He declared 40 persons have been drowned and half that number of bodies had been recovered. Jaco was unable to get up the Kay-ford branch of the Chesapeake & Ohio rairoad but expressed the belief that damage and loss of life in that dis-trict were greater than in other sectrict were greater than in other sec-

At least eight villages and mining settlements in the district were wholly or partly destroyed while many others felt the effects of the storm more or less. Those practically destroyed or badly damaged were Aeme, Ronda, Dry Branch, Miami, Sharon, Dawes, Kaytord and Eskdale. Between Aeme and Kayford 60 persons are reported to have been drowned. GREEKS BITTER AGAINST ALLIES

LEADER OF CONSERVATIV PARTY ISSUES STATEMENT TO AMERICAN PEOPLE.

British and French Officers Strongly
Denounced For Attitude They
Have Taken.

Athens.—Agamemnon Schliemann, member of the Greek Chamber of Deputies and former Greek Minister to Washington, after a conference with the leaders of the late government has issued a statement addressed to The Associated Press and embodying the point of view of the Greek Conservative party regarding the recent intervention of the powers in Greek affairs. The statement is issued in English:

"We have been profoundly humila-

"We have been profoundly humilated that those whom we have always considered the protectors of our national life and of our independence should have succeased, by threatening the use of brutal force, in intervening in teh internal affairs of our country."

"Strong in the conviction of our right, it is our duty to point out, the cold facts as they are, not only to the great neutral powers of the world, among which America holds so prominent a place, but also through the medium of the American press, to point out the same facts to the coalscience of the liberal people of Great Britain and to the gallant French nation so imbued with the immortal principles of 1789. Letter From Gompers Tells of Un-favorable Decisions Given By Candidate

Washington, Aug. 10.—Democratic party managers here gave out a letter rom President Samuel Gompers, of merican Federation of Labor Nichols of Alliance, Ohio, lewing the attitude of Charles, E. lughes, the Republican presidential pominee, in supreme court cases in yolving the interests of labor, particularly the Danbury hatters' case.

Gompers was out of the city, but the Democratic leaders gave out the letter as having been written at the head-quarters of the American Voleration uatters of the American Federation Labor in response to a request for lughes' record.

Compers' letter reviews the Danbury hatters' case, which resulted in a un-animous decision of the supreme court in which former Justice Hughes con-curred holding the hatters of Danbury must individually pay to E. L. Lowe & Co. some \$300,000 damages under the Sherman law for the celebrated hat, ters' boycott. It also referred to the court's decision holding unconstitutional the Arizona anti-alien labor law

"In that decision," wrote Compers "Justice Hughes took the position that the injunctive process applies to perenal relations. Justice Hughes dorsed the abuse of the writ of injunction against which wage earners have correct by remedial legislation in ordi er that they might enjoy the rights and opportunities of free citizens. Even if a permanent, independent and self willed bureaucracy is coming; it has yet to be organized. The country is governed less by authoritative traditions than by a fluid and immediate public opinion, and all conditions are conspiring to confer on the president a prodigious influence on the formation of public opinion.
