LONDON EDITOR SCORES THE U. S. AND OFFICIALS

Says It is Time to Find Out Whether or Not Country is Friendly One

CRITICIZES ATTITUDE OF COUNTRY IN THE WAR

Says He is "Fed Up With Uncle Sam" and the Claims Being Made

LONDON, Jan. 29.—It is time for Great Britain to "earnestly ask if America is our friend" and if it is found she is not to "make plans accordingly," Horatio Bottomley, editor of John Bull, declared in an editorial in his paper today.

Stirred by the slump in exchange, Bottomley bitterly attacked the conduct of the United States during the war. "I say deliberately," he wrote, "the shame of America's inaction in that fatal hour will stand forever as a monument of infamy before which in years to come every decent American must hang his head."

Bottomley declared it should be easy to establish the truth in the Sims controversy and if guilty Daniels should be "squashed immediately by the president."

U. S. AIRMEN ARE NOT HELD AS PRISONERS

Will Probably Resume Flight and Return From Across the Border Today

BROWNSVILLE, TEX., Jan. 29.—Lieutenants E. F. Davis and G. E. Grimes, American army aviators who yesterday made a forced landing near Guerrero, Mexico, are not held prisoner by the Mexicans and probably will fly back to United States territory today, it was announced at Fort Brown shortly before noon.

MALLEN, TEX., Jan. 29.—Military officials along the border awaited word early today concerning the release of Lieutenants E. F. Davis and G. E. Grimes, American army aviators who yesterday made a forced landing on Mexican soil and were taken prisoner by Mexicans 40 miles south of Zapata, Tex.

BOLSHEVIKI CLAIM TO HAVE CAPTURED 5,000 PRISONERS

LONDON, Jan. 29.—Russian Soviet cavalry, commanded by General Denikin, has forced the retreat in the Manch valley, in the lower Don region, and captured 5,000 prisoners after a two days' battle, the red forces then continuing to advance, says a Bolshevik communique received today.

REPORT AVIATORS ARE KILLING DEER FROM AIR

AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 29.—Complaint that aviators are killing deer from the air came from Terrell county to the game commissioner today. The letter stated that a number of deer which had been shot through the back from above, have been found, and that ranchers and residents of the county are indignant over this wanton slaughter and waste of game.

ANALYZE THE EPIDEMIC IN NEW YORK CITY

Cases Very Evenly Divided Between the Sexes With Small Children Escaping

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—Analysis of the 15,765 cases of influenza reported to the New York health department since the present epidemic began shows that the disease is very evenly divided between the sexes.

While the number of cases reported yesterday—5,598—exceeded the daily record in the epidemic last year by 208, the death rate was considerably lower and physicians generally agreed that the cases this year are in much milder form than last winter.

PNEUMONIA REACHES HIGH LEVEL IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—Pneumonia following in the wake of the influenza epidemic, today reached the highest level since the contagion appeared here. It was announced today by the health authorities reported 407 new cases of pneumonia and 77 deaths.

INFLUENZA INCREASING THROUGHOUT COUNTRY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Influenza is generally increasing throughout the country. It was announced today by the United States public health department. Reports to the health service are so incomplete and scattered that their total is far below the actual number of cases, it was stated.

PLYMOUTH, ENG., Jan. 29.—Influenza raged on board the Cunard liner Kaiserin Augusta Victoria during her passage here from New York, when she sailed January 17. She arrived here today 24 hours late because of a hurricane. There were 60 cases of influenza among the passengers and crew, three of whom died.

Bureau of Mines Has Dallas Office

AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 29.—The Texas railroad commission today received notice that an office of the bureau of mines has been established in the Southwestern Life building at Dallas.

MAKING FIGHT FOR AN AERIAL MAIL SERVICE

Second Assistant Postmaster General Appears Before the Senate Committee

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—A fight to save the air mail service started today in the senate. The air mail must be abandoned at the end of the fiscal year, June 30, unless the senate restores to the postoffice department an \$850,000 appropriation for maintenance of this service.

