



HOME ECONOMICS PLANS FURTHERED

Chamber of Commerce To Aid in Bringing Experts—Membership Campaign Discussed

Plans for a three days home economic program here in March with experts and lecturers from the State University to conduct it, were furthered this morning when the Chamber of Commerce directors agreed to bear a part of the expense. A number of the women's clubs of the city have also consented to the fund and a sufficient amount is in sight to make it fairly certain that the program will be carried out, though perhaps not on as elaborate a scale as was at first planned.

As outlined, the program will include lectures, cooking demonstrations, lessons in household economics and similar features by members of the faculty of the Home Welfare Department of the State University. It is also hoped to be able to bring Dr. Herman James of the University here for four lectures in connection with the program. Dr. James has a nation wide reputation as an authority on civic questions.

The plan has the endorsement of the Civic League and ten of the women's clubs of the city and with the assistance of the Chamber of Commerce will probably be carried out early in March. A proposition from E. C. McCarty of the McKean Service Company of Indianapolis, Ind., for the organization of the Chamber of Commerce was discussed at some length by the directors, but the proposition did not seem to arouse special interest, the directors appearing rather to favor the reorganization plan worked out by Secretary B. F. Johnson. Final action was postponed however until Mr. Johnson returns. Mr. McCarty's plan embodies the

REGULAR WINTER HITS THIS MORNING

Blue Norther Hits Town Early, Today and Makes Bad Shopping Weather.

Pearless weather is provided today for folks who didn't do their Christmas shopping early. Following the arrival of the norther which hit Wichita Falls at four o'clock this morning the thermometer tumbled 47 degrees in three hours, according to the recording thermometer at Arts, dropping from 65 to 18, at which point it stood at 7:30. A cold piercing wind sweeping down from the plains added to the sharpness of the weather which was the more disagreeable from having followed a period of comparatively moderate temperature. Low temperatures and high winds were generally reported throughout Northwestern Texas, while points in Western Oklahoma along the Northwestern reported zero weather. Texline and Dalhart reported temperatures of 10 degrees at 10 o'clock this morning; Amarillo 11, Quanah 13, Stanford 23, Abilene 24, Soper 28, Pecos, Okla., 7 below zero; Woodward, Okla., 2 below zero; Elk City, Okla., zero. The only precipitation reported was a light snow in the country around Texline and Dalhart. All reports stated that temperatures were on a slight rise.

Tomorrow Shortest Day of This Year; 10 Hours Daylight

Tomorrow, December 21, marks the entry of the sun into the winter solstice and will have the shortest day-light period of the year; the daylight hours have been gradually shortening since September 22, when the dark and light periods were equal and from now on will gradually lengthen until March 21, the vernal equinox.

The sun will rise tomorrow shortly after seven a. m., and five o'clock will bring sunset, so that there will be a bare ten hours of daylight for this section. The entry of the sun into the winter solstice means the beginning of real winter, which may shock some Wichitans who had an idea that winter had already started.

SWISS GOVERNMENT PUTS LIMIT ON SALE OF BREAD

By Associated Press. Berne, Switzerland, Dec. 20.—The Swiss government has decided to prohibit the sale or consumption of new bread in order to economize the stock of cereals. According to official figures Switzerland has purchased since the beginning of the war 340,000,000 francs worth of American wheat but it is considered certain that it will be impossible to import such quantities in the future.

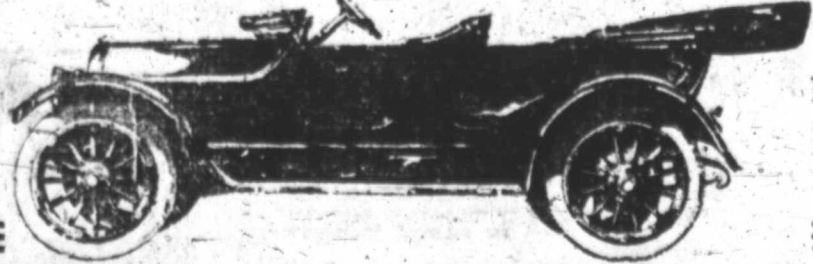

GAS TROUBLES ARE FEWER THIS YEAR

Improvement in Domestic Service Results From Cutting off of Factories

No staking of natural gas pressure for Wichitans has so far been in evidence since cold weather began, and the service by both companies has, generally speaking, been better than last year when the industrial plants were pulling heavily upon the supply from the Petrolia field.

