# IN OKLAHOMA TOWNS

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Jan. 13:

The mysterious malady which has been apreading rapidly throughout the state was dignosed today as "winter cholera" by the state board of health.

Officials of the state board of health predicted an epidemic of the disease which appeared suddenly in Skiatook, where 500 persons were affected and has spread in the past few days to several other cities.

It was stated officially that the mysterious malady is similar to that which swept the state in 1915.

According to the health department the epidemic was caused by the heavy snows throughout the state. It is also stated that a typnoid epidemic will probably follow in wake of the "winter cholera" as it did in 1915.

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 13.-Whether KANSAS CITY, Jan. 13.—Whether the mysterious intestinal malady which has appeared in Kansas and Oklahoma exists in other communities of the southwest was a matter for much speculation here today. Meantime, officials of the two states in which the disease has been found were making efforts to identify it and employ means for checking its spread.

Topeka, Kans., and Muskogee, Okia., apparently are the worst suf-

Topeks, Kans., and Muskogee, Okia., apparently are the worst suifferers. At Topeks, advices here said. 200 cases have been reported and unofficial estimates placed the number at 1,000. Many school children are among those ill there. At Muskogee, it is said, there are about 300 cases. No fatalities were known to have occurred at efther place and the death list from the malady remained at four, all at Skistook, the little Oklahoma fown where it was first noticed. The situation as Skistook is said to be under centroll.

State health department inspectors sent in Skistook to investigate were expected to furnish information loday that would assist the authorities in classifying the epidemic. Tests also were being made at the Oklahoma state emergency hospital, and it was believed, in official circles definite information would be obtained.

Conferences of physicians were held last night at Topeks and Muskogee, Some of the doctors expressed the belief that the malady was a form of dysentery while others were of the opinion it was a gastric form of influence.

#### **POLAND HAS REJECTED BOLSHEVIK PEACE OFFER**

LONDON, Jan 13.—Odessa has been evacuated by General Deniken's troops, according to advices to newspapers here today. Poland has rejected the Bolsheviki peace ofter, ac-

A dispatch to the Chronicle from Mian said that Nikolaf Lenin, Soviet premier, had transmitted a letter to the supreme executive of the Italian Socialists, through an envoy who landed at Naples, imploring the party "to abstain from revolutionary movements which present conditions offer little likelihood of success."

An upheaval in Italy at the present time would be a severe blow to the Soviets peace negotiations with various hostile powers, it was pointed out.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—State legislatures cannot under the law repeal ratification of the constitutional prohibition amendment, Wayne B. Wheeler, counsel for the Anti-Saloon league, declared today in a statement discussing recommendations for repeal made to the law makers of New York by Governor Smith.

Mr. Wheeler cited the attempt of New Jersey and Ohio to withdraw ratification of the fourteenth amendment. Congress refused to accept the repeal and both states were counted among those voting affirmatively. Without their ratification the amendment lacked sufficient votes to become

lacked sufficient votes to pecome operative.

Chief Justice Marshall was quoted by Mr. Wheeler as follows: The principle is asserted that one legislature is competent to repeal an act which a former legislature was competent to pass. The correctness of this principle, so far as raspects general legislation, can never be controverted. But if an act be done under a law, a succeeding legislature cannot undo it. The past cannot be socalled by the most absolute power."







## MANY SUTS FILED INVOLVE COMPANIES IN OIL BUSINESS

with damage and foreclosure

proceedings constitute much of the material filed in the district courts during the present week. More than a score of suits have been filed and many of them involve large oil corporations of Wichita Falls and the North Texas Fields.

The Pioneer Products Co, by its trustee, C. N. Wilkins, is plaintiff in a debt proceedings against the Burkburnett-Houston Oil Co, in which \$751.10 is sought. The plaintiff alleges that this amount is due him for crude oil, fuel oil and other material furnished the defendant while the later was engaged in drilling operations in the Wichita Falls oil district. The case is docketed in the 78th district court for trial before Judge Edgar Scurry.

Debt and foreclosure of lien proceedings was brought on Monday in the 78th district court by the First National Bank of Wichita Falls against the Double F Oil Co, a Texas corporation with headquarters in this city. The foreclosure proceedings allege that the oil company is intelligible to the heaking concern to

as corporation with headquarters in this city. The foreclosure proceedings allege that the oil company is indebted to the banking concern to the sum of \$10,000 the promissory mote having been signed on October 5, 1919. A mortgage is held on a tract of land on lot 3, block 98, Red River Lands, which contains a producing well and this tract is involved in the foreclosure proceedings. Charlie Greek, proprieter of the Coliseum garage at Thrift Branch. Burkburnett, is defendant in a debt and damage suit filed in the 78th district court in which John C. Hoffman, Charles H. Rimmuller are named as plaintiffs. Damages and debt to the grounds of labor and material furnished the defendant in the operation of his business at Thrift.

The Petrolis Machine Co. is plaintiff in a suit for debt against Hale & Todd of this city. The sum of \$1,344.44 is sought.





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
