences in the lives of their men and of their countries.

There are strange wrongs to be righted in every country. There are millions of women who must be given their heritage.

India's women number 150,000,000. Their yoke, despite all the British government has done to aid them, is still heavy.

### Courtesans, Sanctioned by Religion and Custom

They are bowed under the institution of child marriage which disposes of their lives before they are old enough to know what life means. And the custom is 500 years older than the Christian era.

They suffer under the contempt of widowhood. More than 20,000,000 of them, widowed in girlhood, or even childhood, live lives of outcasts, with shaved heads as a badge of their widowhood, and practically prohibited from remarriage.

Young girls are devoted to idols in infancy and early childhood by their parents to some parts of India. About their neck is placed the necklace of the seven cowries. They are wedded to the dagger of Khandoba. Their lives are devoted to singing obscene songs in praise of the god, performing night worship and song services, selling themselves.

These are the murals. Akin to them are the devadasis, or slaves of the gods, and the nautch girls of Southern India. They are taken in childhood to sing and dance before the temple gods and in the idol processions. Through centuries they

have become courtesans, sanctioned by religion and custom.

The women coolies of India work from sunrise to sunset. They carry upon their hands baskets of concrete for the smooth automobile roads of modern India. They carry earth from excavations, bricks for building, and water. They mix mortar. And often, they steal a moment from their work to look after the little baby they have left under the shadow of a bush near their tasks.

For the bowed millions of India's women, the Centenary program promises the beginning of a new life.

"Woman," wrote Confucius, "is a mindless, soulless creature."

The bound feet, the bound minds, the too early marriages of China's women tell the story of their sufferings under such a philosophy.

### Why Chinese Women Are Carried to Work

China has bound its women's feet for 1,000 years. Within the last two or three decades many of the women have unbound their feet. But so old a custom cannot be eradicated in a few years.

There are thousands of Chinese women who have never gone more than 100 yards from their homes unless they were carried. And in the interior one may see women of bound feet, compelled to work, dragging at the ropes of boats, along the towpaths of canals. And in the cotton fields, they work, sitting, hitching themselves along as they proceed. They are carried to and from the fields in wheelbarrows.

China's coolie women labor like beasts of burden. One may see them by hundreds, bowed under heavy yokes. One may watch them, in the mud of the rice paddies, while men stand by on dry ground, directing their work.

China's women are even more numerous than India's. But the program of the Centenary is for them as well. The American millions to be spent will help them to a higher place in the new scheme of things that is in the making.

### The Story of the Geisha Girls

There is work to be done among the women of Japan, advanced though that country is. There are the supernannated women hired out at a few yen a day to carry babies on their backs for many consecutive hours—the Komori. There are the girls of the tea houses, some of them work for twenty or even twenty-two hours a day.

And there are the 30,000 geisha, each taken in childhood, to become the property of old women who support them, and train them in singing, dancing, playing the gamisen and in repartee. After years of the most rigid instruction, these girls may be hired by men for their entertainment.

And the shugi or licensed prostitutes, estimated to number more than 30,000, endure a fate even

worse. They are driven to the Yoshiwaras or vice districts by sheer necessity of making a living. They become virtual slaves under the burden of debt necessarily incurred to equip them for their profession. They are openly bought and sold.

Again, in Japan one finds the coolie woman, not only helping to coal ocean liners, but assisting in driving piles for the building of bridges, and carrying burdens of every kind. And among the factory workers of Japan—in some of the factories shifts are said to be changed once every twelve hours—60 per cent are women. And these women, according to available statistics, are paid between thirteen and fifteen cents a day.

Japan is provided for in the program of the Centenary. Japan's women are to be relieved of their yoke, as well. So are the women of Korea and Malaysia, of Mexico and South America.

### Where Neither Childhood Nor Motherhood Is Sacred

So are the women of Africa—those 40,000,000 wild creatures of the jungle who are the prey of the strong, whipped and worked like beasts; bought and sold and inherited like property; neither their childhood nor their motherhood held sacred.

In North Africa, and all through the countries of the orient, millions of Mohammedan women must be liberated, not only from the purdah, but from the zenana and the harem—the forbidden place of women.