The absence of any trouble is due to the fact that domestic consumers are getting all the gas for their ranges and heaters, not having to divide the supply up with the pipe lines so far, only one minor break being reported several weeks ago.

That Wichitans are much better off in this regard than folks in some other natural gas regions is indicated by reports from Kansas, Ohio, Pennsylvania and West Virginia, where the supply is running too short for even domestic consumption.

BASEBALL TALK IS AGAIN BEING HEARD

Report That Denison Franchise is To Be Sold Arouses Local Fans' Hopes

The report that the Denison baseball franchise in the Western association was to be placed on the market before next season has caused local fans to do some figuring as to the prospects for Wichita Falls' getting a berth in that circuit. No action has been taken as yet, but it is probable that some definite steps toward attempting to reacquire the franchise will be taken if it is found that it is to be had at a price that would enable Wichita Falls to handle it profitably.

This city has been without a league team since 1912, when its franchise in the Texas-Oklahoma League was surrendered. Ever since that time local fans have been looking forward to the time when professional baseball could be brought back here. The announcement of the probable sale of the Denison franchise was made in a Denison dispatch to the Dallas News, as follows:

The Denison baseball club of the Western Association will be offered for sale after the first of the year. It was announced here tonight, following a meeting to discuss the future of the organization. Lack of sufficient support on the part of the patrons is assigned as the principal reason for putting the club on the market.

Stouffer and Ardmore, both Oklahoma points, have been mentioned as possible purchasers. Secretary Chaffee of the local club said the Oklahoma cities or any other place can have an option on the franchise, players and accompanying outfit.

The club has fourteen players. Denison has been in professional ball five years and has won three pennants.

Preparations have been under way for the enjoyment of the park. At a meeting of fans last week expressions indicated much interest in the club for the coming year but failure of many fans to answer the call for tonight's meeting resulted in the decision of the owners to sell out.

An effort will be made to complete the deal before the meeting next month at Muskogee to arrange the 1917 schedule for the Western Association.

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to accept it against their will and to compel them to carry on their local government and select their representatives in the national government in conformity with the opinions of other states who are in favor of woman suffrage. I think such an attempt is contrary to the principles of liberty upon which the American union was established and without which it cannot endure.

Without the right of local self-government we should lose the better part of our liberty. This country is so vast the difference in climate, in physical characteristics, in capacity for production, in predominant industry, and in the resultant habits of living and thinking are so great that there are such necessarily wide differences of views as to the right of local self-government as to be subject to the dictation of the vast multitude of voters living in other parts of the country, would create a condition of intolerable tyranny and would strip the power of the nation to bring about that condition would be to make the nation an instrument of tyranny. It is to be argued that this would ultimately destroy the nation.

The one exercise of national power over suffrage to prevent discrimination against the black race was made and justified only upon the same grounds which justified the war and the emancipation proclamation and for the time being destroyed all local government in the existing states. It establishes no precedent and justifies no attempt at control upon a less terrible and compelling cause.

SANTA FE TO LET NEW CONTRACT SOON

Will Build From Shattuck Into Panhandle Plains in Near Future

Announcement has been made that the Santa Fe Electric Company will see the awarding of contracts to build the long-talked-of Shattuck line of the Santa Fe from Shattuck, Oklahoma into the Texas North Plains counties of Lipscomb, Ochiltree and Hansford. These counties, although described as an ideal agricultural and stock raising section, have heretofore been overlooked in railroad development. The coming of the Santa Fe will do much to develop the possibilities of these counties. The new line will be 82 miles long, running a point near Hansford, county seat of the county of that name, and will pass through Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties. A total of 12 miles of siding will be built, 2,000,000 cubic yards of excavations will be necessary, 2,800 lineal feet of trestle building and 400 feet of steel building will be done.

