Various Disquieting Reports Came
From Across Rio Grande—Bandit
Activities in Distant Parts of ReCording to Berlin Report, Taking 500

Washington, June 10.—Administration officials have been unable as yet to determine the extent of the anti-American agitation in northern Mexico, but they are making no effort to conceal truelr uneasiness. The demonstrations against keeping American troops in Mexico have been widely separated geographically but have occurred, some officials think with significantly close relations to each otner, in time.

They believe it possible a definite rampaign bas been inaugurated by some agency to provoke an armed clash balween American and Mexican forces. It is not known, however, that any definite indication of such an organized movement has been received.

The Associated Press summarizes European war operations as follows:

The Russian offensive in Volhynia and Galicia is daily assuming new phases and marking new ground won by General Brusiloff's troops.

The Russians are contribuing to advance westward from Lutak, after crossing the River Styr fighting rear guard actions with the Austrians as the latter retire. In Galicia northeast of Tarnopol, the Austrian defense appears to be stiffening, heavy fighting being reported there for heights which have changed thands several times. Further south the Russians nearing the Zlota-Lipa River from which the Austrians advanced in their drive of last September.

MOTOR TRUCKS IN BALKAN CAMPAIGN

Ox Wagons Which Formerly Were Used For Transport Are Now Entirely Displaced

Ry Associated Press.

With the Bulgarian Army, Macedonfan Front, (By mail)—The motof truck has revolutionized transportation for the Bulgarian army. An ofncer in charge of the supply department of one of the units trationed here submitted figures which he said instead prove that each motor truck used by his army has been doing the work of 500 oxen and 250 wagons

each day.

In the past the Bulgarian army
has depended entirely upon the ox
wagon for the transport of its food
supplies and ammunition. In the supplies and ammunition. In the early stages of the campaign against Serbia no ofher means were at the disposal of the army. The few horse drawn vehicles had to be used as combat trains, a rickety home made farm affair drawn either by two oxen or two water buffaloes. With railroads few and far between in Bulgaria and Serbia this made campaigning very difficult. Not only was the supply system itself slow, compersome and unreliable, but it also prevented the troops from advancing as rapidly as abey might have done had it been possible to get food and ammunition to the front more rapidly.

The opening of a through route of communication between the Central Empires and Bulgaria changed all this. The first motor trucks reached Bulgaria over the Danube. Later more came over the re-ets-blished Belgrade-Nish railroad. Today the ox wagon is nearly a thing of the past, as the Associated Press correspondent was himself able to ascertain. The conveyance is still used pondent was himself able to ascertain. The conveyance is still used to carry frontward such light supplies as straw and hay or materials when delivery is not urgent and bread is brought into the trenches by the ox wagon; but outside of this the vehicle has been supplanted entirely by the motor truck.




