



# REVISE EFFORT FOR CHANGING PEACE TREATY

### Reservationists Broaden Their Program to Include Many Questions

### BOTH SIDES SAY THEY ARE SATISFIED WITH VOTE

### Next Amendment to Be Reported in Six In One On Shantung Issue

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF., Oct. 3.—"It was a foregone conclusion that the Fall amendments would be rejected," Senator Hiram Johnson of California declared on hearing of yesterday's Senate vote on the main question at issue.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—The program of Senate reservationists is to be broadened to include practically all matters covered by amendments that have been, or will be proposed to the peace treaty, it was evident today.

Not only does the proposed reservation program contemplate relieving the United States of any obligation to send troops abroad under Article X to preserve the territory or political independence of foreign nations against the use of American troops abroad for any purpose without the specific consent of congress.

The new program is also to provide, senators said, that the United States shall not be represented on European boundary commissions or other bodies set up to carry out treaty provisions.

A check is to be placed upon the acts of American members of such commissions so their votes will be subjected to "veto" by congress.

This program has now for the first time become public, its supporters said.

Fall amendments were overwhelmingly defeated yesterday, but upon the first roll call thirty senators voted for the amendments with four absent, who may have supported it.

The voting progress, said Senator Hitchcock, "is the best major vote the Senate is ever known to have given to a bill."

The next amendment to be reported will be that on Shantung, which is an amendment in one.

"It showed that we have one vote more than the thirty-three required to reject the treaty unless it is made safe by the adoption of strong reservations."

## TEXAS REPUBLICANS ADOPT A LILY WHITE CAMPAIGN PROGRAM

### FT. WORTH, TEXAS, Oct. 3.—A Lily White policy by the republican party of Texas was officially announced from headquarters of the Texas Republican Council by Chairman C. C. Littleton in a statement to the press following a meeting of Republican leaders Thursday.

The statement follows: "Texas is a white man's country and government must rest exclusively in the hands of the Caucasian race."

The council is composed of white Republicans and they will dictate the politics of the party without consulting the members of any other race.

"The Republican party has in times past been prostituted by negroes because it allowed to attend conventions as pawns of white politicians, who were seeking office or power within the party."

"This country must be governed by white Americans who are in sympathy with American traditions and institutions."

# TEMPORARY BUILDING MAY BE ERECTED FOR WICHITA POSTOFFICE

**DECISION IS REACHED AT CONFERENCE HELD AT ELKS CLUB TODAY.**

**NO RELIEF FROM CONGRESS**

Matter is Transmitted to Postoffice Department at Washington by Postmaster Howard.

In the absence of action on the part of congress to provide facilities for the relief of congestion at the local postoffice, an offer to provide funds for the erection of a temporary building on the postoffice lot by Wichita Falls citizens which is expected to provide immediate and ample temporary facilities for the handling of the postal business at Wichita Falls was decided on at a conference held at the Elks club rooms Friday morning.

A request for such an offer from the postoffice department was transmitted through Postmaster Howard, who has been working for increased facilities here for some time, and through C. L. Cain, postoffice inspector in this district.

No Aid from Congress. That there is no hope of obtaining legislation from congress at this season even for temporary relief, and probably not for two years, was brought out by Mr. Cain, who is in possession of the present crowded condition of the postoffice, which does not afford sufficient room for the carrying on of the present business, with the Christmas rush, promising to make things even worse if immediate relief is not provided.

Through the right of the postoffice department to contract for the rental of necessary buildings, without action by congress, they have asked for a proposal from Wichita citizens to erect the building and rent same to the government for the rental of necessary buildings, which will be a hollow tile, stuccoed structure of one story, 33 by 37 feet in dimensions, will, it is expected, provide room for the city mail delivery, as well as an additional row of lock boxes sufficient to care for the immediate local demand.

Working Out Plans. It is expected that this building can be erected at \$15,000. Details of a plan now being worked out by a committee, composed of J. A. Kemp, R. E. Huff and W. W. Silk provide for the advance of this money by the five banks of the city, the money to be secured by a contract with the postoffice department and by the signatures of 10 or 20 of the leading citizens of the town, and the building to be leased to the postoffice department for five years at such a figure as would return the money at the end of five years, with reasonable interest and sufficient money in addition to care for insurance and taxes on the building. At the end of the five years the building will revert to the government, which will also have the privilege of liquidating the contract at any time during that term. The provision of this temporary structure will not militate in any way against the chances of the city to secure a suitable federal building. It was agreed at the conference, after some discussion on this subject, it was pointed out that even with this temporary building, the local federal building can not in any way be considered as adequate for a postoffice building, much less as a federal building, when under present conditions the federal court here is holding court in the county courthouse at a great inconvenience both to the federal and state courts, practically crowding out one of the district courts during its sessions and causing for this reason a great congestion of business in the other district court.

