VON MACKENSEN FORCE NOW WITHIN 35 MILES OF CAPITAL AND TWO IMPORTANT CITIES ARE CAPTURED BY INVADERS

Hints Given of British Drive at New Point—Berlin Announces Repulse of Strong Entente Attack on Monastir

The Associated Press summarizes European war operations as follows:
Two important announcements are made by Berlin today, in reporting progress of the Teutonic invasion of Roumania, the capture of Giurgiu on the Danube, and the taking of Cartes de Arges on the Argechu river, 80 miles northwest of the capital.

The capture of Giurgiu places Von Mackensen's army, advancing from the southwest, only 37 miles from Bucharest, with a railroad running thence.





The ideal way is to dig out the bed to a depth of two feet or more, and, if drainage is imperfect at must be provided for by puttin broken brick or gravel in bottom of bed about 6 inches them. Fill in with a mixture of soil deep. Fill in with a mixture of soil and manure, mixed about one-half good rich soil, although splendid roses can be grown by spading any good, well drained soil to the depth of 12 inches and mixing with 6 inches of well-rot ted stable manure. Many attempts to get good results from roses fall for want of proper care in preparing the soil and planting. After the soil is settled, it should be about an inch beow the level of the adjacent surface half feet wide, which enables you to pick the blooms without stepping on

When field-grown roses are received and the roots seem dry, soak them in tuke warm water or thin mud for a few hours before planting. Roses are great feeders and must be supplied with ample fertilizer and water. When watering roses soak them thoroughly: a light sprinkle of water does more harm than good.
