

INDEPENDENCE OF ESTHONIA IS PART OF TERMS

Provisions of Peace Agreement Outlined in Dispatch Received From Revel

LONDON, Feb. 4.—Soviet Russia agrees to give unreserved recognition of the independence of Esthonia under the terms of the peace agreement reached between the two nations, according to a dispatch from Rval. The Russian Soviet government also renounces all rights to Soviet in Esthonian territories, the dispatch said. It outlines the peace agreement as follows:

"Both nations renounce any claims to indemnities.

"Prisoners are to be repatriated quickly.

"Russia is to pay Esthonia 15,000,000 rubles in gold, but there will be customs charges between the nations.

"Esthonia receives a concession to construct a railway to connect with the Moscow line at the Esthonian frontier and permission to purchase 2,500,000 acres of woodland.

"Russia receives the right to electric power from the Narva River."

Night News Briefs

NEW YORK—The Black Star line steamship Yarmouth, which sailed for Havana last month with a \$4,000,000 whiskey cargo and not back for repair, seized by prohibition agents.

REVAL—By the terms of Russo-Esthonian peace, Russia recognizes the full sovereignty of Esthonia.

WASHINGTON—The shipping board announced the sale of the Mercury, a former German-owned steamer and one of thirty for which the board recently received bids.

WASHINGTON—Reckless extravagance in the construction of the government nitrate plant at Muscle Shoals, Ala., charged in a report by Colonel Fred Wagner, former director of operations at the plant, filed with the house war expenditures committee.

PARIS—The list of persons whose extradition is demanded by the Allies, handed to Baron Von Lerner, head of the German peace delegation, by Paul Dutasta, secretary of the peace conference.

HOT SPRINGS—Eddie Coulon of New Orleans knocked out Jimmy Taylor of New York in the second round.

CHICAGO—Maurice Enright, known as the chief of Chicago gunmen, and a figure in many labor feuds, shot to death by five men in an automobile as he stepped from his own motor car.

FALL RIVER, MASS.—Marriage license issued to Miss Emily Knowles and Guy S. Spiker. They probably will be married Sunday.

DUNDALK, IRELAND—The steam packet Ievagh, which left Liverpool Monday night for Dundalk, missing.

TOPEKA—Hugh Fisher, attorney for Robert Hill, negro, wanted in connection with the Phillips County, Arkansas, race disorders, informed Governor Allen's office that ten to fourteen days more would be needed to gather evidence in connection with Hill's extradition.

ROCHESTER, N. Y.—Chairman Cummings of the Democratic national committee predicted that the Democratic party would poll most of the women's vote.

NEW YORK—The army, navy and civilian board of boxing control announced the appointment of a committee to investigate the war record of Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion.

Attacks Clergymen For Permitting the Use of Cigarettes

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—Clergymen who see "no evil" in smoking are demoralizing the church, Miss Lucy Page Gaston, president of the Anti-Cigarette League, declared here today.

"If the church allows cigarette smoking where will the sinner go for refuge?" Miss Gaston asked. "The minister who allows cigarette smoking by his parishioners is merely being led by the lust of money. When the minister of the gospel lowers himself to this, he should no longer be allowed to preach and should be ousted from the pulpit."

"There are no rules against men smoking outside the church," Rev. John T. Brushingham, a Methodist minister here said. "I never brought the topic into my sermon, as it is a personal privilege in which I see no harm."

FILE PROTEST AGAINST LOWERING BREAD RATION

BERLIN, Tuesday, Feb. 3.—Protest against the lowering of the bread ration from 260 grams to 200 is made by the Zeitung Am Mittag, which calls attention to the facts that premiums were promised to the farmers by the government for supplying needed food products. The newspaper complains that, despite the wet mild winter, Berlin is receiving only two pounds of potatoes each for each inhabitant while other cities and towns are getting four pounds per capita.

