

HAVE REACHED AN AGREEMENT AS TO FUME

Premiers Lloyd George and Nitti Come to Understanding at London Conference

LEAVE FOR PARIS TO RESUME DISCUSSIONS

Understood that Russia and Turkey Will be Two Nations to Receive Attention

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Premier Lloyd George and Premier Nitti have reached an agreement for settlement of fumes, it was reported today.

The agreement, according to the report, will be submitted to Premier Clemenceau, when the allied leaders meet with him in Paris today.

LONDON, Jan. 8.—British and Italian officials left here for Paris this morning to resume their peace discussions with French representatives.

Russia and Turkey will be the two nations to receive first attention of the allied leaders, it was indicated. Some London newspapers believed a policy of peace with Russia, because of the recent Bolshevik military victories, will be considered.

In the British party were Premier Lloyd George, Earl Curzon of Kedleston, secretary of state for foreign affairs; Anthony Bonar Law, government leader in the house of commons; Lord Bicknell, lord chancellor; A. J. Balfour, lord president of the council; E. H. Montagu, secretary of state for India, and Lord Riddell.

Premier Nitti and Foreign Minister Scialoja will represent Italy, while Premier Clemenceau and other officials will represent France.

NO MEETING OF THE COUNCIL FOR TODAY

PARIS, Jan. 8.—No meeting of the supreme council will be held today, it was announced, because of the illness of several of the members.

Premier Lloyd George and Premier Nitti could not arrive in time to participate in any session today. Twenty-five members of the British delegation, who will attend the conference, arrived last night.

"STOPPAGE OF WORK" DEMONSTRATION MAY BE STAGED IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Several "prominent" trade union leaders in New York have suggested a "stoppage of work" in protest against the action of the lower house of the New York legislature in suspending five Socialist members, Abraham Forman, a member of the committee appointed by the Socialists here to investigate the affair, said today.

The committee of eight, appointed by the Socialists here, now has the matter under consideration, Forman stated, intimating that negotiations may be under way with the central labor council to arrange the "stoppage of work" demonstration.

WANT AN INJUNCTION TO RESTRAIN ENFORCEMENT OF THE PROHIBITION LAW

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Jan. 8.—An injunction to restrain federal officials in Rhode Island from interfering under the national prohibition amendment with the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages was asked in three bills of complaint filed in the United States district court here today.

The 11th amendment to the bill as amended is "wholly null and void" and the act of the prohibition, is declared to be "unconstitutional and void and beyond the power of the federal government to enforce."

PROMISE TO ROUTE MORE FREIGHT CARS TO WESTERN TEXAS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Representative Parrish today appealed to the railroad administration to end the freight car shortage which is acute in the Panhandle. Officials promised to route more cars to Western Texas as soon as possible.

NOTED SINGER IS ARRESTED



CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—Mlle. Mlva Amasar, the beautiful Russian soprano who caused the arrest of George Baklanoff, baritone of the Chicago Opera company, on the charge of harboring an alien, is herself in custody.

Immigration Inspector Landis admitted that the young woman had been arrested on a similar warrant signed by Secretary of Labor Wilson.

The accused Baklanoff of bringing her to America five years ago, although he had a wife and several children in Russia.

Hearings in both cases were opened today. In the meantime Mlle. Amasar and Baklanoff are at liberty under bond.

STORE IS ROBBED AND THE OWNER IS BURNED TO DEATH

OSCEOLA, ARK., Jan. 8.—W. E. Hamilton, owner of a chain of plantation stores, was bound to a post supposedly by robbers, his face and clothing saturated with gasoline and burned to death when his store at Holt, near here, was set on fire after it had been looted last night.

Farmers, roused by a negro who discovered the building in flames, found Hamilton tied to a post in the building with his clothing saturated and his face seared by the blaze. He died within a few minutes after he was removed from the burning building.

Search throughout the night and early today by sheriff's deputies and scores of citizens is said to have failed to establish a definite clue as to the identity of the man who committed the crime.

Holt, a farming settlement six miles south of his city, is populated largely by negroes.

DEMOCRATS TO SOUND KEYNOTE 1920 CAMPAIGN

Greatest Banquet of Its Kind in History is Scheduled for Tonight

COMMITTEE SELECTS THE 1920 CONVENTION CITY

Special Interest Centers in the Address of Bryan, as Feature of Evening

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—San Francisco was selected today by the Democratic national committee in session here as the place for the party's 1920 national convention.

After 27 votes had been cast, Kansas City and other cities withdrew and the vote for San Francisco was unanimous.

Monday, June 28, was fixed as the convention date.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Resolutions endorsing the treaty of Versailles and denouncing as unpatriotic the attitude of senators who would do so directly or by nullifying reservations, was unanimously adopted by the Democratic national committee in session here.

The "arrogant" Republican leaders of the Senate were denounced as having earned the "contempt" of the country by their attitude toward the treaty for some months and the Senate was called upon to "quit playing politics" with the question of ratification.