### ONE CONVICTION IN ARCHER COUNTY COURT

One conviction that of R. C. Kirkland, was obtained by the state in district court at Archer City, district Attorney Fletcher S. Jones announced Friday. He and Judge Bonner returned Thursday night from Archer City. Kirkland was charged with assault with intent to kill, and a jury found him guilty of aggravated assault and fixed his punishment at a fine of \$50 and 30 days in jail. Judge Bonner and Mr. Jones will be here until early next week.

# POLICE FORCE MAKES 133 ARRESTS DURING THE PAST THREE DAYS

Wichita Falls' police force hung up a new record for arrests Thursday when peppy violators of the law were booked at police headquarters. For three days this month there have been 133 arrests, which is the record of any three days since prohibition went into force, and but few days of the old era would equal the record.

There were gamblers, drunks, persons who drove automobiles over the fire hose while the streets were being bathed, persons who maintained insanitary or unsightly nuisances, violators of the sanitary ordinances, violators of the fire ordinances, vagrants, fighters and every known quality of automobile law violator from the humble wrong parker to the chap with speed mania.

As a consequence, police court presented a rather motley appearance an unfragrant atmosphere and a varicolored assemblage when Judge Ogle rapped for order Friday. The justice wheeled moved speedily, however, and fines flew thick, the crowd quickly thinning.

# ORDERS FOR CONCENTRATION OF THIRTY-SIXTH DIVISION AT THE DALLAS FAIR PARK OCTOBER 10

Warning orders for a concentration in the Dallas sector for attack and capture of the desirable supplies which may be found in the Fair Park at that point on October 10, have been issued from the headquarters of the 36th division, and read as follows:

1. It is reported that Beaumont Grenadine, Oufis, Pommes de Terre, Poulet, Salades, Potage, Fromage, Cafe au Lait, Escargots, Fetes, Souvenirs du Dallas, Vin Rouge (?), Mademoiselles and other military necessaries are being concentrated in Fair Park at Dallas. (267,835-17.)

2. On "D" day at "H" hour the reunited 36th Division will attack and capture these supplies and such other secret stores (\*\*) as may be obtained from friendly inhabitants.

3. (a) All former members of the 36th Division will move from their present station in time to reach Dallas on "D" day and filtering through the hostile gates, will assemble at Convention tent at "H" hour.

(b) All leaves of absence are revoked, no one will be allowed on sick report, all officers and men in the guard house will be released, the necessary guard and fatigue duty will not be necessary and every former member of the 36th Division will be present. Men going A. W. O. L. will be severely punished, the minimum punishment being death and the maximum banishment to Tomerre (Yonne).

(c) Uniform: Civilian clothes, except that the overseas cap will be worn exclusively within the Dallas area and will have on it the Division insignia.

(d) Detail attack order will be distributed on arrival in Dallas area. Heavy packs will be thrown into the nearest creek along with all corn, willy, canned tomatoes and entrenching tools that fall into the hands of any member of this Division.

(e) Members who so desire may carry travel rations in order to have the pleasure of throwing them out of the train window at mess call.

(f) If you have the francs, the local R. T. O. will issue the necessary transportation (all persons are advised to secure round trip tickets in order to insure a safe return home). If you have not the requisite francs, telling the conductor "Far Compre."

DISLIKING THE ENGLISH. Why have politicians been able for long a time to mislead the headway by twisting the tail of the British lion? A healthy, rip-roaring attack on the English, with a general denunciation of all they stand for, has apparently been one of the favorite routes to popularity.

That explains in a measure the usefulness of the anti-British issue to the politicians. If great numbers of our people could visit England and get to know the run of common English folk, the cause of demagogues might suffer.