SHORTAGE OF LABOR HAMPERING PRODUCTION

QUANAH, Feb. 4.—Due to the shortage of labor the two large Acme and Agatite cement and plaster mills are hampered in production, says a telegram to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. In the face of this shortage orders from the four quarters of the nation are pouring into the general offices.

The plants are located just west of Quanah on the Denver & Quanah Acme & Pacific railways. About 200 employees are now on the job. The supply about the plants is sufficient to keep the industry operating full time for ever. In addition to the manufacture of cement and plaster a superior cement for dental purposes is fabricated here.

The prospects are that the price of coffee will double in the next three years. The word comes from Brazil.

SAYS FUTURE PEACE IN THE BALKANS UP TO PREMIER NITTI

LONDON, Feb. 4.—Upon Premier Nitti rests future peace in the Balkans, a high Jugo-Slav official declared in an interview here. Jugo-Slavia has submitted her "last word" in the Adriatic dispute, the official said. "It is Italy's next move," he added.

Denying reports from Italian sources that Jugo-Slavia is mobilizing her country does not plan an offensive war in the Balkans even if the pact of London is enforced, which he considered unlikely.

Italian officials, on the other hand expected a compromise. Nitti's proposals for settlement of the Italian Jugo-Slav Adriatic dispute they characterized as "most liberal." The flame situation they considered as "question mark."

Judge Taylor has been recommended for the position by Senators Sheppard and Culbertson and it is expected his nomination will soon go to the Senate.

Clarence McKinney, U. S. attorney for the Eastern Texas district, has resigned. Senators Culbertson and Sheppard have not yet decided upon his successor.

Negro Confesses to Murder of Father, Voodoo Responsible

KANSAS CITY, MO., Feb. 4.—Jim Bundy, negro, 21, has confessed, police say that he killed his father, Joe Bundy, with an ax because of a voodoo doctor's revelations.

His mother, he said, went to see the black seer recently, to learn the cause of her illness. The voodoo advised her to get rid of her husband as he had brought on a "spell" by boiling herbs and tricking his wife into drinking the brew. Tom said his mother repeated the "revelations" to him, adding "if you love your mother you will get rid of your father." Young Bundy says after striking his father twice with an ax, he robbed the dying man of \$20. Thirty dollars he sent to his sick mother, gave his wife \$20, and paid his rent with \$18.50—explaining his sudden affluence as winning in "polo" game. Then he "discovered" his father's body, called the police who held him and wrung the confession from him.

COLUMBIA FALLS, MONT., Feb. 4.—C. A. Robinson, deputy game warden, has brought in from the hills a photograph of two buck deer which fought, with horns interlocked, until death came.

PLAN CONSOLIDATION OF NATIONAL CHURCH BODIES

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 4.—General discussion of one of the plans for the proposed organic union of 22 national church bodies began today at the conference of delegates from many Evangelical denominations. As presented at the opening session yesterday, this plan provides for a viable organization to be created and known as the "United Churches of Christ in America." Each constituent church would serve the right to retain its creedal statements, its form of government in the conduct of its own affairs and its particular mode of worship, but would co-operate in the activities of the work of the church minimize differences and band together in a vital and effective union.

Among the denominations represented at the conference are the Methodist, Baptist, Congregational, Dis-

ciples, Episcopal, Primitive Methodist, Moravian, Presbyterian, Reformed Episcopal, United Presbyterian, Christian church, Christian Union of the United States and the Armenian church.

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MAKES STATEMENT REGARDING PLEA IN ACCOUNTANT CASE

The Times has received a communication from G. S. Reid of the firm of Mattison, Reid & Co., public accountants, in which he calls attention to the Times' account of the court proceedings when he and D. R. McNeill pleaded guilty to use of the word "certified" on their letterheads as an accounting firm.

Mr. Reid takes issue with the statement of the member of the examining board that "they had been refused a certificate by the state board on the ground they had not passed examinations in this state, etc." and submits letters from L. B. Smith, chairman of the state board of accountancy, and a letter from M. W. Mattison to Mr. Smith.

