

HOLD JOINT SESSION

County Superintendents Oppose Education Report

If Governor John Connally wanted to be remembered, then he should be pleased with the notoriety which his committee on education's report has generated.

However, in these parts at least, the notoriety is hardly what you'd think the former governor would want. But then again, Governor Connally never did give too many favors to this part of the state.

We hope that our readers will get busy and write to Governor Preston Smith, as well as Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes, Representative Bill Clayton, Senator Jack Hightower and House Speaker Gus Mutscher expressing their wishes on the school recommendations.

The recommendations, which would do away with the county's school districts as they are presently set up, are certainly not in the best interests of Parmer County. And, the method of financing the broad, sweeping educational program, which would more than double the amount of taxes paid by local taxpayers, should also get some taxpayers' attention.

Governor Smith, being a West Texan and coming from an area of the state which would be vitally affected by the compulsory consolidation of school districts, may be the only hope of the small school districts.

Smith has said he would not sign a school bill as containing all of the provisions of the committee report. But he needs moral support, and material evidence to back up his stand, in the form of hundreds, even thousands of letters in opposition to the plan and its tax structure.

Representative Clayton has also voiced his opposition to the consolidation and the tax measures. Being a native of Springlake, you'd expect that our representative would be of this opinion. Here again, however, solid support from his constituents would help his cause.

Some people think that the consolidation issue is just a "smoke screen," and that the re-vamping of the school tax structure is the real issue. They think that in the process of horse-trading, the big city politicians may do away with the consolidation in exchange for the tax increases in this area.

One thing's for sure. Under our "one man, one vote" set-up, which was instituted and policed by the Supreme Court, it is a fact of life that the metropolitan centers could impose the whole kit and kaboodle onto the lesser populated areas.

So, it may be as we have said, that the only way that the unpopular program may be thwarted will be that we are fortunate in having leaders in prominent state positions who should take the sparsely-populated areas into consideration before allowing such laws to be enacted.

The Friona's current shortage of homes is, as oldtimers are aware, no new problem. It has existed forever, which indicates, we suppose, that Friona has never "overbuilt." In checking through the 1929 volume of the Star, we see that the condition even existed 40 years ago.

A front-page item in the February 10, 1929 issue of the Star went as follows:

"The demand for dwelling houses in Friona seems unabated and the supply grows with a monotonous lack of haste. 'Every house and every available room for light house-keeping or boarding seems to be taken and the Star office is visited almost daily by persons in search of living quarters and there are none to offer.'

The above story could be repeated in this issue, 40 years later, without a single change being necessary.

It is said that an evangelist who was planning on holding a revival in a small town wrote ahead and asked for a list of those people who were especially in need of prayer.

Superintendents of Parmer County's four high schools, along with members of their school boards, went on record as opposing the major provisions of Governor Connally's committee on education report, at countywide meeting last Thursday.

The two things in the report which are the most unacceptable to county officials are the provision that schools within the county consolidate into one district, and the schedule which determines the amount of local tax money is raised to finance the program.

Under the terms of the report, Parmer County's four school districts would be forced to merge, as the report recommends that only school districts with at least 2600 en-

rollment be left alone, and that county districts be organized where enrollment fell below that figure.

The committee's plan is to provide more personnel for the enlarged districts, along with more courses, particularly in the vocational line.

In order to finance this program, school taxes paid locally would more than double within a three-year period if the proposed school bill passes the legislature.

Meanwhile, as the local district's "fund assignment" steadily increases, the amount which is received from the state will go down.

"The committee is overlooking the value of our small schools in making the consolidation recommendation," said L.F. Jacobs, superintendent of

Schools at Bovina. "In a small school, more students can participate in the various programs than are able to do so in large schools," he pointed out.

"I don't think the committee understands our problems," said Sam Barnes, Superintendent of Schools at Lazbuddie.

