40 YEARS AGO--MARCH 1, 1929

Charley Gonce of Bovina took first place; J.W. Ford of Friona second and Bud Queen of Rhea third in the old fiddlers' contest held at the school auditorium Wednesday night. The large room was filled with spectators. The winner will enter the Tri-State contest at Amarillo March 7.

35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 2, 1934

Coach Bill Stevens, who was serving his fourth term as coach at Friona High School, resigned his position this week for a similar position at Levelland.

The basketball game scheduled here last Friday between the Friona Squaws and Farwell girls, was called off due to disagreeable weather. The two teams, winners in the county tournament, were playing a best two of three game series. The Squaws had won the first game, played at Farwell.

30 YEARS AGO--MARCH 3, 1939

Business concerns will give prizes away during the annual livestock show this weekend, valued at around \$100. Persons visiting the show will need to register at some place of business, prior to 2 p.m. on Saturday. At that time, a drawing will be held to see who the winner of merchandise will be.

20 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 25, 1944

Joyce Ann Miller, 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Miller, was a guest singer on the Army Air Base broadcast over station KNNN last Thursday. Joyce was a hit at the recent bond rally, at which she also sang "Marezy Dots" and the Army Air Corps song.

15 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 25, 1954

Well-drilling and irrigation has become big business in the area. Since April 1 of last year, some 323 permits have been issued for drilling of wells.

Lt. Bill Sheehan, who has been serving as legal counsel for the Wm. Beaumont Army Hospital in El Paso, has announced his candidacy for the position of County Attorney. He will be released from active duty in late May.

10 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 26, 1959

Dr. Paul Spring and Mrs. Eva Miller were named "Man and Woman of the Year" at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet Tuesday night. Bill Nichols was installed as president of the chamber for 1959.

The USDA's announcement Wednesday that the 1959 price support on feed grains will be drastically reduced has been met with repercussions in the Farmer County area. Grain sorghum was supported at \$1.83 per hundredweight in 1958, and the support price for 1959 has been announced at \$1.52. This drop could cost farmers in this county alone from \$2.5 to \$3 million.

5 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 27, 1964

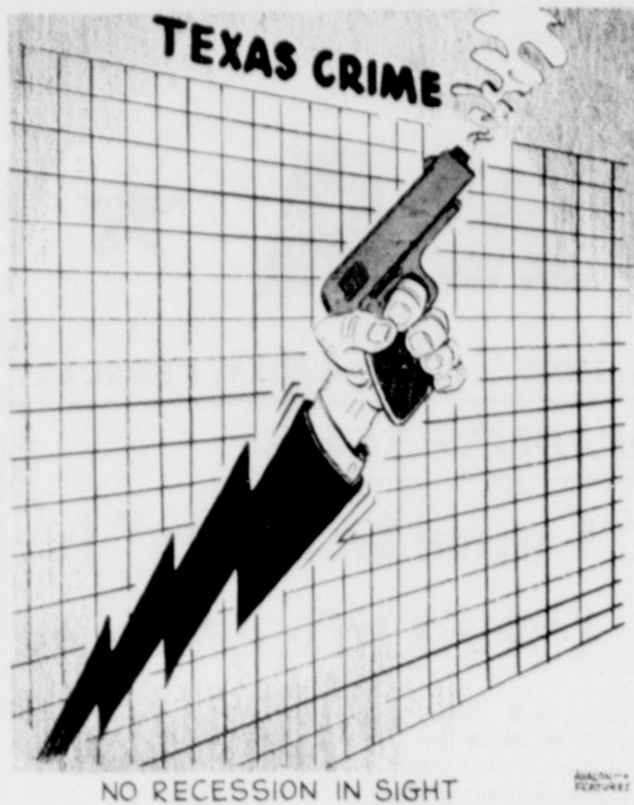

### Dement Greets New Son After Vietnam Tour

Naturally, every member of the armed forces who serve in Vietnam is anxious to return home. But for Friona's Delmer Dement, there was an additional reason. Dement, who returned to Friona January 26 after serving a year in Southeast Asia, had never seen his baby son, who was born while Dement was fighting in Vietnam. "I feel lucky at that," Dement says, "Many guys over there have kids a year old... walking, talking, etc., whom they haven't seen." Dement's firstborn, Gary Lee, is four months old. He was born in Friona on October. "He and my wife, Joyce sure looked good," said the former artilleryman, and the feeling apparently was mutual with Joyce and young Gary. The Friona ex-serviceman said he had been very fortunate in arriving back home with not a scratch, although

he had experienced some close shaves. Dement departed from California last February 1 on the USS Upshore, and arrived in Da Nang February 21. He served with both the Sixth Battalion, 33rd Artillery, and the First Battalion, 44th Artillery. He was primarily a gunner, using the 105 Howitzer. The Friona soldier spent most of this year in the north portion of South Vietnam, only ten miles from the Demilitarized Zone. He says that the morale of the troops in Vietnam was good during the year he was there, but that the men get uneasy when their action is limited, and many feel they are fighting a "limited war." Dement joins a growing list of Frionians who have returned from Vietnam. Dement is employed at Friona Consumers.

