HUNGARIANS TO HAVE MORE TIME TO STUDY TERMS

Extension Has Been Granted by the Allied Powers to February 12th

CHARGE THAT SUPPORT OF AMERICA IS TENDERED

Gen. Bandholtz Will Return to Paris to Give Impressions Formed on Hungary

PARIS, Jan. 31.—Hungary has been allowed additional time to consider the peace treaty submitted by the Allied powers.

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 31.—A Budapest dispatch today quotes the newspaper Szaszat of that city as stating it understands that Brigadier General Harry N. Bandholtz, U. S. A., American military representative in Budapest, has offered to Premier Huszar the support of America to the Hungarian peace delegation.

The newspaper adds that General Bandholtz will accompany the Hungarian delegation when it returns to France and give to the peace conference a report of the impressions he has received on the situation during his stay in Hungary.

A Budapest dispatch dated January 29 and received in this country on January 30 announced that Brigadier General Bandholtz was shortly to leave for Paris.

Gen. Bandholtz, former acting minister to Denmark, has received on the situation during his stay in Hungary.

EXPECT A DECISION IN THE TABOR CASE TODAY

PAW PAW, MICH., Jan. 31.—Justice O. W. Rowland today was expected to announce his decision in the hearing of Mrs. Sarah J. Tabor, charged with slaying her daughter, Maud Tabor Virgo, whose body was found packed in salt in the cellar of the Tabor home at Lawton last November.

MORE THAN 2000 FARMERS IMMIGRATE FROM CANADA TO THE UNITED STATES

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—More than 25,000 persons of the farm class emigrated to Canada from the United States during 1919, according to government reports made public here today.

The United States furnished 52,061 persons—nearly half of the Dominion's total immigration. They brought with them cash and effects valued at \$18,419,466.

SEVEN PERSONS ARE BURNED TO DEATH IN A PITTSBURGH FIRE

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Jan. 31.—Seven persons are known to have been burned to death early today when fire, fanned by a high wind, destroyed 15 temporary residences, occupied by employees of the Carnegie Steel company's plant at Clairton, on the Monongahela river, 15 miles from Pittsburgh. An office building was also consumed.

The fire, thought to have started in a building used as a kitchen, entirely destroyed the 16 structures within 15 minutes. More than 100 occupants of the houses were forced to flee in scant attire.

GENERALS ADDED TO FRENCH WAR COUNCIL

PARIS, Friday, Jan. 30. (Havas.)—Announcement is made that in addition to Marshals Joffre, Foch and Pétain, the French superior war council for the coming year will be composed of the following generals: Humbert, Maistre, Berthelot, Guillaumont, Neville, Mangin, Desseyne, Baucheron, De Gontis and Buat. General Franquet d'Espèrey, commander in chief of allied armies in the Near East, will be retained in that capacity for the present.

NAME COMMITTEE TO DECIDE OFFICIAL ENDING OF THE WAR

LONDON, Jan. 31.—A committee of counsellors has been named to decide the official date of the ending of the world war. It is declared that thousands of pounds are involved in legal proceedings which have been held up pending an authoritative decision on the point.

Interviewed on the subject a prominent barrister said recently: "So many war measures were based, such as the rent restriction act and the orders in council, that one must not trade with the enemy or do this or that and the other, that the legal profession, generally speaking, is looking for guidance."

"No one can possibly answer the question of hand. Some contracts used to phrase at the termination of hostilities, while others spoke of the 'duration of the war' and in each case the parties probably intended the same thing."

MORE THAN A SCORE OF PASSENGERS HURT IN A TRAIN WRECK

BURLINGTON, VT., Jan. 31.—More than a score of passengers were injured when three sleepers of the Rutland railroad train from Boston and New York were derailed at the Grand Isle-North Hero drawbridge between North Hero and Alburtz, thirty miles north of here, at dusk today.

One sleeping car went through the drawbridge into thirty feet of water, the other two remaining on the roadbed. The passengers in the submerged sleeper were immersed suddenly in the icy water, most of them clad only in their night clothes with the mercury at its hollow zero. Many were severely frost bitten before they were dragged out. The accident is thought to have been due to a split rail.

CHICAGO BREAD PRICES TO TAKE A JUMP

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—Bread prices will jump one cent a loaf here beginning Monday, it was announced here today.

Wholesale milk prices will drop 25 cents per 100 pounds, but the ultimate consumer will continue to pay 15 cents a quart.

