#### Supreme Council Adheres to Original Appointment of German Shipping

### NOTIFY HUGH WALLACE AMERICAN AMBASSADOR

#### Advised by Wallace That This Country Preferred to Waive Its Claim Entirely

PARIS, Jan. 12.—The supreme council of the peace conference today notified Hugh Wallace, American ambassador, that its decision to award the United States only 2 per cent of the German shipping to be distributed among the allied and associated powers was unchanged.

MEXICO CITY, Monday, Jan. 12.—Apprehension was caused here tonight by the failure of special press dispatches to arrive from the earthquake zone in the state of Vera Cruz. Up until a late hour nothing had been received from the east.

### CANNOT REPEAL RATIFICATION OF THE "DRY" LAW

#### Position is Taken by Attorney for Anti-Saloon League Who Cites Law

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—State legislatures cannot under the law repeal ratification of the constitutional prohibition amendment, Wayne B. Wheeler, counsel for the Anti-Saloon League, declared today in a statement discussing recommendations for repeal made to the law makers of New York by Governor Smith.

### MEXICO HAS PAPER MONEY FIRST TIME SINCE 1916

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 12.—Paper money is in circulation in Mexico for the first time since 1916. This was made possible by a decree issued by President Carranza authorizing the monetary commission to issue certificates of one peso and 50 centavos, the amounts to be issued limited to deposits of Mexican gold made with the commission.

HOUSTON, TEX., Jan. 12.—Colonel E. M. House of New York, a native Houstonian, reached here today for a four day rest. He denied that he had come to mingle in Texas politics.

### FRANCE BEING SWEEP BY VIOLENT STORMS

PARIS, Jan. 12. (Havas.)—Northern and eastern France are being swept by violent storms, reports state that three persons have been killed and 13 injured. Heavy damage is reported from various cities, numerous buildings having been blown down. Telegraph and telephone communications have suffered considerably.

### REPORT HORACE DODGE IS MUCH IMPROVED

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—The condition of Horace Dodge, wealthy Detroit automobile manufacturer, was described as "much improved" by his physician, Dr. Ira Hill, here today. John Dodge is still "critically ill" with pneumonia, the physician said.

### ATTORNEY FOR JENKINS SURRENDERS TO COURT

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 12.—Eduardo Mestre, attorney for Consul Agent William O. Jenkins, who was kidnaped, presented himself in court at Puebla Saturday, whereupon Judge Fernando Guzman ordered the chief of police to cancel the order for his arrest. Summons for Mestre to appear had been issued by Judge Guzman according to advice from Puebla.

Confronted by two witnesses who declared they had seen Mestre taking his meals with Federico Cordoba, the bandit leader accused of Jenkins' kidnaping, at least 30 times before and after the kidnaping. Mestre demanded proof.

PORT WORTH, TEX., Jan. 12.—Ellen Huett, 27 years old, is in the county jail here today charged with murdering her 70-year-old husband, Will Huett, who died last night from injuries inflicted early Saturday with an axe. The woman told the police Saturday they say she split open her husband's skull while he slept, "because he no longer loved her." Today she professed not to remember the deed, nor even to know he was her husband.

The leader of the band, Juan Rodriguez, was an officer in the Villa army at the time Francisco Villa was commanding his army in an attack on this town in November, 1914. Since that time he has been operating with a small band in both this state and Chihuahua. Rodriguez was among those executed and at one time held a commission in the Carranza army.

### CONGRESSMAN SCORES MANNER OF AWARDED SERVICE MEDALS TO MEN BACK OF FIRING LINE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Charges that many army medals for distinguished service were awarded unfairly, were made in the House today by Representative Gallivan, Massachusetts, before the House military committee.

General Pershing was attacked as having given a medal to "every commissioned messenger boy." "Scarcely a single member of the 'boulvard shock troops' of Chaumont and Paris failed to receive a personal glorification through the placing of a medal on his many chest," said Gallivan. "It is believed that practically every member of the general staff

here in Washington has been awarded one of these medals regardless of the character of service. The reading of the sum total of these citations to swivel chair officers who never left Washington would certainly impress one with the fact that the war was fought with red ink at the Warrenton desks near the Washington monument rather than in the Argonne and St. Mihiel. If a single one of these was passed over he must feel like a gray horse in a barn yard of mules.

### CLEMENCEAU WILL CONTINUE CONTROL OF FRENCH AFFAIRS

PARIS, Jan. 13.—French political observers agreed today President Clemenceau will continue to be the real head of the government even after his resignation Saturday. The premier, President Poincare and Alexander Millerand have reached an agreement, it was said, through which Clemenceau's policies will be kept in force by a cabinet of his own choosing during the month between his resignation as premier and his succession to President Poincare Feb. 17.

