WAGGONER WELL FLOWING AT RATE OF 260 BARRELS OF SAND AT 1497 FEET

CULBERTSON TEST SOUTH OF ELECTRA AVERAGES ELEVEN BARRELS PER HOUR—MEANS OPENING NEW TERRITORY

Much Territory Under Lease and Oil Wells in Prospect—Test Is Made Late Tuesday and Well Makes Continued Flow

Flowing at the rate of ten to twelve barrels an hour, the J. W. Culbertson well on Waggoner Bros. ranch south of Electra last night recorded itself as a big producer, opening up a big stretch of country for development and pointing to the connecting of the Electra and Archer fields, between which it is on a direct line.

The top of the sand was reached at 1497 feet, and there is said to be 21 feet of oil.

The well is close to where J. C. Straus and others drilled last year and is not far from the Producers dry hole on Heaver Creek. There have been other dry holes to the north and east. Not far north is a shallow production pool but there are no deep wells nearer than Electra, about nine miles to the north.

When the well first gave indications of being a producer arrangements were made for starting other tests in the vicinity. The Thomas & Bland Oil company has let the contract for a well to the southeast, while Jack Kelly, J. C. Straus, J. L. Art, the Gulf company and others all hold favorably situated acreage in that section. Some fairly close to acreage is not under lease as yet.

The well is close to the north line of Waggoner Brothers ranch, near the Purcell & Lloyd prospect for a well. The location of the district which is on an air line between Electra and the new Archer districts, gives rise to the belief that much of the stretch of country in between will be found productive and that a material widening of the producing areas may be expected. The well is considered scarcely less important than Archer county's first producer and there is much interest in developments today.

"FOOLISHNESS" IS DAIRY EXPERTS TO SERMON SUBJECT TOUR THIS SECTION

Dr. Cross Shows Where Man's Wisdom Fails Where Not in Accord With God

The theory so often advanced that man can be saved outside the church just as well as if a church member was declared dangerous by Dr. Percy G. Cross in his sermon last night on "The Foolishness of God." "There are those who contend," said Dr. Cross, "that they can be saved outside the church just as well as in it. This contention finds no support inside the Bible. This is an age in which 'safety first' is the slogan on every side, so why not apply it to the life hereafter as well. Those who are in God's church, who have obeyed His edicts to that extent surely will have a better chance of being saved than those who have remained outside. The Bible commands those who have accepted Christ to show so by their outward bearing and deportment. To say 'I am a Christian and saved but I am not going to join the church' would be like saying 'I have life and fire insurance but I haven't any policy.' This is not according to the promises of God. You may think it foolishness, doubtless will, for before the flood the people thought Noah's act in building the ark was foolishness. But when the waters came the people who laughed at the foolishness were destroyed and Noah and his family who obeyed God were saved. There God's foolishness was proved wiser than the wisdom of men. Obey God like Noah and get on the safe side."

NO REDUCTION LIKELY IN LOCAL POLICE FORCE

DAIRY EXPERTS TO TOUR THIS SECTION

Arrangements Being Made For Visiting Towns in This City's Trade Territory

Arrangements for a tour of dairy experts through the Wichita Falls trade territory in the interest of the upbuilding of the dairy industry and an increase in the volume of dairy products shipped to local creameries are being made by A. K. Short, agricultural agent for the Fort Worth & Denver and Wichita Valley railroads. The campaign at this end of the line, as planned by Mr. Short, will be announced on the upper end of the Denver railroad being staged by the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Short, in company with R. L. Potts, A. & M. dairy expert, assigned to the work by Clarence Ombley, director of the A. & M. extension department, will visit all the towns in the upper Panhandle in the interest of the dairy campaign being put on by Amarillo during next week. They will be joined by Harmon Benton, district agricultural agent and John McLean, of the federal department of agriculture.

Mr. Short's plans are not yet matured far enough to set a date for a campaign. He will probably put the matter before the Chamber of Commerce in order to secure its cooperation in the campaign.

FEDERAL DIRECTOR OF STATIONS HERE

Is Looking Into Matter of Establishing Branch For Breeding Drouth Resisting Seed

D. A. Saunders of Greenville, director of the federal seed experiment station at that place, was a visitor here today looking into the local situation with the view of establishing a branch station for the breeding of drouth-resisting cotton and small grain seed suited to the climate of Northwest Texas. The matter of an experiment station here has been under consideration by the department for some time.

The Chamber of Commerce and local parties have exerted their influence in favor of the appropriation bill pending in Congress on a number of past occasions. While the federal appropriation for the work was cut to \$15,000 by the Senate, the bill has gone to a free conference where it is hoped that the amount will be increased. With some aid locally and an annual appropriation from the federal government, Mr. Saunders is of the opinion that the Wichita Falls station can be opened and maintained on a reasonable scale and will result in the breeding of an ideal variety of seed for Northwest Texas. The federal appropriation does not become available until July, which means that the station can not be gotten in operation until next year.