The zenana and the purdah are obligatory upon all women who recognize the Koran. Both are symbols of the subservience and inferiority of woman's position under Mohammedanism, and the zenana carries always the implication of polygamy. The veiled women of Islam are innumerable. The secluded number many millions. In India alone there are 40,000,000 of the latter, and in North Africa, it is estimated, there are 20,000,000 more.

The seclusion of the harem deprives women of outdoor liberty and recreation. It affects their health and the health of their children. Many of these imprisoned women die of tuberculosis. Limited in their experience, permitted to see only husband, father, brothers and nephews, their knowledge of life is small, their minds more than child minds.

### What the Freedom of Women Will Mean

For the sake of world democracy Methodism in America believes that these wrongs must be righted, these women lifted out of the subjection, the servitude, the contempt which surrounds all women of the oriental countries.

Freedom for the women of the world means to the church the dispelling of ignorance through education, the substitution of Christian ideals for superstition and for creeds that have made possible the wrongs of women.

The program for attaining these ends is definite and detailed. Schools, seminaries, colleges and universities are to be built in many countries. Hospitals are to be founded and equipped, and made the center of systems of dispensaries. Teachers, physicians, nurses are to be sent from this country.

All these will have behind them the major purpose of the Methodist Centenary movement, the establishment of the ideals of Christianity in every country, as a foundation upon which women may stand in the work that is primarily theirs, the building of the world democracy of the future.

### JOIN AIR SERVICE AND TAKE FLIGHT FROM YOUR HOME

All that is necessary is to write a letter or telephone the desire to enlist, and a ship will be on its way as soon as possible.

Major T. C. MacAuley, at one of the Fort Worth fields, is accused of proselyting, having come all the way from Fort Worth to Wichita Falls Thursday to get a recruit. Lieutenant de Montel states that if the air ride is what the recruits want, there is no reason for them to write to Fort Worth or anywhere else, thinking that they will get a ride, whereas if they enlist here there will be no ride. For they can get all the rides they want, and a chance to learn to fly.

### ABOUT 75,000 ACRES WHEAT IN COUNTY IS ESTIMATE MADE

There are nearly seventy-five thousand acres in wheat and oats in Wichita county, County Agent J. W. Campbell estimates. Mr. Campbell believes that if the crop can be harvested the yield will be around eighteen bushels per acre.

Wheat cutting is in progress in all sections of the county. Many farmers have attached motors to their binders and are able to run them despite the soggy ground and the tough straw. Tractors are also being used to pull the binders by some farmers.

The middle of next week will see the harvest in full blast over this section.