The result of the senatorial elections Sunday came as the least doubt in political circles that Clemenceau will be the next president. When the Clemenceau ministry resigns Saturday it was said Poincare will charge Millerand with formation of a new cabinet and Millerand will announce a list already agreed upon by himself and Clemenceau. When Clemenceau succeeds to the presidency, according to the politicians here, he will confirm the Millerand cabinet, thus keeping his policies in unbroken control.

As a result of President Poincare's election to the senate observers said it would not be surprising if he accepts a portfolio in the Millerand cabinet.

### CHARGE DOCTOR EXERCISED HYPNOTIC INFLUENCE OVER WIFE TO CLEAR HIMSELF

MARKSBAN, WIS., Jan. 13.—Dr. A. J. Freudenberg held today on the charge of murdering Mrs. Nettie Duffies, his mother-in-law, exercised a hypnotic influence over his wife to procure her support in the fight to clear himself of the accusation. It was suggested by District Attorney Charles Paul today.

The main evidence on which the coroner's jury returned a verdict accusing Dr. Freudenberg of the murder was given by Mrs. Minnie Ballard, a nurse of Fond Du Lac, Wis., in deposition the nurse said: "Mrs. Freudenberg told us she believed the doctor was responsible for her mother's death and talked about it constantly. She was very angry with him and said to him in my presence, if you did anything to finish my mother, you better get her well and do it damn quick."

Steps to exhumate the body of Alfred Duffies, the physician's father-in-law, were taken today. The county board was to authorize expenditure of funds for that purpose. Four members of the Duffies family died under mysterious circumstances within four years. The coroner's jury alleged Dr. Freudenberg caused his mother-in-law's death by injection of a mustard solution.

### Singers at Chicago are Compelled to Pay for Applause

CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—Singers of the Chicago Grand Opera Company have been paying for applause at the rate of \$50 a week to \$25 a performance, according to Charles Fontaine, a member of the company. An assistant stage manager, he said, was head of the clique.

Fontaine explained that the clique leader told the applauders what singers to applaud, when to start a demonstration, and what arias they must make the singers repeat, so the artist's reception would appear "widely enthusiastic."

### PLACES LARGE ORDER FOR COMMERCIAL PLANES

B. L. Brookins, formerly an oil operator in Wichita Falls, is reported in Chicago dispatches to have just placed the largest order for airplanes for commercial purposes ever made. According to dispatches Brookins has closed an order with the Curtiss Aeroplane and Motor company for 200 planes at a total cost of \$2,500,000.

Mr. Brookins is reported to have sold more than 100 planes to oil men operating in the mid-continent field.

### CROSS EXAMINATION OF HARRY SPANELL

BROWNWOOD, TEX., Jan. 13.—Harry J. Spanell, on trial here for the killing of Colonel M. C. Butler at Alpine, Texas, three years ago, on cross examination, declared he had killed Colonel Butler, responsible for the death of his (Spanell's) wife.

"I saw him shooting; I could see the flashes of the gun after I was thrown from the car," declared Spanell. "I don't remember clearly the incidents immediately following the shooting."

Throughout the cross examination the defendant maintained his story without deviation. The defense introduced a number of Waco citizens and former Baylor University students where Spanell was at one time a teacher, as character witnesses.

### HOLDEN HERE TO INVESTIGATE LOCAL TRAFFIC CONGESTION FOR THE RAILROAD ADMINISTRATION

Investigation of the local traffic conditions, brought to the attention of the railroad administration through the wires of William G. McAdoo to the director general of railroads and other high officials of the administration dispatched during Mr. McAdoo's recent visit, was started Tuesday morning with a conference between J. F. Holden, special investigator for the railroad administration, local railroad officials and members of the Chamber of Commerce traffic board.

Mr. Holden, who arrived Monday night, will remain in Wichita Falls for about two more days, before proceeding to investigate conditions at Dallas, Fort Worth and in the North Central Oil belt.

No intimation as to the findings with respect to Wichita Falls, or as to the report which will be made, was given by Mr. Holden, but this report will probably be made public by officials of the administration at Washington.

Accompanying Mr. Holden were F. E. Woodruff, industrial assistant investigator, McAdoo, passenger traffic assistant.

