## WILSON URGES **A**PPROPRIATION

Renews Appeal For \$150,000, 000 For Relief of Poland, Austria and Armenia

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—President Wilson today requested Secretary of the Treasury Glass to make another appeal to Congress for an appropriation of \$150,000,000 to be used in relieving starving populations in Poland, Austria and Armenia.

Wilson, in a letter to Glass, expressed regret that Congress had not already authorized this loan. The appropriation is pending before Congress. It has been urged by Herbert Hoover, Gen. Bliss and others who declare starvation will kill thousands if this relief is not authorized.

The President's letter follows:

"With considerable regret I have noticed from the press that Congress is delaying the granting of authority for the extension of prompt and generous relief to the stricken portions of Europe, the urgency and importance of which, especially in respect to Poland, Austria and Armenia you have already explained to the ways and means committees. explained to the ways and means com-

Votes of mothers and teachers of Texas will be needed to pass the proposed amendment allowing school districts to make their own tax rates, Miss Annie Webb Blanton, the state superintendent of education, reminds the women of Texas, in making a plea for heavier poll tax payments. The for heavier poli tax payments. The schools of the state are in a serious situation, because of the lack of funds, Miss Blanton points out, and the situation will grow indeed desperate, she dds, if the proposed special school tax amendment falls.

Her letter, which gives other reasons why the mothers and teachers of the state should qualify as voters, which was addressed to Mrs. J. W. Lee, as an officer of the Texas Congress of Mothers, and a prominent Mothers' club worker of Wichita Falls, follows:

To the Mothers and Teachers o

Texas:
It is probable that the ratification of the Susan B. Anthony amendment to the constitution of the United States will be completed within the next few months. The favorable action of only 10 more states is required. When, for the first time, it shall have become legal for the women of our entire hation to cast a vote for the president of the United States, how will Texas women feel if they have neglected to qualify them. they have neglected to qualify them-selves to take part in the greatest election ever held in a democracy?

In our own state the signs indicate that the enemies of good government in Texas have no intention of being less active in the summer of 1920 than they have been in the past. The vote of every man and woman who has at heart the welfare of Texas will be needed. Are we willing to risk, through indifference now, the loss of has been gained at such cost in

the past?
In regard to education, our state, in the present shortage of teachers, is now facing a serious crisis. Our best chance of permanent relief lies in the chance of permanent relief lies in the adoption, at the general election in Nowadoption, and the proposed amendment whereby each district will be empowered to vote such school tax as it may deem necessary.
