TRUSTEES MAY CONTROL SALE OF SCHOOL BONDS

Austin, Tex. Sept. 23.—it is held by the attorney general's department in an opinion written by Assistant Attorney General Harris that boards of trustees of common school districts in the sale of school bonds but that the bonds of a common school district cannot be sold for less than their face value and accrue interest. It is also held that a contract for the sale of such bonds for less than par and accrued interest would be unlawful and unenforcible and a failure of such district trustees to comply with such a contract would involve no personal liability on their part. The attorney general's department had been receiving a number of inquiries on the subject.





VERNON ENROLLMENT

NEARING 900 MARK

Vernon, Texas, Sept. 22.—The enrollment in the Vernon public schools since last week has grown from 834 to 889, this without an effort to put into operation the Compulsory Education Law.

The Holcomb Training School has reached an enrollment of nearly 100, which added to the public school enrollment, accounts for nearly 1,000 school children in Vernon. If one will only take the trouble to ride over the city, he can find children in all quarters who have not as yet started to school, while quite a number of tamliles have left the city for the country and have their children in the cotton fields to return later in the fall and enter the schools in town.

The City School Board, following the example of the County Board of Education, has decided to postpone the enforcement of the compulsory feature of the school law until January first, 1917, as there will remain ample time after that for the minimum requirement which, for the first year, is only sixty days, At that time the schools will doubtless be overrun, and all the schools will experience some difficulty in caring for all who apply for admission.
