There is one concern in Wichita Falls which will be in very little danger of fire loss when it completes installation of what is known as the Grinneil Fire Extinguisher system which automatically puts out fires. This firm is carroll-Brough-Robinson & Gates which has installed this system at a cost of \$7,000, but the insurance rates will be lowered 75 per cent and in this way alone the system will be paid for in about five years, besides furnishing ample protection at all times.

The system is of the dry pipe kind and has pipes with sprinkler valves es-ery den feet throughout the building. In case of a fire in any part of the building, the heat melts one of these building, the heat melts one of these sprinkler valves which automatically shuts off the air pressure and in this way turns the water from the city mains into the building and sprinkles over the place where the valves are open. 