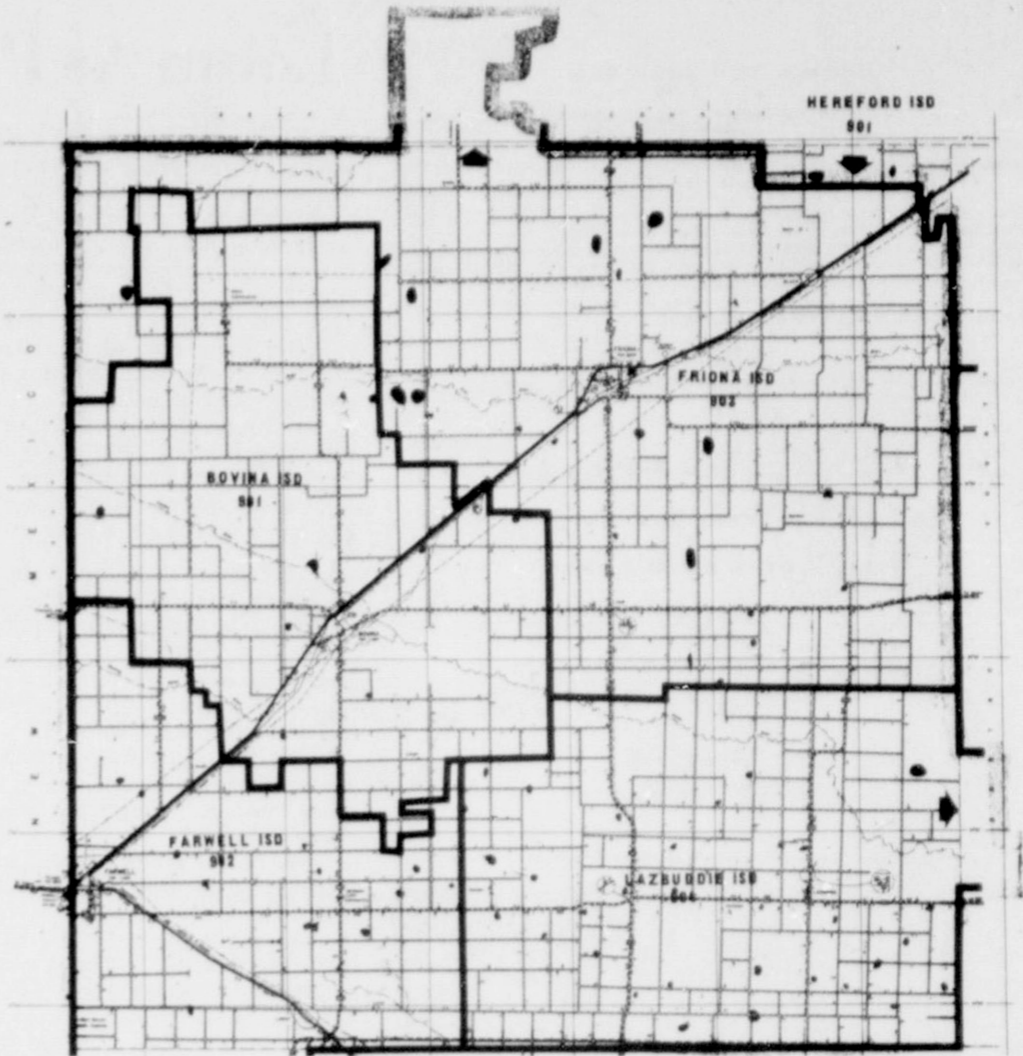
"If we're willing to provide good facilities, extra teachers, and salaries above those recommended on the state schedule, that should be a good argument against consolidation," said Alton Farr, Friona's Superintendent.

W. M. Roberts, superintendent of Farwell schools, recommended that the people write letters opposing the report to Governor Preston Smith, Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes, Senator Jack Hightower, Rep-

resentative Bill Clayton and House Speaker Gus Mutscher. Besides those provisions mentioned, the report would phase out the county superintendent position. It would put teachers on a 10-month program, with additional work days rather than extra classroom instruction.

"We need to question the committee's methods of determining the rate of the local fund assignment," one of the officials said.

Attending the meeting at Bovina's school cafeteria were members of each school's board of trustees, as well as Judge Archie Tarter, the county executive school superintendent, members of the county school board, and representatives from the county's three newspapers.

Money Allocated For Highway 214, Overpass

The widening of State Highway 214 south from Friona to Hub, as well as the construction of an overpass over the Santa Fe Railway near the Friona city limits, has been included in a supplement to the 1969-70 Consolidated Highway program for Texas, according to Oscar L. Crain, Lubbock, district engineer.

The work proposal calls for reconstructing the 7.5-mile segment entirely, and building a new 26-foot two-lane facility, with nine-foot shoulders on either side. This will in effect give the road a 44-foot width from Friona to Hub.

The road was originally constructed as a 20-foot wide Farm-To-Market road, but as Crain points out, the edges have worn away so that the road probably isn't even 20 feet wide today.