Actual construction of the new line is expected to follow closely the awarding of the contract. Immense land holdings have been acquired in this section—the Santa Fe Colonization Company, a company composed in a large part of officers of the Santa Fe railroad. This company has been buying land in that country for the past year or more. The acquisition of land in considerable bodies by this company has come to be taken as a certain forecast of contemplated building operations by the Santa Fe road, and their advent into the realty market in the North Plains proving no exception to the rule gave rise to rumors of the coming of the Santa Fe and brought about a really boom such as that country had never known. The colonization company is said to own more than a thousand sections of land in Ochiltree county alone.

A Katy line south from Orehart to Hansford has been talked of in connection with the Santa Fe Shattuck line, but so far no definite announcement in regard to this project has emanated from Katy sources. As it is the Wichita Falls & Northwestern which will have a tap on the new line by reason of its connection with the Santa Fe at Woodward, should handle quite a bit of business originating on the new Santa Fe line by reason of being the short line on traffic south of Texas points.

Contracts for another Santa Fe line, 64 miles long, from Lubbock to a point southwest of Brownfield, Terry county will also be awarded at the same time as that for the Shattuck line. This line is one of half dozen projects radiating from Lubbock over the South Plains country of west Texas and into New Mexico.

INSURANCE RATE REDUCTION LIKELY

Will Be Granted Unless Losses For Rest of This Year are \$15,000 or Over

With only 11 days remaining before the end of the year, and a margin of about \$15,000 insurance loss still to play on to secure their record, it is certain that only a catastrophe can prevent the Wichita Falls fire insurance rates for the coming year. Should the year end without further insurance loss greater than \$15,000 it will be the third year in which the insurance losses have been less than five per cent of the premiums collected in the city, which will entitle the city to the reduction.

Although this year's loss in comparison with the two preceding years, has been unusually low, the number of fires the local department has been called on to fight this year was far higher than in any previous year in the history of the department. That the loss was kept to the low level that it has been testifies to the prompt and efficient work they have done in fighting the fires during the year.

WANT LEGISLATION FOR CLEAN COTTON

Law To Be Asked To Prevent Putting Foreign Matter in Cotton and Seed

Both the Farmers Union and the commercial associations of this and other cities of the state are planning to back legislation which is to be introduced at the next session of the legislature which will complement the pure food legislation by requiring cotton seed and similar products to be free from foreign adulterants.

An instance of the harm which might arise from this source and which the proposed bill will stop was cited recently by J. L. McConkey, secretary of the district Farmers Union in the case of a car of cotton seed which was found to be mixed with rock and coal enough to ruin most of the machinery in the local cotton seed factory of the Farmers Union.

The man who mixes rock and coal with his cotton seed, or allows impurities to get in his cotton, probably imagines that he is making money thereby. He does not. But the same one time the buyer will make allowances for this condition and the dishonest dealer will lose at his own game. But legislation which would stop these practices would make for much better conditions all around.

Enforce Ordinance as to Fireworks Within Fire Limits

Attention is called by Fire Chief McClure to the fact that the shooting of fireworks, Roman candles and other fireworks within the fire limits of the city is against a city ordinance and is punishable by law. Police officials declare that they intend to strictly enforce this ordinance and protect property owners in the congested districts from the fire limits from this source of fire danger. The fire limits takes in practically all of the business section where even small blazes is a source of grave danger.

PLANS CHANGE IN TAXING OF AUTOS

Representative-Elect Greenwood May Introduce Bill at Coming Session

E. R. Greenwood, the new representative from the Wichita-Wilbarney legislative district, is contemplating the introduction of an automobile bill at the coming session of the legislature. Mr. Greenwood has introduced his draft of the measure but expects to provide for abolition of county and city licenses and for a state license. The proceeds of which will be used for road improvement on a systematic basis.

