The three boxes which had not fin

ished counting late Saturday night got through with the tallying Sunday, No. 12 being the last to complete its work. at 10 o'clock Sunday night. With the exception of Judge Nichol

Fon, who lost to Judge Scurry by a margin of 63 votes, all of the present officials at the court house are returned by substantial pluralities. Ragsdale maintained and increased his lead for tax assessor, winning σ ut with Fowler second and Deaton a good third. One of the closest races was that for county superintendent. In this contest, E. C. Hall of Burkburnett appeared a sure winner late Saturday night, but Miss Hickman showed considerable strength in the city boxes and threatened for a time to over come the lead.