Otto Praeger, second assistant postmaster general, went before the senate committee to plead for the air mail. He is in charge of it. Friends of the air mail said today that America led the world in its development and that abandoning it at this juncture is a reactionary movement.

Thirty planes now constitute the air mail fleet. They carried more than 2,000,000 pieces of mail from the beginning of the service Jan. 1, 1918, to the end of the year.

HOPE TO IMPROVE RAILWAY SITUATION IN WESTERN TEXAS

AUSTIN, Jan. 29.—The entire West Texas railroad situation was given consideration at a conference held in Washington between Directors Tyles, Chambers and Thelen and E. L. Brown, transportation assistant to Regional Director Bush and J. F. Holden, who has just made a series of special reports upon the Texas railroad situation, according to a telegram received by the Texas railroad commission today.

ATTORNEYS GENERAL AGREE THE U. S. SUPREME COURT SHALL NAME MAN TO TAKE TESTIMONY

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Jan. 29.—Governor Holly today declined to discuss reports that the governor of Oklahoma will depuize as many men as necessary to carry out orders of the Tillman county district court in the boundary dispute. He said that he did not know the truth of the reports and that he never discussed "ifs."

Late yesterday the attorneys general of Texas and Oklahoma agreed after a telephone conversation that testimony in the dispute should be taken before a commissioner to be appointed by the United States supreme court upon recommendation and agreement of both attorneys general.

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PART OF RANGERS ARE WITHDRAWN GENERAL COPE ISSUES STATEMENT

Deciding that the greater part of the prospects for trouble among the rival claimants to the Red River bed were past, Adjutant General Cope with a part of the Texas Ranger force, which was with him here left Thursday afternoon, the adjutant general to return to Austin, and the Rangers to the Mexican border.

CABRERA TALKS OF CONTROVERSY WITH MEXICO

Says Recent Decree Paves the Way to a Complete and Amicable Settlement

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 29.—The recent decree of President Carranza, authorizing the granting of provisional drilling permits to foreign oil companies, "paves the way to a complete and amicable settlement of the oil controversy between Mexico and the United States" in the belief of Luis Cabrera, leading member of this Mexican cabinet.

In an exclusive interview with the United Press, he declared he was confident a "satisfactory agreement is possible."

The oil controversy, Cabrera said, "probably has been the greatest point at issue between Mexico and the United States. Mexico will insist upon the principle of national ownership of sub-surface rights, but if the oil men will agree to this principle they can get together with us and discuss its application with regard to vested interests," Cabrera said.

"We are ready to meet the oil companies half way and talk things over frankly but the oil men must show the same willingness," he continued.

"There has been too much disposition on the part of the oil companies as well as others interested in Mexico to make every complaint an international diplomatic issue, taking everything to the American state department and urging representations when frequently direct dealings would solve the difficulties and avert the so-called 'Critical Situation'."

"I think, however, we have demonstrated we are not adverse to conciliation which should result in smoothing out the oil men's tempers, paving the way for an eventual agreement on both sides."

Cabrera explained that naturally much depends on the final form of the pending oil law and the interpretation and enforcement of Article 27 of the Mexican constitution, but he said he would promise that Mexico will protect vested foreign interests.

"I must preface this opinion, however, by stating Mexico will maintain the principle of nationalization," the minister explained, "and of course, that is often to different interpretations. I hold to the fallacy of the contention that the ownership of surface rights also owns the rights of the sub-soil."

"It is impossible to establish with any degree of certainty the location of oil. Our principle of nationalization also encourages conservation, which is most important today."

"Cabrera then explained Mexico's plans under the nationalization scheme to carry out a feature in oil exploitation unique in the history of the world's oil development. She would establish a protective zone around each well, forbidding competitive drilling within that zone and eliminating the practice known among drillers as 'offsetting' through drilling rival wells—a common practice in the United States."

"The 'offsetting' scheme, Cabrera explained, enables one operator to withdraw oil deposits from another's property, often resulting in excess production with unnecessary pipe lines and storage construction."

