Charge That Troops Are Being Sonora by President

THREATENS TO DECLARE STATE UNDER MARTIAL LAV

Governor Supporting Obregon Will Likely Be Supplanted by Friend of Carranza

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 14.—

Mexican federal troops are being rashed to the state of Sonora to "suppress" the popularity of Gen. Alvaror Obregon, candidate for the presidency, according to unofficial solviers from the border received here today.

Obregon is a candidate in opposition to Carranza's party. The message said Carranza was about to put the state under martial law, that he had so ordered several battalions of troops to the scene and that his forces were reported already disembarking at Gusymas on the Guit of California.

Carranza, in sending troops, declared that "a state of lawlessness" existed in Sonora, according to the Spaces, which is Obregon's home state, borders on Arizona and the Guit of California. Sentiment in favor of Obregon has been on the increase there for some time, solvices said. MYSTERIOUS MALADY IF NOW FADING OUT

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Jan. 14.

—The mysterious malady, which for want of a better name, physicians classify as "winter cholers" and which has swept through Eastern Oklahoma at a terrific pace appears this morning to be fading out.

From Skiatook, where the first cases were found, reports indicate that only 50 of the original 500 affected by the disease are confined to bed. No further deaths have resulted. Although many cities report cases, there seems to be little fear on the part of the population regarding the epidemic.

FOLLOWS MOB DEMONSTRATIONS IN MANY PLACES TUESDAY NIGHT: SEVERAL DEAD, MANY WOUNDED

PARIS, Jan. 14.—Thirty-one persons were killed during the riot in front of the reichetas building in Berlin yesterday, according to Berlin advices reaching here today.

LONDON, Jan. 14.—Latest reports from Berlin this afternoon indicated the situation in Germany was serious, but had not reached the gravity of revolution. Yesterday's demonstration and rioting near the Reichetag apparently was implied by the independent socialists who frankly are out to overthrow the government, dispatches said.

PARIS, Jan. 14.—Martial law has been declared throughout Germany with the exception of Bavaria, Saxony, Wuerttemberg and Baden, according to Berlin advices.

Dispatches from Berne say that during the demonstration before the reieffixing building in Berlin yesterday two policemen were killed and two are missing. Ten others were wounded. Twenty members of the crowd which attempted to rush into the building were killed and 40 wounded.

BERLIN, Tuesday, Jan. 13. — The government tonight proclaimed martial law in all sections of Germany following the mob demonstration this afternoon in which at least 10 persons were killed and many others were wounded by machine gun fire from guards in front of the reichstag build-

building was estimated at 40,000 and hew delegations of working people carrying red flags and banners in scribed with the words "All power to the Sovietie," continued to arrive. Troop reinforcements in huge motor trucks were added to the guards on duty, but only one arrest had been made since noon. The men taken into custody are said to have shouted: "Down with Noske!"

Attempts were made by the guards to quietly disperse the mob but it was heedless of warnings. At last the mob, regardless of the machine guners and other defenders of the building, made a rush against the police lines trying to disarm the guards and disable the machine gans. When it was seen the mob could not be checked in any other way, fire was opened on it. The shooting was at close range and the front of the building was littered with dead and wounded. The most severe casualties were inflicted on the crowd which approached from the Simon strasse side of the structure. Order was soon restored.

The reichstag continued its sitting until 3 o clock, at which time it was anhounced 10 bodies of persons killed in the fightshad been brought into the court of the building.





There was a second congress of peasants' soviets in Petrograd. Kerensky was still conciliative. He wanted to bring all factions in Russia together on an amicable basis. Lenin, Trotzky and their kind were keener than Kerensky. They were representatives of mechanics rather than of peasants. But they say that they could not win without the peasants. So they adopted Marie Spiridonova's land platform, "all the land for the men who work upon it."

Reds as "Peaceable as Lambs Report Officers of the Transport Buford

CHIL Jan 12 The 248 deported ils aboard the United States port Buford—the 'Soviet Ark'' been as "peaceable as lambs," irs of the transport told the Unit-

The "Reds" Lave been "cating all ther one set 'han have made no disturbances and offered no threats of what they will do when they reach Russia, the officers said.

American correspondents were taken abourd the vessel today.

There have been some slight dissuisfaction among the crew, it was learned and three sailors one of Irish and German birth deserted. Saturday, night, apparently with the aid of a German fishing boat in the harbor.

Repair work on the Buford was proceeding rapidly, officers said, and she probably will sail Tuesday or Wednesday for an unknown port. The former reported destination near Reval was incorrect, it was learned. The report arose from a misunderstanding. German newspapers were told the Buford probably would land at a "Baltic port' and they confused this with the name "Baltic Port" as the outer harbor near Reval is known here.

"All's peaceful so far but those 'reds' look troublezome. On some octasions they have seered us."


