
\$4,000,000 LOSS CAUSED BY FIRE IN SHELL PLANT



SEES DANGER IN HUDSPETH BILL

ITS PASSAGE WOULD STOP RAIL-ROAD BUILDING. SAYS FRANK KELL.

PENDING RATE CASE

Relation of Legislation to Shreveport Controversy Is Pointed Out By Wichitan.

Should Senate bill 219 at Austin be enacted into a law it will prove a disastrous blow to hopes of railroad extension in the state, and especially in Northwest Texas where railroads are most vitally needed, said Frank Kell Saturday. Mr. Kell spoke of the measure recently introduced by Sena-tor Hudspeth, which substantially gives the attorney general power to forfeit the charter of railroads acting under the rulings of the interstate commerce commission as against those of the Texas commission without giving them a chance to defend their position in the courts as is the case with any other litigant.

ate attempt to coerce the railroads into a certain attitude without giving them the right to defend their position in the courts. "BLUE LAWS FOR TEXAS"

"It would seem that there are enough laws on the statute books of Texas governing what people shall do or shall not do on Sunday, but some members of the present Legislature are not satisfied.

The people still persist in having a few harmless amusements on the only day in the week that many of them have for recreation, and in the eyes of a few of our great lawmakers this is most sinful. There is a bill before the Legislature to penalize practically all kinds of amusements, whether free or paid admissions.

Some individuals prefer to spend 5 or 10 cents on Sunday afternoon for a moving picture show; some go to free municipal entertainments in a big city like Houston, where we have a form of government that is charitable, sensible and humane.

All the people can not have automobiles, or clubs, or home amusements. A lot of them want to get out Sunday afternoons; some even have the audacity to go to a baseball game.

According to this proposed enactment, the people must refrain from all pleasures on Sundays. They may be permitted to go out in the woods and listen to the birds sing, but if they should happen to go to some place where there is a band playing they have committed a great sin in the eyes of these most strict and righteous law makers.

When the bill was first prepared it even made it an offense and a violation of the law for a person to buy a gallon of gasoline to keep his car running on Sunday. Then it was discovered that this was a little too drastic, consequently the ban was taken off that form of offense.

You will still be permitted to ride in your automobile and still be permitted to buy some of the fluid to keep it running, but there is very little else in the world that you can ouy or can do on Sunday if the absurd bill that is proposed should PASS.

If you happen to own an automobile you can go rushing through the streets, and you can have all kinds of joy riding. If you don't own a machine, however, you may stay at home and be thankful that you are permitted to do even that without legal interference.

Laws and more laws. Restriction and more restriction. Blue laws and purple laws. Silly laws, many of them; absurd restrictions, foolish attempts to curtail the liberties of the people, trying to force the people to be good by rules that merely induce people to violate the law. Citizens who want to be law-abiding forced to become law-breakers. Amusements that are harmless, and that frequently keep men and women from going to worse places, put under the ban.

Everything closed on Sunday, whether free for the public or paid for by the people.

If we are going to have blue laws, let us make them blue as indigo. Stop the trains from running; make it an offense to be seen in an automobile on Sunday; close the hotels and restaurants; close down the soda founduce."