When completed, the Friona to Hub segment of the road will be very similar to U.S. Highway 60 on either side of Friona in nature.

"We hope to be able to widen the section of Highway 214 south of Hub to the Bailey County line sometime in the future, but because of the expense of completely reconstructing the road, it was not possible to include it in this program," Crain said. He indicated that this portion of the highway might be included in a future highway program.

The cost of the 7.5-mile portion from Friona to Hub, including the overpass, is estimated at \$2,200,000. Of the 10 road projects for District 5 covered in the supplemental program, the Parmer County project is the most expensive; in fact, it amounts to roughly 30 per cent of the \$7,380,000

in funds approved for construction in the district, covering 77.3 miles.

Crain estimated that the overpass alone would cost in the neighborhood of \$700,000. The balance of the \$2,200,000 will be spent on reconstructing the road.

Rhea E. Bradley of Littlefield will be the engineer supervising the work.

The highway, which has been a busy one for traffic south to Muleshoe, Lubbock, etc., has taken on even more use with the opening of Missouri Beef Packers, with the addition of scores of cattle trucks using the road each day. The PACO Feed Yard south of Hub also has added to the road's traffic.

Squaws Off To 3-0 Mark In Second Half

The Friona High School Squaws, who along with the Chieftain basketball team had a break from District 3-AA play on Tuesday, have jumped off to a fine start for the second half of district play, with a 3-0 record after three games.

The Squaws face a big challenge in their bid for the second half championship on Friday, when the tough Floydada Whirlettes invade Friona.

Last Tuesday, the Squaws squeezed past rival Dimmitt here, 45-40 in an overtime.

It marked the second time this season for the Squaws to top the Bobbies in an overtime period.

On Friday, the team easily disposed of Lockney, 60-35, as everyone on the squad saw game action.

The Chiefs, meanwhile, dropped their first three games of the second half, most recent scores being 70-42 to league-leading Dimmitt, and 74-53 to Lockney.

Water Users Called To Organize Saturday

A meeting has been called for Saturday, February 8 in Bovina for the purpose of organizing a "Parmer County Water Users Association." The meeting will be held in the Bovina High School Auditorium, beginning at 2 p.m.

Proponents of the meeting point out that an organization of this type is necessary to encourage local participation for water importation.

Important studies are under way by the U. S. Corps of Engineers, The Bureau of Reclamation as well as economic study by Texas Tech to determine the impact that water importation will have on the area, state, and nation.

"We must encourage importation of water for this area if we hope to continue our economic development. Without an organized group we cannot be most effective," a spokesman for the meeting said.

The Texas Water Development Board thinks their program, which was recently re-

vised to include a major plan for West Texas, could be implemented by the 1980s. "If this is possible, then we need to lay the groundwork to be ready for the water when it becomes available. In many ways the technicians are ahead

of us, who need the water most," the spokesman said. Saturday's meeting will be open to everyone interested in water and the future development of the area. Many people believe the two cannot be separated.