Local railroad officials conferring with Mr. Holden at the Tuesday morning meeting included: J. F. Hockey, general superintendent for the Katy lines; F. W. Grace, division superintendent for the Katy; and J. F. Lott, Denver division superintendent. T. B. Noble, G. Clint Wood, and J. W. Chatman, Jr., the latter traffic manager for the Chamber of Commerce, were the representatives of the Chamber of Commerce at the conference.

#### TO ADVANCE PRICE ON SCOTLAND ADDITION LOTS

The great lack of housing facilities in Wichita Falls has been, and still continues, a problem. New citizens are coming so rapidly that houses can not be found for them. New additions to the city have been opened and the sale of lots has been heavy. Scotland Addition, just north of the courthouse and near the industrial district, is one of the most favored locations. It is desirable for residence property and the likelihood of its being needed as sites for factories gives it an added value.

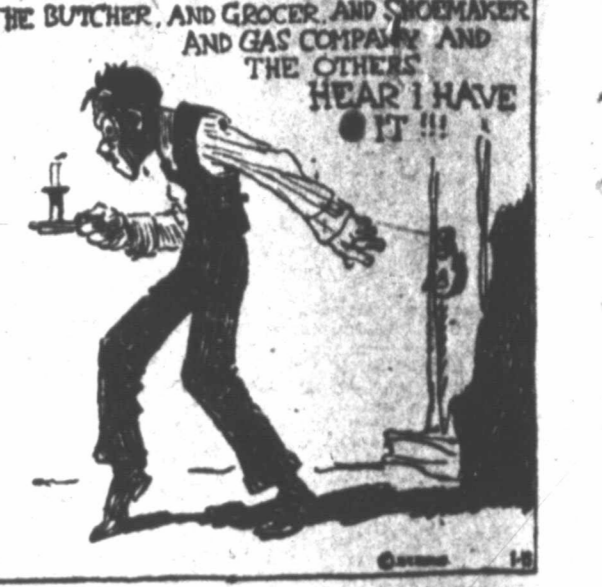

# AT WHAT AGE ARE WOMEN MOST INTERESTING?

I have always said if I could not be an artist I would rather be a mother than anything else in the world.—Gutzon Borglum.

American foremost sculptor, Gutzon Borglum, speaks, and the words of his mouth are in praise of the MOTHER-WOMAN.

It was in the artistically charged atmosphere of the clay moulder's studio that he told which of all the feminine faces shows rarest in his mind's eye.

He answered the question with all the succinctness of a man's mind which has mulled the subject well and has thereby founded a judgment as solid as the marble out of which he hews his form. "If I could not be an artist I would rather be a mother than anything else in the world."

Gutzon Borglum is the solid type of man.

He is no more a dilettante than the reason who chips away stolidly proportioned and strong. He is square and firm. His hands are generally proportioned and strong. His eyes are quick and kind, with a quizzical twinkle in their darkened depths. His voice is mellow, with the note of a patently big mouth to warn not only his own little flock but the flocks of less fortunate fathers in far corners of the war torn world.

The master moulder of America, so free from pose, so lacking in the fantastic follies of "temperament," so honest and human that the passer-by would in all probability mistake him for a tradesman going his daily rounds.

Next to his art—motherhood.

Mother-Woman Appeal.  
"The appeal of the mother-woman is not new to me," said Gutzon Borglum, his eyes roving over the pale complexion of his creation picking out splashes of white in the dim light of the studio.

"It is not necessary for a woman to have children of her own in order to possess the mother look."  
"I have known many number of women who have experienced the miracle of birth and have emerged without so much as a hint of the maternal fervor to soften the contour of their faces."

"On the other hand, there are to my certain knowledge potential mothers with empty arms and a full heart who might pose for a portrait of the Madonna with every assurance of carrying conviction to the canvas."

"Children do not make the mother. The mother instinct is inborn. It will express itself as a spring tide or an ocean surf or any of the infinite forces of nature."

"I asked the sculptor what it was in the mother-woman that caught and held his interest."  
"That is hard to define," he answered. "Then, after a thinking pause," he believes it is her strength, her fortitude, her capacity to endure. It is never shifting source of wonder to me—this unbelievable hardihood of the mother."

"Perhaps I can explain my meaning in an apt by citing the case of the mothers of Poland. I have a boundless admiration for the country. It has been squeezed and ground and panned by the powers of Europe for centuries, yet the Polish patriot of today is no less a patriot than the first of his race to feel the iron heel. His heart beats just as high for his flag. His arms are just as strong to defend its colors."

"It is the mothers of Poland who have made it so. Those dauntless mothers of men crucified on the cross of country, glorifying in the fulness of their martyrdom."  
"During the years 1914 and 1915 there was scarcely a child left in Poland under the age of 7. Starvation—that was the answer. The cattle were gone. Food was so scarce no one dared think of it except for the army. The fighters must go on. When they could no longer go, Poland must perish."