The letter from Mr. Smith is dated Dec. 24 and is addressed to Mattison, Reid & Co., at Wichita Falls. It calls attention to a letterhead of the firm in which the term "certified public accountants" is used. To this letter Mr. Mattison replied from Houston Dec. 29, writing:

"Mr. Reid, who is now my partner and located in Houston, informed me that it was his impression that the certificate of one member of the firm was all that might be required, and your letter is the first notice to him that his information was incorrect. The letter states that the firm is continuing the word 'certified' on the letterheads. The letter also expresses confidence that a certificate would be granted Mr. Reid for which he has had application before the board for something like a year."

In answer to this letter Mr. Smith wrote on Jan. 1, explaining that Mr. Reid's application had not been acted upon through the confusion arising out of the change in the personnel of the board. This letter follows in full:

DALLAS, TEX., Dec. 24, 1919.

Mattison, Reid & Co.,
Postoffice Box 638,
Wichita Falls, Tex.

Gentlemen: I have before me your letter, head under the above name with the addition of Certified Public Accountants.

Knowing of you gentlemen and your reputation, I do not feel that you are wilfully practicing as Public accountants in direct violation of the law, copy of which I enclose you.

As chairman of the State Board of Accountancy, it is incumbent on me to call the attention of the proper authority to matters of this kind.

Mr. Reid is not a Certified Accountant under the laws of the State of Texas and no audit company is allowed to practice as certified. You will readily see this by reading Section 12 of the law herein. I would like for you to write to me, explaining why you are practicing under the style as set out in your letter head as I do not desire to call the attention of the authorities to a matter of this kind if there are extenuating circumstances.

Very truly yours, L. B. Smith, Chairman.

Mr. Reid called attention to his many years' experience as an accountant and said that while he was doubtless guilty of a technical violation of the law that there was no willful intention on his part to do so. Mr. Reid in his communication says that Mr. McNeill has been entirely blameless in the matter, as has Mr. Mattison and that the fault is wholly his own.

IMMEDIATE ACTION ON TELEPHONE RATES IS NOT ANTICIPATED

CASES ARE REVERSED BY COURT CRIMINAL APPEALS

REORGANIZATION MEETING HELD AT KEMP PUBLIC LIBRARY TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

DEPARTMENTS ARE FORMED

Committees Are Announced to Take Up the Work Along the Various Lines.

City beautification and sanitation, a municipal market, corporation with city officials in civic affairs where the women may give assistance, and a continuous membership campaign were some of the lines along which the Civic League planned their 1920 work, at the re-organization meeting held Tuesday afternoon at the Kemp Public Library. Community beautification schemes through community and individual contests will be a part of the City Beautiful Department's work, according to Mrs. J. A. Kemp, who outlined some of the plans of this department in the absence of Mrs. W. S. Curlee, the chairman. An effort will be made to make the entire city attractive through interesting the individual householders in beautifying their premises. The sanitation department, of which Mrs. M. H. Glover is chairman and the city beautiful department will co-operate in much of their work. It was pointed out, since the functions of both departments will be towards the same end.

The municipal market has been a plan of the Civic League for months, since the necessity for the housewives taking measures to combat the high cost of living became so pronounced, and this department, while the funds for operating the market are being accumulated through the League's serving the various club luncheons will be busy on plans for the opening of a market, though at present there is no definite announcement made.

Problems of the public amusement places where the women can give assistance to the city authorities will rest with the public affairs department of which Mrs. J. W. Lee is chairman. This department's mem-

bership includes Mayor J. B. Marlow, representative from the city council and the Chamber of Commerce. This department will deal also with any other matters pertaining to the interests of the general public.

The Civic League will also pay more attention to the social side during 1920, recognizing the fact that with the immense new population there is a social debt that the organization owes to the new members, and plans were made at the Tuesday meeting for a quarterly social meeting, to which the branch leagues and all friends of the members will be invited. The League also made plans for contributing one of the Y. W. C. A. monthly entertainments for the girls of the city, choosing to entertain in March.