"In view of the present worldwide demand for oil," Cabrera continued, "and the trend of the struggle for petroleum, no country in the world can afford not to adopt the Mexican principle of nationalization—or some similar plan—that is a plan which entitled the government to control of the sub-soil."

"We have been accused alternately of seeking to turn over our oil fields to the British, Germans and Japanese, but we only sought to establish a firm system of titles."

Asked for his definition of vested interests, Cabrera admitted there was considerable difference between the government's definition and the oil companies. The companies, he said, often regard their "prospects" to which the titles in many cases are vague, as "vested."

He said, however, he would make the following classification:

First—Flowing wells brought in before May 1, 1917, upon which rights will be recognized as perpetual and protected as such.

Second—Lands acquired in fee period, the term thereof being subject to the new oil law.

Third—Potential lands upon which lease holders also shall receive preference, but for a shorter period—probably two years.

Fourth—Lands held under options, limiting period of development to one year. Where none of these classifications applied the land would revert to the government, Cabrera said.

Declaring the vital question was a matter of titles, he said, the government would not insist upon the question of a land tax and was willing either to divide royalties with the owner or give him all.

"That's my view," Cabrera concluded. "Now if the oil men will show a conciliatory spirit there is a good chance for peace."

MUCH CONCERN OVER POSSIBLE GERMAN TRIALS

Indicated in Note Sent to Allies Asking Revision of Clause of Treaty

BERLIN, Wednesday, Jan. 28.—Indication of the government's growing concern over the extradition of Germans accused of war offenses was given in the note sent to the allies today asking revision of clauses of the Versailles treaty.

The attempted assassination of Matthias Erzberger, minister of finance, last Monday, is viewed in official circles as a precursor of what is likely to happen on a larger scale if the government, yielding to the allies' appeals to force in arresting men on the lists submitted by the entente powers, Editorial and partisan recriminations, provoked by the attack on the finance minister, have already reached the white hot stage.

While it has been commonly known that the Allies, yielding to the allies' persuasive power in an effort to induce the allies to desist in their avowed purpose of demanding the surrender of Germans, the shots aimed at Erzberger have made the cabinet more apprehensive than it has been at any other time relative to the enforcement of the Versailles conditions. The note to the allies, which will not be published in Germany, warns the entente powers that Germany cannot assume she is able to compel either national or local agencies of the law to lay hands on the men wanted and transfer them to German frontiers.

Officials Hands Off. The Associated Press is informed that even responsible officials of the foreign office have announced point blank they will refuse to execute any work connected with extradition formalities and they threaten to strike or indulge in "passive resistance."

A leading official of the foreign office expressed doubt today that a man could be found in Germany from an army or navy commander down to a humble village deputy "who would lend himself to the work of executing a warrant for the arrest or detention of fellow countrymen to be dragged before a foreign tribunal."

Suggestion is made in the note that the men wanted be tried by the supreme court at Leipzig and in the part of the communication the cabinet has indicated its belief that the nation's highest tribunal guarantee an exhaustive and impartial trial. It is pointed out that the Allies are given representation on the bench of the supreme court, which should further tend to guarantee a fair trial.

The economic situation in Germany is precarious at present and this is an unsuitable period to invite trouble, the note indicates, continuing to point out that trouble, if it comes, will not be confined to any single party.

"The whole nation is likely to go on a general strike," an official declared today while discussing the government's plight, if it is coerced into even making a feint in the direction of apprehending the men wanted. It is definitely stated that a list of names of men whose extradition will be demanded has as yet been received and that the government has no hint of when it is coming or who is wanted.

REACH AN AGREEMENT ON ALL PRINCIPAL POINTS IN ITALIAN RAILWAY STRIKE

LONDON, Jan. 29.—An agreement on all the principal points at issue has been reached between the Italian cabinet and the leaders of the striking railwaymen, according to a Central News dispatch from Rome under yesterday's date. It is expected that the strikers will return to work immediately.