Trail Ride Is Being Planned

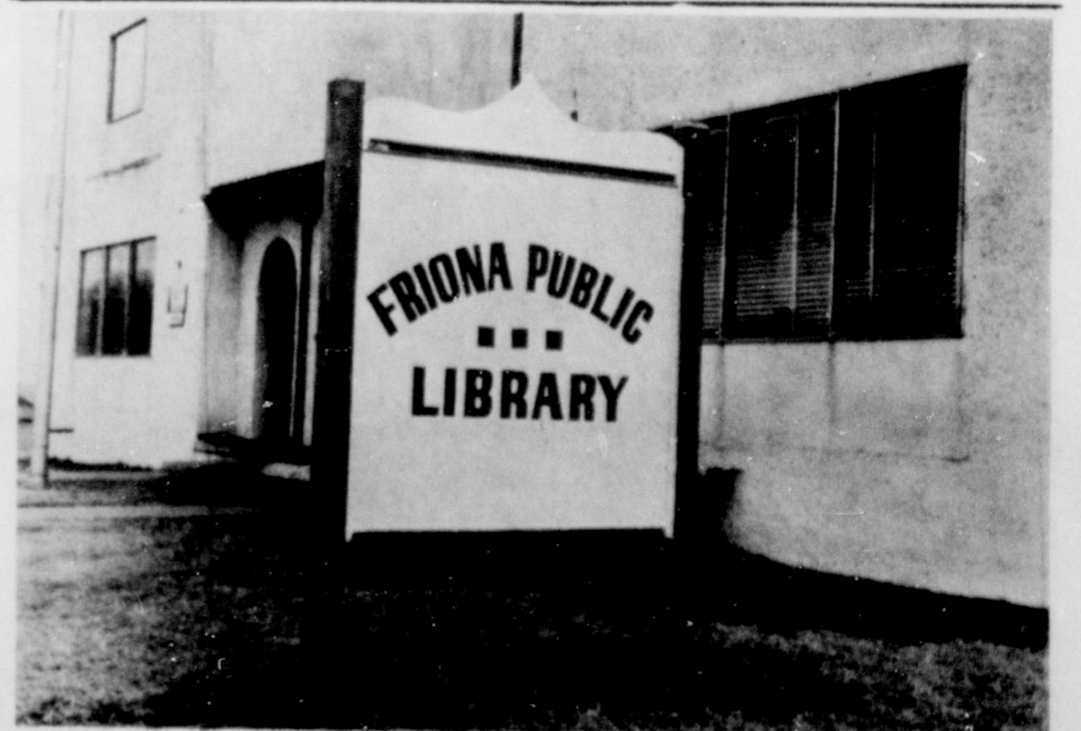
The Friona Riding Club is planning a trail ride to Palo Duro Canyon on the second Sunday in February, the 9th.

Drugs, Lax Morals Loom As Problems

This is the age of the swinging generation; the hip generation. Movie and TV heroes are no longer the tough guys in trench coats, the gunslinging cowhands or heroic swash-bucklers with trusty sword. Today's hero is an anti-hero who wears long hair, dresses indifferently and flouts his lack of morals. He is arrested for narcotics possession and/or addiction, flaunts his distaste for religion, and gains stature with each trip to jail.

But the media who publicize such characters ignore the question of the damage being done. And a great deal of that damage can't be undone.

In recent days newspapers across the country have been reporting that the VD rate is reaching epidemic proportions. Experts are blaming the "pill" in most cases. The freedom it allows for promiscuous behavior has created a neglect for the consequences of disease.

But there is an even worse by-product of the abandon-to-pleasure cult. The disease may not punish only the guilty. What about the growing number of illegitimate children born each day? Children of the non-pilltakers, caught up in the tide. Children who enter the world with the diseases shared by their parents. Children who bear the punishment for a crime they did not commit.

Children are being born with a transmitted narcotic habit. If they actually survive the throes of withdrawal, they then must go through the ordeal of kicking a habit that they have inherited.

A recent study showed an abnormally high rate of deformity in babies born of mothers who had taken just one LSD trip. Pediatricians across the country have been alerted to the problem, and "any baby who presents unusual behavior at birth" is suspect. The mother is subjected to a grilling and examination. But her failure to report her addiction means, in many cases, that it is too late.

This is admittedly grim reading for a family newspaper.

But if even one mother, anywhere, reads these lines and alerts her doctor to spare her baby the tragedy of addiction or death—or if any teenager reads the above and says a resolute "No!" to the dare to try narcotics—then we will have thought it worth the space.

Osborn Named To AA All-Academic Team

Joel Osborn, senior guard on the 1968 Friona Chieftain team, was named to the class AA All-West Texas Academic football team, it was announced this week.

Osborn was given the "Fighting Chieftain" lineman award for the 1968 season by the Friona Booster Club.

The team was compiled by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, from nominations made from the more than 400 high schools in the 132-county area served by the WTCC.

Osborn, a senior, had a 93.0 grade average. He was one of seven linemen named to the offensive unit team. Only two other District 3-AA players were listed on the team. They were Steve Barker and Tandy Johnston, both of Lockney. Barker is a lineman, and Johnston a quarterback.

Two Hereford players made the class AAA all-academic team. They were Sheldon Alexander, with a 91.4 average, and Gary Crume, with a 90.1 average. Both are linemen.

Beverly King, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, said "We feel that exceptional academic achievement, in addition to athletic ability should be recognized and encouraged in West Texas schools. Too often there is too much honor bestowed for athletic achievement without regard to scholastic attainment."

