





Paris.—France will make her first organized effort to attract tourist trade when peace is restored.

The war made French people appreciate fully for the first time how many persons of means had been in the habit of hurrying to Paris from all corners of the world. No effort was made to induce them to come, because the magnetic attraction of the town alone sufficed; but since they have awakened to see many other things, the French have looked into this question of touring and have found that some 300,000 Russians were in the habit of rusticating in Germany and Austria where they left each year the equivalent of more than a billion francs. Eight hundred thousand persons visited the 113 seaside resorts of the Baltic and the North Sea in 1913.