SEVERAL FIREMEN ARE INJURED IN AN OKLAHOMA BLAZE

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Jan. 31.—Fire which swept through the basement and lower floors of the Gus Paul building here early this morning, caused an estimated loss of \$200,000. Most of the damage was done to the stock of automobile accessories. A gas explosion injured several firemen.

The fire resisted every effort of the department for more than five hours. It is believed to have been caused by internal combustion in a pile of coal kept in the basement.

REPORT THAT BOOZE WAS DUMPED IN SEA

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—The 500 cases of bourbon whiskey which are said to be missing from the \$4,000,000 cargo of the "Whiskey Ship" Yarmouth, were thrown to the fishes off the Delaware capes when that vessel was disabled a week ago, according to the negro captain.

The captain was called before customs officials here to explain the mystery of the missing intoxicants, following discovery of an automobile loaded with whiskey by revenue men who went on board Thursday.

HAS BEEN ACQUITTED ON THE CAVELL CHARGE

PARIS, Jan. 31.—Georges Quien, who originally was sentenced to 20 years for alleged betrayal of Edith Cavell, the British nurse, executed by the Germans in Belgium, has been found not guilty on the Cavell charge.

The court, however, confirmed Quien's conviction for espionage. He was sentenced to 20 years in prison.

TREATY BATTLE NOW GOES BACK TO THE SENATE

Senator Hitchcock to Move on February Tenth That the Matter be Taken Up

NUMBER OF QUESTIONS TO BE DECIDED BEFORE THAT DATE

In Meantime Conferences Will be Held by Leaders of Both Factions

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The treaty controversy now goes back to the Senate as a whole as a result of collapse of the bipartisan conferences efforts at compromise.

Senator Walsh, Montana, will pave the way today for the formal calling up of the treaty in the open Senate on Tuesday, February 10, Senator Hitchcock will formally "move the Senate now proceed to the consideration of the treaty with Germany."

Walsh's notice will set in motion a train of events preliminary to the Hitchcock motion. Between now and February 10, a number of questions must be decided. They include:

1—Will the Democrats support Hitchcock practically as a unit when he makes his motion, or will they desert his leadership in sufficient numbers to prevent resumption of treaty debates?

2—Will the Republicans and reservationists combine with the Democrats in sufficient numbers to make Hitchcock's motion successful?

3—How will the "Irreconcilable" Republicans vote?

4—Will Senator Lodge maintain his position on the treaty or will he surrender on this point in the face of the country's demand for immediate ratification?

The answers to some of these questions depend on conferences to be held between now and February 10. As things now stand, Senator Hitchcock believed, he said, that 43 or 44 of the 46 Democrats will support the motion. Some of them have, however, privately expressed the strongest opposition to it on the ground that to get the treaty into the Senate again means blocking all legislation, of which there is a great deal demanding attention.

Hitchcock holds that a majority of the Senate, that is, 49, can call up the treaty. If he gets 43 Democratic votes he must have six Republican ones. If Lodge and those who stand with him stick to the position which they now occupy, that the treaty cannot be called up, Hitchcock must get his votes from the mild reservation group or the irreconcilable group.

Senator McNary, mild reservation leader, favors this move, as do McCumber and Holt. That makes 12 votes. Kellogg and Lenroot, counted with this group, do not favor it and it is believed, Hale is also against it. McNary predicted today that the mild reservation group will furnish all the Republican votes needed to put Hitchcock's motion over. Some of the irreconcilables also favor it, because it would give them a stand which would did opportunity to campaign the country on the Senate floor for utter rejection of the treaty and the league covenant.

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VIEW OF BOLSHEVIK ARMORED TRAIN

This train is composed of the serviceable parts of various captured Bolshevik trains. The fighting car has one large gun turret mounting a 75-mm. gun. ACCIDENT TO SHIP CARRYING SUPPLIES IS SERIOUS RESULT

LONDON, Friday, Jan. 30.—Reports that the British steamer Willdomo, bound from New York to Danzig with supplies for the people of Poland, has gone ashore off Farsund, Norway, are viewed in a serious light here. The vessel carried a cargo of milk and other food especially adaptable to feeding children which would have met pressing demands at Warsaw for two months.

In semi-official quarters it is said there is no indication the vessel will be floated soon.

HEADLINES INDICATE HOW BRITISH PRESS TAKES GLASS LETTER

LONDON, Jan. 31.—Headlines in the evening newspapers show how Great Britain is taking the letter of Carter Glass, the retiring secretary of the United States treasury, to Homer L. Ferguson, president of the chamber of commerce of the United States, from the United States, in effect that the United States does not undertake to finance the requirements of Europe.

