By HUGH BAILLIE WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 .- Republicans and Democrats today began actively organizing for the business of selecting a President of the United States in 1920. Leaders were on the ground arrang"

ing for meetings of the Democratic and Republican national commmittees here January 8, and December 10, respectively, to pick convention cities. Press agents representing the candidates were also beginning to appear, armed with much literature. Announcements of new candidates were expected to some thick and fast from the G. O. P. ranks within a few days, but the Democrats were holding back. There were many ideas as to what the issue would be. Miles Poindexter, senator from Washington and one of the first Republican aspirants in the field, declared it would be Bolshevism and that he would make his fight on a platform promising eradication of the "Red menace." and Republican national commmittees

W. G. McAdoo was seen today as a bidder for labor support if he becomes a candidate, in view of his telegram to Fuel Administrator Garfield, vigorously supporting the miners' wage demands and opposing the idea of letting the public pay the increase. But McAdoo has not avowed his intentions, and the other Democratic possibilitis, including Governor Cox and A. Mitchell Palmer, are keeping very quiet.

Bryan is Mentioned.

W. J. Bryan, although he has said he has no more political ambitions, is frequently brought into the situation when the Democratic aggregation is being looked over.

There was some talk today of "states rights" figuring as an issue. This might come about in connection with enforcement of prohibition. Rhode Island has not ratified the constitutional amendment, and, according to her representatives here, intends to resist enforcement on the ground that the Federal governmnt has no right to interfere in such a matter.

Many cities are bidding for the Republican national convention. They include San Francisco, Chicago, Asbury Park, St. Louis, Kansas City, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Minneapolis combined. For the Democratic convention, Baltimore, Chicago, Indianapolis, and St. Louis are among those bidding.

Politicians are looking to South Dakota to bring out the first "bumper crop" of candidates. January 1 is the day on which contenders in that state may file their declarations. The first presidential primary will be in New Hampshire, March 9.

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

That is an attitude that we will have to correct if we are to build a city here as we should. "Then, in addition to endeavoring to attract outside money here, we should make an effort to hold capital in Wichita Falls which has been made out in the Northwest field, not only getting the employment of this money in the upbuilding of the town, but in this way making citizens out of the people who make that money."

"He said he dreamed he reached under his pillow to get his revolver and that he was suddenly awakened by the noise of a shot. He found the revolver in his hand and it was smoking.

"I am convinced this man is telling the truth for this reason: The builet that killed his wife went through the pillow before it lodged in her head, behind the left ear. Sapienza alept on the left side of the bed and his wife on the right."

Prosecutor Harrison, who said neighbors corroborated Sapienza's statement that he and his wife had always been on the best terms, declared he believed the manufacturer was telling the truth. He added that Sepienza had turned over to him for investigation the threatening letters he had received.

COUNTY TO ERECT LODGING HOUSE FOR

The erection of a lodging house to cost approximately \$700 for use by officials of the sheriff's department on duty in the Northwest fields is provided for in a resolution unanimously adopted by the county commissioners at the regular meeting held Monday afternoon at the court house. The building is to be erected on the Lillismorgan tract and is near Waggoner City. Sheriff Bob McFall told the commissioners that due to the large number of oil field workers locating in the Northwest fields, a detachment of deputy sheriffs had to be stationed there in order to enforce the law. Rent in that section has reached almost a prohibitive rate and the commissioners have attempted to solve the problem by urging the immediate erection of the lodging house.

At the request of Sheriff McFall told the commissioners ordered the employment of an additional guard at the court house. Sheriff McFall told the commissioners that due to the bad condition of the county iail it would be very easy for the prisoners to stage a general jail delivery. The sheriff pointed to the fact that the jail was overflowing with prisoners many of whom face grave felony charges.