"So the new born were given that the unborn might live freemen."  
"Do not think because the new born were blotted out that the fires of patriotism will sometime burn low."

"You could not every man and every male child in a country of patriots to the crowd and if there are a thousand mothers with child, and half of these children should be boys, a race will rise up to claim its heritage to fight for its own."  
"Here then, is the reason for my interest in the mother-woman. On her depends the perpetuity of the race. In her lies the future. She is Denmark."

"Every one, whether pagan or Christian, longs for immortality. We like to believe ourselves a part of infinity. We want to think that when the curtain closes on this life the

**BOARD OF CONTROL IS FACING BIG PROBLEM.**  
AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 12.—The board of control, which assumed the duties of several state departments and the management of all state institutions on Jan. 1, is faced with a big problem of organization, said Chairman S. B. Cowell. During this organization, which did not begin until practically time for the board to assume its duties, machinery of its predecessors is being utilized and kept intact as far as possible.

CHARGE ALLEGED UNBERTAKERS LOBBY BEHIND MOVEMENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—Charges that an alleged "undertakers lobby" is behind the movement to have bodies of American soldiers returned from France will be investigated by the Senate military affairs committee.

Senator Thomas, Colorado, today cited charges made by members of the Gold Star Mothers that undertakers are behind the movement, and asked that the committee investigate.

"If these charges are true, it is an attempt to compromise the sentiment of those who lost relatives in war," Thomas said. "It is a matter that should be investigated."

Representatives of associations in various parts of the country urging the return of American dead from France today made personal appeals to the House foreign relations committee for the passage of a resolution directing the President to take immediate action along this line.

After the hearing Chairman Porter, Pennsylvania, introduced a resolution providing that "The President be and is hereby authorized and directed to proceed forthwith wherever the same has been requested by the next of kin to exhume and transport to America, for interment in such cemeteries as may be designated by the next of kin, the bodies of all persons now buried in foreign countries who gave their lives in the late war in the service of the United States or in the service of the Allies."

In cases where the relatives desire to care for the bodies they will be turned over to them after reaching this country. Otherwise the bodies will be buried in some national cemetery, possibly Arlington.

American soldier dead outside France number 1156. In France 71,000 American dead are buried. Of these 15,500 are outside the zone of the armies. These bodies will be returned to the United States as desired by relatives. Otherwise they will be concentrated at the American cemetery at Argennes, near Paris.

The disposition of bodies within the zone of the armies has not been determined. France has prohibited removal of the bodies but the state department is trying to have this ban lifted.

Forty more Wichitans today pledged themselves to devote two and a half hours daily, for three days next week, to the Chamber of Commerce membership campaign. The pledges were given at the second of the series of luncheons being held in preparation for next week's election program.

Speakers at Tuesday's luncheon discussed a number of matters in connection with the campaign. Several stressed the importance of enlisting more of the younger men of the city in the work of the organization and urged that the campaign work particularly along this line.

MEN ARE ACCUSED OF RUNNING WOMAN'S OIL ORGANIZATION

CHICAGO, Jan. 15.—The Woman's Federal Oil Company, organized in 1914 by women, today is in the hands of new directors—all men. The company began as a million dollar corporation; its financial condition today was reported as the financial secretary cash in hand \$17.75, balance in bank \$3 cents, deficit for the year \$83,429.

The company dealt largely in Texas land leases. Seventy-five of these said shares were issued and there were upwards of 2,000 shareholders. Shares formerly brought \$4.50 but today they were quoted at 15 cents.

Mrs. H. H. Honora Jr. was president of the company, and one of the organizers. She was the last woman connected with the concern, she said the corporation "was started with every favorable man, but the men ruined it."

"I was my idea to keep it a woman's affair strictly," said Mrs. Honora. "At first we had a woman's selling organization, but later had to include men. When we carried the half million dollar stock issue over to men brokers to dispose of, we had a chance to sell our stock at a minimum price. The men wanted the stock at over 50 per cent—much too high."

The men wanted the stock from the beginning. Now let them have it.

"The situation is one that calls for uniform action on the part of all dealers," said H. R. King of Seattle, Washington, a national director of the association and also a member of the executive committee.

"Competition between reputable dealers keeps prices on dependable merchandise from rising beyond the necessary level."

Conferences have been arranged with H. N. Fitz, special assistant to Attorney General Palmer in price war, to discuss methods for bringing down clothing prices.