CHAIRMAN HAYS NAMES PLATFORM COMMITTEEMEN

Work Begins on Policies and Platform in Advance of Convention

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF., Jan. 29.—Work of the policies and platform committee of the 1920 Republican national convention was due to start today following the announcement late yesterday of its membership by Chairman Will H. Hays. The committee consists of the 12 members of the national committee heretofore appointed and approximately 100 men and women from all walks of life and shades of Republicanism.

The iron-nerved prisoner whose career of crime took him from coast to coast and ended in Tacoma, Wash., with his arrest for the murder of a bank employee during a \$13,000 robbery of the East Brooklyn Savings Bank in December, 1918, began his last day on earth with apparent indifference to his fate.

He seemed as cool as when he sat in the district attorney's office in Brooklyn after his arrest and recouped robbery after robbery and murder after murder in which he said he had been implicated. He partook heartily of a breakfast and smoked innumerable cigarettes.

Hamby confided to Major Lawes last night that he had planned to cheat the death chair by committing suicide in his cell today. He changed his mind, however, he said, because Major Lawes had treated him so square and been "such a good fellow."

FREE VOTES FOR MANY OF THE YOUNG WOMEN

Girls, here's a scheme to get a free vote in the elections of 1920. If you are now under 21 but will be of "voteable" age on election day, the county tax collector is anxious to present you with an exemption receipt which is as good as a vote, if you came to Texas less than 12 months ago but will be here a year on election day, you are likewise entitled to a vote.

Attaches of the county tax collector's office say that young women are not availing themselves of getting "free" votes. County officials are wondering if the young women are ashamed to admit their age, or just fail to become interested in politics.

SUES FOR DAMAGES RESULT OF COLLISION

Alleging that the defendant carelessly ran a truck into his roadster upon the streets of Wichita Falls last August, L. Johns Wednesday filed a suit for \$513 damages against C. J. Peyton. The proceeding is the outgrowth of a collision said to have occurred in the business district of this city and in which the plaintiff's automobile is said to have been badly damaged.

WOMEN ARE REMINDED MUST PAY INCOME TAX

AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 29.—Women who had incomes during 1919 are reminded by Collector of Internal Revenue A. S. Walker that they are subject to all of the provisions of the federal income tax. Many thousands of women file returns and pay taxes regularly, and there are new names added to this list each year. The high wages and salaries received by women last year will perhaps double the number of the fair sex who are required to file returns.

A public schoolteacher, or other city, town, county and state employee, is not taxed on her salary or wages, but must file a return if her taxable income from other sources was sufficient in amount to come within the law's definitions.

An unmarried woman, a widow, or a married woman who is living apart from her husband, must file an income tax return if her net income for 1919 was \$1,000 or over.

She is entitled to an exemption on the first \$1,000 of her income. If she is the head of a family, as defined in the income tax regulations, she may claim \$1,000 additional exemption. Also, she may claim further exemption of \$200 for each person for whom she is the chief support, if the dependent is under 18 or is mentally or physically defective.

A married woman who has an income from a separate source than her husband is entitled to file a separate return with respect to that income. Ordinarily a husband and wife file joint returns, including the income of both. But if the husband does not include his wife's income, the wife is required to file her own return. Separate returns of husband and wife are required if either had a net income exceeding \$5,000.

A married woman who lives with her husband is not allowed a pre-ferred exemption. She and her husband have \$2,000 plus \$200 addition for each dependent; and this exemption may be taken by either or divided in any manner between them.

