## HUNGARY VOTES FOR MONARCHY

### Claim Only Immediate Action By Gov. Robertson Can Prevent Bloodshed

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Jan. 28.—Only immediate action by Governor Robertson can avert bloodshed as a culmination to the Red River controversy in Tillman county, according to urgent telegrams received today by Governor Robertson from citizens of Grandfield, Oklahoma.

### INFLUENZA IN WICHITA FALLS IN MILD FORM

Numerous Cases Are Reported in City As Well As in the Oil Fields

Influenza in a mild form has made its appearance in Wichita Falls and vicinity, approximately 150 cases being reported within the city limits and as many more in the suburbs. Both county and city health officials warn the people that the disease is rapidly approaching epidemic form and urge that the proper precaution to check its spread be taken.

Reports from the oil regions show that the disease is sweeping numerous oil camps. One driller reported Wednesday that he was compelled to suspend operations, due to the fact that his entire crew are sick. Reports from Burkburnett show that there are 200 cases in that place with 250 in Iowa Park.

Physicians say, however, that the disease is a milder form than that of last winter. No deaths have been reported in Wichita Falls.

MANY FLU VICTIMS DROP IN STREETS

BUDAPEST, Tuesday, Jan. 27.—Influenza victims are increasing in this city, many dropping in the streets. The government is requisitioning medicines because of the present scarcity. Hungarian frontiers are tightly closed as a barrier against disease as well as to prevent the export of food and valuables.

INCREASE IN NUMBER OF CASES IN SIBERIA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—An increase in the number of cases of influenza among the American troops in Siberia was shown today in a statement issued by the war department. The statement shows that the number of cases in the army both at home and abroad, for the weeks ending January 2 and 9, respectively, 24 and 41 cases were reported. The only disease death reported, however, was one due to tuberculosis.

DEATHS FROM INFLUENZA INCREASE IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—Deaths from influenza and pneumonia in Chicago continued to increase today, but health authorities, reporting a decrease in the number of new cases, expressed the belief that the epidemic was under control.

Dr. Gottfried Koehler, acting health commissioner, predicted the number of deaths would increase during the next few days, due to the accumulation of cases since the epidemic abated.

### JUGO-SLAVS REFUSE COMPROMISE OFFER MADE BY ITALIANS

PARIS, Jan. 28.—The Jugo-Slav reply to the Italian ultimatum regarding the Adriatic question, received this afternoon in Paris amounts to a virtual refusal of the compromise offered by the Italians. The reply, it is believed, suggests a new basis of compromise along the lines of President Wilson's proposal.

### D'Annunzio Seizes Vessel Containing Two Million Lire

ROME, Jan. 28.—Forces of D'Annunzio have seized the steamer Taranto, en route to Albania, with supplies and 2,000,000 lire in money and are unloading her at Fiume, the Messerico Trieste correspondent today telegraphed.

### MADE PROGRESS ON PLANS FOR A COMPROMISE

Had Agreed on Seven Points With Tentative Agreement of Five Other Provisions

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Information concerning the status of the bipartisan treaty conference, obtained today, showed that when the secret conference was interrupted by the irreconcilable "revolt" and Senator Lodge's ultimatum, agreement had been reached on seven points, with tentative agreements on five others. The conference will be resumed tomorrow.

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### DEFY PLEDGING SUPPORT TO SOVIET PROGRAM

Protest Is Made in Trial of Socialist Members of Assembly

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 28.—Denial that Socialists had pledged support to L. C. A. Martens, Russian Soviet "ambassador," or had endorsed plans for establishment in America of the Soviet system of government, was made today by counsel for the defense at the trial before the assembly judiciary committee of the five suspended Socialist assemblymen charged with disloyalty.

### MINERS COMPLETE THE PRESENTATION OF THEIR DEMANDS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Miners' representatives today completed their presentation of wage and cost statistics to the commission appointed by the President to settle the coal strike and at the request of the operators President Robinson adjourned the hearings until Monday when the operators will present statistical data. Mr. Robinson also gave notice that beginning Feb. 4 the commission would hear representatives of the coal fields outside the central territory.