Tex-Anns Set Lubbock Date

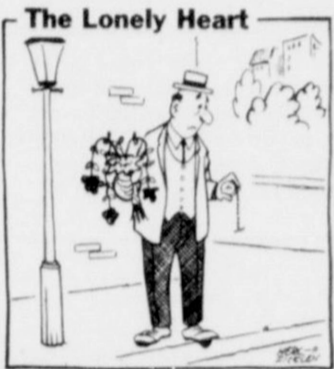

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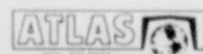

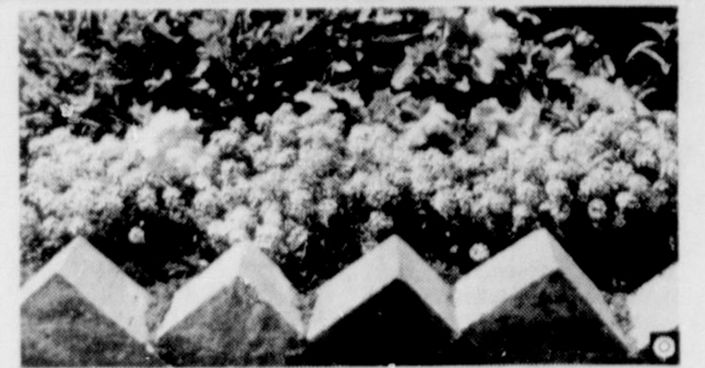

Rep. Clayton Gets Vital Appointments

State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake has been appointed Chairman of the Committee on Livestock by House Speaker Gus F. Mutscher of Brenham. In announcing the appointment, Mutscher said that Clayton's service in the Legislature for the past three sessions and his experience as a Chairman of other committees during the 59th and 60th Legislatures will prove to be invaluable to the Committee and to the House of Representatives.

Clayton is the Representative for District 72 which encompasses Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Lamb and Parker counties and claims that his district is the best in the State.

The 17-man Committee on Livestock will have jurisdiction over matters concerning the livestock industry in Texas. This Committee takes the place of the Committee on Livestock and Stock Raising, as it was called during the 50th Legislature.

The 40-year-old Legislator is a Springlake farmer and businessman. He is a Mason, a member of the Baptist Church and a member of the Lions' Club. Representative and Mrs. Clayton are the parents of two children, a daughter, Brenda, and a son, Tommy.

"The tremendous amount of cattle and feed grown in Texas make this Committee's activities important to Texas," said Mutscher. "And no man has more interest in its promotion than Bill Clayton."

Clayton was also named as Chairman of the Livestock Committee, and as a member of the following committees: Conservation and Reclamation, State Affairs, Urban Affairs and Elections.

The livestock industry and feed-lot development in Texas could be affected by the legislation that will be considered by the Livestock Committee, and places Chairman Clayton in a position to be especially helpful to this area. The appointment to the Conservation and Reclamation Committee will provide an avenue for Clayton to continue his work in water resource development for

the State and especially for West Texas.

Clayton also stated that Representative Hinson, of Mineola, and Representative Rayford Price, of Palestine, were named Chairmen of the Public Education Committee and State Affairs Committee, respectively. These are the Committees that probably will consider the report of the Governor's Committee on Education.

Clayton noted that these two assignments are of particular interest because both of these members come from an area of the State where the recommendations regarding consolidation and taxes, as suggested by the Governor's committee, would be harmful to their area, and consequently they will probably oppose the Committee's report in its present form.

Clayton re-emphasized his opposition to the proposed consolidation and tax measures for our schools. He stated that he has received lots of mail opposing the consolidation of schools and only one letter supporting the measure.

