THE PHONE LINES into Washington D.C. were clogged with 500,000 calls last week as half a million people called in, five to one against the President's proposal for lifting the ban on gays in the military.

Probably as big as the gay issue, is the question "Will the people's voice make a difference?" During election campaigns, the politicos are vitally interested in the opinion of us common folks. But we usually notice a big difference in attitude once they've gotten settled into those plush Washington offices. The opinion changes almost immediately from. . . "We invite your input on these issues" to ... "We experts are the only ones qualified to make the decisions."

A good example of this is the answer given by Texas State Senator Temple Dickson to a constituent who complained to him about a piece of proposed legislation. Dickson replied "You don't seem to have enough sense for me Jan. 11, 1993) This is similar to the response that Bill and I received several years ago from Senator Lloyd Bentsen (now Secretary of the Treasury) when we were urging our elected officials NOT to give away the Panama Canal.

Most of us realize that the "gays in the military" thing is just a smokescreen to divert our attention from the fact that nothing is being done about the economy. For that matter, gays have their own smokescreen and are experts at using it. The minute the AIDS topic comes up they start screaming about being discriminated against, their civil rights being violated, and how they can't help themselves because they were born homosexual. Baloney! Masters and Johnson, the recognized experts on human sexuality, say there is no basis for the genetic theory of homosexuality. It is a learned condition.

As a patron of the arts, I have personally known some very nice gay fellows and have nothing against them as individuals. To some degree, I can understand the need for creative-type people to express themselves in a nontraditional manner as long as it does not harm others. But I am heartsick at the devastating effect the AIDS virus has had on the visual and performing arts in our society.

On a recent Donahue show, several gay people on the panel and in the audience insisted that AIDS is a heterosexual disease and has nothing to do with an individual's sexual preference. Baloney, again! True, it has drifted into the mainstream of society now, but the homosexual faction flatly refuses to accept the responsibility for bringing this plague upon us in the first

Your usual viral diseases do not pick and choose their victims according to sex. So how do you account for the fact that 90 percent of all AIDS victims are male? Could it be because your average gay guy has 50 partners a year? This amounts to nearly one each week or about 1,500 in a lifetime. That's

really spreading it around. Some AIDS victims have been refused medical insurance, admittance to hospitals, long term care, etc. Be aware that once gays are openly in the military, the care of those who contract AIDS will automatically fall under the supervision of military hospitals and the

taxpayers will be paying the bills. Even without AIDS, the gay faction, which amounts to only two percent of the U.S. population, accounts for 80 percent of all the other cases of sexually transmitted veneral diseases. And these are the people who are demanding that we "average" folks accept them without bias, recognize their so-called "marriages," let them serve openly in the military, and allow them to adopt children so they can have "families." Get real!

I think we'd better keep those Washington phone lines very busy!



## Tongates See Super Bowl At Pasadena

At least two couples in the Friona area attended the Super Bowl last weekend in Pasadena, California.

Jason and Jill Grimsley were among the 98,374 fans who watched the Dallas Cowboys manhandle the Buffalo Bills, 52-17. and bring the pro football title back to the state of Texas, where most folks feel it "rightly belongs."

Tongate, a Cowboy fan for the past 30 years, says the trip to watch the Cowboys perform in the NFL's post-season classic was "The chance of a lifetime."

Tongate's sister, Ginger Perkins, who lives in Beverly Hills, California, just "down the road" from the Rose Bowl, site of the game, secured tickets for him and his wife, and was responsible for the longtime Friona resident getting to see his first Super Bowl game in person.

"She called me before the Cowboys played the Forty-Niners in San Francisco, and tried to get us to come out for that game. She could have gotten tickets for it, but we decided against it. When Dallas beat San Francisco, she wouldn't take 'no' for an answer," Tongate

Perkins had one line available for tickets, but lost it when her company offered them to Japanese businessmen. So, she managed to buy four tickets at a silent auction.

"She wouldn't tell us how much they cost her. All we had to do was fly out there," said Tongate, assistant manager at Friona Wheat Growers.

Tongate said the sister is about as big a "sports nut" as he is, having season tickets to the Los Angeles Raider games, and is also a season-ticket holder for a hockey team. She is associated with Fox Studios in Burbank.

Tongate said he was impressed with the view of the field at the Rose Bowl.

"Our tickets indicated that we would be on about the 30-yard line. But the seats are placed in at an angle. I thought we were about even with the seven-yard line, but you could see the entire field. We could see scoring at both ends of the field," he said.

Making their plans to go on a fairly last-minute basis, the Tongates got a flight to Los Angeles from Lubbock on Saturday evening. The first return flight available didn't come up until noon Pacific time on Tuesday. "And everyone on the flight had been to the Super Bowl game," Tongate

The Tongates said that virtually everyone at the game had on either their Dallas Cowboys or Buffalo Bills T-Shirts and caps, so it was not difficult to tell which team a person was rooting for.

### Screening For Older Drivers

When older drivers have auto accidents, the reason is often what they can--or can't--see. A recent study found that older drivers with a restricted useful field of vision (UFOV) are three to four times more likely to have auto accidents--and 15 times more likely to have accidents in intersections.

The UFOV is the visual space in which a person can respond quickly to visual stimuli, such as an oncoming car. Researchers measured the subjects' UFOV with a visual attention analyzer, a computerized instrument that tests how fast the person sees something and reacts to it. The screening accurately identified risk and non-risk drivers in nearly 85 per cent of cases.