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CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 28.—With a platform of "protection of the profits and eradication of radicals," Mayor Harry L. Davis, Cleveland, today announced he would be a candidate for the Republican nomination at the coming primaries. Headquarters are to be opened shortly in Columbus.

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### SUFFRAGE LAW OF THE STATE IS CONSTITUTIONAL

AUSTIN, Jan. 28.—The Texas woman's primary suffrage act was upheld today when the supreme court refused to grant a writ of error in the case of T. M. Hamilton vs. Lee R. Davis, tax collector of McLennan county. This action upheld the decision of the third court of civil appeals, which declared the law constitutional.

### REFORM FORCES OF CONGRESS HAVE PLAN ALONG A NEW LINE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Reform forces in congress are quietly organizing for an offensive against horse racing and gambling, which is expected to drive those pastimes into the limbo where liquor now lies. The fight will not be started in the open until the reformers are certain they have enough votes pledged to give them victory. The work of lining up these votes is in full swing today.

### ESTHONIA AND THE SOVIET OF RUSSIA ARE NOW AT PEACE

LONDON, Jan. 28.—A peace treaty between Esthonia and the Russian Soviet government is to be signed tomorrow, according to a dispatch from Riga to the Exchange Telegraph Company. Esthonia is to receive financial and other material help under the peace agreement.

### NO CASUALTIES AS RESULT OF EXPERIENCE OF SIDNEY O. NEFF

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—No casualties resulted from the Port Expedition experience of the lake steamer Skinyer O. Neff, stranded in an ice field here for over a week. It was learned today that the vessel was safely freed from the ice and returned to Chicago through the seventy acres of ice shacking the Neff and found all safe. This included a party of seven men who walked to the boat from Chicago's harbor before shifting winds drove the huge ice floe out into the open water.

### CREW OF POWHATAN LANDS AT HALIFAX; ONLY FEW ARE ILL

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 27.—The American transport Powhatan disabled to sailing here after a ten-day battle with terrific blizzards, heavy seas and zero weather. Her crew of 255 men and 23 officers were safely ashore.

### GENERAL OIL CO. GETS A GUSHER IN GLASSCOCK COUNTY

SAN ANGELO, TEX., Jan. 23.—The first oil well in Texas west of the Colorado river, was brought in by the General Oil company on the L. S. McDowell ranch in Glasscock county today. The well is pushing over the top of the derrick, which contains some oil, according to a Big Springs (Tex.) report.

### SEND WAR VESSELS TO DEMAND REMOVAL OF PORTUGUESE DIKE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28.—The provincial government of Canton has dispatched five war vessels to Macao demanding immediate removal of a dike recently built by the Portuguese in Chinese territory in violation of treaty rights, according to a cable dispatch received by the Chinese World, a local Chinese newspaper.

### SAYS NEXT WAR IS GOING TO BREAK IN PACIFIC OCEAN

LONDON, Jan. 28.—W. A. Hughes, Australian premier, speaking at Melbourne yesterday, said the next war would probably break out in the Pacific, according to a Central News dispatch from Sydney.

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### SAN ANTONIO GETS TWO NEW PLAYERS OUT OF MILWAUKEE

H. J. Benson, president of the San Antonio Texas League ball club, has obtained two new players for the Broncos who may cause occasional trouble for some Wichita Falls pitcher during 1920. The men, according to information received in a letter from the sporting editor of the San Antonio Light, are Holla Darringer, shortstop, and George Anderson, outfielder, both of whom pastimed last year with the Milwaukee club of the American association.

They may cause occasional trouble for some Wichita Falls pitcher because on paper neither Anderson nor Darringer appear particularly dangerous. Anderson hit for .252 last season, but there were 87 players in the American Association who outted the old apple for a higher percentage—Anderson collected only 18 two-base hits, 4 two-baggers and 2 home runs. Apparently, however, he "watts 'em out," as his records show 56 free tickets to first.

Darringer hit .248 and went through the season without a circuit smash to his credit; but he also uses his head as well as his bat, receiving in 1919, 57 bases on balls.

Darringer finished .931, standing fifth among the shortstops of the American association, while Anderson's fielding percentage was .951 throughout a playing period of 132 games.