WILD DUCK FEEDING IS HIS LIFE WORK

Wisconsin Man's Theory Might Easily Be Applied at Lake Wichita

Wichitans who want to make Lake Wichita still more popular as a duck hunting resort can do so by planting ducks at the lake. This is the statement of Clyde B. Terrell of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, who is now in Texas and who has made the feeding wild ducks his life work. Local duck hunters who have learned he was in the state have expressed regret that it was not known sooner, so that arrangements might have been made for bringing him here. A recent article in the Dallas News described Mr. Terrell's work. It follows:

To have been known as the leading authority in the country on the feeding of wild ducks since the age of 16 years is the unique distinction of Clyde B. Terrell of Oshkosh, Wis., now a famous naturalist at the age of 22 years. Mr. Terrell has planted hundreds of duck foods as far north as the Hudson Bay and as far south as Florida. He is now in Texas to advise the members of several hunting clubs how they can bring flocks of wild ducks to their lakes.

Mr. Terrell has lived all his life on his father's farm just outside of Oshkosh. As soon as he was large enough to walk he went to the lakes and marshes to watch the habits of the water fowl. While living concealed in grass one day he observed that the ducks ate only one kind of plant. From the simple discovery he has developed a life vocation, a profitable business and scientific investigations that have received the endorsement of the Bureau of Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture.

retary of the club. He also spoke at the club's annual banquet. Before planting any seeds, Mr. Terrell always makes a complete inspection of the lakes, streams, marshes and ponds or the premises. He tests the water and soil; he lists the vegetation now growing; he finds out what duck foods are best adapted to the soil and what kinds of ducks are best suited to the place. After a careful plan has been drawn up, Mr. Terrell plants the seeds himself.

The theory upon which Mr. Terrell proceeds is a very simple one, which sums up as follows: "Ducks must eat live. Ducks will swarm to the spots where there is something they can eat. Therefore if you want ducks, plant something for them to eat."

"Go to any of the famous hunting grounds," said Mr. Terrell, "such as Great South Bay New York; the Chesapeake Bay, Back Bay, Virginia, or the lakes and marshes of Central Wisconsin, and you will find that there is something that attracts the ducks and makes it possible for them to stay there."

while wild celery is a food of the diving or deep-water ducks, like the canvasbacks, redheads and bluebills. A wide variety of foods are recommended for attracting various kinds of waterfowl.

There are a few plants, chief of them being the duck potato or wapato, which are eagerly sought for by practically all ducks of both marsh and diving species, as well as by many varieties of wild geese and other waterfowl. Fishermen are also interested in wild celery, as many kinds of game fish feed on the tender leaves and shoots. It also furnishes shelter and breeding places for the fish and aquatic insects are abundant around these plants.

Although some of the necessary funds were contributed from other sources, the marines stationed in the continental posts were first to answer the appeal, and it is largely through the latter's efforts that their over the sea brothers will receive remembrances at Christmas time.

**SEVERAL TALKS
ON GOOD ROADS**

MEETING OF WICHITA COUNTY MOTOR CLUB IS HELD TUESDAY NIGHT

J. A. KEMP THANKED

Appreciation of His Recent Gift is Voiced—Membership Campaign is Postponed

As soon as it flashed over the wires that this little county of Wichita has voted \$700,000 for good roads, every nickel worth of property in the county will have an enhanced value of at least twenty-five per cent said Bert Bean, speaking in the Wichita County Motor Club at their semi-monthly luncheon at the St. James last night. Mr. Bean, while discussing the advantages of good roads to the small towns, also made an earnest appeal for the general advantages of a good roads system. In summing-up the advantages of the good roads system to the small towns he pointed out that it widens the territory of the small town merchant, brings him into touch with the outside world, brings the salesman to whom he has previously been inaccessible to his door with products which will prove of advantage to him and his community and is one of the chief factors in the development of the town in attracting travel, the traveling public being enabled to see opportunities existing in a place and thus attracted as permanent settlers. Mr. Bean also remarked that the small town merchant suffers more than any other from the ravages of the mail order business, and asserted that the farmer would not so frequently pick out an article from a mail order catalogue if he had good roads to travel on to his trading place.