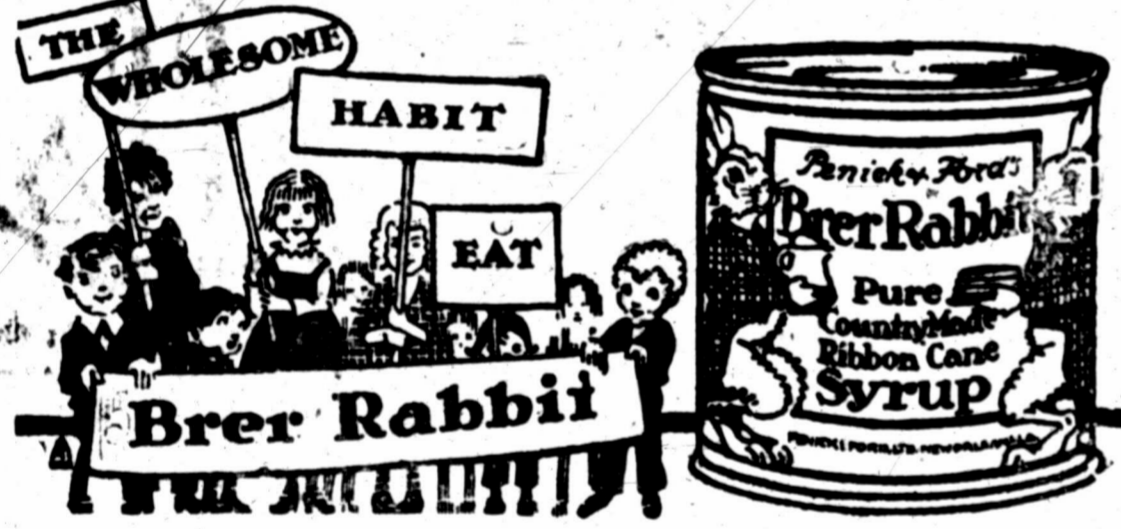

NORTHWEST LOUISIANA EXPECTING GREAT PERIOD OF OIL DEVELOPMENT

SHREVEPORT, La., Jan. 29.—Northwest Louisiana is on the eve of the greatest period of oil development in its history, is the opinion of E. H. Perry, general manager of Coston & Co., the world's greatest independent refiners.

In a recent interview Mr. Perry said: "Unfavorable weather and impassable roads alone retard the expansion of the known Louisiana oil pools in the triangle made by drawing a line from Caddo south to Bull Bayou, thence to Monroe, and back to Caddo, there lies nearly 3,000,000 acres of undeveloped territory. At this time, there are nearly 200 rigs up on this acreage, and scattered throughout it. With anything like decent weather, completions will begin to come in within 60 to 90 days, and the eyes of the oil world are focused on these results."

The refiners are looking to Louisiana to meet a large share of the burden imposed by the constantly increasing demand for oil and its by-products. This section is in about the same conditions as the Mid-Continent field, when the Cushing pool came in. The wildcatter is now in Louisiana in earnest, and when these pioneers flock in, something is due to happen. The next two months will probably see the Caddo and Bull Bayou pools extend as far east as the gas pool near Monroe, and if so, it should be the very biggest oil field ever discovered."

It was suggested to Mr. Perry that the salt water scare at Homer had a tendency to discourage drilling throughout Louisiana. He said: "Those stories, like other incorrect propaganda, will have a tendency to discourage only the timid, and a timid oil operator never brought in or extended a pool. Then, too, these kind of stories have a 'backlash' and react in favor of renewed development. TOTAL OF 299 WELLS COMPLETED IN STEPHENS DURING THE PAST YEAR

FRANKFELT, TEX., Jan. 28.—A post review of the Texas oil fields for 1919 showed that Stephens county completed 299 wells during the year with 24 dry holes and 16 gas wells. This compared with 650 wells, 78 dry holes and 11 gasers in Eastland county and 454 wells, 80 dry holes and 16 gasers in the Hog Creek pool. LATE SPORT NEWS

JACK JOHNSON TO RETURN TO THE U. S.; DEMANDS A FIGHT

MEXICO, Jan. 29.—Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion pugilist, plans to return to the United States at once to face charges against him in Chicago, according to a letter Johnson showed to representative of the Associated Press today.

The former champion is confident he can arrange legal difficulties in time to fight Jack Dempsey before the latter meets Georges Carpentier, of France, and asserts Dempsey must meet him before he can claim the world's championship.