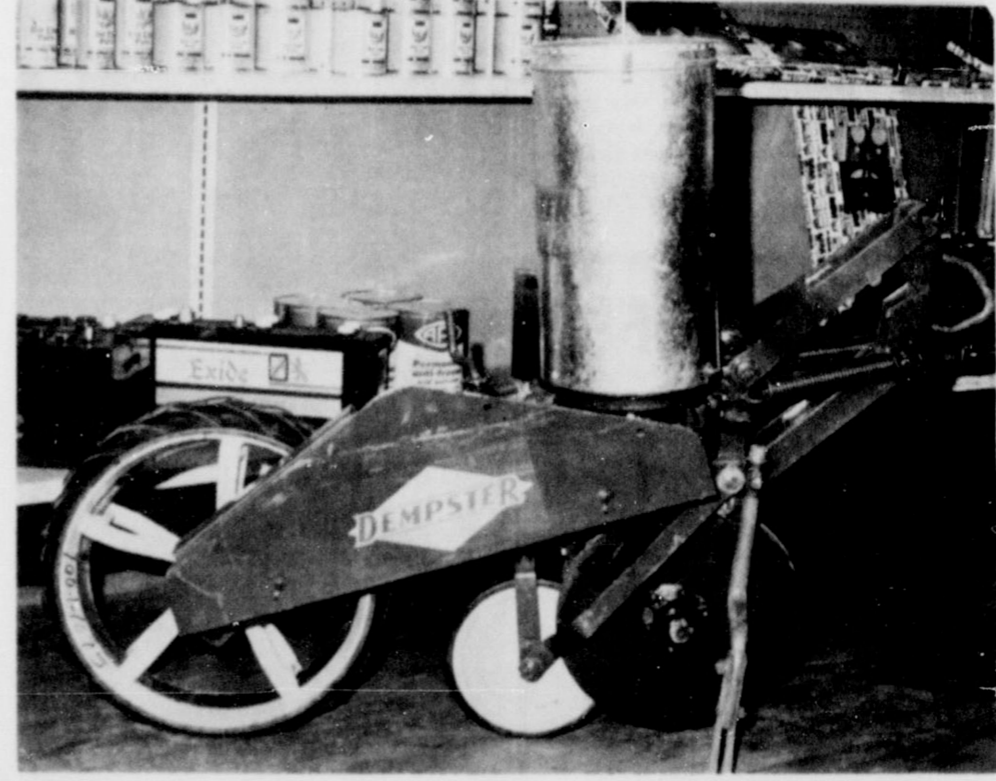

## Mental Health Center Available to County

Other counties in the district of the center are Bailey, Castro, Hale, Motley, Floyd, Swisher, Lamb and Briscoe. Children from these areas, including Parmer County, are now taking advantage of the testing and therapy programs.

Baker E. Duggins of Friona has been appointed by Parmer County Judge Archie Tarter to serve on the board of directors. He has selected an advisory board to work with him in this county including Mrs. R. J. Garner of Lariat, Mrs. Gilbert Kaltwasser of Lariat, Mrs. E. A. Farham of Lazbuddie, Mrs. C. C. Christian of Farwell, Mrs. J. T. Gee of Friona, and Mrs. Vernon Estes of Bovina. One of the board's primary purposes will be to inform people of the county of the services offered at the center.

The center was made possible in 1964 when the Legislature passed House Bill 3, the Texas Mental Health and Mental Retardation Services

If the communities wanted it badly enough to work for it, Mrs. Woodley said. A \$311,000 grant from Health, Education and Welfare Department was met by the Central Plains Hospital Authority and the building was started.

"This is a new concept of handling the emotionally ill or retarded in or near our local communities. We will treat these just as we do physical disorders, with the theory that prevention, early detection and care in the local community is more effective and therefore more to be desired than waiting until the patient must be placed in a distant institution. All of this gave impetus to what has happened and what is happening in a nine county area --- of which Parmer County is a part," Mrs. Woodley said.

