WHY NOT BEAUTIFY YOUR HOMESITE?

Many thousands of acres of sod land are being broken and converted into productive farms and many new homes are being built thereon.

There is nothing which more rapidly adds beauty to the homesite and attractive value to the farm, than the liberal planting and growth of shade trees. How quickly the eye of the traveler is attracted to the home that is surrounded by a clump of trees, on account of the added beauty and which can be seen for so many miles in this level country.

It is a pleasure to note that many of those who are coming into this locality are realizing the truth of this statement and are planting such trees around their homes. With many the question arises as to which variety is the best or most suited to this climate and soil; and which will be most permanent and most rapid growth. We have been asked these questions a number of times, but not knowing from experience we have been unable to give satisfactory information.

During the present season we have heard and read a great deal about the Chinese Elm which is highly recommended as a suitable and satisfactory tree for the plains country, largely on account of its hardy nature and rapid growth.

We are giving herewith a good description and history of this tree, as regards its success in the United States, which was taken from the "Farm and Ranch." It is entitled: "A Valuable Shade Tree for Texas," and is written by A. D. Jackson, editor of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station paper.

"The Chinese Elm at present gives promise of being one of the best trees for shade and wind breaks in West Texas, according to R. E. Carper, assistant director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. This is a new tree, first introduced a few years ago from China by the office of seed and plant introduction and which has been tested out for the past seven years by the experiment station at Lubbock. Recognizing the merits of this tree and its adaptability to the western part of the state, the station has, during the past five years, propagated and distributed some 10,000 trees of this variety in widely scattered areas. Only favorable reports have been made on the performance of this elm from the various places it has been tried over the state.

The people are fast becoming informed as to the desirability of this elm and there is a big demand for it. The supply within the state up to this time largely has been propagated by the experiment station

for trial and distribution. The Chinese Elm is propagated readily from fresh seed and in the absence of a supply of seed, fair success occasionally has been secured from root and hard wood cuttings.

Many nurserymen in the state are becoming interested in the possibilities and in the sale of this tree for planting in Texas. A few of the nurserymen now have a limited supply of trees of this variety available and many others are now planning to propagate it in considerable numbers.

"The Chinese Elm is a drought resistant tree, having an extensive surface root system. It has numerous small leaves, makes a dense shade and is remarkably fast growing and easily transplanted. Apparently it is especially valuable for the western part of the state where there are practically no suitable shade trees native and where a dependable tree of these habits is so badly needed for both city and farm planting. Its growth there up to this time indicates that the Chinese Elm is a distinct and valuable addition to the list of trees thriving in this region and from trial plantings in other sections it also promises to be of considerable importance as a desirable shade tree in other parts of Texas."

A RECIPE TO RID YOUR POULTRY OF PARASITES

Warm weather brings danger for the poultry flock—mainly from lice and mites, which sap the vitality of the fowls, reduce egg production and kill the growing chicks. The fact that one pair of poultry lice are capable of producing in eight weeks, generation upon generation, a total of 125,000 of their damaging tribe, is an indication that control measures should be started just as quickly as the first signs of infestation appears in the flock.

Body lice are controlled by using sodium fluoride, say the poultry specialists at the Missouri College of Agriculture, either dusting the birds, or greasing them with a mixture of grease and sodium fluoride or dipping the hens in a solution of sodium fluoride, 1 pound to 9 gallons of water. A very warm sunny day should be selected for the dipping, and care should be taken that every bird on the place gets the bath.

Mites are controlled by painting the roosts and dropping boards with the waste oil from the gasoline engine.

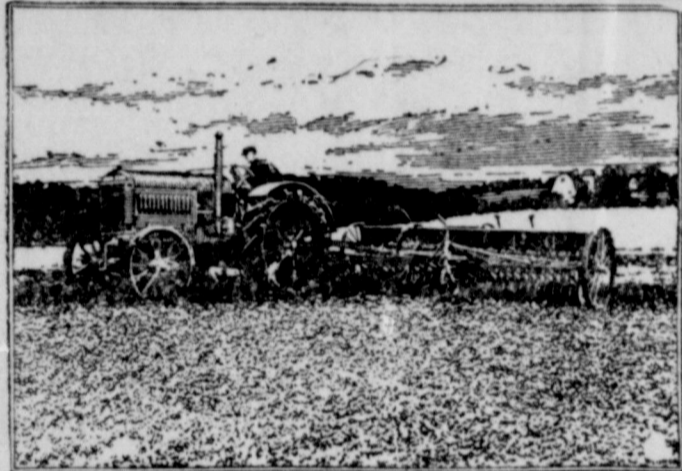

BARKING UP THE WRONG TREE