**ST. LOUIS REPORTS THE EPIDEMIC IS SPREADING**

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 22.—The influenza epidemic continued to spread here today, 429 new cases being reported as compared with 392 cases yesterday. The death toll was eight from influenza and 39 from pneumonia.

### PLANNING TO COMBAT PRICES OF BOOTLEGGERS IN OIL FIELD SUPPLIES

With operations promising the opening of an oil field in the Wichita Falls district in two directions, Tillman county, Oklahoma, and the Kemp-Munger-Allen district, the independent operators of Wichita Falls are planning to combat the prices of the bootleggers in oil field supplies, who reap a harvest during the development of the Waggoner pool, by the organization of their own oil well supply company with a large scale—the proposed capital of the company being \$1,000,000. Of the capital stock \$500,000 will be paid in at the organization of the company.

Practically all of the independent operators, it is believed, will become interested in the new organization. Among those mentioned in connection with the company at present are: W. E. Norton, G. Clint Wood, T. P. Adams, W. J. McCallister, Martin Rowe, F. J. Lea and W. M. Priddy.

### THREE DAYS IN THE COUNTY JAIL FOR THE DALLAS POLICE CHIEF

DALLAS, TEX., Jan. 22.—Three days in the county jail and a \$180 fine was the penalty entered against Chief of Police John W. Ryan of Dallas today by District Judge Phippen, because the police chief was adjudged in contempt of court for failure to obey a summons in a habeas corpus case. Chief Ryan was ordered to appear Feb. 12 and show cause why the sentence should not be carried out.

### INVESTIGATION MAY BE MADE OF PROFITS OF EATING HOUSES

"If Wichita Falls restaurant proprietors are making a clear profit of as much as 60 per cent upon any necessary article of food they are violating the provisions of the Lever act and will be prosecuted for profiteering."

The above statement was made Wednesday afternoon by Special Agent Harry Bishop of the United States Department of Justice when told that Whitley Hodling, business agent for the cooks and waiters' union, had charged local caterers with making a clear profit of between 40 and 50 per cent.

"I have long suspected that Wichita Falls restaurant proprietors were guilty of gross profiteering but have never secured sufficient evidence to base a complaint in federal court," the special agent continued, "however if further investigation shows that Mr. Hodling's assertions are true prosecution will start immediately. I will appreciate any information furnished me which will lead to clear-cut evidence that restaurant proprietors are making the clear profits charged by the business agent of the cooks and waiters' union."

United States Commissioner Lantz agreed with Special Agent Bishop that the restaurants were charging exorbitant prices and should be prosecuted in case the figures given by Business Agent Hodling are correct.

provide that the United States shall not be obligated for any league expenses except services and ordinary office expenses. On this point the language of the Lodge reservation is: "If the United States shall at any time adopt any plan for the limitation of armaments proposed by the council of the League of Nations under the provisions of article eight it reserves the right to increase such armaments without the consent of the council whenever the United States is threatened with invasion or engaged in war." The substitute agreed by conferees reads: "No plan for the limitation of armaments proposed by the council of the League of Nations under the provisions of article eight shall have been accepted by conferees."

Treatment of Alien Nations: The Lodge reservation with slight changes was agreed to.

American Rights: Lodge reservation agreed to.

Voting Power: The so-called Lenox reservation designed to prevent any other nation out-voting the United States by the aid of the votes of self-governing colonies was eliminated under a tentative agreement and the following was substituted: Under part one, being the covenant of the

League of Nations, shall be entitled to cast a number of votes equal to that which any member of the league and its self-governing dominions, colonies, or parts of empire, in the aggregate shall be entitled to cast, the United States assumed no obligations to be bound by any decision, report or finding of the council or assembly in which any member of the league and its self-governing dominions, colonies, or parts of empire in the aggregate have cast more than one vote.

"The United States assumes an obligation to be bound by any decision, report or finding of the council or assembly arising out of any disputes between the United States and any member of the league if such member, or any self-governing dominion, colony, empire or part of empire united with it politically has voted."

On this the agreement is understood to have been of the flimsiest and the question was regarded as unsettled.