The Westminster Gazette calls it "a financial ultimatum from the United States," the Globe "finance threat from the United States," the Pall Mall Gazette "America's loans to stop," the Evening News "No more money from the United States," and the Star "Let Europe pay in gold."

What little comment appears suggests that Mr. Glass' ultimatum will spur British bankers and financiers toward an effort to meet the situation.

LATROBE'S "SUCKER LIST" TO BE SOLD AT AUCTION

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—The twenty-five thousand dollars' worth of "sucker list" from L. R. Latrobe, Wall street broker, and who are alleged to have sent him nearly \$750,000 for investments which never were made, may expect soon to receive their first consignment of "literature" from a new firm. An advertisement in a Wall street publication today announced that Latrobe's customers list, known in the slang of the street as a "sucker list," would be sold at auction on February 6.

A body attachment for Latrobe, which his attorneys said is said to be unknown, was issued by Federal Judge Knox yesterday at the request of Edward B. Levy, receiver of the Latrobe firm. Two proceedings in bankruptcy were filed in the case several months ago.

According to Mr. Levy, the "sucker list" is virtually the only asset he has. It is a list of names and addresses of persons who have invested in the stock market, Mr. Levy said.

PROGRESSING WITH WORK ON PROPOSED CHARTER FOR CITY

Considerable progress was made in framing the new city charter at the meeting of the commission held in the director's room of the Chamber of Commerce Friday night, the work of examining the first 72 sections of the charter submitted by Dr. Hight being practically completed. The commission expects to be able to complete the work within the next week or 10 days when the charter, as approved, will be submitted to a vote of the people.

The draft, as submitted by Dr. Hight, in a large measure meets with the approval of the commission as far as the salary features of the new charter include:

The election of a mayor and four aldermen instead of five aldermen, as heretofore, all other members of the official family to be appointed by the city manager or the board of aldermen.

Providing that the board of aldermen may employ a city manager if they deem such action to be in the interests of the city, such manager to be selected from within or without the city and be subject to discharge at any time the board may so elect.

Providing for the initiative, referendum and recall.

Providing for a maximum tax rate of \$2 on the \$100 valuation.

The new charter as drafted provides that in the event of the death or resignation of the mayor or a member of the board of aldermen his successor shall be elected by the remaining members of the council.

Some objection was voiced to this provision on the theory that the people should make the selection, but a majority of the commission adopted the proposed plan.

Some discussion was had as to the boundaries to be proposed for the city and in this connection a committee of J. B. Marlow, W. F. Weeks and J. A. Richolt was named to go into the matter and report at a later meeting.

The commission will meet again on Monday night to take up other features of the charter.

THIRTY-SEVEN ALLEGED REDS ARE INDICTED

Big Bill Haywood and Thomas Whitehead are Included Among Number

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—Indictments against thirty-seven members of the I. W. W. were returned this morning by the special grand jury investigating radical activities. Chief among those indicted were William D. (Big Bill) Haywood, former secretary of the organization, now at liberty from Leavenworth prison under bond, and Thomas Whitehead, who succeeded Haywood as secretary.

The indictments complete the work of the "red" grand jury. Last week the grand jurors indicted eighty-five members of the Communist party and thirty-eight members of the Communist Labor party.

The charges in all cases are conspiracy to overthrow the government by force.

The indictments of the leading figures in the three radical organizations are the outgrowth of the sensational New Year's Eve roundup, in which State's Attorney Hoyne, anticipating federal authorities by twenty-four hours, arrested more than 300 persons suspected of being members of the three groups.

The indictments were returned secretly before Chief Justice Crowsley this morning. At ten o'clock it was said leaders appeared in Judge Pam's court to answer charges already pending against them. They were met by agents of the state's attorney's office and 37 principals sorted out and placed under arrest.

Mr. Hoyne expects to try the alleged radicals in three groups according to their party affiliations. Trials are slated to begin in about 60 days.

The committee hearings have been adjourned until Tuesday.

CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 31.—Mrs. Edith Bullman and her five months old daughter, Pauline, were shot to death early today and the husband and father, Martin, was reported dying in a hospital.

Police believe Bullman, temporarily deranged by influenza from which all three members of the family have been suffering for a week, killed his wife and baby and then shot himself.