Isadore Dockweiler of California, nominating San Francisco, outbid Chicago's offer with a proffer of a guarantee of \$10,000 for expenses, the free use of the municipal auditorium seating from 15,000 to 18,000 and additional funds for entertainment purposes.

The case for Kansas City was presented by former Mayor Fred Fleming, Representative Champ Clark, Dr. B. A. Jenkins, publisher of the Kansas City Post; Breckenridge Long of St. Louis; and S. P. Anshon, national committeeman for Kansas. The city offered a guarantee of \$50,000 and free use of the convention hall.

Dr. Jenkins pointed out that Kansas City lay in the center of a group of doubtful states, declared that "while my heart would say let's go to San Francisco, my head would say let's go to Kansas City."

Mr. Clark said that award of the convention to Kansas City would "doer up every Democrat from the Mississippi to the foothills of the Rocky Mountains."

The committee will meet behind closed doors at 2:30 p. m. to vote on the convention time and place.

The committee voted that until the national convention meets a definite list of members of the associate women's national committee is now constituted should continue in office during the tenure of office of the present national committee.

The committee will present its claims for the national convention, addresses of invitation being made by former Mayor Carter Harrison, former Senator James Hamilton Lewis and Representative Charles G. Dyer.

Referring to the local differences in Democratic politics in Chicago, Mr. Harrison said all of the factions there were united in asking for the convention.

RATIFICATION TAKEN PLACE ON SATURDAY

PARIS, Jan. 8.—The exchange of ratifications of the peace treaty with Germany will take place on the coming Saturday, Jan. 10, it now seems certain. The supreme council today fixed this date for the ceremony and decided that it should be held in the French foreign office.

SITUATION IN RUSSIA AS BAD AS COULD BE

There are Few Signs Indicating Any Improvement is Late Report

ARE TWO ESPECIALLY MENACING DEVELOPMENTS

Denikin's Army is Cut in Two and Bolshevik Claim Capture of Krashnovodsk

LONDON, Jan. 8.—The situation in Russia is shown as bad as could be, from an anti-Bolshevik point of view, according to British war office reports, and there are few signs indicating any likely improvement. There are two especially menacing developments. In the first place General Denikin's army has been cut in two through the Bolshevik push to the sea of Azov at Taganrog, and its flanks have been thus leaving a large gap. In addition there comes a claim from the Bolsheviks of the capture further east of the town of Krashnovodsk, on the Caspian sea, and which this is not confirmed, it is generally accepted as true.

Grave Possibility. The capture of this important port of Krashnovodsk, it is pointed out, creates the grave possibility that the Reds may overtake northern Persia and occupy Teheran, which probably would mean the establishment of Bolshevik rule in Persia. The taking of Krashnovodsk permits the Reds not only to control the Caspian coast, but also the important Krashnovodsk-Moscow railroad, but even these three gains do not prevent them from gaining control of the Caspian from the more or less ineffective fleet. Once in possession of this sea there remains only a small British force and the poorly organized Persian forces between his left and right wings, and the possibility of their obtaining control of the whole country.

Seems Likely to Fail. With its important oil supplies on the western coast, the capture of Teheran, it is pointed out, would seem likely also to fall into Bolshevik hands and its occupation would provide a base for further operations against the rear of Denikin's hard pressed right wing.

If the Bolshevik reports are true, General Denikin has suffered a considerable disaster, for not only have the Reds severed all land communication between his left and right wings, but they have captured large quantities of war material, including much that was sent to him by the allies.

There is little hope held out for some relief from the severe blizzard, no accidents were reported Tuesday. Several freight trains operating over the Port Worth and Denver lines were reported to be delayed several hours due to snow drifts in the northwestern section of the state.

PANHANDLE IS COVERED WITH SNOW BLANKET

Severe Blizzard is Raging Over Much of Texas and Oklahoma Points

ABOUT THREE INCHES OF SNOW IN THIS SECTION

Train Service is Seriously Handicapped as a Result of Weather Conditions

Northwest Texas and western Oklahoma was visited Wednesday night and Thursday by one of the most severe blizzards of the winter accompanied by snow varying in depth from three inches in Wichita Falls and vicinity to more than two feet in various sections of northern Oklahoma. Reports received from various points along the Port Worth and Denver city indicate severe cold and heavy snow. From three to five inches of snowfall is reported in that section of country extending from Wichita Falls to Quamua.

The Panhandle is covered with a blanket of snow averaging in some places more than 12 inches. Reports indicate that one of the most severe blizzards of recent years is raging in the Amarillo and Amarillo is blanketed in snow. The snowfall is much greater along the route of the Denver to the Colorado line and reports received, local railway officials state, that train service between Amarillo and Denver is seriously handicapped by the severe weather.