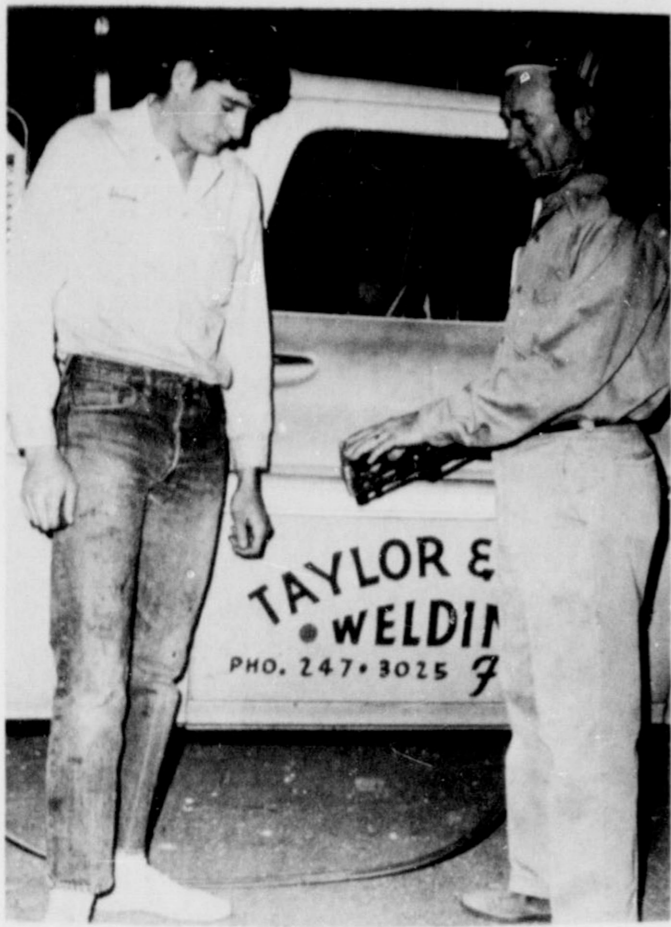

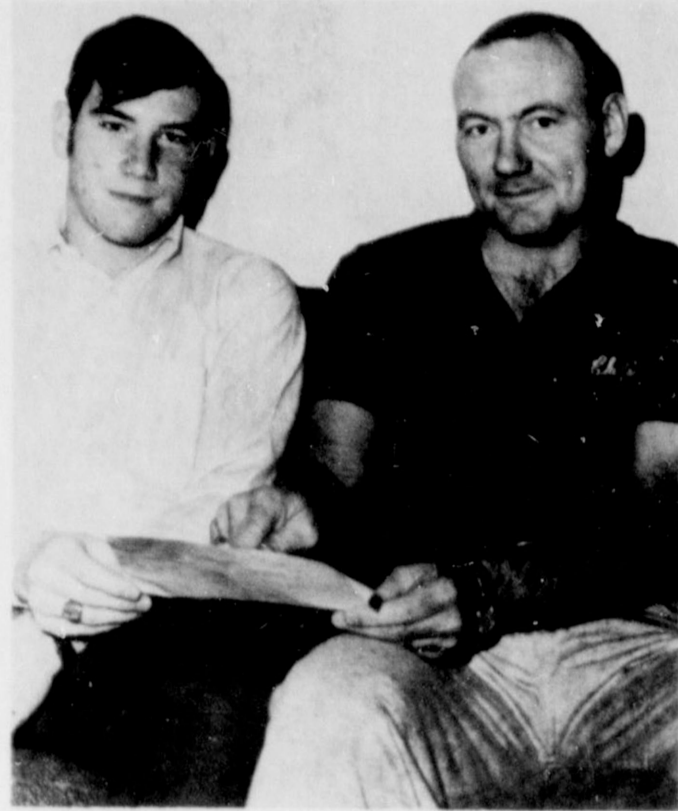
Gene and Bobbie Moore have appeared in churches of many denominations for the past ten

The library has many new books. One that is particularly interesting is "Laser, Tools of Modern Technology", by Ronald Brown. Mr. Brown explains the theory of the laser and its development in the 1960's into specific tools that have application in the fields of medicine, communications, engineering and manufacturing. Early uses of the laser have been optical radar, cutting and welding of metals, attaching detached retinas back to the supporting tissues of the eye, and as a bases of a branch of photography called holography which produces three-dimensional images. Future uses of the laser are likely to include carrying millions of radio and television frequencies simultaneously; removing cancerous tumors on the skin, and burning away the decayed areas of a tooth in thousandths of a second.

A laser is basically a device that controls the way in which photons are emitted by a light source. It produces a beam having much greater intensity and coherence than one from any other source of light.

Some other new books are "The Other Side", by James A. Pike, "Coming of Age in Mississippi", by Ann Moody (this book was discussed on the "Today" show recently), "Wells Fargo", an illustrated history of that famous company by Loomis, and "Harry Truman", a pictorial biography by Gies.

formation about a specific number. The library telephone number is 247-3200.