Parmer County is among nine counties that will be served by the Mental Health and Mental Retardation Community Center now under construction in Plainview adjacent to the Central Plains General Hospital.

The 30-bed center, built at a cost of \$600,000, has been made possible by the efforts of many people, including Dr. Mary Bubliss, Plainview psychiatrist, Mrs. Eleanor Griffin, administrator of High Plains Training Center for Children and Judge C. L. Abernethy, among others.

Now being offered at the High Plains Training Center for Children and Sheltered Workshop in Plainview is psychological testing, EEG tests and group therapy, according to Mrs. Elizabeth Woodley, planner and coordinator for the center. After the new center is completed in 1970, more extensive programs will be available.

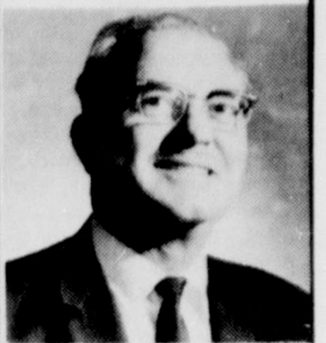

### On The Farm In Parmer County

RONNIE McNUTT

It costs money to feed cattle lice. These parasites, are among the most damaging to beef cattle.

Cattle infested with lice spend a lot of time rubbing against fences, posts or other objects due to the annoyance caused by the insects. Cattle on feed do not gain as they should and require more feed.

Infested cows lose weight and their calves become prime targets for the pests. Reduced weaning weights of calves is another spot that hits the pocketbook.

Cattle lice are common over the entire state and include both the biting and sucking types. Their populations build up rapidly during cool weather and when cattle are kept in close quarters.

Sucking lice, short and long nosed, pierce the animal's skin and feed by sucking blood. They are usually found, on the sides of the animal's neck,

on the brisket, back, inner surface of the thighs, tail and around the nose, eyes and ears. Chewing lice are smaller and are usually found on top of the animal's body.

Many chemicals are available for controlling lice as well as other external parasites of farm livestock. Because of restrictions and safety suggestions which apply to the use of chemicals, the county agent invites stockmen to come by the office and pick up a copy of MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry."

#### SOME UP, SOME DOWN

There are more cattle, hogs and turkeys on Texas farms and ranches January 1, 1969, than a year ago but fewer sheep goats and chickens, reported the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Cattle numbers were up five per cent; hogs one per cent; turkeys six per cent; while sheep numbers were down seven per cent; goats eighteen per cent and chickens ten per cent. Total value of livestock and poultry on January 1 was placed at \$1,696.8 million, 12 per cent above a year ago.

As a result of an increasing number of requests for assistance and information on controlling some of the major predatory animals in the county a County-wide meeting has been set for Thursday, Feb. 27.

### Predator Control To Be Meeting Subject

In the last year or so there has been a buildup in the county of predatory animals that cause economic damage either to livestock, land or crops, according to County Agent Ronny McNutt. These particular predatory animals being referred to are prairie dogs, coyotes and rats.

There has been an unusually large increase in coyote numbers in the past year.

As a result of an increasing number of requests for assistance a predator control meeting has been set. The meeting will be held Thursday, February 27 at 2 p.m.

In the Hub Community Center. Glen Riley, who is with the Fish and Wildlife Department in Lubbock, will conduct the meeting. Riley will explain and demonstrate the proper material and equipment needed to control these predators. This representative will also have a supply of poison grain for individuals interested in purchasing for predator control.

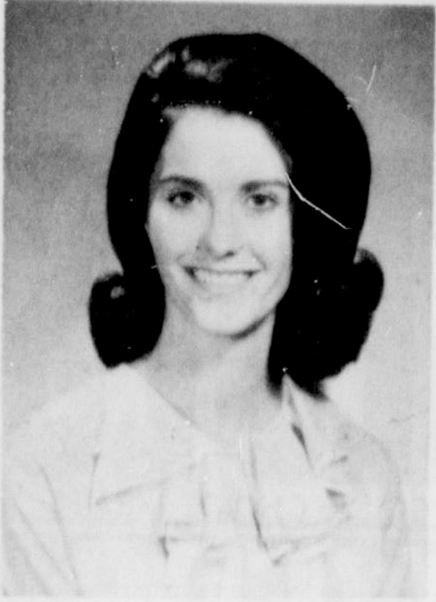