SOMETHING AHEAD OF THEM. E. R. Richardson lives in San Antonio. Until recently he owned about fifteen hundred acres of well-improving black land farms in Refugio County. He thus relates in the San Antonio Express:

My terms of sale were as follows: fair market price; I take their notes secured by deeds of trust, for the full amount, payable on or before ten years, and a 4-charter mortgage on one-third of the cotton and a stated amount per acre on all land in other crops. The custom and law in Texas on rental basis is one-quarter and one-third to the landlord. Out of this one-third, which I require them to deposit in the bank to my credit with copy of gin ticket and account sales from the buyer of the cotton, I apply first to the interest at 6 per cent until same is paid, the balance on the principal. Of course, there may be crop failures and they may not make enough to even pay their interest, but the landlord in failure years gets nothing anyway, so why not wait on them until they get our good black land farms, when they do

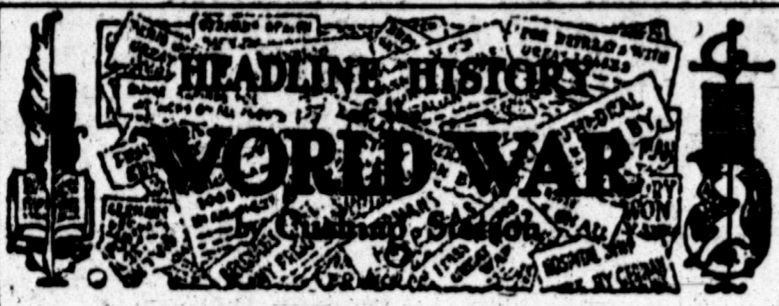

KING AND QUEEN ARE WELCOME TO NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—The official welcome of King Albert, Queen Elizabeth and Prince Leopold to this city at noon today, although deferred until 24 hours after their arrival from Belgium, surpassed in enthusiasm the informal greeting they received yesterday.

Tens of thousands were massed at the Battery and in the vicinity when the Royal party arrived there on the Rodman Wannamaker yacht, Noma, which they had boarded in the North River immediately after leaving their hotel, their thousands lined lower Broadway which the party and their escort traversed in motors to the city hall. This was the luncheon hour for the financial district workers and they preferred giving voice to their admiration of Albert of the Belgians and his consort and heir to undertaking the more prosaic task of eating.

The progress up Broadway was marked by an ovation rivalling any greeting ever witnessed in New York. In city hall park were packed great crowds, who welcomed the Royal party with a tremendous shout.

The king replied: "I thank you heartily for your words of welcome. I appreciate highly the honor that the city of New York does me in making me one of its citizens. I prize all the more highly this manifestation because I believe the municipal institution have always played in the past an important role in the public life of the country. I think that there is not in the history of the world another example like that of the city of New York, which born, not three centuries ago, has become in this short space of time one of the centers of universal activity. New York is indeed worthy to be the commercial and financial metropolis of that admirable American democracy which showed itself to be as great in war as in peace, and always generous toward those who suffered."

"I am happy, Mr. Mayor, to be able to bear to the immense city which surrounds us with its splendor, the salutations of Belgium."

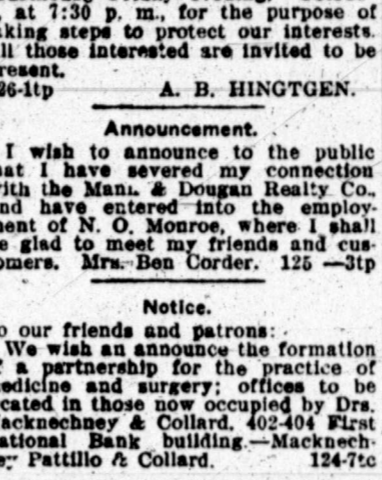

REDS INVADE THE HOME OF SOX FOR THIRD OF SERIES

HARD DIGGIN' STARTS TODAY FOR THE CHAMPIONS OF NATIONAL LEAGUE.

SOX ARE NOT DISHEARTENED

Chicago Presents a Scene Strangely in Contrast With That at Cincinnati.

By HENRY L. FARRRELL (United Press Staff Correspondent) CHICAGO, Oct. 3.—Hard diggin' starts today for the Reds. From the seat of the home grounds where they have been making the dirt fly for a gravel for the White Sox, the steam shovel of Pat Moran will root into this gravel this afternoon at Comiskey Park.

Early this morning the Moran delegation, flushed with two sensational wins over the American League champions, invaded the neighborhood of the Sox for three games that they hope will end their series and bring the first world's championship banner to Ohio. Just a hit behind, the White Sox staged a home coming that was far from the triumphant entry of the Windy City Creams. Battered and beaten, but not disheartened, Gleason and his clan returned. Smiles, perhaps forced, but smiles nevertheless, showed on the faces of the under dog; in the big scrap as they stepped from the train and faced a gathering of South Side hopefuls, who voiced optimism, "It's our turn, gang, we got 'em here."