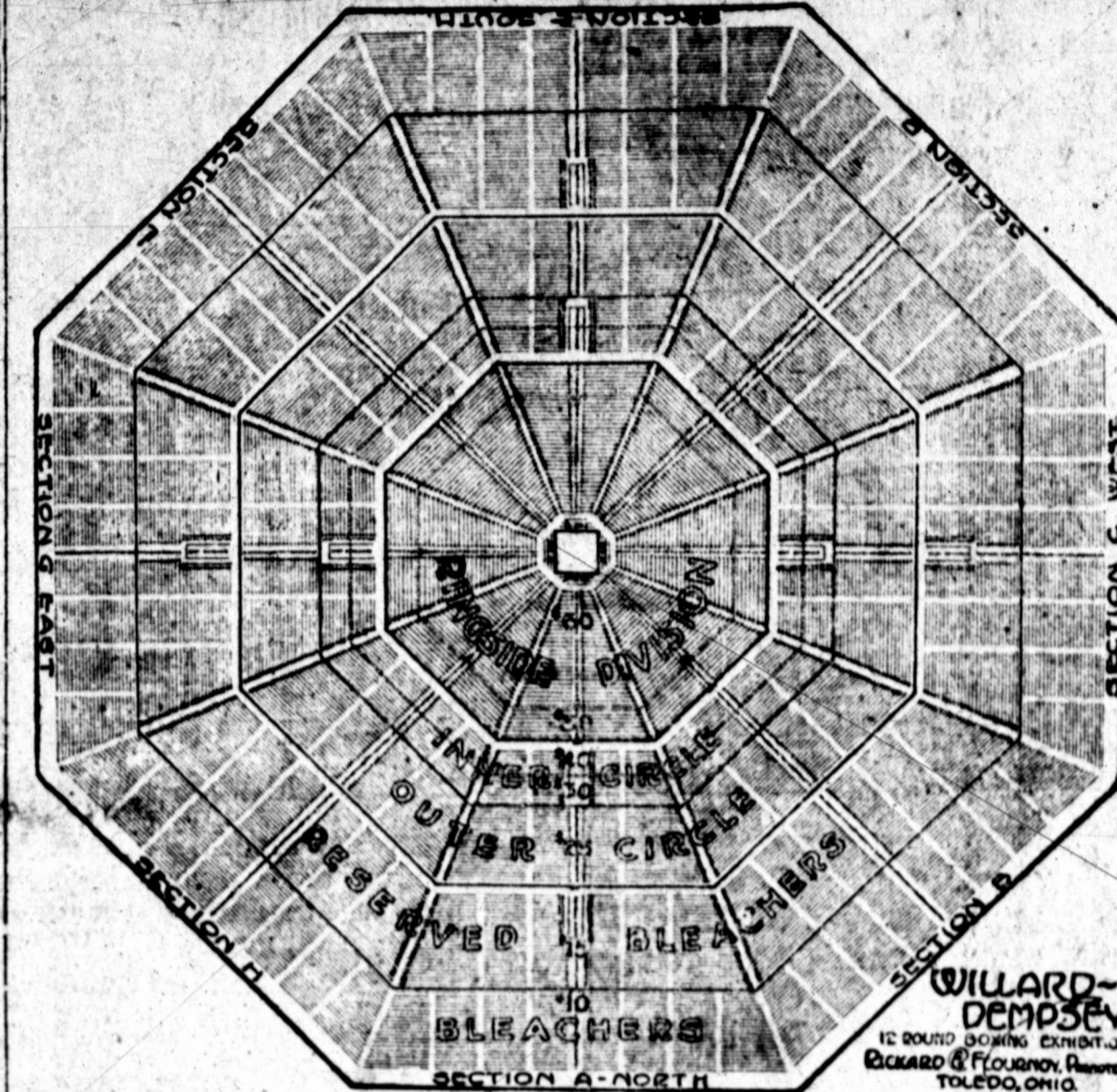

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### ANNOUNCE PLANS FOR INAUGURATION OF PERMIT SYSTEM

By Associated Press.  
 WASHINGTON, May 30.—Plans for the inauguration of a permit system to control the movement of this year's mammoth grain crop, announced today by the railroad administration, contemplate the appointment of grain control committees at each primary market, comprised of a representative of both the operating and traffic departments of the railroad administration and a third party representing the transportation division of the United States grain corporation.

Shippers will apply through the railroad agent at the point of origin to the grain control committee at the market to which they wish to send their product. If conditions permit, permission for the shipment will be given promptly. Otherwise the shipment will be delayed until storage facilities are such that the grain can be moved without causing freight congestion.

A copy of the permit when issued, will be transmitted by the grain control committee to the railroad by which the shipment is to be made so that necessary action may be taken to furnish cars. The system is similar to that which was used in clearing freight congestion last year.

"It will be readily appreciated," a statement by Director General Hines said, "that not only the shippers and shippers of grain will be benefited by this regulation, but the entire shipping public will benefit, in that the channels of commerce will be kept free of congestion, car detention largely eliminated and the maximum use of all equipment more highly developed.

Good weather and decreasing business due to the cessation of shipment of war supplies have tended to build up a large car surplus which will be mobilized in the grain belt by the railroad administration as fast as needed.

### EXPULSION OF 25,000 OF EXTREMISTS FROM SOCIALIST PARTY

 CHICAGO, May 30.—Ten members of the national executive committee of the socialist party are in session here, and today it was announced that 25,000 of the extremist wing of the party had been expelled by vote of the committee. Further announcements were that the committee had decided to call the national conference for Chicago on August 30 and to start nationwide meetings on July 4 to demand Eugene V. Debs' release from prison and to issue statements giving socialist views on the peace conference and other subjects.