In discussing the cost of the proposed bond issue Mr. Bean pointed out that the average cost of \$44,000 per year, which pays the interest and creates a sinking fund for the retiring of the bonds, figures out at approximately 1 1/2 per cent. He contrasted this with the 8 per cent rate paid by business men for money with which to carry on their business, in addition to which they have to pay the principal back. The latter is a profitable transaction for the business man. Mr. Bean fails to see how the other could fail to be more so for the county.

"Just as a chain is no stronger than its weakest link, so is a road no better than its worst spot," declared Mr. Bean, referring to the necessity of cooperation in road building. In other words it would do Wichita county little good to build good roads in the adjoining counties did not do likewise. However he declared his belief to be that the people of this county need have no fear of this being firmly convinced that a road built from the Clay county line to the Wilbarger county line or across the county in other directions would automatically bring about the building of good roads by the people of those counties after a little travel over the good roads.

As an illustration of his first point to the effect that the building of better roads follows closely after civilization Mr. Bean mentioned the first effort of this kind made in Wichita Falls soon after the organization of its first council, a volunteer organization whose members served without compensation.

"A ten dollar mayor and a one dollar council," Mr. Bean described this body of which he was a member. "Soon after our organization we sent Jim Aye out to buy a team to work on the streets. I well remember the pair of black mares he bought. I saw one of them in use by the sanitary department the other day. But the point that I wanted to make was that with the appearance of these horses on the streets marked the beginning of Wichita county's effort to lift itself out of the mud of which the present good roads effort is merely another and more advanced phase."

On account of the holiday rush it was decided to postpone the club membership campaign until some time early in January. As the next meeting would fall on January 2 it was decided to postpone it a week and hold it on January 9. At this meeting membership committees and others which will have charge of the various branches of the club's activities will be announced.

Active work toward bringing about of the good roads bond election is contemplated by the campaign executive committee soon after the first of the year, according to the statement of Chairman C. W. Reid.

The gift of a library to Wichita Falls by J. A. Kemp, was mentioned by President Reid as the biggest thing that this big man has ever done, in calling for a resolution of appreciation of Mr. Kemp's public spirit. The motion made by Dr. Wade Walker was unanimously adopted by the club. Mr. Reid also referred to the movement for the presentation of a loving cup to Mr. Kemp and urged the members to take an interest in this movement.

W. R. Cotton drew the prize, a pair of squirrel lined driving gloves donated by McTurkians, J. W. Bradley and C. A. Hinderliter were secured as new members last night.

A belief that the farmers of the county were as much in favor of the good roads as the people living in the towns, and realized as fully their value as an enhancement of their land values and affording quick transportation for their products to market was expressed by Dr. Wade Walker. Dr. Walker said that he had talked to scores of farmers on this proposition and so far had found only one farmer who was opposed to the proposition.

A concerted effort of every member of the club will be necessary to carry the bond election, said Judge Edgar Scarry. Judge Scarry pointed out that what was everybody's business was nobody's business, but that if each member of the club would make it his own business to work for this proposition as faithfully as he would for himself were he a candidate for office he was certain that the bond issue would carry hands down.

TO REORGANIZE POULTRY ASSOCIATION TONIGHT

Both members of the old North Texas Poultry Association and others who are interested either as amateurs or professionals in the growing of pure bred poultry are invited to the meeting for reorganization of the association which is to take place at the Chamber of Commerce rooms at 7-30. Officers and directors of the above for the coming year will be elected tonight and plans for next year's show gone into. Although only in its third year the association has shown remarkable growth and its annual show takes rank as one of Texas' big poultry gatherings.