The letter shown by the former champion was written by him to Charles F. Clyde, United States district attorney in Chicago. It said Johnson would go to New York by the way of Havana, arranging through the American embassy here for federal agents from Mr. Clyde's office to meet him in New York. This step was for the purpose of avoiding complications. Johnson requested Mr. Clyde to give him 36 hours of leave after he arrived in Chicago so that he might secure bondsmen and make other legal preparations.

Johnson asserted yesterday that he weighed 213 pounds but would go into training immediately after reaching the United States and would be able to easily make his old fighting weight. During the eight years that Johnson has been out of the United States he has visited virtually every country in the old world and South America.

Jack Johnson was tried early in 1913 on charges of having violated the Mann "white slave" law and, being convicted, was sentenced to a year's imprisonment at the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas. Johnson appealed but before the case was argued before the higher court he forfeited his bail bond of \$15,000 by fleeing from his home near Chicago to Montreal, Canada.

Late in June, 1913, he sailed for Europe and has not been on American soil since that time.

DEMPSEY'S ALLEGED EVASION OF DRAFT IS TO BE INVESTIGATED

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.—Alleged letters dealing with Champion Jack Dempsey's war record were the goal of federal officers here today. With definite action taken toward investigation of the champion's doings during the war period, officers wanted a look at the letters Dempsey's former wife claims to have.

Mrs. Maxine Dempsey, the divorced wife, informally charged the champion with resorting to various ruses to keep from actual war service. She has been in seclusion since making her statements.

In telegrams here Dempsey and his manager said they welcome a full investigation. W. C. Thomas, former army colonel, will have charge of the affair. He was assigned to the case after E. M. Blanford, chief of the department of justice, here submitted a report on the charges made by Mrs. Dempsey.

COFFEE AND MORALE

Think back. Was there ever a time even during the most serious and crucial periods of the great war, when you were unable to have a cup of fragrant, steaming coffee for your breakfast?

Other things disappeared from the grocery shelves, but there was always coffee. Other parts of the restaurant menu were seriously curtailed, but nobody struck coffee from the list.

No matter how hard the times coffee was always on hand.

Quite a bit of favoritism, wasn't it? Or was it? We learned, during the war, how to get along without sugar in cakes and desserts, we learned that we could eat cornbread and barley muffins in place of white bread; we learned how to cut down on meats and fats.

The Food Administration at Washington told us these things must be done and taught us how they might be done.

In addition to cereals, milk and cheese, fats and meats, the United States Food Administration must have had coffee under serious consideration.

For there were black times in 1915 when all ordinary commerce was at a standstill. Unless we sent steadily every available ounce of food to the allies and our own soldiers, victory of the enemy seemed imminent. This meant that every ship not bound elsewhere on an absolutely necessary errand must be pressed into service for the direct shipment of food from the United States to France or England.

Eighty per cent of all the coffee imported into the United States is grown in South America. From North America to South America and back is a fairly long trip and a very different voyage than straight across the ocean to France or England.

Yet there never was a time when ships were not being sent to South America for coffee. Why?

Because Mr. Hoover believed that the American people needed coffee.

Coffee tends to tone up the system when the body is temporarily below par. It stimulates the heart action. It assists digestion.

Nothing else can so cheer up a man who awakes with a groggish or a down-in-the-mouth feeling. Nothing else makes him feel so good without any ill after-effects.

Wise wives have always known that the time to talk to a man is after the rolls and coffee, not before.

In other words, coffee is, as Mr. Hoover said when its food value was questioned, "a psychological necessity."

So you did not have to get along without coffee during the war. At all times dealers were allowed to maintain a "visible supply" of one million and a quarter cups of coffee. This was not as much coffee as goes to make up the visible supply. But it was enough to "keep us going" enough to give each of us a cup of coffee every day.

Mr. Hoover was unwilling that the American people should have to go without coffee. He saw its direct relation to morale in war time. Mr. Hoover gave coffee its first official recognition as a necessity.