PAINTERS AT ABILENE ADOPT RESOLUTIONS ENDORSING LEGION

ABILENE, TEX., Jan. 8.—Local union No. 661 of the Painters' union of Abilene has passed resolutions endorsing the action of a Chicago painters' union local which declared American Legion members ineligible to membership in the union and asked Congress to send Victor Berger as representative from the Milwaukee district.

"Said action is not representative of the principles of the American Legion and its members and affords demagogues and politicians an opportunity to misrepresent and denounce the Painters' union and union labor in general," the resolution declared.

"We declare our friendship and admiration for the American Legion and approve the recent government action against anarchists, Bolsheviks and red agitators and commend the action of Congress in expelling Victor Berger from membership in that body."

MAUD POWELL DIES AT UNIONTOWN, PA.

UNIONTOWN, PA., Jan. 8.—Madam Maud Powell, well-known throughout the country as a violinist, died in a hotel here today. She suffered a nervous breakdown yesterday and became so ill that her concert last night was cancelled.

UNDERWOOD WILL NOT BE CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Senator Underwood of Alabama in a statement today announced he would not be a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination.

"My friends have complimented me," the senator said, "by suggesting that I be a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, but I am in no sense a candidate. I have announced my candidacy for the senatorship from Alabama and I hope and expect to represent that state in the senate for the next six years."

EARTHQUAKE IN MEXICO TAKES TOLL OF 3,000

This Figure Represents Apparently Reliable Estimates of the Casualties

MARTIAL LAW DECLARED WHERE TROOPS CAN REACH

Government Has Already Sent Relief Trains into all of the Stricken Areas

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 8.—Dispatches from Vera Cruz today confirmed reports that the villages of Saitillo, Lafaguas, Ocotlepa, Mazatlillo Plata, Chicota, and Quimixtilan practically were wiped out in Saturday's earth quake.

Only ruins of the villages remain, the dispatches said. Many other towns were partly destroyed, it was said, and the danger has not yet passed because of frequent collapse of weakened buildings.

As result of the initial quake all houses on one street in Jalapa were reported destroyed. Eighty per cent of the buildings in the city were ruined, it was said.

Foreign Minister Aguilar, who also has accepted the post of governor of Vera Cruz, has organized additional relief expeditions to care for the sick and homeless and begin work of reconstruction.

Scores of persons have died from lack of medical attention, food and shelter, according to reports here.

In addition to the 3,000 estimated dead, 2,000 more are estimated injured and in need of medical treatment. Property damage probably will reach millions of dollars.

PROFESSOR PORTA IS HEARD FROM AGAIN

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8.—The violent earthquake shocks in Mexico last Saturday night were part of the seismic disturbances he predicted as the result of the conjunction of six planets of the same sign, he said today.

Professor Albert F. Porta, who was credited with predicting the end of the world on December 17, 1923, said today that the Mexican earthquakes and those which occurred in the Canary islands January 1 to 8 are to be considered as the product of the "league of planets" which he predicted last August.

SOVIET ARK BUFORD IS TO ENTER KIEL CANAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The Soviet Ark Buford, with a cargo of 243 real aliens, is about to enter the Kiel Canal, according to official dispatches received here today. While still refusing to disclose its destination, the ship's officers said "very good" guess might be ventured since passage through the canal has become known.

It was believed that the Buford would go to a port in Livonia to discharge its radical cargo. Transportation across the country into Soviet Russia.

WEALTHY OIL MAN SUICIDES LAST NIGHT IN FT. WORTH HOTEL

EFFORT TO ESCAPE THE PROFITS CHARGED BY THE MIDDLE MAN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Organized railway employees have started on the other end of the line in an effort to solve the problem of the high cost of living. Unable to obtain relief through additional wage increases which one of the chiefs said were invariably followed by increases in living costs, the four big railroad brotherhoods and the affiliated railway shop crafts have adopted a scheme to escape the profits of the middleman by a system of co-operative buying production and distribution of the necessities of life. Plans for the scheme were laid at the farmer-labor conference at Chicago in November and although they are yet in a tentative stage, definite courses of action is expected to be adopted at a second conference called for February 15th at Chicago.

The proposal calls for an alliance between farmers and laborers to create direct dealing between farm producers and city consumers and between city producers and farm consumers.

The plan is being worked out by the All-American Farm-Labor Co-operative Commission, which was formed at the November meeting in Chicago and it includes the creation of a distribution network and the organization of a co-operative bank.

This latest move on the part of the railway organizations was taken in some quarters to indicate that the railway administration had increased pay.

CHRISTEN CHILDREN OF ARMY OFFICERS

EL PASO, TEX.—Christmas of 1919 has been a happy and successful one for officers of the Seventh United States Cavalry who took place at Fort Bliss on Christmas eve. The ceremonies were held in the quarters of Col. S. K. H. Tompkins, commander of the regiment and were performed by Chaplain S. B. Knowles. The regimental commander played appropriate music while Chaplain Knowles, standing beneath the regimental colors, baptized the little ones. Four were less than a month old, and the others were of various ages. They were: Mary Louise Fizzle, daughter of Captain and Mrs. L. C. Fizzle; Betty Lee Beckman, daughter of Captain and Mrs. W. R. Beckman; George Blizard Moore, son of Captain and Mrs. George A. Moore; William Stanley Koster, son of Lieutenant and Mrs. Fred W. Koster; James Guthrie Rothermund, son of Lieutenant and Mrs. T. K. Rothermund; and Emily Carolyn Sherman, daughter of Lieutenant and Mrs. James H. Sherman.

