Declaration of Independence

IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776

WHEN, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separa-

We hold these truths to be self-evident :-- That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are tire, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these eights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to after or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate, that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience bath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses nail usarpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces It is their right, it is their duty, to throw ear sight government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the nation! sufferance of these colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to after their former systems of government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facta be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good, He has forbidden his governors to pass hivs of

immediate and pressing importance, taless a spead ed in their operation till his assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has sitterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature -a-right inestimable to them. and formidable to tyrants only. He has called together legislative bodies at places

unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly. for opposing, with manly firminesa, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused, for a long timb after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected, whereby the legislative powers, incapable of againtlation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise the State remaining, in the meantings exposed to all. the dangers of invasions from without, and convulsions within

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the laws for the naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of

He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent to laws for establishing Judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries. He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sept

He has kept among us in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislatures, He has affected to render the military independent

He has combined with others to subject us to a Jurisdiction foreign to our constitutions, and un acknowledged by our laws; giving this assent to helr nets of pretended legislation For quartering large bodies of armed troops among

For protecting them, by a mock crist, from a ishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these States;

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the For imposing taxes on us without our consent;

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury; For transporting us beyond seas, to be tried for

pretended offences; For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province, establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule

into these colonies; For taking away our charfers, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering, fundamentally, the forms of our governments;

For suspending our own legislatures, and declarlog themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases wintsoever.

We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity; and we have conjured them, by the ties of our common kindred, to disayow these neurostions, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and consaugnings. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of manking,

Alderman Reed, who presided at the meeting said: "These laws are plainly enough set forth in the city ordinances and must be enforced.