There are at present 218 members of the Civic League, Mrs. J. E. Sharpe, the secretary announced Tuesday, and the membership department is to add to this membership throughout the year by a continuous personal campaign.

Allied to this plan for increasing the membership in the work of the city beautiful department, which will increase the number of branch leagues already organized.

These outlines of the new department organization constituted the feature of the business meeting Tuesday. Mrs. T. B. Smock, the president presided with Mrs. Sharpe, the secretary giving the reports.

A subscription of \$10 to the Texas Women's Poll Tax League to help pay the expenses of the campaign just closed was voted. Much satisfaction was expressed at the large poll tax payments in Wichita Falls by the women, though no definite figures of the payments could be given at the time.

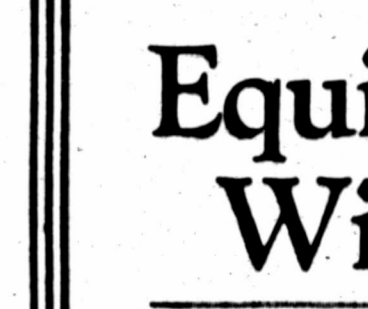
RED BLUFF IRRIGATION PROJECT ON THE PECOS NEARER CONSUMMATION

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SALE OF OIL LEASES IN THE OSAGE NATION BRINGS \$3,102,000

PAWHUSKA, OKLA., Feb. 4.—"Poor Lo, the Indian, is getting richer. Sale of leases in the Osage nation yesterday brought \$3,102,000 to be divided between 2,229 original leads. At the government auction of leases big operators competed with little ones who risked their all. The bidding at times appeared to the unsophisticated observer as pure foolery. The highest price paid for a lease was \$22,000 by the Phillips interests, while the Maryland people took on a lease at \$201,000 in spirited bidding with the Phillips crowd which the latter hiked the bid five thousand dollars for every one thousand boost by the former.

The big bidders run up their offerings by thousands with a mere nod of the head. But little fellows chewed nervously, their faces flushed the while. One confided to a stranger that he had sold his house and lot to buy a lease. "It means either wealth or—but, God! I mustn't fear already I've got to win."

But in this battle for leases there was room for rivalry. The bidding on a certain tract started at the usual \$1,000 and moved up to \$1,400. A woman's voice bid \$1,500. It came from the press table—Miss Roselia Flanagan—Tulsa, newspaper woman.

"Sixteen hundred" was as far as a man nearby got.

"Shut up. Let her have it," was the cry. When the applause died down the auctioneer announced: "Sold for \$1,500." And so Miss Flanagan got a lease. "Scouts" say it is worth many times that amount.

DECLARES GOVERNMENT WILL HAVE DISCHARGED OBLIGATIONS TO OWNERS

DALLAS, TEX., Feb. 4.—When carrier lines in Texas and the southwest are returned to private control March 1 the United States railroad administration will have faithfully discharged its obligations to the corporate owners, according to H. F. Bush of St. Louis, southwest region director, while on a tour of inspection here recently.


"Railroads in Texas will go out from under government control in as good a condition as when they were received," Mr. Bush said. "In some instances they will pass into the hands of their owners in better physical and financial condition than they have ever been. The St. Louis Southwestern does not constitute an exception to this statement. On the contrary, that transportation system will be turned back in a better condition than when it was taken over by the government, the Texas railroad commission notwithstanding."

Mr. Bush scouted the idea that his trip over the Cotton Belt in Texas had any bearing on the recent controversy between the railroad administration and members of the Texas railroad commission. "I have fully accepted the report of Mr. Hadley, who made an inspection of that transportation system," continued Mr. Bush, "and my present trip is not being made for the purpose of satisfying myself as to the correctness of that report."