YOUNG WOMEN TO AID IN PROTECTING MORALS OF NEW YORK GIRLS

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Fifteen thousand young women have been sworn in by the New York Protective Association to aid in protecting the morals of girls here. The theory of this "girl-to-girl" movement, it was explained today, is to use the influence of youth for youth to bring about such healthy recreation as shall prevent the exploitation of leisure-time by commercial and unwholesome interests. It is also sought to encourage the reform and rehabilitation of unfortunate girls through kindness and wherever possible without the stigma of courts or reformatories. The girls who have accepted their aid, work for a living and have average conditions to contend with in their own homes. They are members of the girls' service clubs and the Girl Protective League.

PUBLIC EXECUTIONS WANT PAY INCREASED

LONDON, Jan. 3.—England's public executioners, the hangmen, want their pay increased and their claim has been presented directly to the house of commons by a member of that body. Augustine Hallwood inquired whether the government knew it was paying the executioners no money for the last three days. A government representative replied that the matter would receive consideration.

MAJOR H. O. WOMACK IS ARRESTED AT FT. WORTH

DENVER, COLO., Jan. 3.—Major H. O. Womack, former officer in charge of an army store here, was arrested tonight at Fort Worth, Texas, by department of justice agents, charged with frequenting in his accounts, according to reports received here. The complaint, according to the office of the department of justice here, was made by the same finance officer in Waco, Texas.

MANY ITALIAN TOWNS ISOLATED BY FLOODS

ROME, Jan. 3.—The Arno valley is flooded and many towns, among which are Baiji, Sappona, Peretola and Peretole, are isolated. The lower part of the city of Pisa is inundated and it is feared there have been loss of cattle.

PROSPECTIVE BRIDE REPORTED MISSING

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 3.—Miss Louise Kyle, daughter of H. H. Kyle, prominent attorney of this city, whose marriage to Captain Theodore Dwyer of Dallas, Tex., former lieutenant of marines, had been set for noon today is missing, according to police. No clue to her whereabouts had been found last night, they said.

27 ARE DROWNED WHEN VESSELS SINK

PARIS, Jan. 3.—Twenty-seven were drowned when the tugboat Fluvier and the sailing vessel Jalpaise were sunk in a storm in the Mediterranean off the coast of France, according to dispatches here today.

NEWCOMER SHOCKED AT NATIVE CUSTOMS

PAPETE, TAHITI.—The newcomer to the island is apt to be rather shocked at the native customs of eating raw fish. This however, is not as it seems, as the fish which is not cooked by fires, is to all intents and purposes cooked by several hours' immersion in lime fruit juice.

EL PASO WOMAN HAS UNPRECEDENTED CHATTER

EL PASO, TEX.—A woman was brought before Justice of the Peace R. B. Barlow on a charge of speaking too much. You're charged with going 30 miles an hour on Montana street. Guilty or not guilty? "Judge, may I say a few words?" The judge granted her permission to say a few words. "Well, you see it was like this— and she continued the explanation for 30 minutes, talking what the judge called a "blue streak."

COMMISSIONER INDIAN AFFAIRS SAYS McADOO LOGICAL MAN TO LEAD THE DEMOCRATS IN 1920

In an interview in the Dallas News Wednesday, Cato Sells, commissioner of Indian affairs, declared that William G. McAdoo, now a visitor in Wichita Falls, is the logical Democratic standard bearer for 1920. The probability of Mr. McAdoo as the Democratic candidate is more apparent now than at any previous time, said the commissioner. He has been a presidential factor from the moment he became secretary of the Treasury—the greatest secretary of the treasury since Alexander Hamilton. He was the genius of the federal reserve banking law, the greatest piece of constructive legislation since the Civil war. He was more responsible than any other man for the federal farm loan law and the shipping bill. He was largely instrumental in developing the new relationship between the United States and the South American republics, which has brought about a more friendly condition than has ever before existed between these countries. This is particularly true of commercial conditions by which the United States will be largely benefited.

Has Many Big Achievements

His management and success with the financing of the war is without precedent in this or any other nation. Mr. McAdoo was among the first advocates of woman suffrage, and throughout the entire struggle for the enactment of a constitutional amendment he has been an unwavering advocate of equality at the ballot box as between the sexes. During this time he was constructing the McAdoo tunnels under the Hudson river in New York—not only a great piece of engineering, but a constructive conception indicating the future of the nation and the future of the man—there were circumstances which caused women telephone operators to take the place of men. When the question of wages was raised Mr. McAdoo declared that women should have the same wages that men had received for doing this work.