Yes, the Sox smiled. Even Eddie Cicotte and Claud Williams, those two ace hurlers, whose colors were lowered and trampled in the dust at Redland by the stampeding Reds, grinned a bit in the taxi that hustled them to their hotel. In the young hands of Dickie Kerr, the kid southpaw, probably will be faced this afternoon the task of stopping the wrecking crew from Ohio that has mounded the two best bats of the Sox staff.

# BUSY SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL ABOLISHES TRASH WAGONS AND RAISES WAGES OF STREET MEN

### WHAT COUNCIL DID.

Decided to buy a "black Maria" for the use of the police department.  
Voted to inspect streets now ready to pave today.  
Refused to take action either for or against boulevarding Ninth street with a park-way in the center of the street when paved.  
Discussed at length the problem of parking automobiles in the downtown areas, but took no definite prohibitory action.  
Passed finally the ordinance giving the Wichita Valley railroad a franchise for a spur down Thirteenth streets and an alley to the Wooten Wholesale grocery house.  
Decided to investigate a proposal to open Twelfth street to Elizabeth street.  
Adopted a resolution asking all wholesale meat dealers to provide cold storage here for meats.  
Announced that an ordinance soon would be passed prohibiting passage over paved streets of automobiles tractors and trucks that cut up the paving.  
Decided to place lights in the park before the library so as to discourage lovers in seeking that spot as a rendezvous.  
Talked finances for the library at length but did not decide where to get the money.  
Decided to sell fire station No. 2 for \$20,000 for a filling station, despite protests alleged to have been made by property owners in the vicinity.  
Announced that an ordinance soon will be passed prohibiting the use of the streets as a mart for "for sale automobiles."  
Issued an edict that no more trash and swill will be hauled by the city after October 15. This is a "clean up or close up" measure.  
Raised wage scale of street workers.  
Passed finally ordinance fixing plumbing inspector's fees.  
Passed "safety zone" ordinance to second reading.  
Adopted iron as a roofing for a shed so that city mules won't gnaw it.

Much municipal business was transacted at the regular meeting of the city council Thursday night, at which all of the members were present for the first time in weeks, as Mayor Marlow expressed it.  
Just an intimation was given of some drastic, but city-making, legislation soon to be adopted by council and several actions tending toward keeping Wichita Falls space with the times were taken.  
Henceforth city prisoners will be hauled to jail in a patrol wagon Police Commissioner Bundy was given authority to purchase such a vehicle after he and Assistant Commissioner Goodfellow had explained that under the present plan it was necessary for police officers to leave their beats unprotected to escort prisoners to jail.  
Council took no final action on a proposal of Attorney Boone that Ninth street be parked. Mr. Boone explained that he understood council already had decided that where the street was 100 feet wide it should be parked down the center. Council denied any final action on such a proposition, but appeared in a receptive mood should such a plan be deemed advisable. However, Mayor Marlow evidently expressed the alderman's sentiment when he declared the project impracticable because of the car tracks and the inability to keep trees, grass and flowers in the street from being trampled.  
Mayor O'posse.  
"It means a patch of woods in the middle of the street," said the mayor. "Street cars would make the grass a greasy streak. I think it would be a mistake."  
Mr. Boone said the people living in his neighborhood are anxious to pave and either want to pave to a park-way or pave the entire street, whichever council wants. After council argued at length, it passed the ordinance giving the Wichita Valley railroad a 30-year franchise for a spur track on Thirteenth street, through block 213 and dividing block 210 and through an alley. However, a provision in the franchise placed a limit of five minutes upon the time which the road may block Thirteenth street with cars. Some of the councilmen wanted to stipulate that the street be not blocked at all, Mayor Marlow said Seventh street often is blocked 20 to 25 minutes at a time.  
Charles M. Blalowsky appeared and petitioned council to grade Van Buren street from Seventh street to the crematorium. Council will visit this street today and determine what should be done.  
W. M. Priddy was before council with two petitions. One was that an ordinance be passed prohibiting trucks with worn out tires traversing the paved streets. He declared that the streets are being damaged; that the new concrete roads will be cut to pieces unless some steps regulating traffic are taken and declared that if council would pass the ordinance Burk Burnett could be induced to adopt the same law and thus the use of tireless trucks would be stopped on the highway between the two cities. He told of instances where the highways had been badly misused by trucks and tractors. Mayor Marlow again said some action would be taken. He declared the traversing of streets by trucks with chains on the wheels even a greater evil than the worn out tires.

