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REVISE EFFORT FOR CHANGING PEACE TREATY

Reservationists Broaden Their Program to Include Many Questions

BOTH SIDES SAY THEY ARE SATISFIED WITH VOTE

Next Amendment to Be Reported Is Six In One On Shantung Issue

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF., Oct. 3 "It was a foregon; conclusion that the Fall amendments would be re-jected," Senator Hiram Johnson of California declared on hearing of yesterday's Scrate vote. "This vote has little bearing on the main question at issue."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—The program of Senate reservationists is to be broadened to include practically all matters covered by amendments that have been, or will be proposed to the peace treaty, it. was evident today. Not only does the proposed reservation program contemplate relieving the United States of any obligation to send troops abroad under Article X to proserve the territory or political independence or foreign nations against the use of American troops abroad for any purpose without the specific consent of congress. This is to 'over such cases as the sending of troops to upper Silesia to help keep order preceding and during the Plebzacite which is to decide whether the territory is to be under German or Polish soverignty.

The new program is also to provide, senators said, that the United States shall not be represented on European boundary commissions or other bodies set up to carry out treaty provisions. If for any reason congress thinks this country should not be represented, and is to provide for American withdrawal from membership on any such commission at any time congress desires.

Working Out Plans.

It is expected that this building can be erected at \$15,000. Details of a plan now being worked out by a committee composed of J. A. Kemp. R. E. Huff and W. W. Silk provide for the advance of this money by the five banks of the city, the money to be secured by a contract with the postoffice department and by the signatures of 10 or 20 of the leading citizens of the town, and the building to be leased to the postoffice department for five years at such a figure as would return the money at the end of five years, with reasonable interest and sufficient money in addition to care for insurance and taxes.

end of five years, with reasonable interest and sufficient money in addition to care for insurance and taxes on the building. At the end of the five years the building will revert to the government, which will also have the privilege of liquidating the contract at any time during that term.

The prevision of this temporary structure will not militate in any way against the chances of the city to secure a suitable federal building, it was agreed at the conference, after some discussion on this subject. It was pointed out that even with this temporary building, the local federal building can not in any way be considered as adequate for a postoffice-building, much less as a federal building, when under present conditions the federal court here is holding court in the county courthouse at a great inconvenience both to the federal and State courts, practically covered as a process of the district of the boys to reform.




The work of drawing up the petitions, and attending to the legal steps necessary in this connection, has just been completed by Judge J. has just been completed by Judge J.

NORTHWESTERN NOT OF SHOPS FROM CITY

"The Wichita Falls and Northwestern, so far as I know, is not and has not been considering the removal of its shops to Frederick, Oklahoma," is the statement made by ".

W. Grace, division superintendent here, when questioned in regard to reports emanating from Frederick to the effect that the road would take such action if homes were proxided for the workers at that point, the move being by reason of the difficulty of the employes obtaining proper living facilities in Wichita Falls.

"A movement of the shops to Frederick, besides entailing a heavy expense, would not in any way benefit the Northwestern, in my judgment, as it is only 50 miles from here and in a more inaccessible location than the "The Wichita Falls and Northwest-

a more inaccessible location than the shops are in at present at Wichita Falls.

"I have seen newspaper reports quoting the chief dispatcher at Fred erick, and quoting me in reply to the effect that I would not recommend such removal on account of the fact that homes were as hard to obtain in Frederick as in Wichita Falls. I have never held any such conversation on this subject and if I conversation on this subject and if I had would not have made any such

reply.

"From this reported conversation the people of Frederick seem to have leaped to the conclusion that if they will provide homes for the workmen they can secure the shops. This, I think, is a mistake."
