More Such Vessels Now Under Con-struction in Germany, According to Amsterdam Report—Kiel Ship Yards

Amsterdam, July 11.—Another commercial submarine, the Bremen, constructed by the same company that built the Deutschland, now in an American port, already has left harbor, according to the Berlin Vossiche Zeitung.

The German shipowning firm of the Ocean Navigation Company, Ltd., of Bremen, registered at Bremen as having been established by the North German Lloyd Company, the Deutsche Bank and Alfred Lohmann of Bremen, own the submarines, the newspaper

BOAT INSPECTED

Captain Koenig today made a statement to the customs officials that he expected to get away within ten days. He had been told that if he remained longer than two weeks the boat's wireless would be sealed up. State department officials expressed belief, based upon unofficial information, that the Deutschland would be declared a peaceful, unarmed mer-chantman and entitled to all privileges of an ordinary cargo carrier.

The state department, it was officially declared, will not concern itself with reported objections by Canadian nickel interests to exportation of nickel on the boat. MANY AMERICANS SEE HARD SERVICE

Large Numbers From This Country Show Up in Ranks of British.

British Headquarters, Prance—American citizens have seen hotter fighting in the last two weeks than any American since the Appomalox campaign. They have endured as heavy shell tire as the German guns ever directed at the British front and known what it was to charge into the German tranches with bayonet and bomb in pouring rain through the mud in the small hours of the morning.