Dempsey to Have Chance to Clear Himself of Charge

By HENRY L. FARRELL
NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, will be given a chance to clear himself of "draft dodging charges." The army, navy and civilian board of boxing control, to whom the champion appealed for a hearing, has reconsidered its previous decision to remain out of the controversy over his war record and will sit in judgment on the case February 11.

The committee acting as a court, is to consist of Alfred L. Madley, counsel of the board; Chairman, Major A. J. Drexel, Hiddle; Gutzon Borglum, the sculptor; Dr. Joseph E. Ryan, of Princeton, former head of army athletics; Robert Edgren, formerly sporting editor of the New York World; John S. Smith, chairman of the New Jersey state boxing commission; Rowell P. Easton, R. Breckenridge Steel and Adam Emple.

The committee today wired Jack Kearns, manager of the champion, of its decision that it was thought that Dempsey might attend the hearing in person as in making the appeal he expressed willingness either to appear personally or file an answer to any questions submitted.

Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, member of the International Sporting Club, was asked to sit on the court but the Socialist hearing now before the legislature made it impossible for him to accept.


On January 22, Dempsey wired an appeal to the board as a body of thorough and honorable sportsmen, whose aim has always been justice and fairness and a square deal for all. "Investigate this matter thoroughly and if I am innocent of the charge of draft dodger clear me publicly before the world and if I am guilty, condemn me."

At first it was decided to ignore the appeal and remain out of the controversy but in announcing the call for the meeting the board explained that it had been forced to this course by popular demand as represented in hundreds of letters from coast to coast received daily at the office of the board.

GENERAL PERSHING TO REACH FT. WORTH SATURDAY MORNING

FORT WORTH, TEX., Feb. 4.—Gen. John J. Pershing and his staff of nine officers will reach Fort Worth at 8:30 a. m., Feb. 7, coming here from Dallas. The special reception committee from the Bothwell Kane post, American Legion, will meet the army party at the Texas and Pacific station, with a mounted escort of 24 men, and accompany it up Main street to the Fort Worth club, where rooms have been reserved for the entire party.

After breakfast at the club, the general and his party will be taken in automobiles to Camp Bowie and to two flying fields—Tallafiero, at Hicks, and Barron, at Everman.

Camp Bowie is on the outskirts of the city and here the party will be welcomed by Col. W. L. Reed and his staff. Tallafiero flying field is 10 miles north of the city and Barron five miles south. The stops at these points will be brief and the entire party will be brought back to Lake Worth, where at the Moshia Temple mosque lunch will be served.

The Shriners expect to give a reception there for the general and his officers at a banquet at one of the downtown hotels. Only ex-service men will be admitted. It is expected General Pershing will deliver a brief address to the former soldiers, sailors and marines.

The Pershing party will remain in Fort Worth Sunday, Feb. 8. At the request of the commander-in-chief, a formal program has been arranged for the forenoon. However, at 12:30 p. m. the party will be guests of the Elks at luncheon and at 2 o'clock the general will unveil a memorial tablet of the Elks. This tablet is located on the side of the Elks' big building overlooking Burk Burnett park. This tablet is in memory of the Fort Worth Elks who went to war. Later General Pershing will be the guest of the Sunday schools of the city. His visit to Fort Worth will end at 7:30 p. m. Sunday, when he leaves for Lawton, Okla., where he will inspect Fort Sill and the government school of fire.

A feature of the Pershing entertainment here will be the participation of the commander-in-chief's former orderly, Private Hovenkamp, who is now a farmer boy near Fort Worth. He served for a time under Pershing in France.

PERSHING SQUARE TO BE DEDICATED FRIDAY

DALLAS, TEX., Feb. 4.—"Pershing Square" will be dedicated to the honor of the commander-in-chief of the American Expeditionary Force during the visit of Gen. John J. Pershing to this city, Friday, Feb. 6.

Several boxing bouts, featuring former service men, and a banquet are other parts of the program planned for the distinguished visitor, who will come to Dallas from Houston, after

visits there and at San Antonio and El Paso.