Library Finances. Mr. Priddy's other proposition was relative to the library finances, and the suggestion that council place lights in the library park. He said the park and library steps are being misused. Dr. Reed was given authority to have the lights installed.  
Relative to the finances, council did nothing. However, Mr. Priddy was retained that council always had come to the assistance of the library and would continue to do so. No provision has been made for furnishing funds for the conduct of the library next year but it developed that the members of the library board had determined to use their personal finances if necessary. The new city charter, said Priddy, will not provide for the library but it developed that this matter will be "worked out."  
"The city will have to go into debt anyway," said the mayor. "It now costs \$20,000 a month to run the city where it used to take \$10,000 a year. The population has more than doubled, but the revenues haven't." The city's financial condition, it was gathered, is rather unimpaired.  
Dr. Reed presented a resolution, which was unanimously adopted, requesting that packing houses and persons who ship meat be required to provide cold storage.  
Jack Culbertson, manager of the Wichita Motor Co., complained to council about the manner in which for sale automobiles are allowed to be parked in the streets. He declared that he could find no parking place yesterday and left his car in the street for a moment, later being threatened with arrest, in fact being arrested, but disregarding the instructions of the officer to go to the city hall. He declared it is often necessary for people to park their cars in the street, but they wish to go and exclaimed that no one had a right to use the street as a salesroom.  
"I would not be a street hog," he declared.  
Seventeen for sale cars were counted yesterday by Culbertson parked on Ohio avenue between Seventh and Eighth streets.  
The hauling of trash and garbage has proved too costly to the city, it was brought out by Sanitary Inspector Morgan and Dr. Reed. As a consequence council issued a notice to the public that after October 15 persons must haul their own trash and garbage. Until that date the city will stay on the job. All merchants and business houses are to be warned that they do not heed the warning and haul away their trash and garbage they will be haled to court.  
George Dobson, street superintendent, told the council that if the city was to keep any men at work in its street department it would have to pay better wages. The men have been paid \$2.50 and \$1 a day. A sliding scale of \$4, \$4.50 and \$5 a day was fixed and the men will be paid according to their worth. Dobson brought out that the city needs 20 men and has but seven in the street department.  
On Dobson's request, council decided to build a shed about 32 feet by 60 feet as a shelter for the 25 or 30 head of mules the city owns. It was brought out that mules eat the combination or patent roofing and for this reason it was decided to roof the shed with iron, although one councilman wanted to put the roof out of reach of the mules.  
A refund of \$1.50 will be paid to

the Denver railroad, due, it was explained, through a mistake made in computing freight on pipe sometime ago.  
To Sell Fire Station. Alderman Curlew's suggestion that No. 2 fire station be sold met instant approval. He said an offer of \$20,000 had been made by a man who wished to open a filling station there. Mayor Marlow also told of an offer he had received of \$20,000 for the property.  
In the course of the discussion it developed that property owners in the vicinity are opposed to a filling station there, but it is likely that the station will be sold and provisions made for straightening the kink in Tenth street there.  
Alderman McFall wanted to know who was responsible for the filthy and insanitary condition he and Commissioner Bundy had found in downtown alleys and the rear of buildings on a tour of inspection Thursday.  
"We told them to either clean up or close up," said McFall. "I have never seen filthier and more unkept places. Why the sewers are stopped up in some places and conditions of actual and loathsome filth exist. There is less civic pride evinced by some people here than any place I ever heard of."  
Council promised action looking toward remedying this condition.  
Lack of labor, said City Engineer Donnell, is retarding paving work. Paving Superintendent McDonald declared he was ready to go ahead with the work but that the grading had not been completed. Gravel is arriving at the rate of two carloads a day. The council will inspect this work today, too, and may take some action to speed it up by furnishing labor. The meeting lasted until after 11:00 o'clock.

### NOCONA ORGANIZING A REFINING COMPANY OF 3,000 CAPACITY

NOCONA, TEXAS, Oct. 3.—An effort is being made here to organize a refining company, to probably be known as the Nocona Producing and Refining company, the object being to engage in the refining business, the initial capacity to be 3,000 barrels, and to take up the matter of engaging in the producing part of the same a bit later. This project is meeting with considerable favor. A site has been selected east of town and south of the M. K. & T. railroad.