### BUILDING OCCUPIED BY M'CONNELL BROS. SELLS FOR \$72,000

The sale of the brick building occupied by McConnell Brothers furniture store on Indiana by C. C. Huff, of Dallas to Sam Kruger and A. H. Fell of this city for a consideration of \$72,000 was announced Tuesday. The plans for the new owners for the building are not known as Mr. Kruger is out of the city. This is one of the largest real estate transfers that has taken place in the past few months of Indiana avenue property.

**TWO HUNDRED NEW CASES IN ARKANSAS**

LITTLE ROCK, Jan. 22.—Two hundred new cases of influenza in Arkansas were reported to Dr. C. W. Garrison, state health officer, yesterday, a summary today showed. Fort Smith has more cases than the rest of the state combined, 134 cases and two deaths having occurred there to date. Fifty-four cases have been reported in Little Rock.

### PLAN NARROW GAUGE RAILWAY TO KEMP-MUNGER-ALLEN FIELD TO SOLVE TRAFFIC PROBLEM

In the event that the developments of the next few days in the Kemp-Munger-Allen district justify the operation, construction will begin immediately on a narrow gauge railway to the field from Wichita Falls, it was stated today. This railway will resemble the trench railways, which can be constructed quickly, and will greatly facilitate the transportation of materials and supplies, and will make it possible to develop this district with the minimum of delay and expense.

Estimates on the construction cost are practically completed, and if the tests in this section bearing sand depth prove up wells, indicating that operators who have believed that a big field will be opened are correct, no time will be lost in building the railway. Local capital is interested, and J. A. Kemp, one of the principal land owners in this section and president of the company that drilled the discovery well is one of the principals in the movement, which will mean much to the oil developments in the section southwest of Iowa Park, in both Wichita and Archer counties. This section is being reworked with tests and developments of great importance are anticipated for the next few weeks.

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# WILSON URGES APPROPRIATION FOR THE EAST

### Renews Appeal For \$150,000, 000 For Relief of Poland, Austria and Armenia

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—President Wilson today requested Secretary of the Treasury Glass to make another appeal to Congress for an appropriation of \$150,000,000 to be used in relieving starving populations in Poland, Austria and Armenia.

In a letter to Glass, expressed regret that Congress had not already authorized this loan. The appropriation is pending before Congress. It has been urged by Herbert Hoover, Gen. Bliss and others who declare starvation will kill thousands if this relief is not authorized.

The President's letter follows: "With considerable regret I have noticed from the press that Congress is delaying the granting of authority for the extension of appropriations for relief to the stricken portions of Europe, the urgency and importance of which, especially in respect to Poland, Austria and Armenia you have already explained to the ways and means committees.

"It is unthinkable to me that we should withdraw from these people who are in such mental and physical distress the assistance which can be rendered by making available on credit a small portion of our exportable surplus of food which would alleviate the situation. While I am sure that you must have explained fully to the ways and means committee the appalling situation in these parts of Europe where men, women and children are now dying of starvation and the urgent necessity for prompt assistance, I beg of you to make another appeal to Congress.

"I am informed through the published report of hearings before the ways and means committee that Congress has now been furnished with incontrovertible facts showing the necessity for immediate affirmative action. This prosperous republic ought not to bear any part of the responsibility for the moral and material chaos that must result from an unwillingness on our part to aid those less fortunate than ourselves. We can merely to husband a small portion of our surplus, permit the happening of this great catastrophe.

## QUESTION IS CERTIFIED TO STATE SUPREME COURT

AUSTIN, Jan. 28.—The case in which H. S. Lawson of Travis county seeks to secure an injunction to restrain the state depository board from performing duties delegated to it by law, on the grounds that the state depository act is unconstitutional, was submitted on the court of civil appeals here today. The lower court refused to grant the injunction.

In the case of W. A. Glascock vs. the First National Bank of San Angelo, this court certified to the supreme court the following question: "Where a party draws a check in such form as that it can be changed to read for a larger amount in such manner as not to excite the suspicion of a reasonably prudent person and it is, after it is drawn, so changed under circumstances that constitute forgery, and the same upon presentation to the drawee is paid without knowledge on his part of such act as would put a reasonably prudent person on inquiry as to such a forgery, is the drawee liable to the drawer of such check or the bank that pays the same?"