SHIPPER'S PRESENT MEMORIAL TOUCHING RAILWAY DISPOSAL

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—In a memorial to congress made public here today, the shippers' group have been requested to speed restoration of their powers to state and federal courts and commissions over the railroads.

The memorial was addressed primarily to the joint committee considering Senator Cummins' bill for the termination of federal control. The shippers' representatives, nearly all lines of business except the packers, opposed the proposal to create a transportation board, arguing that it would be confusing to give the new board powers which have been vested in the Interstate Commerce Commission.

A permanent guarantee of returns for the roads was attacked as socialistic and apt to result in loss of efficiency and initiative by the roads. On the same grounds the proposal to appropriate for the government any surplus earnings was disapproved. It would mean penalization of efficiency, the shippers said.

The provisions for compulsory consolidation of roads into rate making groups was called "theoretical, visionary, impractical, unwise and wholly unjustified." Pooling of earnings would destroy competition, the shippers said.

The organization asked for just legislation which will prevent railway strikes. No recommendations were made. It was suggested the interstate Commerce Commission be authorized to investigate rail and waterways to determine possibilities for extension and unification.

MANY CATTLE DYING ON HAWAIIAN ISLANDS

HONOLULU, T. H.—Cattle are reported dying rapidly in the Kohala district, islands of Hawaii, as a result of continued drought. According to stockmen, it is not the lack of drinking water that is proving fatal to the animals, but the effect of the drought upon the range grass. There is said to be scarcely any nutritious food left on the range. The cattle are so weak when they go to the water holes, they become bogged and cannot pull themselves out again. Twenty-seven head of cattle are reported to have been lost in this way at one water hole.

CRADDOCK SUCCESSFULLY DEFENDS HIS TITLE

BOSTON, MASS., Jan. 3.—Earl Craddock, Iowa, heavyweight wrestling champion, successfully defended his title here last night when he defeated "Cyclone" Burns of this city in two successive falls.

WINFREY SAYS INVISIBLE HAND IS IN CONTROL

Makes Public Letter Embodying Resignation as Chairman of Prison Board

SUGGESTS A FULL AND COMPLETE INVESTIGATION

Recently Charged, Extensive Grant System in Texas

AUSTIN, Jan. 3.—At noon today Mr. Winfrey's letter had not been received by the governor, who had written to saying concerning the prison scandal.

DALLAS, Jan. 3.—R. L. Winfrey of Dallas today made public a letter embodying his formal resignation as chairman of the Texas Prison Board, forwarded to Governor W. P. Hobby yesterday, in which he suggested the governor make a full and complete investigation of the prison system.

It was recently charged by Winfrey that extensive graft existed in the prison system and in his letter to the governor he declared "an invisible hand" has had a hold "on the throat of the prison system until it has become a stench in the nostrils of the people of Texas."

Many laws have been passed in reference to the Texas prisons, Mr. Winfrey's letter said, "but up to now it seems that when a man undertakes to carry out the intentions of the legislature to bring about the needed reforms for the protection of the convicts and also to protect the interests of the state in all its dealings, he is branded for the slaughter house."

The text of Mr. Winfrey's letter to Governor Hobby follows: "I hereby tender to you my resignation as chairman of the prison board, as requested by you to take effect upon the appointment and qualifying of my successor.

"Immediately upon the receipt of your request I called you on the telephone and told you of conditions as they now exist. I had no desire to remain on the board without a voice in the administration of its affairs and asked you if there had been any charges of malfeasance or of dishonesty in my conduct of the office.

"You stated to me that there had not been and that you would like me to come to Austin and talk with you. I told you that I did not think that would be necessary, as I thought I fully understood and requested from you a letter which you gave me dated Dec. 25, 1919, which is as follows: 'W. P. Hobby, Governor.

"Dear Mr. Winfrey: Complying with your request for an expression, I beg to give you as assurance that I did not base my request for your resignation upon any knowledge or belief that there had been any malfeasance or dishonesty in office on your part, nor have I ever heard of the slightest charge to that effect.

"Years very truly, 'W. P. Hobby, Governor.' "Members 'Invisible Hand.' "I presume you know that for a great number of years there has been an invisible hand, up to now an other has been heard on the throat of the prison system until it has become a stench in the nostrils of the people of Texas. Legislature after legislature has met and appointed many investigating committees, who have reported in regard to the conditions. Appropriation after appropriation has been made to take care of the deficit. Many laws have been passed but up to now it seems that when a man undertakes to carry out the intentions of the

legislature to bring about the needed reforms for the protection of the convicts and also to protect the interests of the state in all its dealings, he is branded for the slaughter house. And that that brand has been placed upon me."