From the moment General Pershing's party steps from the train here until it leaves Saturday for Fort Worth the local committee on arrangements plans to see that the general's time is monopolized, except for the brief intervals he will devote to official matters.

The "square" to be dedicated to Pershing has been known as "Old Five Points," and lies near the center of the business district. It is formed by the junction of Commerce, Preston and Jackson streets.

MYSTERY WIRELESS PLANT IS OBJECT OF SEARCH BY AGENTS OF GOVERNMENT

EL PASO, TEX., Feb. 4.—Federal agents are searching for a mystery wireless plant believed to be located somewhere in the southwest, whose activities are becoming too aggressive.

The plant persists in sending out frequent S. O. S. calls, always signed "H. O. B." and the "outlaw" operator apparently takes delight in breaking up radio messages being handled in this district. He began courtizing trouble recently by interfering with military messages.

Besides the army men, there are 15 licensed amateur wireless operators in El Paso. All deny any knowledge of the mystery plant except that they have heard its calls.

Amateurs who "listen in" declare that the unknown operator invariably "breaks up" messages when he is on the job, and is especially active when time flashes are being transmitted at 10:40 p. m. They cite a recent instance. A steamer out in the Pacific was sending a report on the weather and conditions aboardship to San Diego, when the "outlaw" began to send unintelligible dots and dashes for the apparent purpose of preventing military and amateur operators here from hearing the message.

JAZZ MUSIC IS NOT NUISANCE, SAYS JUDGE

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 4.—Jazz music is not a nuisance, according to a decision by Judge Lewis R. Works, in the Los Angeles county superior court.

The city of Pasadena had brought suit against a social club whose neighbors complained its "jazz music jarred on their nerves."

Judge Works said: "Once jazz music might have been construed as a nuisance. It is no longer so construed. If the music disturbed the residents of the neighborhood, I am sorry, but this court can not give them relief."

AGRICULTURAL SITUATION IN TEXAS IS SERIOUS ONE DECLARES CLARENCE OUSLEY

DALLAS, Feb. 4.—The agricultural situation, especially in Texas, is serious, according to Clarence Ousley, former assistant secretary of agriculture. He declared here recently that he could see no possibility of increased farm production in 1920 and that "we will be fortunate if we equal the production of 1919."

"The fact that there can be no increased farm production in 1920 over that of 1919," Mr. Ousley explained, "is due to several main reasons. The first is that the production of the years 1919, 1918 and 1917 was in each year on the basis of greatly increased acreage due to war pressure. In fact, the acreage of those three years increased twice as much as it did in the preceding seven years. The production of those three years was made possible by the extraordinary effort of the farmers and their families and it is beyond human endurance for them to continue those efforts another year."

"We have a forecast of reduced acreage in all crops in the reduced acreage of winter wheat and winter rye, which respectively are 22 and 23 per cent below 1919. Much land, ordinarily used for pasturage, was devoted in the last three years to the raising of wheat and other grains."

"The second factor, operating against an increase in farm production, is the diminished supply of labor. There are not as many men on the farms as when we entered the war in 1917. The only possibility of approximating the acreage of 1919 in two crops is the larger use of improved farm machinery. Of course there is a limit to what can be done in that respect."

"The industries are absorbing more and more farm labor because of the reduced hours and easier conditions of industrial pursuits. The masses of manual laborers, skilled and unskilled, understand perfectly that there is a shortage of manpower throughout the world due to the loss of 10,000,000 men during the war and due in the United States particularly to the lack of immigration, which has practically been suspended for five years to come. Even if Europeans would incline to come to the United States, it is a matter beyond question of doubt that the American people will not permit immigration after a fashion of preceding times. Hence, the Biblical method of multiplying and replenishing the earth."

"Moreover, labor is resolved not only to work shorter hours and to receive higher pay but among a large number of laborers there is a fixed purpose to reduce the output. Gen-

erally speaking, it is safe to say that the output per man throughout the United States, for these various reasons, is not more than 75 per cent of the pre-war output.