The Frank V. Wright well in the northwest corner of the Fielding Secret Survey and about ten miles north of Saint Joe is reported to have passed through fourteen feet of hard lime stone at 2,700 feet or below and to have encountered a dry sand underneath. The well is now considered in a favorable stage and will be closely watched.

It is reported at Saint Joe that machinery is being shipped for the test to be drilled southwest of Saint Joe by Oklahoma capital. It is said work is to be started by the 25th of this month.

### REGIONAL DIRECTOR OF KATY EXPECTED SATURDAY ON INSPECTION TOUR

B. F. Bush, regional director for the southwestern district, whose jurisdiction among others embraces the Katy system, will pass through Wichita Falls with a party of high railroad officials Saturday on a trip of inspection over the property of that road in this district, reaching here on a special arriving about 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon. ## LOCAL OPERATOR OBJECTS TO ANY SEVERE CRITICISM OF THE LARGE PIPE LINE COMPANIES

"I don't like to hear too many means of getting their oil out, and things said about the big pipe line companies," said a Wichita Falls contractor and producer who has been playing the game in Texas oil fields since 1901. "I have a warm feeling for the big companies who own in Sour Lake loaned money to some of us 'little fellows' so that we could exist, when times were tight. These companies have kept the price of oil up for 45 days in the Northwest pool, and according to my way of thinking they aren't responsible for the cut of October 1. It was the producer who got his oil run sold his oil for any old price, while they had wells shut in all the while. I know this to be a fact, and I know that I have had oil run from my wells, while the company which was running my oil wasn't running half of its own oil."

Indications are that there will be no session of the 78th district court next week. Judge Scurry will leave Saturday for Atlanta to attend the reunion of Confederate Veterans and Sons of Veterans, and the selection of a special judge from among members of the bar had not been determined upon Friday.

The jury summoned for next week in the 78th district court was notified Thursday not to appear, all jurors having been excused.

"They kept the price up during weeks, when independent companies were getting oil for as low as a dollar a barrel. When producers were slashing prices anyway at all to get their oil run. They could have made a cut when the first overproduction came, but they didn't. Instead they kept up the price and staved off, in my opinion, a very bad panic. The big companies aren't the only ones that have lines nearing completion, and pretty soon there will be a big competition in the field, which will result in a bonus again being paid, according to indications. As far as a 'freeze out game' is concerned, I do not believe that that sort of a game could be played very successfully in this field if anyone wished to play it. There are too many independent operators, who have already made enough money to weather a pretty bad storm. The financial institutions of this city are also strong, and I believe that if a fight came, which hardly seems probable, the independent concerns could hold their own."

"I don't believe that the cut will have any effect on stocks, for stocks were already as low as there was any chance of them going. It looked to me. And I can't see that it's any worse to sell oil to a big pipe line company for \$2 a barrel than to sell it for \$1.50, maybe lower to some of the independent companies. There certainly isn't any money lost. And I don't see that it's any worse for a big company, which will be serving the field, and spending money here when the flush production's over and the 'bootleggers' have faded away, to get oil at a reduced price, than the other fellow."

"It may be too optimistic. A few weeks will suffice to tell, but I really believe that as the independent concerns first cut the price when the big flush production came on, so they will again be shortly offering a bonus, when more lines come in, and operators aren't hard pressed for

START SATURDAY ON PETITIONS FOR LOCAL IRRIGATION PROJECT

Circulation of petitions asking the commissioners court for the creation of a water improvement district embracing the city of Wichita Falls and a small part of adjoining land to provide for future expansion which will participate in the building of the Big Wichita Irrigation project as a means of providing the necessary additional water supply for the city, decided on at a recent mass meeting, will be started Saturday morning, it was announced today.

The work of drawing up the petitions, and attending to the legal steps necessary in this connection, has just been completed by Judge J. I. Starley, attorney for the committee recently named to attend to the details of the project. Petitions for the creation of the irrigation district are not yet finished, but their completion and circulation is expected for the early part of next week, and it is thought that they will be completed in time that the creation of both districts can be laid before the commissioners court at their next session.

Although only 50 signatures are legally required to bring about the creation of a district of this kind, the committee expect to secure several hundred names on the petitions before presenting to the commissioners. An election of the taxpayers in this district will, of course, be necessary before bonds can be issued by the district so created.

A general meeting of both the executive and advisory committees who have been working out details of the project will be held late this afternoon or tomorrow.
