for the twelve federal farm loan
banks.

Texas is the only state that com-rises an entire district of the twelve incounced by the farm loan board to ay. The other districts comprise rom four to nine states each.

"In determining the federal land bank districts, and in designating the cities within such districts where federal land banks shall be located." the orficial announcement says, "the federal farm lean board has given careful consideration to the farm loan need of the country. The board held public hearings in nearly every state in the union and in this manner collected information of great value in

The banks will be established as soon as practicable. Under the law each will have a capital of \$750,000. Applications for loans have been pouring into the board in great volume recently and it is estimated that a sum more than 20 times in excess of the combined capital stock could be used in making loans. used in making loans.

CONGRESSIONAL RETURNS SHOW PANHANDLE AND NORTH-WEST FAR IN LEAD

FIGURES COMPARED

More Than Twice as Many Votes As In Some East and South Texas Districts

The thirteenth congressional district of Texas, which includes Northwest Texas and the Panhandle, is by far the most populous in the State, judging from the completed returns from the November election, showing a much larger vote polled for Marvin Jones, congressman-elect, than for any other of the Texas delegation save those elected at larger.

elected at large.

This condition is due to the rapid increase in population in Northwest
Texas and the Panhandle since 1900, when the last congressional redistricting bill was passed. It may be taken as indicating the urgent need for another redistricting measure.