"I think all fair men will rejoice at the improved conditions which laboring men are now enjoying because in a democracy the general welfare is best promoted by widespread comfort. Every man who does a day's work either on the farm or in the city is under a moral obligation to do a full day's work. That is the only way we can increase production, or either manufactured materials or raw products. Until we can increase production we cannot lower the scale of prices. Speaking in general terms, the world is not producing in the staple commodities what the world demands. As long as this condition prevails prices must be high."

SOME CROWDED IN BROWNWOOD AS WELL

BROWNWOOD, TEX., Feb. 4.—A Brownwood man bought a home a few days ago and asked for immediate possession. The seller said: "Go right ahead and move in, and found three other families already living in the house. Now there are four."

"I cannot throw them out, because there is nowhere for them to go. We are all just making the best of it, in the five rooms which all of us are using," he says.

FLACK DAMAGE SUIT IN THE 78TH COURT

The Flack damage suit against the Texas company was again taken up before Judge Edgar Scurry in the 78th district court Wednesday morning. W. C. Flack, an oil field worker, is attempting to secure \$75,000 damages for the death of his son, L. O. Flack, and the serious injury of another son, J. M. Flack, which occurred in the oil regions near Electra on April 30, 1919. The two children, one 6 and the other 7, entered a cellar to bring up some fruit jars, and upon striking a catch a flame burst forth causing the death of one child and serious injury of the other.

The other claims that the fire was caused by accumulation of gas in the cellar and that the gas accumulation was due to carelessness on the part of the Texas company in not properly storing the gas upon the oil fields. It is likely that the case will go to the jury late this afternoon.

COFFEE AND MORALE By FLORA G. ORR

Formerly Home-Economics Writer, United States Food Administration
Think back. Was there ever a time even during the most serious and crucial periods of the great war, when you were unable to have a cup of fragrant, steaming coffee for your breakfast?
Other things disappeared from the grocery shelves, but there was always coffee. Other parts of the restaurant menu were seriously curtailed, but nobody struck coffee from the list.
No matter how hard the times coffee was always on hand. Quite a bit of favoritism, wasn't it? Or was it?
We learned, during the war, how to get along without sugar in cakes and desserts; we learned that we could eat cornbread and barley muffins in place of white bread; we learned how to cut down on meats and fats.
The Food Administration at Washington told us these things must be done and taught us how they might be done.
In addition to cereals, milk and cheese, fats and meats, the United States Food Administration must have had coffee under serious consideration.
For there were black times in 1918 when all ordinary commerce was at a standstill. Unless we kept steady, the Food Administration at Washington told us these things must be done and taught us how they might be done.
The soldiers, victory of the enemy seemed imminent. The meant that every ship not bound elsewhere on an absolutely necessary errand must be pressed into service for this direct shipment of food from the United States to France or England.
Eighty per cent of all the coffee imported into the United States is grown in South America. From North and a very different voyage than a freight across the ocean to France or England.
Yet there never was a time when ships were not being sent to South America for coffee. Why?
Because Mr. Hoover believed that the American people needed coffee.
Coffee tends to tone up the system when the body is temporarily below par. It stimulates the heart action. It assists digestion.
Nothing else can so cheer up a man who awakes with a groggish or a down-in-the-mouth feeling. Nothing else makes him feel so good without any ill after-effects.
Wise wives have always known that the time to talk to a man is after the rolls and coffee, not before.
In other words, coffee is as Mr. Hoover said when his food value was questioned, "a psychological necessity."
So you did not have to get along without coffee during the war. At all times dealers were allowed to maintain a "visible supply" of one million and a quarter bags of coffee. This was not as much coffee as goes to make up the visible supply. But it was enough to "keep us going." Enough to give each of us a cup of coffee every day.
Mr. Hoover was unwilling that the American people should have to go without coffee. He saw its direct relation to morale in war time. Mr. Hoover gave coffee its first official recognition as a necessity.