"I do not know who dictated the series of questions propounded by you to me through the newspapers of recent date, but they read much like those of a lawyer and reminded me of many years ago in Texas when gambling houses and disorderly houses were running wild open. Occasionally these would come, a preacher with a few sermons and demand of the powers that be that those houses be closed. The powers that be would rise up on their dignity and ask of the preacher, 'Do you know it to be a fact? If you do so, make affidavit, being sufficient evidence and we will prosecute them to the full extent of the law.'

"In Position to Know. "You, above any other man in Texas, are in a position to know what is going on in the prison system. Being a newspaperman, you should know that I will print nothing that is not privileged by law. It would do me no good, nor the people of Texas any good, to make specific answers to your questions at this time because the newspapers would not print them.

"You have the power to make a full and complete investigation and I further suggest to you on behalf of the people that you appoint a big strong man with a brain and a heart to succeed me and honestly and conscientiously stand by him.

"I have put in practically two years work for the state and I do not regret it. I believe that I have made the burdens of unfortunate people less and I know that I have safeguarded the financial interests of the state for many hundreds of thousands of dollars. When in doubt as to the legal course to pursue I called upon the attorney general of Texas for advice and I take the space here to say that at all times he has responded with sound counsel.

"To Engage in Business. "The only injury done me by your action is in that you will be ready but in no other way am I embarrassed. I am returning to my home with less money than when I accepted the place from you, without solidified on my part. I have a family to support and shall have to leave open office here and engage in the real estate business but at the proper time as a leader I will be ready to do any and every service I can to the prison system and the people of the state of Texas.

"As governor of Texas you have the power to act. "Yours very truly, "R. L. Winfrey."

Pipelines to New Oil Fields

BUILDING PIPE LINE ACROSS RED RIVER TO OKLAHOMA TESTS

Building of a three-inch pipe line across the Red River into the Oklahoma territory, north-west of the General section of the Oklahoma side, is announced by the Lone Star Oil and Refining Company. The line at present terminates at section 7-5-1. The ultimate termination for the line is any of the Oklahoma county tests which may be influenced by the building of this line is not given.

This is the third line being built into the Red River section by the Lone Star, two others having been built into the General section of this side of the river, the first, and the only one in operation in this section, having been completed straight across country soon after the bringing in of the General well, and another, now practically completed, going from the company's line just west of Newberry across block 518 and the adjacent territory to the H. S. Allen tract, just south of the General. Completion of a 12,000 barrel capacity relay pump station on the northwest corner of the Hardin tract, just northwest of Burk Burnett, the largest pump station in this section, is also announced by the Lone Star. The big pump is turned by a 300 horsepower General Electric motor.

With their new lines the Lone Star company has facilities for taking oil from every section of the North-west field, with a total pipe line capacity of approximately 11,000 barrels daily.

LONE STAR COMPANY TO EXTEND LINE TO THE OKLAHOMA SIDE

Announcement by the Lone Star Oil and Refining Company that its pipe line to the General Pool, along the river to Tillman county, in sections where drilling is now under way, and that the extension of directly under construction, gives the public the impression that developments in Tillman county have taken a turn of which it at present is not informed. There are 14 rigs up across the Red River, about half of them drilling, but no available reports show any of them with oil, or showings as present which would justify the construction of a pipe line.

However, the expense of pipe line construction would scarcely be undarkened unless there was justification, and for this reason the announcement serves to justify suspicions that have been extant for some time concerning various Tillman county tests that have been drilling there since to reach sand depth. The coming week or so should bring news of interest and great importance.

DEVELOPMENTS NOT TO BE IMPEDED BY LACK OF PIPE LINES

Developments in the Red River section around the General well, will not be impeded by lack of pipe line facilities as the other new Burk Burnett pools have been in the early days, since the Lone Star Oil and Refining Company has two three-inch lines already completed to block 511, and the Prairie three-inch extension will be completed by Friday of this week, and two more are building.

The Gulf Pipe Line Co. is pushing construction of a double four-inch line, which will have a carrying capacity of 12,000 barrels, and the Texas Co. has already begun construction of a six-inch line to this section. By these extensions ample facilities for transporting the oil from the new wells will be afforded, and the pipe line companies are all confident of their ability to keep up with developments. The seasons learned by operators in the other pools is also expected to prevent the heavy over-drilling in this section.

Two electric generating stations are being built in Morocco by a company with \$500,000 capital.

The Gulf is also building a line to the Red River pool opened up by the General, and will be ready to run oil from this district in a short time. A double four-inch line is being built to this section.