Interesting result: many of the subjects who had "failed" the UFOV test had no record of reported accidents. Researchers suggest that older drivers with vision problems modify their driving habits, avoiding heavy traffic, night driving and such.

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## Recipes Grapefruit

By CARLA McKEOWN

One of my most fond Christmas morning memories is of Santa Claus left beside the tree every year. We would eat grapefruit for weeks, it seemed.

I still enjoy a fresh and tangy grapefruit sprinkled with just a touch of sugar. Of course, even as children, we learned that the prized grapefruit were Texas Rudy Reds.

The red grapefruit originated in Texas. Today, there are several varieties of Texas red grapefruit, including the Rio Star and the Ruby-Sweet.

low in calories. A typical red grapefruit has 37 calories, and each half provides 78 per cent of the U.S. Recommended Daily Allowance of Vitamin C. Grapefruit also is a good source of Vitamin A, potassium and dietary fiber.

When measuring grapefruit, 2 oranges, peeled and sectioned keep in mind that one medium grapefruit equals 2/3 cup juice, 1 cup bite-sized pieces, 10-12 sections, or 3-4 tablespoons grated peel. To get the most juice from a temperature and roll it gently before

To section a grapefruit, cut off the ends of the grapefruit with a sharp, thin-bladed knife. Place the fruit flat side down and cut away the peel from top to bottom along the curve of the fruit. Remove all the white pulp. Cut down along one section to the center. Then, turn the knife sideways to loosen the section and lift out. Other sections will be easy to remove.

When buying grapefruit, look for well-shaped, heavy fruit that is springy to the touch. Avoid grapefruit which is soft or dis- 1-9 inch crumb crust colored at the end.

Although fresh grapefruit eaten with a serrated spoon for breakfast the huge bags of grapefruit that is probably the most popular method of eating the citrus fruit, grapefruit can be used in a variety of recipes and can be eaten hot as dessert. Try the following recipes:

BROILED GRAPEFRUIT 1 grapefruit

Brown sugar

Butter or margarine, softened Cut grapefruit in half. Cut sections from membrane, leaving them in place. Cut out core and remove seeds. Sprinkle each half with a little brown sugar and dot Grapefruit are nutritious and with butter. Broil for 10 minutes or until golden brown and heated through.

grapefruit juice 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin 1/2 cup water 1 grapefruit

Prepare the crust and chill until ready to use. Blend the cottage cheese and yogurt in a blender or food processor until very smooth. Add the lemon juice, sugar and grapefruit juice; blend again until well mixed. In a small saucepan, sprinkle the gelatin over the water and let it stand until softened, about 1 minute. Stir over low heat until gelatin is completely dissolved, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and let cool to lukewarm. Add the gelatin mixture to the cheese mixture and mix well. Chill until thickened. Beat with a rotary beater or elecric mixer for 1 minute. Pour into the crumb crust and chill until firm. Separate a peeled grapefruit into sections and remove the membrane. After the cheesecake is firm, arrange the grapefruit sections in an attractive pattern on the top. Sprinkle with additional crumbs.

### MINT-GRAPEFRUIT SORBET

2/3 cup sugar 2-3 large pink grapefruit, peeled and sections, membranes removed, divided

5 tablespoons white creme de menthe

1/4 cup water Mint leaves, for garnish

Combine the sugar, grapefruit, creme de menthe and water in the bowl of a food processor or blender the puree into a shallow glass dish and place it in the freezer for 12-24 hours or until frozen solid. Transfer the frozen fruit mixture to the food processor and process on a

pulse setting until it is smooth. Return the mixture to the dish and re-freeze for 1 to 1-1/2 hours. Remove the dish from the freezer and let stand at room temperature for about 10 minutes before serving to allow it to soften slightly. Scoop out small balls and serve in bowls with a grapefruit section and a sprig of mint leaves. Makes 8 servings.

1 cup sugar 2 tablespoons cornstarch 1-3/4 cup water

Pinch of salt 1-3 ounce package strawberry gelatin

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

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



Of course, way back then, we called them Sears-Roebuck catalogs and they were very important in our homes. We may have spent as much time looking at the "wish book," as we said then, as present day children do watching television.

I vividly remember the anticipation we felt each fall and spring when we knew the catalogs would soon show up in our mail

Not only did we enjoy looking at them and ordering necessities from them, we made good use of them in many other ways. For family use, many of them found their way to the outhouse as soon as they were out of date.

This reminds me of a joke I heard many years ago. It went like this: An uneducated man wrote a letter reading, "Dear Sears-Roebuck, please send me some toilet paper."

Soon he received this reply, "Look on page 1001 of our current catalog and send us a number for the merchandise you need and we

will send it to you." His final letter read: "Dear Sears-Roebuck, if I had your catalog, I wouldn't need your toilet paper."

In addition to selecting toys from them for Santa to bring, many children spent hours playing with paper dolls which had been cut from

the pages. In fact, I don't remember that my older sister and I ever had any other kind of paper dolls, except plain ones we made. However, I do remember that our younger sisters had factory-made ones.

Another way they were used to a good advantage was by making risers for young children to sit upon at the table. A fall or summer catalog--one of the large ones--was very often covered with used denim, bed ticking or other substanial material for purpose.

Then, too, many times the pages served as guides for pioneer homemakers who were piecing quilts. By sewing scraps of fabric onto a square or other selected shape, they were able to make uniform blocks. After the blocks had been pieced and stripped together, the paper was easily torn