According to the statement of facts in this case, the writer of a check for \$5 neglected to place a line after the word "five" and the check was raised to \$500.

## NO INTERFERENCE WITH WIRELESS COMMUNICATION IN THE UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—There has been no unusual interference with wireless communication in America, asserted Dr. E. F. W. Anderson, chief engineer of the Radio Corporation of America, in discussing today the mysterious wireless signals described recently in London by Signor Marconi.

He scouted the suggestion advanced by some scientists abroad that the signals might have come from another planet. If any disturbance existed, according to Dr. Anderson, it was purely terrestrial.

"The supposed signals which are considered unusual probably are produced by some spark station," he said, "and are being heard at a greater distance than ordinary because of the clearness of the atmosphere and the absence of the static. The fact that the mysterious signals are partly decipherable bears out my contention."

Speakers described the measure as the most demoralizing scheme put forward for Ireland since the act of union. They declared that until Ireland was governing herself an attempt to abolish the existing boards of education, as proposed by this bill, would be resisted, as the measure deprived the clergy of control. # FLETCHER QUILTS AS AMBASSADOR TO MEXICO CITY

### Resignation Ends Eighteen Years in the Diplomatic Service of United States

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Official announcement that Henry P. Fletcher, United States ambassador to Mexico, has resigned was made today by Secretary of State Lansing. Fletcher has sent his resignation to President Wilson with a request that it be acted upon as soon as possible.

Fletcher is now in New York and it is not known whether he has any plans for the future. His resignation ends 18 years in the diplomatic service. Fletcher was appointed to his post in Feb. 1916. He did not go to Mexico City, however until the following February. For the last year, Fletcher has been on duty at the state department in an advisory capacity to Secretary Lansing on Mexican matters.

Fletcher's relations with the Mexican government while in Mexico City were understood to be more or less strained, owing to alleged German intrigue in Mexico during the war. Fletcher always took a firm stand in the present contentions of the United States in regard to American interests in Mexico, it was said at the state department.

Since Fletcher's return from Mexico City, the American embassy has been conducted by George T. Summerlin, chargé d'affaires.

## RECORD IN TRANSMISSION OF WIRELESS MESSAGES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—What is believed to have been a record in the transmission of wireless messages from an airplane in flight to a land station was reported today by the army air service. Recently the maneuvers of the 37th Infantry at Fort Mackintosh, signals sent from a plane were recorded at Del Rio, Texas, a distance of 175 miles. An altitude of 200 feet was maintained during most of the time and a general north and south course was flown. The messages were received without a break although the operator stated that at times they became faint and the distinctions varied, due likely to the direction of the flight.

## APPEAL FOR GREATER INTEREST IN FARMING

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—An appeal for greater interest in agriculture by bankers of the United States was given out today by Richard S. Hawes of St. Louis, president of the American Bankers' Association.

"Nothing is more germane to the future happiness of America and the prosperity of its bankers than increased scientific production on the farm," said Mr. Hawes.

"Bankers should lend every assistance to the encouragement of scientific farming methods which will bring proper and adequate returns on labor and capital invested. The bankers must help solve every problem facing the rural communities because their property is close to the whole future of the country."

## PREDICTS BIG WAR IN EUROPE WITHIN NEXT FEW YEARS

BOSTON, MASS., Jan. 28.—Professor Albert Hart of Harvard University urged to United States to make "speedy reparations" for a big war which he predicted would break out in Europe within the next five or 10 years, in a speech delivered here before the Harvard Club.

"It is positively criminal if the United States does not make speedy reparations," he said, "to insure us an army of trained officers and men in the event of war breaking out again."

The lining of belligerent powers are possibly differ greatly from that of the last war, Prof. Hart declared. The combination of Germany, Japan and Russia is far from unlikely, he said, and expressed doubt as to whether Italy would again side with France and England.

"Uncle Sam's job in the war which has just been won was to prevent the Hun from dictating the future policy of the world," he said. "Now that the job is done, Uncle Sam hangs back as if there was no other job."