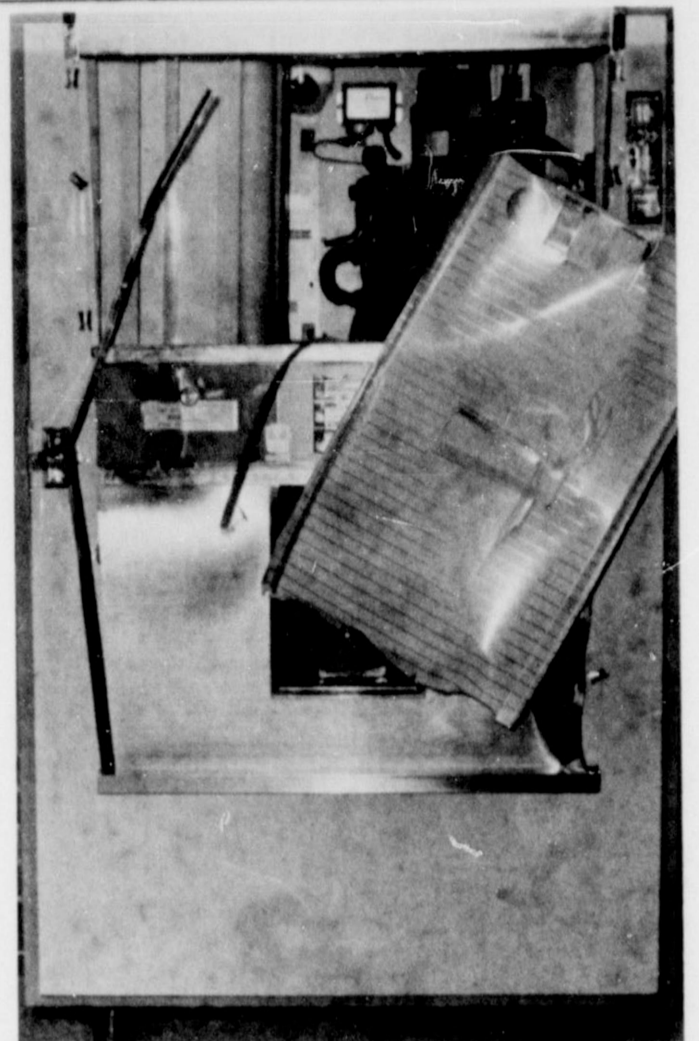

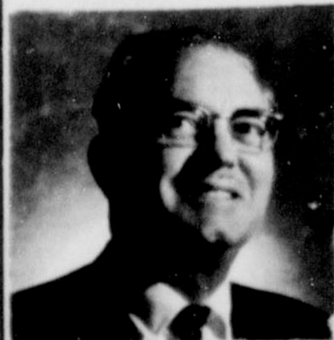

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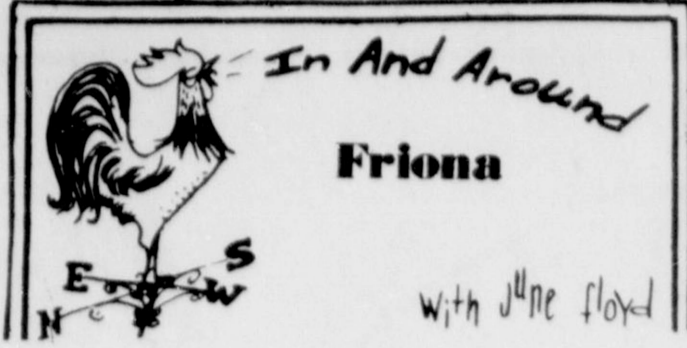

Low temperatures and dry weather seem to be a regular feature of our weather. Most farmers would like to get some moisture. Hearing wheat farmers and livestock men talk is somewhat depressing. Their conversations usually begin with this question: "Have you ever known of such a long dry spell before?"

February and March usually bring us more snow than December and January, so maybe we will get some winter moisture yet. A lot of wheat is being watered, most row crop farmers are getting their land ready for spring watering and some cattle have already been taken of the wheat.

Mayor W. L. Edelman recently returned from Hot Springs, Arkansas, where he attended a convention of the National Cotton Council. He is concerned over present Department of Agriculture plans for cotton farmers and would like for each of them to study all points of programs offered for voting before casting a ballot.

He spoke enthusiastically about an association of women on the South Plains who are promoting the use of cotton. It seems that one woman was dissatisfied with what was being done and began her own program of promotion.

Like any other idea on which a farm woman is sold, this one soon began to catch on with her neighbors and friends and has grown to be an important factor in the promotion of the sale of cotton.

All of those of us who are interested in the future of cotton need to find out more about her program and adopt the slogan, "If it works on the South Plains, it can be made to work in Farmer County."