ENUMERATION OF NATION'S INDUSTRIES TO START MARCH 1

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Enumeration of the nation's industries, including manufacturing plants, mines, quarries and oil and gas wells, forestry and forest products, will start March 1, it was announced today by Director of Census Sam L. Rogers. For the purpose of this census the country has been divided into 558 districts and 1,290 men will be needed to make the count. A force of 98 special agents from the Washington office will be in charge of the headquarters in the various states. Complete statistics covering the industries are to be gathered and these will show accurately the economic situation of the country. Figures on the numbers of workers employed and hours and wages will be compiled. There now are about 400,000 manufacturing plants listed by the census bureau.
 Men only will be employed to take

the industrial census the director stated, and payment will be made on the basis of \$1 for each plant enumerated. Former soldiers, sailors and marines will be given the preference for this work.
 Hereafter the industrial census will be taken every two years, Mr. Rogers stated, instead of only at the time of the decennial population count.

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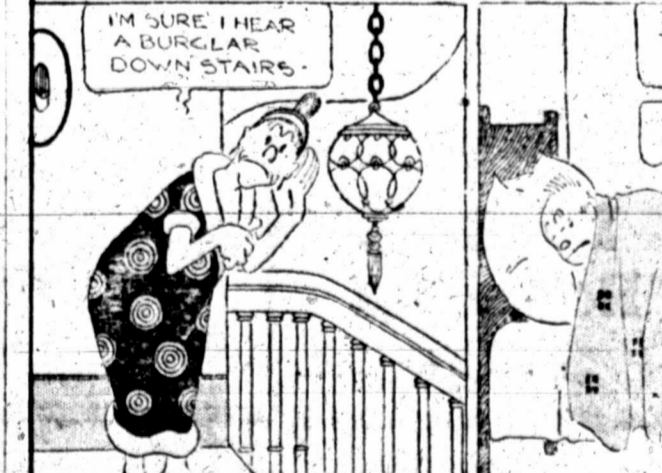
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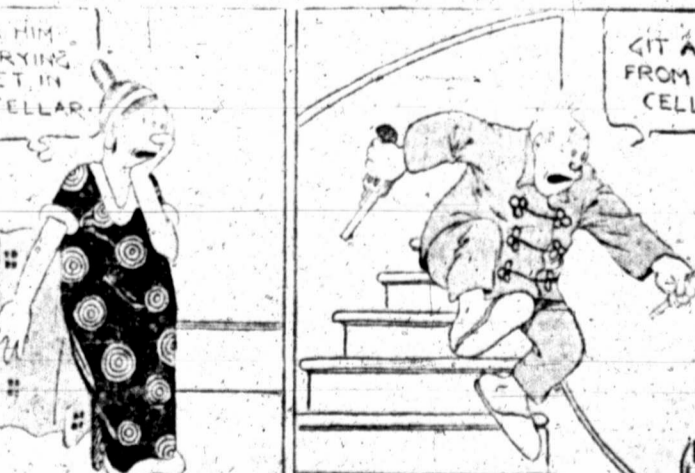

GRAND RAPIDS, MICH., Jan. 31.—An effort to complete the selection of a jury today for the trial of Senator Truman H. Newberry and 123 co-defendants charged with violation of the election laws, federal district court convened half an hour earlier than the usual time this morning, illness of 15 veniremen, three of them in the tentative panel, served to prolong the process yesterday. Sessions, who appointed a physician to look after the health of the venire, and attorneys expressed concern over a possible mistrial if the epidemic is not checked.

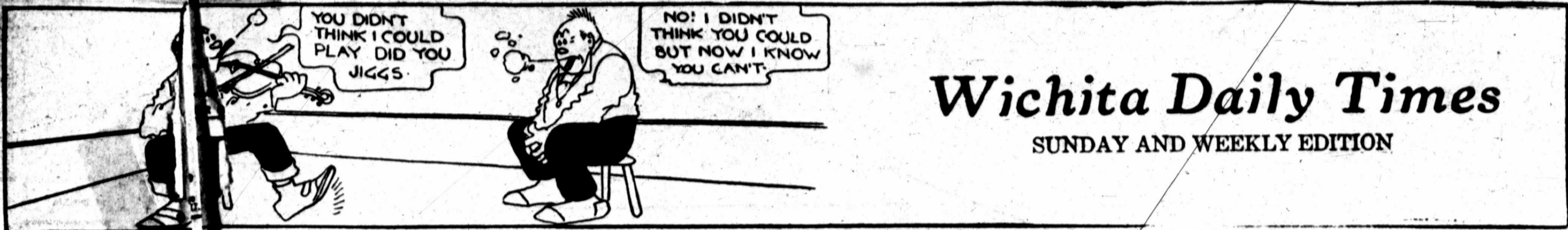