### WICHITA CLUB IS TO SECURE TOP FLOOR CITY BANK BUILDING FOR PERMANENT CLUB QUARTERS

The Wichita Club has taken a tremendous social leap upwards; out of its basement onto a roof. At the club's regular weekly luncheon in the basement of the Christian church today it was voted to sign a lease for three years on the entire top floor of the new City National bank building, to obtain fixtures and furniture and to create permanent club quarters until such time as the organization may be able to erect its own club house.

Owing to the increased liabilities of the club because of the proposed change in quarters, it was voted to leave to a committee, G. C. Wood, Stanley Field and Judge Feder, the task of investigating the cost of furnishing the new home and the operating expense, this to be used as a foundation on which to fix the club's future initiation fees and yearly dues. Other amendments consisted of eliminating honorary memberships, providing for resident and non-resident members and providing for a membership committee the personnel of which shall be unknown to other members of the club.

"Working conditions are as good and perhaps better in Wichita Falls than in any other city in the south-west," said Jack Prather, business agent of the painters' union, Wednesday on commenting upon a statement made by a local business man that Fort Worth had the most agreeable labor situation than any town in the state. "I do not believe that Fort Worth has any better labor conditions than Wichita Falls. We have more members than Fort Worth, according to size of the two cities and I believe that just as good a feeling exists here between employers and workmen as in Fort Worth or any other Texas city."

### CENTRAL LABOR COUNCIL IS PLANNED FOR ELECTRA

With the progress of trades unionism, Electra labor leaders have decided upon the permanent organization of a central labor council at that place and final steps in the creation of this body will be taken during the present week. Five locals are now in existence at Electra and the cooks, waiters and waitresses have begun organization work.

A central trades council was recently organized at Burk Burnett. Organized crafts have also created a central labor body at Vernon.

A vice president of the State Federation of Labor is maintained in cities and towns where central labor bodies have been created.

### STRONG ORGANIZATION IN OIL FIELD TOWNS

Labor leaders are proud of the high percentage of union members maintained in various oil towns in the vicinity of Wichita Falls. Organization records kept here show that Iowa Park is practically 100 percent organized although but one craft, the carpenters, have a charter there. Five locals are maintained at Electra while practically all crafts are organized at Burk Burnett.

### JOURNEYMAN TAILORS FORM ORGANIZATION

Cardenas, organizer for the American Federation of Labor, has been in Wichita Falls for several days working among local tailors. It is understood that 30 tailors will enter as charter members. Regular officers will be established at the Labor Temple.

### CHARTER COMMISSION IS ORGANIZING TODAY

Members of the newly elected city charter commission are holding their organization meeting in the offices of the Chamber of Commerce this Wednesday afternoon. The meeting having been called together by Mayor J. B. Marlow. Members of the commission, with much of the detail work covered through the labors of the former charter committee and Dr. A. R. Hatton, expect to complete the work on the new charter soon enough for it to be passed on by the voters before the municipal elections in April. In order to accomplish this the charter would have to be reported to the council before the first of March, since 30 days must pass between the calling and the date of the election.