According to Adolph Germer, the party's secretary, who asked ejection of the expelled members, the ousted units are members of the Russian, Lithuanian, Ukrainian, Lettish, Polish, South Slav and Hungarian branches who "made no pretense of obeying the party platform."

# OIL DEVELOPMENT

## CUEBA HILL IN CLAY COUNTY IS ACTIVE SECTION

BECOMING CENTER OF INTEREST FOR OIL COMPANIES AND INDIVIDUALS.

GEOLOGISTS' REPORT FAVORS

Number of Rigs Are Up for Deep Tests and Developments Will Be Awaited.

That section of Clay county, lying southeast of the Petrolia field, and northeast of Henrietta, known as Cueba Hill, is becoming a center of interest for oil companies and individual operators, who have faith in geological reports, that the formations at this point show similarity to the Ranger field. There are a number of rigs up for deep tests in this section, and indications point to a thorough test of this section. Eastern capital is interested to the extent of several thousand acres under lease, and several deep tests.

The National Petroleum Co. of New York have what is said to be one of the finest rigs and drilling equipment ever erected in Texas on their location, three miles northeast of Byers. They are starting their well with 22 inch casing and are prepared to go 4,500 feet if necessary to reach the big pay. Geologists reporting on this location state that shallow production should be found at 700 feet, and a good sand around 1800 feet.

The Wichita Little Rock Oil Co. have already let the contract for a 2,000 foot test on their lease in section 21, Montague county school lands. This location is on what is known as the Cueba Hill dome. Not far away the Peters Yeager Oil Co. are reported to have made their location on the summit of Cueba Hill.

Small said that the county will take any necessary legal steps to assert its rights to the forty acres of school land which is a remnant of school lands disposed of several years ago.

### PROHIBITION IS BEING CONTESTED IN ELEVEN STATES

By Associated Press. SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—With the circulation of referendum petitions against the national prohibition amendment actually begun in Oklahoma and Nebraska, the amendment is now being attacked by referendum in 11 states. Theodore A. Bell, attorney for the California Grape Protective association, was informed today. Executives of the association announced that nothing further will be done in Oregon, where a writ of mandate against the petitions was sustained on the ground that the action of the legislature in ratifying the national amendment was a resolution and not a law and therefore not subject to referendum. The Washington supreme court held that such resolution was referendable.

In Nevada the circulation of the petitions is being held up by a court action. Today's decision of the Nevada supreme court upholding the state prohibition law has no connection with the referendum issue, it was announced.

The other states where petitions are being circulated are California, Washington, New Mexico, Colorado, Missouri, Ohio, Arkansas, Michigan and Maine, Mr. Bell said.

### RIO JANEIRO PAPER DEFENDS U. S. FROM CHARGE OF DEPUTY

By United Press. RIO JANEIRO, May 17. (By Cable to New York.)—The newspaper Razao today took issue with the elements that are fostering anti-American agitation in Brazil.

Referring to the speech of Deputy Mauricio Lacerda in the chamber yesterday, the Razao said: "We do not approve of Lacerda's support of agitation against the United States, which was begun by Madeiros Albuquerque, who, using his journalistic prerogative, launched accusations against that nation which has always been a friend of Brazil."

"Albuquerque is a private citizen and unable to create difficulties. However, the deputy's opposition to France's transfer of her Brazilian loans to the United States changes the aspect of the case. It is absurd to deny the right of England and France to transfer their loans. The war has changed financial dominion from London to New York. Transfer of the loan is to our advantage because it is against the interests of the United States to lower the value of Brazilian money, since we would be obliged to overpay for their products and they would have to overpay for ours. Known in Europe, transfer of the Brazilian loans to the United States is wise and reflects credit on Brazil's financial standing."

The Razao ridiculed the charges of American imperialism, declaring that Brazil "is not threatened with conquest." Among other things, Lacerda declared in his speech that sincerity of the Monroe doctrine must commence with cancellation of international expansion and restoration of California and Texas to Mexico.

"If the doctrine defends America from Europe, who will defend America from America?" he asked. "American capital is aggressive and the dollar has always been guarded by cannons. This is proven in Mexico, where dollar expansion has undermined the government, systematically destroying autonomy. Transfer of our debts to the United States would place Brazil under the threat of aggressive protection."
