





A piece of metal fed to it comes out as a side frame. It can make 20000 of these in an eight hour day. Other mighty machines stamp out radiator shells, fenders, cowl dashes and doors. You take off your hat to the drop forging machines. Down comes the hammer and the fiery piece of iron is beating machines. Down comes the hammer and the fiery piece of iron is beaten into shape. The complete drop forging of the front axle can be accomplished with one heat. Every kind of partrequiring strength was drop forged while we looked on, axles, crank shafts, brake assembly rods, brake and control rods, spring shackles, gear blanks and brake rod sectors.

We saw the company's accurate system of die making. It calls for a special workman on each detail. One works on the shaper, another on the planer and a third on die sinking. The multiple spindle drill in one operation drills all the holes in the front axle. This is a guarantee that each will be in right

It was hard to drag us away from the automatic turret lathe that surfaces and finishes fly wheels. It works as though somewhere within its metal vitals a brain was con cealed. The workman has only to put on the rough fly wheel, adjust the first set of tools, push the lever, and let the machine do the rest.

The cast iron is peeled off as rapidas wax. Sometimes four or five operations are performed at once. When one set of cuitings is done, the machine



One of the greatest boons possible for Wichita and adjoining counties would be the breaking up of 100 of the largest farms into 500 or more smaller ones, said J. L. McConkey secretary of ones, said J. L. McConkey secretary of the District Farmers Union yesterday afternoon. Mr. McConkey was discuss-ing the meeting to be held at the Chamber of Commerce rooms next Sat-urday for the purpose of forming a pool to take tdvantage of the Federal Farm Loan set pool to take to Farm Loan act

In Mr McConkey's opinion the farm loan act will provide the cheap money which will make possible the breaking up of many of the larger farms.

"There is no doubt,' he said, "that farmors in this section are trying to cultivate too much land. The result that the crops are not as intensive cultivated as should be the case ly cultivated as should be the case, the income is no more than would be the case with a smaller acreage and more careful cultivation, and the expense is larger. To put it in other words, the attempt to cultivate too much land simply results in an avoidable waste. Then, besides that we need more farms and the more people that they would make room for in the county."





# VERY LITTLE SO FAR

Agricultural Agent Campbell and Chamber of Commerce Expect To Build Up Industry

Efforts to greatly increase the acreage in peanuts in Wichita county will age in peanuts in Wichita county will be made during the early part of the coming year by J. W. Campbell, county demonstration agent and officials of the Chamber of Commerce. Although this crop has been proved to be unusually well suited to the climate and soil of Wichita county and to assure the farmer of a prefitable return when other crops will verge on failure, the acreage put in peanuts in the county last year was so small in the county last year was so small as to be negligible. The acreage was probably under 100 acres for the whole county and most of this was grazed off. However a few demonstration plots under Mr. Campbell's direction corver to show the most billion of the serve to show the possibility of the crop in this county. On these plots the yields ran from 40 to 90-bushels to the acre, and as the goobers have a market value of from \$1.10 to \$1.25

a market value of from \$1.10 to \$1.25 per bushel the money possibilities of the crop can readily be seen. Besides the gooders raised an average of three quarters of a ton of hay to the acre is produced, the hay having a market value of \$12 to \$14 per ton.

Heretofore the objections interposed by farmers when urged to put land in peanuts have been the inability to get the right kind of seed, lack of familiarity with the cultivation of the crop, and remoteness from a market together with lack of understanding of marketing conditions for this ing of marketing conditions for this crop. The removal of each and all of these difficulties is the purpose of the Chamber of Commerce. The cot-Chamber of Commerce. The cot-seed oil mills of Wichita Falls and vicinity stand ready to put in a press to enable them to make oil and cake from the peanuts as soon as they are assured of a production which would justify the putting in of

this machinery.

The Chamber of Commerce plan embraces the formation of a peanut club, or a number of clubs in various parts of the county, the members to contract among themselves to plant so much of the crop, and as a body agree to deliver their product at the prevailing market price to some cot ton oil mill on the consideration that mills.