Completion of the two additional pump stations between Wichita Falls and Fort Worth, which will give three boosting stations at Henrietta, Bowie and Decatur respectively, will give this line a capacity of 15,000 barrels and better, daily. With the trunk line finished, and the pump stations in operation, Mr. Gardner states, there will be no difficulty in making whatever extensions developments may require in a very short time, and a recurrence of the congestion and

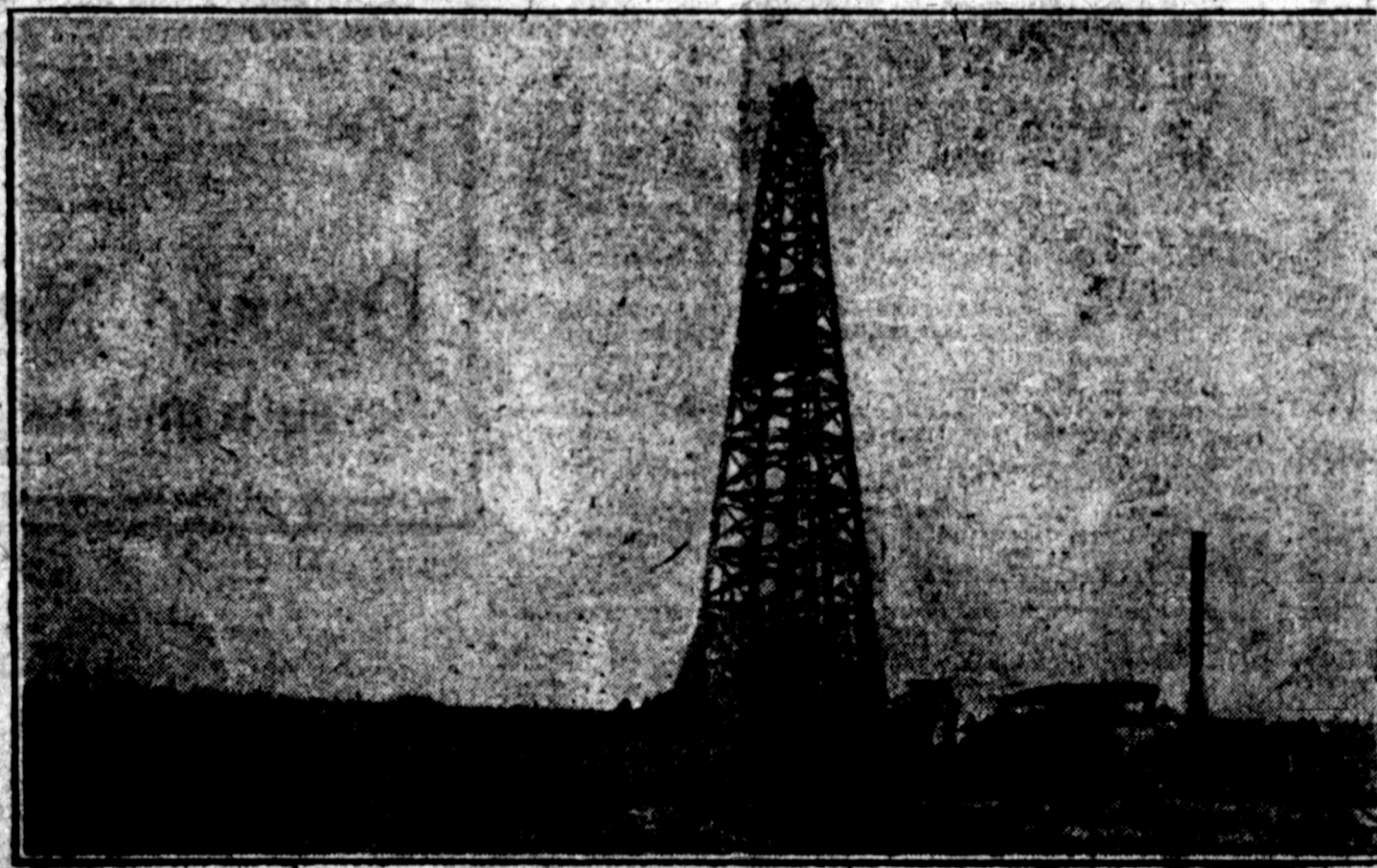

ONE HUNDRED COMPLETIONS IS RECORD FOR THE PAST WEEK

An even 100 completions are reported for the Wichita Falls district for this week, all of them in the Waggoner pool, the heaviest week in point of the number of completions in the history of the pool.

The banner completion of the week is, as has been the case for the past several weeks, furnished by the southwest part of the pool, where the wells have been holding up better in their initial production than the sections which have been so intensively drilled.

This largest completion is that of the Texas United Oil company, No. 1 A. A. Morgan (formerly carried as Painter-Cook, Fenton and Strunk), the smallest completion, that of the Texas Star Oil company's No. 1 Eliza, which is in one of the sections which were thickly drilled, is rated as 48 barrels.

Among the completions are 18 holes abandoned, most of them being between the point where the sand pinches out in the Waggoner and the point where the General Oil company's No. 1 Sparks in the river bed has apparently opened up a new pool.

FOX IS WILLING TO SURRENDER IMMEDIATE PROFITS ON FIGHT

TO DISCUSS DETAILS OF BIG FIGHT AT A CONFERENCE TODAY

SAN DIEGO, CALIF., Jan. 8.—Details of the proposed match at Tia Juana, Lower California, between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier for the world's heavyweight championship, were to be discussed at a conference here today between Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, and James W. Coffroth, promoter.