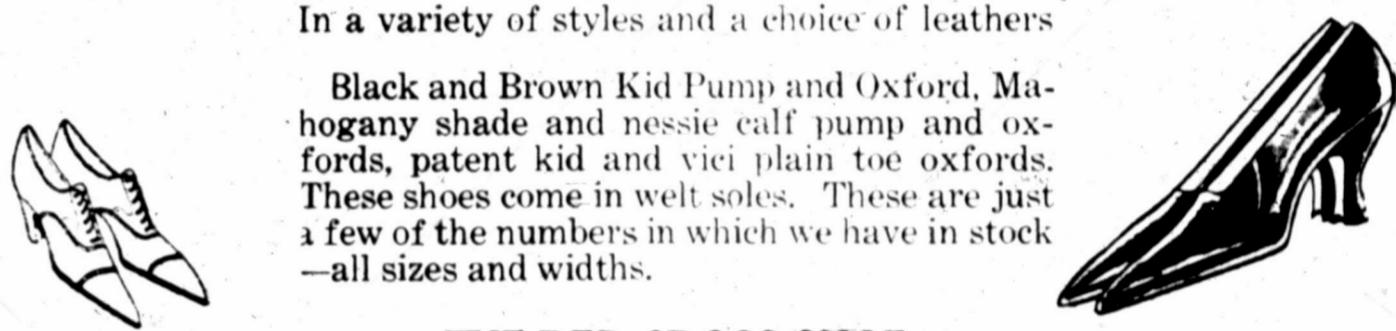

### BURKBURNETT HAS ORGANIZED BOOSTERS TO DEVELOP THE CITY

BURKBURNETT, TEX., Jan. 28.—The greatest business meeting in this city since the early oil excitement was the organization of the Burk Burnett Boosters, composed of the business men of Burk Burnett, in the reception room of the First National bank, Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The big general purpose of this band of boosters is to build Burk Burnett.

The special object of its organization is to build good roads into Burk Burnett to and from the Northwest field and the South field.

The immediate special undertaking will be to fix up the streets.

The officers of the Burk Burnett Boosters are as follows: President, A. R. Thomas; secretary and treasurer, J. P. Roodhouse; road-builder, R. J. Abbott; financial committee, R. H. Henry, M. C. Anderson and A. R. Fribbler; committee on street claims and adjustments, Mr. Madden and Dr. A. W. Adams.

The Boosters will need \$50,000 for street building. The finance committee has three sources from which to draw this money: By private subscription from the people, an appropriation from the municipal government and an appropriation from county or highway commissioners. The pro rata of the later depends on the co-operation of the city to carry the work through to completion in our allotted season.

The Boosters will co-operate in every possible way with these two governing bodies. The fund by personal subscription has already begun and the committee is empowered to appoint sub-committees to solicit from firms and individuals at an early date, that the much needed street work may develop as fast as the weather conditions will permit. Already much is being done even in the rain and the mud. Permanent paving, of course, is an impossibility at present, but the Boosters will begin on Main street as soon as the adjacent thoroughfares can be made passable and traffic can be excluded from Main, where drainage and grading will prepare for final concrete.

Several of the streets are too narrow, falling below the standard required to secure the state appropriation, where said streets will be the continuation of public highways, hence the committee has to widen them from private and public property and adjust claims thereon.

The Boosters are to be congratulated in securing paving, of course, is a road builder of R. J. Abbott's ability and experience. His record as the manager of such enterprises is well known to be A-1 and with his hand at the helm the muddy streets and impassable roads will soon be things of the unhappy past.

Aside from a business need and municipal comfort, civic pride demands everybody's co-operation to boost the Boosters. Instead of Burk Burnett being the "dirtiest little hole in the state," it should, by every right, be the prettiest, cleanest and best. This is no vain boast. Both county and city officials say that "family fights" have become so common in that section of the city that drastic measures will be taken in order to curb the evil.

### REGIONAL DIRECTOR BUSH TELLS OF THE EXTRAORDINARY TRAFFIC CONDITIONS IN THE SOUTHWEST

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Extraordinary transportation conditions, particularly in Texas, during the year 1919 due to the unprecedented oil development, and the very unusual rainfall have been particularly mentioned in the annual report for the year 1919 of B. F. Bush, regional director of railroads, made public today.

"There were three extraordinary conditions local to the State of Texas during the year 1919 have presented extreme difficulties and have had the unremitting attention of the railroad officers," said Mr. Bush.

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The oil development occurred on branch railroads or railroads of light construction which were not adapted to the movement of heavy locomotives or other heavy equipment.

"The extraordinary large crops of wheat was in a territory where no such crop had ever been obtained before, and where there were practically no facilities for local storage. The wheat had to move to a large extent for export via Galveston.

By degrees this situation was improved through the diversion to Galveston of a large additional number of vessels.

The report set forth that during the year passenger train service had

been increased at the rate of 2,347,357 miles per annum.

According to the report, local freight loading on the lines in the Southwestern region showed an increase during the period from Jan. 1 to Nov. 15, 1919, over the same period of 1918 of 91,347 cars or 3.3 per cent. Up to December 1, 53,000 cars of wheat had been moved to primary markets in the region, an increase of 40 per cent over the same period of last year.