Coffroth early today was without direct word from Dempsey, Carpentier's manager, that his terms had been accepted, but said he had called Charlie Harvey, his agent in London, to get in touch at once with Dempsey and Carpentier and advise him of their plans.

Meanwhile he is proceeding on the theory, he said, that Associated Press advice from Paris to the effect that Dempsey had accepted his offer were correct.

He said he expected to construct an arena at Tia Juana to accommodate a crowd of at least 80,000 and possibly 100,000. He expected to discuss with Governor Esteban Castro arrangements for the match after he had heard from Harvey.

CARPENTIER IS WILLING TO MAKE CONCESSIONS

PARIS, Wednesday, Jan. 7.—Georges Carpentier is willing to give concessions in the matter of weight in order to meet Jack Dempsey, according to a statement made tonight to the Associated Press by Desamps, Carpentier's manager. Desamps said he was willing to split the \$100,000 purse offered by James Coffroth on a basis of 60 per cent for the winner and 40 per cent for the loser.

"Carpentier is willing to journey to a strange land, face a exotic climate, give away from 25 to 30 pounds in weight and accept a 50-50 split of Mr. Coffroth's offer," said Desamps. "We had intended to demand a 50-50 split but are willing to accept a 60-40 division in order to show this is not merely a money-making proposition but also a sporting event. We will endeavor to give American sportsmen a real championship battle."

DECLARES DEMPSEY CAN'T FILL CONTRACT

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—That Jack Dempsey could not meet Georges Carpentier at Tijuana, Mexico, July 4, is the statement made by Charles E. Cochran, London fight promoter, who said that Carpentier was already under contract to Cochran. The Englishman, who promoted the Carpentier-Beckett fight in London and who is now in Chicago, declared today that his contract with the Frenchman was binding and that Carpentier and N. Desamps, his manager, were liable if it was broken.

He reiterated that he would not offer Dempsey more than \$200,000, plus 10 weeks of yauville at \$50,000.

KEARNS RECEIVES A TELEGRAM FROM MILLER

LOS ANGELES, CALIF., Jan. 7.—Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, late Wednesday announced he had received a telegram from Colonel J. C. Miller of Oklahoma, asking if he had closed with James W. Coffroth for Dempsey to fight Carpentier at Tijuana, and advising Kearns that if he had not, it would pay him to wait until he had received Miller's offer.

Kearns said he had asked Miller to forward his proposition, but added if Coffroth had signed Carpentier, any offer from Miller or anyone else would be ignored. He declared he had acted similarly with an offer from William Fox, New York motion picture producer.

OFFER IS CABLED TO GEORGES CARPENTIER

LONDON, Jan. 5.—Nate Lewis, American fight manager, on behalf of Dominick Tortorice, the New Orleans promoter, today cabled an offer of \$125,000 to Georges Carpentier to meet Jack Dempsey for the world's championship in New Orleans some time during November.

If the offer is sufficiently interesting to Desamps, Lewis will confer with him about the number of details.

The offer for a fight late in November was made after it had been learned that Carpentier had theatrical contracts that would keep him busy until late in the year.

INFILDER SAM CRANE GOES TO CINCINNATI

CINCINNATI, O., Jan. 8.—The release of infielder Sam Crane to the Cincinnati Reds was announced here today by Jack Hendricks, manager of the Indianapolis American Association club. Details of the deal have not been arranged, Hendricks said, other than that Crane now is the property of the Reds. Pat Moran wants Crane for utility roles.

EDDIE FITZSIMMONS SCORES A KNOCKOUT

DETROIT, MICH., Jan. 8.—Eddie Fitzsimmons of New York scored a technical knockout over Patsy Cline of Newark in the sixth round of their scheduled 10-round bout last night. Joe Chip of Pittsburgh won the newspaper decision over Knockout Brown of Chicago in 10 fast rounds.

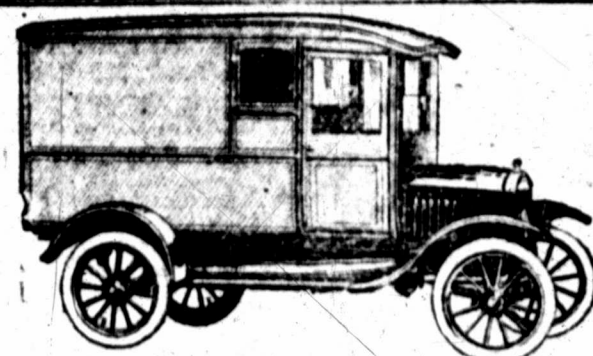

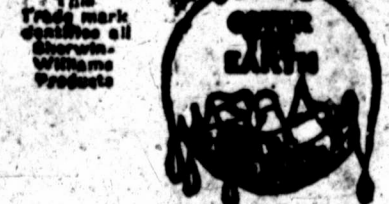
